This resolution establishes and adopts a proposed operating millage rate to fund Fiscal Year 2025-2026 operations and a second and separate millage rate to fund voter approved debt service obligations for Fiscal Year 2025-2026. Advertising for this public hearing appeared on the Truth-in-Millage (TRIM) Notice mailed to all property owners.

City Attorney Calloway read Resolution 2025-114 by title:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF LAUDERDALE LAKES, FLORIDA, ADOPTING A PROPOSED MILLAGE RATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2025/2026 COMMENCING OCTOBER 1, 2025, THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2026; FURTHER SETTING A DATE AND TIME FOR THE SECOND AND FINAL PUBLIC HEARING; PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF RECITALS; PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A DATE, TIME, AND PLACE FOR A FINAL PUBLIC HEARING; PROVIDING FOR DIRECTIONS TO THE DEPUTY CITY CLERK; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Commissioner Thomas made a motion to move Resolution 2025-114 to the floor for discussion.

Susan Goodling-Liburd, Financial Services Consultant, stated that at the Commission Meeting held on July 22, 2025, Resolution #2025-096 was approved to establish proposed tax rates for inclusion in the preliminary tax statements sent to property owners in August 2025. The City identified two (2) Ad Valorem Tax Rates. One was for operating purposes. The other was for the repayment of debt service. Both of these rates, provided for in this resolution, served as separate not-to-exceed amounts for their respective purposes. A mil represents a specific rate of \$1 per \$1,000 of taxable value. A millage rate of 8.6000, for example, would result in a payment of \$8.60 dollars per \$1,000 of tax assessed value. The total operating millage for the City of Lauderdale Lakes is recommended at 8.6000 mils. This entire amount is dedicated to operating and capital purposes. The rate initially set by Resolution #2025-096 was set at this same rate and advertised. The rolled-back rate determined by State law for the change in assessed values versus the current rate is 8.1081. The advertised rate of 8.6000 reflects an increase of 6.07% above the rolled back rate. Debt service for the \$15 million General Obligation Bond approved by the voters in 2004 was issued in FY 2005. For Fiscal Year 2025-2026, the amount needed to fund the voted debt service is .4910 mils. A rolled back calculation is not computed for voter-approved debt service since the millage levied is the actual amount to fund the debt service. This resolution would establish the following proposed millage rates for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 - 8.6000 mils for operating and .4910 for voted debt service - for a total City millage of 9.0910.

Vice Mayor Causwell stated that she would like residents to know that property taxes are being increased due to their property values being increased and not the millage.

Vice Mayor Causwell made a motion to approve Resolution 2025-114.

Ms. Gooding-Liburd stated that the ordinance adopts the tentative Fiscal Year 2025-2026 Budget for the City of Lauderdale Lakes. The appropriations represent funding to support the City Manager's proposed Fiscal Year 2025-2026 Budget and additional recommendations made at Budget Workshop discussions with the Commission. With approval of this ordinance, the resulting tentative budget will be advertised in the Sun-Sentinel and other media outlets according to the requirements of Florida Statute. Advertisement for the Notice of Tax Increase and the Budget Summary will meet statutory requirements for the final adoption of the FY 2025-2026 Annual Final Budget on September 22, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. in the Commission Chambers at City Hall. With the passage on second reading, the adopted budget for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 will be completed. The FY 2026 tentative budget for all funds in the City is \$111,813,166.00.

Mayor Edwards Phillips stated that this was a public hearing and opened the floor for public comments.

Hearing none, Mayor Edwards Phillips closed the floor for public comments.

Discussion ensued amongst the City Commission regarding the need for additional staff. The suggested staff positions are for a Grants Writer and a Special Events Coordinator for the City Commission.

He stated that he agrees with the Marketing Consultation Program through Lauderdale Lakes Beams. He would like include digital marketing within that program.

Commissioner Thomas asked if the Budget Officer would be reassigned the tasks of the Grants Coordinator.

Acting City Manager Howard stated that to decrease the deficit, staff took a hard look at these positions, and as far as the budget and grants analysts, we do have a grants person that is in-house.

Discussion ensued amongst the City Commission regarding the Grants Coordinator position and using a consultant we currently use to assist with applying for the grants. The need for a Procurement Specialist as a lot of projects need to go through the solicitation and procurement process. The need for more staff in I.T. when the world is advancing in technology so much on a daily basis. The need for a Special Events Coordinator specific for the City Commission events. The need for one more staff member in Human Resources to assist the current staff to assist with benefits. The need for an in-house building inspector.

The City Commission requested a list of all the current positions in the city, the salary for each position and the job description, along with any consultants and contractors.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING

Item 7.A. ORDINANCE 2025-011 APPROVING THE RENAMING OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES' MULTIPURPOSE CENTER AS THE "HAZELLE P. ROGERS MULTIPURPOSE CENTER"

There was no discussion on this item.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS ON CONSENT AGENDA

Item 9.A. RESOLUTION 2025-119 AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND THE ACTING CITYMANAGER TO AWARD A CONTRACT TO SOLITUDE LAKE MANAGEMENT IN THE AMOUNT OF SIXTY FOUR THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED ANDTWELVE DOLLARS (\$64,812.00) TO PROVIDE HERBICIDE APPLICATION FOR VEGETATION AND ALGAE CONTROL IN THE CITY'S CANAL NETWORK

Ron Desbrunes, Public Works Director, stated that the city maintains a network of 11 miles canal that requires regular maintenance in the form of trash removal, aquatic vegetation and algae control in order to ensure proper water flow, reduce blockages, and maintain public safety and aesthetics. The maintenance operation is conducted with a combination of man power, mechanical harvesting and chemical treatments.

Chemical treatment of canal requires the purchase, transport and storage of chemicals, equipment and trained personnel. In addition, chemical applications liabilities and licensing seasonal applicators can be challenging and hinder other critical maintenance operations. A licensed chemical spraying services have the workforce and equipment available to mobilize quickly and complete large-scale applications efficiently, minimizing disruptions to other city maintenance operations specifically during peak season where aquatic weeds and invasive plants grow faster than normal and the weather conditions are conducive for algae. Current expenditures to purchase and transport chemicals, trained staffs, vehicle, boat, fuel and equipment are approximately \$75,000. After evaluation, Solitude Lake Management was determined to be the most responsive and responsible bidder, offering the best value to the city. Staff is recommending the City Commission award the contract to Solitude Lake Management for an amount not to exceed Sixty Four Thousand, Eight Hundred and Twelve Dollars (\$64,812.00).

Vice Mayor Causwell asked if there is any staff in house who can perform these duties.

Mr. Desbrunes stated that the stormwater crew is responsible for the canals and there is a lot of canals in the city that require maintaining.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams inquired as to who is currently cleaning the canals.

Mr. Desbrunes stated that Solitude Lake Management is currently doing it from May to September and their contract will expire at the end of September.

Item 9.B. RESOLUTION 2025-120 AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND THE ACTING CITY MANAGER TO AWARD A CONTRACT TO STANTEC CONSULTING SERVICES INC., FOLLOWING A SOLICITATION (RFP25- 3110-04R) ON THE CITY'S DEMANDSTAR PLATFORM TO PROVIDE A SOLID WASTE RATE STUDY FOR THE CITY'S SOLID WASTE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT IN THE AMOUNT OF THIRTY THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$30,400.00)

Mr. Desbrunes stated that the city's solid waste collection, disposal, recycling and other related services fees are funded through the Solid Waste Fund. This is a NonAd valorem special assessment fee established annually by City Commission resolution for residential properties. For FY 2026 the proposed residential rate is \$272. This rate has been established since fiscal year 2018-19 and has not been adjusted. Costs for solid waste processing have been on the rise annually. The current rate structure maybe not be sustainable. In order to determine whether the current special assessment fee can adequately cover the costs of waste processing, a rate study is needed to analyze current revenue versus program costs, evaluate projected future costs and service demands, review the existing rate structures for compliance with applicable laws and industry best practices and make recommendations for adjustments to ensure long-term financial sustainability. The city recently amended Ordinance, 2024-014 (September 10, 2024), Franchise Fee for Solid waste collection: Section 11 "Adjustment Of charges", where the annual rate adjustments for the city will be a flat 5% which takes effect on October 1, 2025 and every October 1 thereafter. Stantec Consulting Services, Inc. scored the highest during the evaluation process, as well as they were identified as the most responsive and responsible proposer, offering the necessary technical expertise, municipal rate-setting experience, and competitive pricing necessary to complete the study.

