1 **RESOLUTION 2021-051** 2 3 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF LAUDERDALE LAKES, 4 FLORIDA URGING FLORIDA GOVERNOR RON DESANTIS' VETO OF CS/HB 5 403 PROHIBITING AND PREEMPTING LOCAL GOVERNMENT HOME RULE 6 AUTHORITY TO TAKE CERTAIN ACTIONS RELATING TO THE LICENSURE AND 7 REGULATION OF HOME-BASED BUSINESSES, FURTHER SPECIFYING 8 CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH A BUSINESS IS CONSIDERED A HOME-BASED 9 BUSINESS, AND FURTHER AUTHORIZING HOME-BASED BUSINESSES TO OPERATE IN AREAS ZONED FOR RESIDENTIAL USE; A COPY OF WHICH IS 10 ATTACHED HERETO AS EXHIBIT A, AND A COPY OF WHICH CAN BE 11 INSPECTED IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK; PROVIDING FOR THE 12 13 ADOPTION OF RECITALS; PROVIDING FOR INSTRUCTIONS TO THE CITY 14 CLERK; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. 15 16 WHEREAS, Section 166.021, Florida Statutes and Florida Constitution Section 2(b), Art. 17 VIII provide municipalities with governmental, corporate, and proprietary powers to enable 18 municipalities to conduct municipal government, perform municipal functions, and render 19 municipal services, and may exercise any power for any activity or power which may be exercised 20 by the state or its political subdivisions ("Home Rule"); 21 WHEREAS, as provided for in Section 2(b), Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of 22 Florida, it is the expressed will of the voters of Florida to have the right to govern themselves 23 under municipal Home Rule powers; 24 WHEREAS, the City of Lauderdale Lakes ("City"), similar to other Florida cities within the 25 State, support small businesses and entrepreneurship, however, is further obligated under its 26 fundamental responsibility to provide for the health, safety and welfare of its citizens to balance 27 the desire to operate a home-based business against the potential impacts on residential

28 neighborhoods and residential property values;

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WHEREAS, planning and zoning as an inherent function of local government, has as its
primary purpose to minimize incompatible uses and balance competing property rights,
particularly in the case of preventing proposed uses and development from unfairly interfering
with existing uses;

5 WHEREAS, the City of Lauderdale Lakes, similar to other Florida cities, by and through its 6 comprehensive land use plan, the Lauderdale Lakes Code, including its Land Development 7 Regulations, has enacted commonsense requirements intended to provide for a balanced 8 approach for permitting commercial uses on or in proximity to residentially zoned properties, 9 which requirements account for the prospect of differing impacts of proposed commercial or 10 business uses within residentially zoned neighborhoods;

WHEREAS, the City's requirements aptly consider instances in which low intensity uses,
such as a professional office use may be compatible within a residentially zoned neighborhood,
while conversely, a high intensity use such as a repair yard work or 24-hour gym may be entirely
incompatible;

WHEREAS, during the closing day of the most recent Florida Legislative Session, CS/HB
403 was narrowly passed in the Florida Senate by a 19-18 vote;

WHEREAS, unlike Senate bill CS/CS/SB 266, which served as a compromise on homebased businesses between the Florida League of Cities, legislators, and interested stakeholders, CS/HB 403 does not include critical elements intended to strike the appropriate balance of operating a home-based business with potential adverse impact on property rights of existing residential homeowners;

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1 WHEREAS, CS/HB 403 is materially deficient in that it fails to include key provisions, such 2 as: 3 • The ability for local government to set commonsense limitations on hours of 4 operation for a home-based business. 5 The ability for local governments to place limits on business signed, exterior storage and traffic generated by a home-based business. 6 7 • The ability for local governments to prohibit business activities from occurring 8 within the view of a residential street; 9 10 WHEREAS, CS/HB 403 actually prohibits local governments from regulating home-based businesses differently from other businesses in a commercial zone, but fails to recognize the 11 12 inherent distinction and necessity for regulating the hours of operation for a business in a 13 commercial district, as distinct from a business operating a residentially zoned district; and 14 WHEREAS, if allowed to become law, CS/HB 403 will be a significant preemption of Home Rule Powers and the ability of local governments to balance competing property rights, and 15 16 further will avoid existing local ordinances and regulations that are currently tailored to meet 17 unique solutions to providing for planning and zoning of uses and competing property rights of both businesses and homeowners. 18 19 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF 20 LAUDERDALE LAKES. as follows: 21 SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF RECITALS: The foregoing RECITALS are hereby ratified and 22 confirmed as being true, and the same are hereby incorporated by reference and made part of 23 this Resolution. 24 AUTHORITY: The City Commission of Lauderdale Lakes, Florida hereby SECTION 2. urges Florida Governor Ron DeSantis to veto CS/HB 403, which in prohibiting and preempting 25

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local governments to take certain actions relating to the licensure and regulation of home-based

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businesses, fails to strike the appropriate balance between competing property rights of
 businesses and existing residential homeowners.

3	SECTION 3. INSTRUCTIONS TO THE CITY CLERK: The City Clerk, as directed by the City
4	Manager is hereby directed to forward this Resolution to the Honorable Ron DeSantis, Governor
5	of the State of Florida; the Broward County Legislative Delegation; the Florida League of Cities;
6	The Broward League of Cities, and take any and all action necessary to effectuate the intent of
7	this Resolution.
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1	SECTION 4. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its final passage.
