

Fiscal Year 2025 Fire Prevention and Safety Grants Program Fact Sheet

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 Fire Prevention and Safety (FP&S) Grant Program makes \$32.4 million available to eligible applicants seeking to strengthen community fire prevention programs and to support scientific research on innovations that improve firefighter safety, health, and well-being.

Overview

The FP&S Grant Program is one of three grant programs that constitute the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) focus on enhancing the safety of the public and firefighters with respect to fire and fire-related hazards. Since FY 2002, FEMA has awarded approximately \$920 million through the FP&S Grant Program to provide critically needed resources to strengthen community fire prevention programs and enable scientific research on innovations that improve firefighter safety, health, and well-being. FEMA will make an estimated 100 awards through the FY 2025 FP&S Grant Program to eligible applicants.

Purpose

The FP&S Grant Program is a competitive grant program that provides critically needed resources to fire departments and non-profit organizations to carry out allowable activities. FEMA awards grants to applicants whose requests best address the narrative evaluation criteria identified in the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO).

Funding

The Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act, 2025, Pub. L. No. 119-4, § 1101, appropriated \$32.4 for the FP&S Grant program. The statute, 15 U.S.C. § 2229, authorizes the FP&S Grant Program to make competitive awards to fire departments and national, state, local, tribal, or nonprofit organizations that are:

- Not fire departments; and
- Are recognized for their experience and expertise with respect to fire prevention or fire safety programs and activities, and firefighter research and development programs.

The total amount of funding a recipient may receive under an FP&S Grant Program award is limited to a maximum federal share of \$1.5 million. Research and Development (R&D) Activity applicants under the Early Career Investigator category are limited to a maximum federal share of \$600,000 per project.

Eligibility

The FP&S Grant Program is separated into the following two activities: FP&S and R&D.

Eligible applicants for the FP&S Activity include:

- Fire departments operating in any of the 50 states, as well as fire departments in:
 - The District of Columbia;
 - The Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands;
 - The U.S. Virgin Islands;
 - Guam;
 - American Samoa;
 - The Commonwealth of Puerto Rico; or
 - Any federally recognized Indian tribe or tribal organization.
- National, regional, state, local, tribal and nonprofit interest organizations that are:
 - Not fire departments; and
 - Are recognized for their experience and expertise in fire prevention and safety programs and activities are also eligible applicants under the FP&S Activity.

Eligible applicants for the R&D Activity include:

- National, state, local, federally recognized tribal, and non-profit organizations, such as:
 - Academic institutions (e.g., universities);
 - Research foundations;
 - Public safety institutes; or
 - Public health, occupational health, and injury prevention institutions.

Fire departments are not eligible to apply under the R&D Activity. Applicants are strongly encouraged to seek partnerships with the fire service that will support project efforts from design through dissemination and implementation.

Definitions

- A fire department is an agency or organization having a formally recognized arrangement with a state, local, tribal, or territorial authority (city, county, parish, fire district, township, town, village, or other governing body) to provide fire suppression to a population within a geographically fixed primary first due response area.
- Interest Organizations are national, regional, state, local, tribal, and non-profit entities that are recognized for their experience and expertise in fire prevention and safety programs.

Allowable Activities

Under the FY 2025 FP&S Grant Program, eligible organizations may apply for grants under the following activities:

FP&S Activity

- Community Risk Reduction

- Smoke Alarms, including addressing the needs of the disabled in the community (e.g., deaf/hard of hearing smoke alarms)
- Sprinkler Awareness
- Public Education
- Training
- General Prevention/Awareness
- Risk Assessments
- Juvenile Fire Setter Projects
- Wildfire Risk Reduction
- Code Enforcement/Awareness
- Origin & Cause Investigation
- National/State/Regional Programs and Projects

R&D Activity

- Clinical Studies
- Technology and Product Development
- Early Career Investigators
- Preliminary Studies

Application Process and Evaluation Criteria

All complete and eligible applications are evaluated through a peer review panel process. Peer reviewers will assess the merits of each project within the application based on the substance of the application relative to the established funding priorities. A minimum of three peer review panelists will evaluate the applications using the Narrative Statement, answers to general questions, and answers to activity-specific questions. Each application is judged on its merits against established criteria and is not compared to other applications. The funding priorities differ for the FP&S Activity and the R&D Activity. The funding priorities and narrative evaluation criteria are developed from recommendations provided by a criteria development panel composed of fire service professionals representing the major fire service organizations.

FP&S Activity

- Projects most consistent with the established FP&S Grant
- Program funding priorities that score the highest and are determined to be in the “competitive range” will undergo a Technical Review by the FEMA Program Office, which will assess the request with respect to costs, quantities, feasibility, eligibility, and recipient responsibility.

R&D Activity

- Applications are first reviewed by a panel of fire service experts to assess the need for the research results and the likelihood that the results would be implemented by the fire service in the United States.

- Projects that are determined most likely to be implemented to enable improvement in firefighter safety, health, or well-being will be deemed in the “competitive range” and will be forwarded to a second level of project review, which is the scientific panel review process.