Item 9.C. RESOLUTION 2025-121 TO AWARD A CONTRACT TO THE MOST RESPONSIVE, RESPONSIBLE AND LOWEST BIDDER SAFA CONSTRUCTION, LLC FOR (ITB 25-6310-11B) WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT CANAL 5 IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED ONE MILLION FOUR HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THREE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE ANDNO/100 DOLLARS (\$1,423,585.00)

Aazam Piprawala, Procurement Administrator, stated that there is an immediate need to repair/restore canal bank and erosion control to protect the canal from pollutants that are harmful to water quality and flood control throughout the canal network. A variety of means and methods will be employed to restore canal banks that are in critical condition. The City of Lauderdale Lakes solicited qualified firms to provide Water Quality Improvement for Canal #5. The solicitation was solicited using the City's electronic bid system, www.demandstar.com from June 11, 2025 until August 15, 2025. The solicitation was broadcast to 2,061 suppliers and there were 61 planholders. The solicitation was further advertised in the Sun Sentinel,

a newspaper of general circulation, on June 15th 2025 and June 18th, 2025. The solicitation was declared closed August 15, 2025. The evaluation process included a thorough review of the written proposals, to determine the lowest responsible and responsive bidder. City staff is recommending award to Safa Construction, LLC. after completing the competitive bidding process which represents the best value to the City for an amount not to exceed One Million, Four Hundred and Twenty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred and Eight Five Dollars (\$1,423,585.00).

Vice Mayor Causwell inquired as to what the money was being spent on.

Magsood Nasir, City Engineer, stated that these funds are only for construction.

Commissioner Thomas asked if ARPA funds were being used for this project.

Mr. Nasir stated that some of the money will be used from the state appropriation and the rest will be ARPA funds.

Item 9.D. RESOLUTION 2025-122 AUTHORIZING THE ACTING CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE AN EXTENSION TO THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN BROWARD COUNTY AND THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION/COMMUNITY BUS SERVICES

Ericka Lockett, Parks and Human Services Director, stated that the City entered into a Public Transportation/Community Interlocal Agreement with Broward County to operate the Lauderdale Lakes Community Bus Services. The agreement includes the leasing of wheelchair-accessible passenger vehicles for regular route service for a three-year term, with the option for three additional one-year extensions upon written approval from both the County's and City's Contract Administrators. The Original Agreement was amended on or around February 22, 2021, October 29, 2021, and November 5, 2024 (collectively, the "Agreement"). The Parties desire to enter into this Amendment to extend the term of the Agreement through September 30, 2027, and to add Juneteenth as an observed holiday on which service does not operate. The minimum ridership level for the Public Transportation/Community Bus Interlocal Agreement is 7.1 passengers per revenue hour. The Community Bus currently operates two weekday routes: one East/West route and one North/South route, as well as two Saturday routes. The total annual operating funding for the Public Transportation/Community Bus Service from Broward County is approximately \$325,541.20, which is paid 100% by Broward County.

Item 10.A. RESOLUTION 2025-123 A QUASI JUDICIAL PROCEEDING APPROVING, WITH CONDITIONS, CONDITIONAL USE APPLICATION NO. 01-CU-25("APPLICATION"), SUBMITTED BY RAM'S CAR CARE/RAM'S CAR CARECENTER, INC., REQUESTING CONDITIONAL USE APPROVAL PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 5 SECTION 503 OF THE LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS ("LDRS") TO ALLOW FOR THE OPERATION OF AN AUTOMOBILE REPAIR GARAGE IN THE B-4 INTENSE BUSINESS DISTRICT

Tanja McCoy, Development Services Director, stated that the proposed location is a 10,750 square-foot space within an existing industrial building in the B-4 Intense Business District. The business specializes in preventative maintenance and light repair services for fleet accounts, with only limited retail activity. Fleet operations mean that vehicles are not stored on-site for extended periods, minimizing impacts on surrounding properties. All repair activity will be conducted indoors, supported by six automotive lifts and two diagnostic racks.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams asked if any other businesses in the plaza have made such requests.

Ms. McCoy stated that some of the other businesses are going to remain in the plaza, however, it depends on where they are located in the plaza as buildings within the plaza is not going to be rebuilt.

Item 10.B. RESOLUTION 2025-124 A QUASI-JUDICIAL PROCEEDING REGARDING SBA TOWERS X, LLC APPLICATION FOR A WIRELESS COMMUNICATIONS PURSUANT TO SECTION 1111 OF THE LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, LOCATED AT 3001 NORTH STATE

Ms. McCoy stated that SBA Towers X, LLC, is proposing construction of a 105-foot stealth "monopine" wireless communications tower behind the existing Walmart at Oakland Park Blvd. and State Road 7. The tower would accommodate up to four carriers and is sited within a stormwater retention pond on an elevated 40'x40' equipment platform. Equipment would be screened by a six-foot chain-link fence with PVT slats, limited to six feet in height. Finding that application 01-WC-24 does not meet the standards of Sections 1111.5 and 1111.6 regarding the masonry wall, landscaping, and one-mile distance separation, staff continues to recommend denial of this application. However, such denial of application 01-WC-24 will allow exceptions to these provisions to be considered pursuant to Section 503, Conditional Uses.

City Attorney Calloway explained the quasi-judicial process.

Item 10.C. RESOLUTION 2025-125 A QUASI-JUDICIAL PROCEEDING APPROVING SBATOWERS X, LLC APPLICATION FOR A CONDITIONAL USE WITH EXCEPTIONS WHICH WILL ALLOW THE PLACEMENT OF A 105FT STEALTH "MONOPINE" WIRELESS COMMUNICATIONS TOWER LOCATED AT 3001 N.STATE ROAD 7, LAUDERDALE LAKES, FLORIDA

Ms. McCoy stated that SBA Towers X, LLC, is proposing construction of a 105-foot stealth "monopine" wireless communications tower behind the existing Walmart at Oakland Park Blvd. and State Road 7. The tower would accommodate up to four carriers and is sited within a stormwater retention pond on an elevated 40'x40' equipment platform. Equipment would be screened by a six-foot chain-link fence with PVT slats, limited to six feet in height. Staff has reviewed the supplemental information provided and finds the application in conformance with the requirements of Sections 1111.7 and 503.3 of the Land Development Regulations and recommends approval of Conditional Use application 01-CU-24, along with the requested masonry wall, landscaping and one-mile separation exceptions. Staff finds that the applicant has conducted a thorough analysis of the surrounding area within a one-half mile radius to provide improved network coverage in an area currently underserved by reliable coverage. The applicant has demonstrated the need for the tower, and has eliminated all other viable locations through the required hierarchy analysis. While the tower will be visible from the surrounding area, this is unavoidable due to its required height to provide proper service. The equipment compound will only be visible within the confines of the rear loading area of the commercial property, and will not be visible from any of the surrounding residential uses due to the existing eight (8) foot masonry wall on the north, west and south sides of the site. Staff further recommends that approval of application 01-CU-24 be subject to certain conditions.

Item 10.D. RESOLUTION 2025-126 CANCELLING THE OCTOBER 13, 2025 CITY COMMISSION WORKSHOP AND THE OCTOBER 14, 2025 CITY COMMISSION MEETING DUE TO THE CITY COMMISSION ATTEDING THE FLORIDA REDEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION (FRA) CONFERENCE FROM OCTOBER 14TH TO OCTOBER 17TH, 2025

Vielka Buchanan, Economic Development Manager, The "Shop Lauderdale Lakes" initiative is designed to boost revenue for local businesses, highlight the value of shopping within the community, and expand membership in the Lauderdale Lakes Chamber of Commerce. Promotional Strategy: A city-wide rollout of branded materials will reinforce the campaign's message and the Chamber's mission of Growing Business, Strengthening Community. Promotional assets include: Eye-catching signage across the city Flyers, posters, and decals for local distribution Feather flags and yard signs for high-visibility areas Digital outreach through social media and online platforms Target Audience: Over 13,000 households in Lauderdale Lakes The city's dynamic and diverse business community Interactive Feature: A central element of the campaign is the integration of QR codes on all printed materials. These codes will direct users to a dedicated "Shop Lauderdale Lakes" landing page hosted on the Chamber's website, offering

easy access to business listings, promotions, and membership opportunities. The Chamber has requested promotional branded items from the City as well.

Commissioner Harrison stated that he was not in favor of giving out branded items and that the Chamber needs to start up on their own for now. He does support them, however, they do need to develop themselves at the onset.

Mayor Edwards Phillips inquired as to what the requested amount was for.

Ms. Buchanan stated that the requested amount is for signage and posters for the "Shop Lauderdale Lakes" initiative.

Discussion ensued amongst the City Commission about the Chambers need to promote and develop themselves.

Consensus was made to table this resolution at the next meeting.

Vice Mayor Causwell stated that the event should not end at 8 p.m. Being that it is Carnival weekend, she would like to extend the time to 11 p.m.

Consensus was made to amend the resolution at the City Commission meeting changing the time from 8 p.m. to 11 p.m.

A. DISCUSSION REGARDING STATE REPRESENTATIVE LISA DUNKLEY'S REQUEST TO HOST DISTRICT 97 TOWN HALL MEETING AT A CITY FACILITY (4:30 P.M.TIME CERTAIN)

This item was pulled from the agenda.

- B. PRESENTATION REGARDING FISCAL YEAR 2024 YEAR END FINANCIAL AUDIT (5:00 P.M. TIME CERTAIN)
 - Mr. Roderick Harvey of HCT Certified Public Accountants and Consultants, stated that he has no reportable findings to issue to the City Commission relative to the 2024 Year End Financial Audit.
- C. DISCUSSION REGARDING SUPPORTING THE BROWARD METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION'S AMENDED 2050 METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN (MTP) FOR INCLUSION OF TWO PRIORITY CORRIDOR PROJECTS NW 19TH STREET - NW 43RD TERRACE TO NW 31ST AVENUE AND NW 31ST AVENUE - SEGMENTS BETWEEN BROWARD BOULEVARD TO MCNAB ROAD (5:30 P.M. TIME CERTAIN)

James Cromer and Fazal Quarashi from the Broward MPO provided a presentation on the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (also referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law) established the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Discretionary Grant Program and

appropriated funds from the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) to implement the Program. The funds provide Federal financial assistance to support local initiatives that prevent deaths and serious injury on roads and streets. The Broward MPO and Broward County Government jointly applied for the SS4A Grant and received a \$5 million grant award from USDOT to develop the Broward Safety Action Plan (BSAP). One component of the Broward Safety Action Plan (BSAP) was the identification of Priority Corridors. Three key metrics - High-Injury Network (HIN), High-Risk Network (HRN), and Demographics Analysis – were the basis for identifying and prioritizing the 338 HIN corridors. Eleven of the 338 corridors advanced into the concept design phase as Priority Corridors. These corridors included FDOT, Broward County, and locally-owned roadways. Conceptual design for the Priority Corridors included planning level design plans and cost estimates to create engineering solutions to achieve zero fatalities and serious injuries on the Broward roadway system. Two of the Priority Corridors include segments within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City of Lauderdale Lakes. These are: NW 31st Avenue – NW 8th Street to McNab Road and NW 19th Street – NW 43rd Terrace to NW 31st Avenue.

D. DISCUSSION REGARDING AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF THE UNIFORM COLLECTION OF NON-AD VALOREM ASSESSMENTS AGREEMENT

This item was pulled.

E. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE PURCHASE OF A TABLE FOR THE WOMEN OF VETERANS AFFAIRS (WOVA) ANNUAL MILITARY BALL (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER MAXWELL-WILLIAMS)

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that there is a request from the Women of Veterans Affairs to purchase a table for ten in the amount of \$1,000 for their annual Military Ball.

The City Commissioners who attended the Military Ball last year stated they purchased a ticket from their own City account last year.

City Attorney Calloway stated that to remain complaint with the Office of the Inspector General (OIG), the appropriate documentation should be on file when such tickets are purchased. Regardless of the fund that the ticket is being purchased from, it is still public funds.

Consensus was made not to purchase a table from City funds.

F. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE PURCHASE OF A TABLE FOR THE FIYAH GALA EVENT (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER MAXWELL-WILLIAMS)

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that there is a request from Island Space Caribbean Museum for the FIYAH gala event to purchase a table for ten in the amount of \$5,000.

Consensus was made not to purchase a table from City funds.

G. DISCUSSION REGARDING TEEN TALK TRIAD - FALL FORUM (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER THOMAS)

Commissioner Thomas introduced Dr. Joanette Brookes-George of the Teen Talk Triad.

Dr. Joanette Brookes-George stated that she would like to consider a partnership with the City in hosting the Power of Choice: Teen-Decision-Making Forum on Saturday, November 15, 2025 from 10:00am to 3:00pm. She is asking to use the Multipurpose Auditorium for about 200-200 middle and high school students. "The Power of Choice" is a transformational youth summit addressing the digital pressures, mental health struggles, and decision-making challenges faced by today's teens. This event equips youth with real-life tools to thrive in a tech-driven world by emphasizing digital ethics, emotional resilience, and suicide prevention. This summit bridges prevention and intervention —providing proactive skills and safe spaces for dialogue and healing.

The City Commission were all in favor of partnering for this event.

H. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE CONTRACT EXTENSION FOR CONSTRUCTION MANAGER SERVICES THROUGH DECEMBER 2026

Mr. Nasir stated that pursuant to Resolution 2022-017, the City Commission approved temporary ARPA-funded positions, including a Construction Manager role awarded to Mr. Bhuiyan Md. Munir.

Mr. Piprawala stated that Mr. Bhuiyan's current agreement, Amendment No. 1 (authorized by Resolution 2025-017), provides a monthly compensation of \$6,360.00 and is set to expire on September 30, 2025. Staff proposes Amendment No. 2 to extend the term for these services through December 31, 2026. The proposed amendment includes a 5% increase, setting the new monthly compensation at \$6,678.00, which is an increase of \$318.00 per month.

I. DISCUSSION TO PROCEED WITH A CONTRACT AWARD FOR PROFESSIONAL SURVEYING AND GEOTECHNICAL SERVICES, AFTER A COMPREHENSIVE EVALUATION PROCESS FOR RFQ 25-3110-02Q WHERE, DUE TO TIED SCORES, THE RECOMMENDED VENDOR WAS SELECTED VIA LOTTERY

Mr. Piprawala stated that after a detailed evaluation process. RFQ 25-3110-02Q elided 14 proposals. Because of the complexity the evaluation process was divided into 4 meetings. There was a tie for first place, a tie for second place and then one company in third place. The City consulted with the Florida DEP, Office of Resilience and Coastal Protection program who further authorized the City to proceed with the award pursuant to the City's procurement policy. City staff is recommending that the selection of an awarded vendor be pursuant to the city's procurement code, Article Sec. 82-356. m. 3. Methods of source selection-Tie bids, as none of the vendors are local to the City of Lauderdale Lakes. With direction from the City Attorney and City Manager's Office, a coin was flipped and Craven, Thompson and Associates, Inc. won. This meeting was live on Zoom.

J. DISCUSSION REGARDING CONTRACT FOR THE CITY ATTORNEY

Ms. Sharon Haynes, Director of Financial Services stated that staff is seeking the City Commission to provide guidance on how they would like to move forward with legal services provided to the city. The term of the incumbent, including all contractual extensions ends on September 16, 2025. According to the City's procurement code, Sec 82-358 Legal services are actually exempt from bid and proposal requirements. However, the city is also allowed to exercise its right to issue a public solicitation for these services, at the will of the City Commission. She is requesting permission to meet, along with the Acting City Manager and Procurement Administrator the City Attorney to review and negotiate on the contract before bringing it back to the City Commission.

Vice Mayor Causwell inquired as to the total amount and what does it entail.

Ms. Haynes stated that the retainer fee is \$600,000. In addition, litigation will be extra. The retainer fee covers the City Attorney's attendance at the City Commission meeting, review of ordinances and resolutions and clarification of legal matters while he is in City Commission meetings.

Vice Mayor Causwell asked when the contract expired.

Ms. Haynes stated that is expired on September 16, 2025.

City Attorney Calloway stated that since FY 2021, he has provided for a monthly retainer in the amount of \$204,000. He has worked on matters associated with Oakland Villas, as well as working with the Development Services department on Code Enforcement issues. In addition, he was been working on litigation with 3 properties. This was all under the direction of the City Commission. In addition, without given a budget, he has worked on litigation regarding the bowling alley, protected the City's interest with the Championship Academy Charter School, Sopher property and most recently the Marketplace Plaza. These litigations have brought money back to the City in excess of the litigation costs.

Commissioner Harrison stated that legal services are costly and the City Attorney has had to work on several cases for the City. While he is protecting the City's interest, he has a firm to report back

to. He stated that further discussion is needed.

Vice Mayor Causwell stated that litigation costs money and the City may not be able to afford it. She stated that further discussion is also needed.

Commissioner Thomas stated that she did not realize how much it takes to get the litigation done. She stated that further discussion is also needed. She thanked the City Attorney for bringing funds back into the City and would like for other ways for the City to better itself.

Mayor Edwards Philips stated she is appreciative of the funds that the City Attorney brought to the City through the litigation/. The City has grown and many of the issues have been resolved and in the process of being resolved so the litigation costs may go down.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that the City Attorney has done a good job and is doing the required work and should be compensated accordingly.

K. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE DESIGN OF THE ALCEE HASTINGS PARKWAY PROJECT

Mr. Desbrunes stated that on July 23rd, 2024, the City Commission awarded a contract to Kimley-Horn and Associates in the amount of \$120,000 to provide design services for the NW 36th Street Improvement project (Alcee Hastings Parkway). The project, funded by the Broward County Transportation Surtax program, consists in the installation of streetscape, landscape improvements, way finding, traffic calming and drainage improvements. A powerpoint presentation was shared.

Commissioner Thomas stated that she would like a better conceptual idea of the plans. She would like to know what would be best for that area.

Mr. Desbrunes made some recommendations as to what can work in the area and stated that he could also bring back some recommendations to the City Commission.

Commissioner Harrison stated that he likes Option 1. He would like to find a balance between aesthetics and sustainability.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams inquired as to where the funds are coming from.

Mr. Desbrunes stated that the funds are coming from the surtax. \$1 million was allocated for design and construction for this project and they have released \$120,000 for the design with the remaining balance for construction.

Mr. Desbrunes stated that an ordinance will have be amended if the City Commission desires. As the current ordinance reads, the adjacent property owners will be responsible to take care of the maintenance of the swale where the trees will be planted. The new ordinance can allow for the City to maintain the trees.

Commissioner Thomas asked for a 3D visual so she can have a better idea.

L. DISCUSSION REGARDING ALLOWING MUSIC AT RESTAURANTS DURING CARNIVAL WEEKEND

This item was discussed under the City Commission agenda review.

M. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE PROCESS AND PROCEDURE FOR HIRING A NEW CITY MANAGER (SPONSORED BY MAYOR EDWARDS PHILLIPS)

Mr. Piprawala stated that the scope of services were revised, primarily the evaluation criteria and the insurance requirements. The bid was launched on September 11th and will be closing at the end of the week. The findings will be brought back to the City Commission at the next City Commission workshop.

N. DISCUSSION REGARDING RENAMING A DESIGNATED SECTION OF NW 41st STREET LOCATED EAST OF NW 31st AVENUE AFTER BOYD H. ANDERSON HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL, MR. JAMES GRIFFIN (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER HARRISON)

Commissioner Harrison stated that he would like to rename a designated section of NW 41st Street located east of NW 31st Avenue after Boyd H. Anderson High School Principal, Mr. James Griffin. He shared a list of the accomplishments of Mr. Griffin.

Discussion ensued amongst the City Commission regarding the exact location of the street for the proposed renaming.

Mayor Edwards Phillips stated based on the pictures provided, the street is very short. She does not believe that street will do Mr. Griffin justice.

Mr. Nasir stated that stated since this is a city road, the City Commission can rename the road. If agreed upon by the City Commission, he will reach out to the county regarding the proposed location to discuss the traffic issues before finalization. No approval from the City of Oakland Park is needed.

Mr. Desbrunes informed of the location area that belongs to the City, Oakland Park and the Broward County School Board.

There was a continued discussion of other possible street areas for the proposed renaming. Two proposed locations were 31st Street and 39th Street, going to 29th Avenue and 31st Street and 41st Avenue, going towards 29th Avenue.

Mr. Desbrunes stated that NW 39th Street from NW 31st Street to 29th Avenue can work as the street belongs to the City.

City Attorney Calloway stated that an ad hoc committee would be asked to recommend, not recommend or recommend with conditions for the proposed location.

Commissioner Harrison stated that he would to propose for a portion of 39th Street, from NW 31st Avenue to NW 29th Avenue.

O. DISCUSSION REGARDING RENAMING THE SAMUEL BROWN MONUMENT TO THE SAMUEL BROWN VETERANS MONUMENT/SAMUEL BROWN AND VETERANS MONUMENT (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER MAXWELL-WILLIAMS)

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that the Military Affairs Board would like the City to consider renaming the Sam Brown Monument to the Sam Brown/Veterans Monument.

Mayor Edwards Phillips stated that the Northgate Park may be a better location.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated she suggested that location a few years ago, however, the Northgate residents were not in favor.

Mayor Edwards Phillips stated that the City should reach back out to the Northgate residents to see how they feel about the renaming.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated she will work with the Acting City Manager to do so.

P. DISCUSSION REGARDING VETERANS DAY APPRECIATION (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER MAXWELL-WILLIAMS)

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that the Military Affairs Board is requesting gift cards in the amount of \$1000 for the City's veterans. The proposed amount is \$250 in \$50 gift cards for the Military Affairs Board members and \$750 in \$25 gift cards (30 in total) for distribution to the City veterans. This will be given out on Veteran's Day.

Commissioner Thomas stated that there are a few hundred veterans in the City. The amount being requested is negating the other veterans. She is not in favor of this request.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that the 30 gift cards would be for those veterans who attended the event.

Mayor Edwards Phillips and Vice Mayor Causwell stated they were not in favor of this request as there are many veterans in the City.

Commissioner Maxwell-Williams stated that she will have a member of the board attend a meeting to provide more information about the request.

Q. DISCUSSION REGARDING SEALING & EXPUNGEMENT WORKSHOP (SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONER HARRISON)

Commissioner Harrison stated he would like to have a Sealing & Expungement One Stop Workshop in collaboration with Office of the State Attorney, Harold Pryor, and Clerk of Courts, Brenda Forman. The proposed event will take place on November 14, 2025 om 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. in the Multipurpose Building.

6. REPORTS

Ms. McCoy stated that she spoke to Ms. Perrin regarding the time that the City needs to process these type of special events permits. Only eleven days were given for the City to perform the review. Ms. Perrin stated that the church is now aware of the time needed and will act earlier next year.

Ms. McCoy stated that she spoke to Singh's Restaurant and she is currently researching the current ordinance and see if the code can be changed to accommodate restaurants being able to provide music and entertainment.

4. CONSIDERATION OF BUSINESS CONTAINED IN THE CALL FOR SPECIAL MEETING

A. RESOLUTION 2025-118 ADOPTING A FINAL MILLAGE RATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING OCTOBER 1, 2025, THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2026

This resolution establishes and adopts a final operating millage rate to fund Fiscal Year 2025-2026 operations and a second and separate millage rate to fund voter approved debt service obligations for Fiscal Year 2025-2026. Advertising for this public hearing appeared in the Sun-Sentinel on Friday, September 19, 2025.

City Attorney Calloway read Resolution 2025-118 by title:

RESOLUTION 2025-118

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF LAUDERDALE LAKES, FLORIDA, ADOPTING A FINAL MILLAGE OF 8.6000 (8.5 MILLS OPERATING AND .1 MILLS RESERVE) AND A VOTER-APPROVED DEBT SERVICE MILLAGE RATE FOR THE CITY'S GENERAL OPERATING AND DEBT FUNDS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING OCTOBER 1, 2025, THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2026; PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF RECITALS; PROVIDING FOR INSTRUCTIONS TO THE DEPUTY CITY CLERK; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Commissioner Harrison made a motion to move Resolution 2025-118 to the floor for discussion.

Motion passed: 5-0

Susan Gooding-Liburd, Financial Services Consultant, stated that at the Commission Meeting held on July 22, 2025, Resolution 2025-096 was approved to establish tentative tax rates for inclusion in the preliminary tax statements sent to property owners in August 2025. The City identified two (2) Ad Valorem tax rates: one for operating purposes and another for the repayment of debt service. Each rate, as provided in the resolution, served as a separate not-to-exceed amount for its respective purpose. A mil represents a tax rate of \$1 per \$1,000 of taxable value. For example, a millage rate of 8.6000 would result in a tax of \$8.60 per \$1,000 of assessed taxable value. Subsequently, at the Special Commission Meeting held on September 10, 2025, Resolution 2025-114 was approved to establish the proposed millage rates. The total operating millage rate for the City of Lauderdale Lakes is recommended at 8.6000 mils, which is fully dedicated to operating and capital purposes. This proposed rate matches the rate adopted in Resolution 2025-114 and was advertised in the Sun-Sentinel on Friday, September 19, 2025. According to State law, the rolled-back rate - which reflects the tax rate that would generate the same revenue as the previous year, accounting for changes in assessed property values - is 8.1081 mils. Therefore, the advertised rate of 8.6000 mils represents a 6.07% increase over the rolled-back rate. Debt service for the \$15 million General Obligation Bond approved by the voters in 2004 was issued in FY 2005. For Fiscal Year 2025-2026, the amount needed to fund the voted debt service is .4910 mils. A rolled back calculation is not computed for voter-approved debt service since the millage levied is the actual amount to fund the debt service. This resolution would establish the final millage rates for Fiscal Year 2025-2026: 8.6000 mils for operating and .4910 for voted debt service - for a total City millage of 9.0910.

Mayor Edwards Phillips announced that this was a public hearing and opened the floor for public comments.

Trevor Schmidt stated that he has an issue with the 8.6 millage rate as it is the highest in Broward County.

Mayor Edwards Phillips asked if there were any more public comments. Hearing none, Mayor Edwards Phillips closed the floor for public comments.

Discussion ensued amongst the City Commission regarding their wishes to lower the millage, however, it is not feasible with the current state of the economy.

Commissioner Harrison made a motion to approve Resolution 2025-118.

Ms. Gooding-Liburd stated that the ordinance adopts the Final Fiscal Year 2025–2026 Budget for the City of Lauderdale Lakes. The appropriations outlined represents funding to support the City Manager's proposed FY 2025–2026 Budget. Following approval of the ordinance on first reading, the budget was advertised in the Sun-Sentinel and other media outlets in accordance with the requirements of Florida Statute. The Notice of Tax Increase and the Budget Summary were published in compliance with statutory requirements for final budget adoption. This ordinance sets the final budget for FY 2025-2026. It affects all funds by fund category: General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Debt Funds, Capital Funds and Enterprise Funds. The General Fund is supported by the final property tax millage of 8.6000 mills. The General Fund funds the City's highest priority, public safety (Police and Fire Services), through the contractual obligations. The budget is balanced at \$111,813,166.00.

Mayor Edwards Phillips announced that this was a public hearing and opened the floor for public comments.

Trevor Schmidt stated that the City's millage is 8.6 and the City of North Lauderdale's millage is 7.4.

Vice Mayor Causwell inquired as to why the service is being contracted out and not being done in house.

Ron Desbrunes, Public Works Director, stated that the city maintains a network of 11 miles canal that requires regular maintenance in the form of trash removal, aquatic vegetation and algae control in order to ensure proper water flow, reduce blockages, and maintain public safety and aesthetics. The maintenance operation is conducted with a combination of man power, mechanical harvesting and chemical treatments. Chemical treatment of canal requires the purchase, transport and storage of chemicals, equipment and trained personnel. In addition, chemical applications liabilities and licensing seasonal applicators can be challenging and hinder other critical maintenance operations. A licensed chemical spraying services have the workforce and equipment available to mobilize quickly and complete large-scale applications efficiently, minimizing disruptions to other city maintenance operations specifically during peak season where aquatic weeds and invasive plants grow faster than normal and the weather conditions are conducive for algae. Current expenditures to purchase and transport chemicals, trained staffs, vehicle, boat, fuel and equipment are approximately \$75,000. After evaluation, Solitude Lake Management was determined to be the most responsive and responsible bidder, offering the best value to the city. Staff is recommending the City Commission award the contract to Solitude Lake Management for an amount not to exceed Sixty Four Thousand, Eight Hundred and Twelve Dollars (\$64,812.00).

Mayor Edwards Phillips announced it was a public hearing and opened the floor for public comments.

City resident Byron Maylor stated that these towers emit radiation and static electricity. He stated that these things should be taken into consideration when awarding such variances.

City resident Nicole Hall stated that the City code specifies that the towers need to be one mile apart. She asked what the City was gaining by breaking its own code.

Mayor Edwards Phillips asked if there were any more public comments. Hearing none, Mayor Edwards Phillips closed the floor for public comments.

Mr. Calloway asked the City Commission if there has been any ex-parte communications between any member and any affected persons who has an interest in this matter.

A response of NO: Mayor Edwards Phillips, Vice Mayor Causwell, Commissioner Harrison, Commissioner Maxwell-Williams, Commissioner Thomas

Mr. Calloway asked if there have been persons who have submitted a Notice of Intent to participate in this matter.

Mr. Calloway asked if the legal advertisement was published in the newspaper at least seven days prior to the proceeding.

Mr. Calloway asked if a mailed notice containing the same information as the legal advertisement was sent to each property owner within 300 feet of the subject property at least five calendar days prior to the proceeding.

Ms. McCoy stated that a mailed notice containing the same information as the legal advertisement was sent to each property owner within 300 feet of the subject property at least five calendar days prior to the proceeding.

An oath was administered to Ms. McCoy and Ms. Katie Berkey of Becker & Poliakoff, Mr. Sanjay Dhawan, Ms. Maria Gimenez, Mr. Shahzad Mahmood, Mr. Matthew Simmons and Mr. Peter Traficante by Deputy City Clerk Benasrie-Watson.

Ms. McCoy stated that SBA Towers X, LLC, is proposing construction of a 105-foot stealth "monopine" wireless communications tower behind the existing Walmart at Oakland Park Blvd. and State Road 7. The tower would accommodate up to four carriers and is sited within a stormwater retention pond on an elevated 40'x40' equipment platform. Equipment would be screened by a sixfoot chain-link fence with PVT slats, limited to six feet in height. The applicant seeks relief from onemile separation requirement from existing towers, decorative masonry wall with Mediterranean Revival design, ten-foot landscaped buffer around equipment. The tower supports the City's Comprehensive Plan goals for advancing wireless services and emergency communications. The stealth monopine design meets the LDRs requirement for facilities within 300 feet of residential areas. The existing eight-foot perimeter wallaround Walmart provides visual buffering of the proposed ground equipment for surrounding residential neighborhoods. Required setbacks from residential properties are met (north: 214 ft; west: 123 ft; south: 277 ft). The structure is designed to support up to four carriers. Minimal traffic or infrastructure impact is anticipated. In the case where the application does not strictly conform to the requirements of Sections 1111.5 and 1111.6, a denial of the application must first be issued. Upon the issuance of the denial, the applicant may request exceptions from 1111.5 and 1111.6 pursuant to section 1111.7 following the procedures and requirements of Section 503, Conditional Uses. City Staff has reviewed the application and find that the proposed design as set forth in the application fails to meet the decorative masonry, the ten (10) foot landscape buffer, and one-mile distance separation requirements. Based upon the assessment and findings contained within the Staff Report, City Staff recommended that the Planning and

Zoning Board recommend to City Commission denial of this application. Finding that application 01-WC-24 does not meet the standards of Sections 1111.5 and 1111.6 regarding the masonry wall, landscaping, and one-mile distance separation, staff continues to recommend denial of this application. However, such denial of application 01-WC-24 will allow exceptions to these provisions to be considered pursuant to Section 503, Conditional Uses.

Ms. Berkey introduced the project team who consisted of Mr. Sanjay Dhawan of SBA Communications, Ms. Maria Gimenez of Verizon Wireless, Mr. Shahzad Mahmood of Kimley-Horn and Associates, Mr. Matthew Simmons of Maxwell, Hendry and Simmons, LLC and Mr. Peter Traficante of Kimley-Horn and Associates.

Mr. Traficante presented a powerpoint presentation on the project location, summary of request, surrounding zone, site overview, co-location, criteria for approval for telecommunication towers, coverage and capacity and coverage maps. The specific exception requests per Section 111.5 include a separation where the proposed tower would be located .7 miles from the Broward County monopole and .9 miles from the Crown Castle monopole.

Mr. Calloway asked Mr. Traficante if his testimony states that the development standards relating to the wall, the landscape and the separation distance under Section 1111.5 do not meet the standards.

Mr. Traficante stated that is correct.

Commissioner Thomas made a motion to approve Resolution 2025-124 denying the application.

Mayor Edwards Phillips asked if there were any more public comments. Hearing none, Mayor Edwards Phillips closed the floor for public comments.

Ms. McCoy stated that SBA Towers X, LLC, is proposing construction of a 105-foot stealth "monopine" wireless communications tower behind the existing Walmart at Oakland Park Blvd. and State Road 7. The tower would accommodate up to four carriers and is sited within a stormwater retention pond on an elevated 40'x40' equipment platform. Equipment would be screened by a sixfoot chain-link fence with PVT slats, limited to six feet in height. The applicant seeks relief from onemile separation requirement from existing towers, decorative masonry wall with Mediterranean Revival design and ten-foot landscaped buffer around equipment. The tower supports the City's Comprehensive Plan goals for advancing wireless services and emergency communications. The stealth monopine design meets the LDRs requirement for facilities within 300 feet of residential areas. The existing eight-foot perimeter wall around Walmart provides visual buffering of the proposed ground equipment for surrounding residential neighborhoods. Required setbacks from residential properties are met (north: 214 ft; west: 123 ft; south: 277 ft). The structure is designed to support up to four carriers. Minimal traffic or infrastructure impact is anticipated. Based upon the assessment and findings contained within the Staff Report, City Staff originally recommended that the Planning and Zoning Board make findings and provide a recommendation for approval or denial of the requested Conditional Use in this application, along with the requested exceptions for the masonry wall, landscape buffer and distance separation requirements. Staff has reviewed the supplemental information provided and finds the application in conformance with the requirements of Sections 1111.7 and 503.3 of the Land Development Regulations and recommends approval of Conditional Use application 01-CU-24, along with the requested masonry wall, landscaping and onemile separation exceptions. Staff finds that the applicant has conducted a thorough analysis of the surrounding area within a one-half mile radius to provide improved network coverage in an area currently underserved by reliable coverage. The applicant has demonstrated the need for the tower, and has eliminated all other viable locations through the required hierarchy analysis. While the tower will be visible from the surrounding area, this is unavoidable due to its required height to provide proper service. The equipment compound will only be visible within the confines of the rear loading area of the commercial property, and will not be visible from any of the surrounding residential uses due to the existing eight (8) foot masonry wall on the north, west and south sides of the site. Staff further recommends that approval of application 01-CU-24 be subject to the following conditions: 1) Substantial conformance to the Plans for SBA Towers X, LLC, prepared by Kimley Horn, dated July 14, 2025, consisting of 15 pages. 2) Substantial conformance to the correspondence from Becker & Poliakoff, with a Revised date of July 15, 2025 encompassing 77 pages (the "Justification Statement"). 3) All equipment housed on the equipment platform shall not exceed six (6) feet in height as measured from the base of the platform. 4) No signs, including commercial advertising, logo, political signs, flyers, flags, or banners, whether or not posted temporarily, shall be allowed on any part of an antenna telecommunications facility, or telecommunications tower unless required by applicable law. 5) All required licenses will be required and provided at the time of issuance of a building permit, final certificate of use, and/or business tax receipt. 6) Compliance with the requirement that the site must be posted with permanent "HIGH VOLTAGE — DANGER" and "NO TRESPASSING" warning signs (condition added by Planning and Zoning Board).

Mr. Traficante provided a powerpoint presentation that stated Section 11.5 states that a decorative wall surrounded by a ten foot wide landscape is required by code. The proposal will not include a landscape buffer as additional screening provides no value in this location. The compound will not be visible sitting depressed with a retention area with existing landscaping and an existing buffer wall. An additional wall and landscaping would restrict water flow within the retention basin diminishing its ability to serve its primary function of stormwater run-off management for Walmart. He reviewed the exceptions requested through Application No. 01-CU-24.

Mr. Sanjay Dewan continued the powerpoint presentation relative to the coverage needed for 5G. He discussed the pre-existing tower locations in relation to the City boundary.

Mr. Traficante stated that the proposal is consistent with the general standards of review for Conditional Uses per Section. 503.3.

Mr. Calloway asked if the applicant has agreed to the conditions that staff has recommended to the City Commission.

Mr. Traficante stated that they have agreed.

Commissioner Thomas asked if four connections can be accommodated on the tower.

Mr. Shazad Mahmood stated that the tower itself is owned by SBA Communications and currently they will lease out the space to Verizon and T-Mobile.

Ms. Maria Gimenez stated that the tower will allow improved coverage and provide a public service for the city when it comes to emergencies.

Commissioner Harrison made a motion to approve Resolution 2025-125 with conditions.

RESOLUTION 2025-130 OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES, FLORIDA, SUPPORTING THE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION'S AMENDED 2050 METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Summary

This resolution supports the request from The Broward MPO to add two priority corridor projects NW 19th Street- NW 43rd Terrace to NW 31 Avenue and NW 31st Avenue – segments between NW 8 Street to McNab Road as amendments to the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). This action will allow these corridors to move toward funding and implementation.

Staff Recommendation

Background:

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (also referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law) established the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Discretionary Grant Program and appropriated funds from the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) to implement the Program. The funds provide Federal financial assistance to support local initiatives that prevent deaths and serious injury on roads and streets. The Broward MPO and Broward County Government jointly applied for the SS4A Grant and received a \$5 million grant award from USDOT to develop the Broward Safety Action Plan (BSAP).

One component of the Broward Safety Action Plan (BSAP) was the identification of Priority Corridors. Three key metrics - High-Injury Network (HIN), High-Risk Network (HRN), and Demographics Analysis – were the basis for identifying and prioritizing the 338 HIN corridors.

Eleven of the 338 corridors advanced into the concept design phase as Priority Corridors. These corridors included FDOT, Broward County, and locally-owned roadways. Conceptual design for the Priority Corridors included planning level design plans and cost estimates to create engineering solutions to achieve zero fatalities and serious injuries on the Broward roadway system.

Two of the Priority Corridors include segments within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City of Lauderdale Lakes. These are:

 NW 31st Avenue – NW 8th Street to McNab Road NW 19th Street – NW 43rd Terrace to NW 31st Avenue



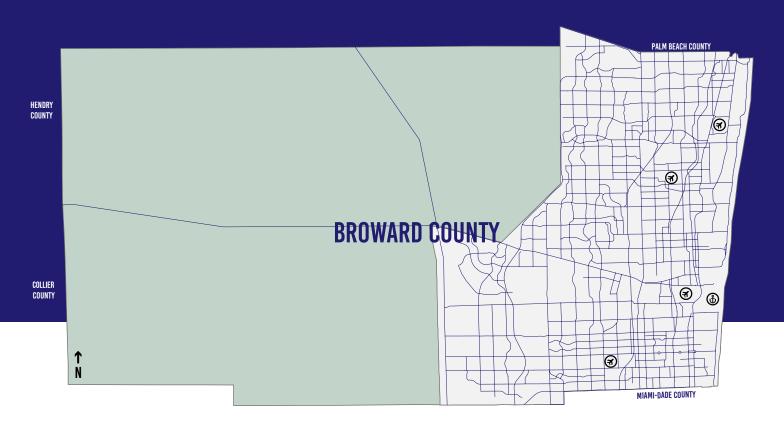

What is Route to 2050?

Every MPO across the country must develop a Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP); a 25-year planning horizon document that is updated every five years which turns transportation goals into prioritized projects. Your MTP, Route to 2050, emphasizes the need for reliable highway, freight, transit, bicycle, and pedestrian, projects that promote infrastructure hardening, technology, safety, and improve quality of life. The plan is the initial step to improving coordination between housing and transportation planning, and sets the stage for the future development of a Housing Coordination Plan. Building on the previous MTP, Commitment 2045, this plan also enhances its technology funding program to address current and prospective transportation technologies.

The MPO uses the MTP to guide the use of Federal, State, and other funds to create a transportation system that safely moves people and goods, creates jobs, and fosters vibrant communities within its planning area. The MPO also works with citizens, the private sector, and its planning partners to ensure that the transportation options funded in the MTP best represent the direction chosen in the context of policy direction from the MPO Board. The MTP outlines the plan development process, transportation needs in the Broward region, and establishes a transportation plan that can be funded with sources that are reasonably expected to be available between today and the year 2050.

During the development of the Commitment 2045 MTP, the MPO established The Path to 2100. The Path to 2100 is a visionary document developed to facilitate a paradigm shift from the historical approach to growth, development, and transportation investments.

With this vision, the MPO illustrated what that paradigm shift should look like and what the MPO and its partners can do to move the Broward region along the desired path to the year 2100.

The Route to 2050 MTP advances the Path to 2100 priorities by addressing road safety, managing congestion, and supporting Broward County's planned transit improvements. It identifies Smart City investments such as the Digital Twin (a real-time model that improves planning and decision-making efforts) and the installation of advanced communications systems. The MTP identifies the most susceptible corridors in Broward so they can be hardened against extreme weather events and support a more advanced transportation network.

The Commitment 2045 MTP funded 64 exciting projects worth nearly half a billion dollars. These included transforming Old Dixie Highway into a road for families, rebuilding Loxahatchee Road, boosting infrastructure hardening on A1A, enhancing Tri-Rail stations, rail monitoring technology along railroad crossings, and improving first-last mile connections on key transit corridors like SR-7 and University Drive.

Your Route to 2050 MTP builds on this momentum, pushing the Path to 2100 vision forward. It provides clear priorities for six funding programs, laying out a structure to guide projects into the MPO's annual List of Priority Projects and Transportation Improvement Program. As MTPs are updated, they must build on the past to maintain continuity, but also be flexible enough to adapt to change. We are proud to say the Route to 2050 MTP balances both.

The Route to 2050 MTP continues the MPO's commitments, established in Commitment 2045, to:

Fund projects that improve Broward's transportation system within the existing planning and transportation programming framework, with a focus on safety and infrastructure hardening.



Collaborate among transportation partners to ensure funding provided by the Federal and State governments allow for sufficient flexibility to address the public's needs.



Continue on The Path to 2100, an aspirational vision for the region's transportation that reflects opportunities presented by growth, technology, infrastructure hardening, and other emerging issues that will influence the future of the region.

The transportation investments set forth in the Route to 2050 MTP emphasize the need for a safe, hardened, and reliable network that provides for the needs of all users, while supporting the economic vitality, and quality of life in our communities.

Key Goals & Objectives

Development of the Route to 2050 MTP is driven by the MPO's three key goals:

To achieve these goals, the MPO developed the MTP using a systematic process designed to implement policy guidance from the MPO Board; collaborate with MPO partners throughout the region, including the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Broward County, its 31 municipalities, local and regional agencies, and the neighboring Palm Beach TPA and Miami-Dade TPO; and address Federal and State metropolitan planning requirements.

The result is the Route to 2050 MTP has identified \$9.2 billion of transportation improvements from the year 2025 to 2050 that will aid the Broward MPO and our partners in advancing the Path to 2100.

Here's a highlight of the plan:

Emphasis Areas

Following Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) Planning Emphasis Areas, the Broward MPO has developed its own emphasis areas that will help drive the MTP development process. They are:

Setting the Context

This chapter focuses on the importance of partnerships, how the plan was developed to be consistent with Federal, State, and Regional goals and policies, provides an overview of the funding programs established for the plan, and how the identified needs were prioritized to make effective use of the available funds.

Partnerships

The Broward MPO works closely with federal, state, regional, and local partners. At the federal level, both the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) establish requirements for and oversee the metropolitan planning process to ensure compliance with federal standards. Both agencies provide funding to the Broward MPO to support its required planning activities and conduct certification reviews every four years to ensure transportation needs are being addressed in an effective manner.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is a key partner for the Broward MPO. At the district level (FDOT's District Four), FDOT and the MPO work closely to program and implement state and federally-funded projects in Broward. At the state level, FDOT provides resources for MPOs, including the revenue projections used to determine available funding for Route to 2050, policy guidance and procedures through its MPO Program Management Handbook and other related materials, and develops the Florida Transportation Plan, or FTP, which is the long-range transportation plan for the entire state.

At the regional level, the MPO works with the Palm Beach TPA and the Miami-Dade TPO through Southeast Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC), whose goals are to foster coordination among the three planning agencies and to develop a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) that identifies transportation issues that cross county boundaries and impact the overall region (the entire Miami Urbanized Area). SEFTC was created through an Interlocal Agreement on January 9, 2006. Through SEFTC, the three planning agencies work with FDOT and others on a variety of regional plans, including the 2040 Southeast Florida Regional Freight Plan, the Regional Transportation System Management & Operations Strategic Plan, and many others.

Local partners include Broward County, its 31 municipalities, the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, and numerous non-profit agencies and organizations. Each of these entities provides representatives for the MPO's committees, with elected officials serving on the MPO Board of Directors. The MPO's municipal and non-profit partners assist with public engagement. The cities and SFRTA implement projects funded by the MPO, in addition to partnering with the MPO where appropriate for grant opportunities.

Broward County is a funding and implementation partner, collaborating with the MPO on the:

- Distribution of transportation surtax funds for municipal projects,
- Implementation of federal grants, and
- Coordination of transportation services.

Key Goals & Objectives

Using the goals from the Commitment 2045 MTP as the basis, the goals for the Route to 2050 MTP were modified to reflect the enhanced emphasis on Infrastructure Hardening and safety in this plan. Specifically, "safely" was added to the first goal to reflect the MPO's emphasis on safety for all transportation users. The third goal was modified from "Strengthen Communities" to "Foster Vibrant Communities" to recognize the need for hardening to both weather and economic-related factors. Figure 2-1 on the following displays the plan's adopted goals and objectives.

Aligning with Federal, State & Regional Goals

The FAST Act established 10 planning factors to be considered during the metropolitan planning process. These planning factors are shown in Table 2-1 below along with the adopted goals for Route to 2050. Much of Route to 2050 was built upon the Commitment 2045 effort, ensuring that these planning factors were reflected throughout the plan development process, including project prioritization.

The State of Florida adopts the Florida Transportation Plan (FTP) as its long-range transportation plan. This plan is updated every five years and FDOT is currently working on the update for the year 2055. The plan provides strategic direction to FDOT and its planning partners. **The plan consists of four distinct elements**:

Vision Element

Defines Florida's long-term transportation vision and goals for the next 25 years and beyond.

Policy Element

Describes objectives and strategies to guide transportation partners statewide in accomplishing the vision and goals.

Performance Element

Reports how our system performs on key measures of safety, asset condition, and mobility.

Implementation Element

Details how we will work toward implementation and track progress over the next five years.


FDOT developed the FTP in partnership with public and private stakeholders to define transportation goals, objectives, and strategies to make the Florida economy more competitive, its communities more livable, and sustainable for future generations. The goals for the FTP are provided in Figure 2-2.

Federal and State Policy for MTP Process

The Route to 2050 MTP was developed using a systematic process designed to respond to the following:

- Policy guidance from the Broward MPO Board
- Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (23 C.F.R., Part 450, Subpart C)
- Florida statutory requirements (Florida Statutes Title XXVI; Public Transportation, Chapter 339, Section 175)
- FHWA / FTA 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan Expectations (January 2018)
- FDOT 2050 Revenue Forecast Handbook (June 2023)

The Code of Federal Regulations (specifically Title 23, Chapter 1, Part 450) establishes the Federal requirements for the metropolitan transportation planning process, and MTPs. These regulations are amended by congressional action and were last updated in 2017 to reflect changes included in the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) and reinforced by Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act). The most recent transportation legislation, the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) was signed into law in 2021.

The IIJA continued the performance-based planning process introduced by MAP-21 and the FAST Act. The IIJA is the first federal law that provides funding for infrastructure beyond surface transportation, including high-speed Internet access and environmental mediation. The legislation focuses on electric infrastructure and infrastructure hardening efforts, in addition to providing funds for the nation's surface transportation programs. Table 2-2 lists these emphasis areas and identifies where in the MTP documentation these areas are addressed.

The MPO built on this by identifying local emphasis areas to be addressed by the Route to 2050 MTP. These emphasis areas are housing, infrastructure hardening, safety, and technology. More information about each of these is provided in Chapters 4 and 6.

Florida implements the Federal requirements and adds its own through the Florida Statutes. Chapter 339 addresses metropolitan planning organizations and their products. In preparing the Route to 2050 MTP, the Broward MPO considered all of these requirements, along with the defined expectations for such plans provided by USDOT. Appendix A includes the Federal and State requirements for an MTP and the most recent FHWA/FTA LRTP Expectations Letter (dated January 10, 2018).

Consistency with Other Plans

Many plans developed by partners of the MPO are critically important to the region and the Route to 2050 MTP. The MPO made a concerted effort to ensure consistency to the maximum extent possible with relevant plans and programs in the region.

The Southeast Florida Region: Three Counties, One Traveling Public

The Southeast Florida region is made up of Broward County and the neighboring counties of Miami-Dade and Palm Beach. Collectively, the region has a population of 6.18+ million people (US Census, 2023 estimate) and is expected to reach nearly 7.5 million over the next 25 years, making it the fourth most populous urbanized area in the nation.

Whereas the Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) have always maintained cooperative working relationships with each other, their alliance solidified when the 2000 Census data were released defining the eastern portion of the tri-county area as the "Miami Urbanized Area." Then, in 2006, recognizing the need for increased regional transportation planning and coordination balanced with the need and desire to maintain localized transportation planning, the three MPOs created the SEFTC.

This partnership was formalized through an interlocal agreement. Since its inception, SEFTC has approved:

- Regional goals and objectives
- Regional corridors of significance
- Regional transportation plans
- Project lists for Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) funding

Over the past decade, the region has adopted three Regional Transportation Plans (RTP) that have impacted the way the MPO looks at regional movement and infrastructure needs with an emphasis on transit. During the development of this 2050 MTP, the region has been concurrently working on its fourth RTP evaluating different future scenarios.


The 2050 RTP is considering three scenarios that look at the availability of transit and travel technology across the region, the impacts of growth and infrastructure hardening efforts, and a combination of these two approaches. Within each scenario, the analysis is looking at what happens if the region takes a reactive and siloed approach to these issues versus a proactive and multidisciplinary approach.


Broward County Mobility Advancement Program (MAP)

In November 2018, voters approved a local 1-cent, 30 year surtax to increase mobility and address transportation challenges in Broward County. While a 30-year financial plan was developed to a fund a variety of transportation projects, the implementation of projects is achieved through a five-year capital program, reviewed by the Oversight Board and approved by the Broward County Board of County Commissioners as part of their annual budget.

The MPO has an interlocal agreement with the County to prioritize the municipal projects submitted for surtax funding. As part of MAP, the County completed its transit systems plan, known as the PREMO (short for Premium Mobility) Plan, in 2023. The PREMO plan identifies 11.5 miles of commuter rail, 23.3 miles of light rail, 76 miles of bus rapid transit, and 100 miles of high frequency bus service.

Project development of a portion of the commuter rail line, one bus rapid transit corridor, and a portion of the light rail system are currently underway. Any surtax projects seeking Federal funds will be included in the MTP through an amendment.





Long Range Transportation Plans in Communities Adjacent to Broward

The Miami-Dade TPO and the Palm Beach TPA developed long range transportation plans concurrently with the Broward MPO. These planning efforts were coordinated closely through SEFTC and its committees and through the Regional Transportation Plan noted previously.

Other Local Plans and Programs

Through its Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), the MPO worked closely with Broward County, municipalities, and other agency partners to coordinate and ensure consistency with local plans and programs such as local comprehensive plans and transit development plans, among others.

Broward County Housing Master Plan

Broward County adopted a housing master plan in March 2024. With housing being one of the emphasis areas selected by the MPO for Route to 2050, coordination occurred throughout the development of the MTP with the housing master plan team. Given the concurrent development efforts, the MPO decided to delay its Housing Coordination Plan until such time as the County adopted its master plan. However, information from this master plan was used to develop the Housing Route Marker (see Chapter 6).

Port Everglades Master/Vision Plan

Broward County's passenger and freight port, Port Everglades, adopted an updated master plan in 2020. A representative from the Port serves on the MPO's TAC. The MPO is committed to supporting the Port in its efforts to secure capital funding for infrastructure hardening, maintenance and expansion projects. The Port is currently updating the Master/Vision Plan with anticipated completion in March 2025. A list of projects from the adopted 2020 Master/Vision Plan was provided and is included in Appendix D. These projects will be added to the Cost Feasible Plan of the MTP through amendments as necessary.

Fort Lauderdale - Hollywood International Airport Master Plan

Similar to Port Everglades, the Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport adopted its most recent master plan in 2020. The airport is also represented on the TAC and recently provided updates to the MPO's Committees and Boards regarding their landside improvements that are in the review process. The MPO coordinated with airport representatives early in the MTP development process and through this coordination, the airport decided not to submit projects through the MTP Call for Projects process.

How was Route to 2050 developed?

The development of the Route to 2050 MTP was a two-year long process consisting of the five steps shown in Figure 2-6 on the following page.

Throughout all of these steps, the public and stakeholders were engaged through regular presentations to the MPO's Citizen and Technical Advisory Committees and the Board of Directors. The TAC served as the Steering Committee for the plan, providing technical guidance and assessment of key components of the plan, including the prioritization and plan evaluation processes, the list of prioritized projects, and the draft cost feasible plan.

Step 1: Collect

This involved working with the MPO's partners, including the 31 municipalities, Broward County, the Florida Department of Transportation, and the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority to identify projects and funding needs through the Call for Projects. The public was engaged in this process through a survey asking about needs and investment priorities. This step also included data collection and development for the prioritization and plan evaluation processes and the development of revenue forecasts. The MPO also conducted internal needs assessment workshops to identify regional projects for inclusion in the plan.

Step 2: Analyze & Prioritize

Projects submitted through the Call for Projects and identified by the MPO's internal needs assessment were analyzed to ensure they were eligible for funding in the MTP and to determine which of the MTP's funding programs were the best fit. This step also included scoring of the projects through the project prioritization process and ranking by score within each of the funding programs.

Step 3: Budget

Considering the number of needs within each program as well as the public survey results, funding levels from the Commitment 2045 MTP, and feedback from the MPO Committees and Board, percentages of the projected MPO attributable funds were assigned to the funding programs.

Step 4: Develop Draft Plan

The prioritized projects were assigned to project development phases and time bands using the projected available revenues (draft Cost Feasible Plan). Several funding program policies were established to provide guidance for amendments. A series of Route Markers were developed and assigned to funded projects to ensure the key issues of safety, housing, susceptible roadways, bicycle suitability and congestion are considered through the project development process. The draft Cost Feasible Plan was endorsed by the MPO Board and shared with the stakeholders for their consideration.


Step 5: Adopt Plan

Following a review of the draft Cost Feasible Plan by the stakeholders, updates were made to the timing of funding projects and a final version of the Cost Feasible Plan was created. The official Route to 2050 MTP document was created, reviewed by the public and MPO Committees, and adopted by the MPO Board on December 12, 2024.

Funding Programs

The MTP is a transportation plan that can be funded with sources that are reasonably expected to be available between today and 2050. The MPO decided to continue, with some modification, the six funding programs developed as part of Commitment 2045 (Figure 2-7) to support the allocation and monitoring of transportation investments. Federal, State, and local transportation revenues are allocated to these six funding programs based largely on eligible use requirements dictated by funding agencies and, to the extent possible, policy direction from the MPO Board for sources that offer some flexibility in their allocation. More information about these programs and the types of projects they fund is provided in Chapter 7.

Performance Measures & Indicators

The Broward MPO developed the Route to 2050 MTP in accordance with the requirements of the US Department of Transportation's IIJA Act, Florida Statutes, and Federal metropolitan transportation planning regulations. Prior transportation legislation, namely MAP-21 and the FAST Act emphasized performance-based planning, including the establishment of national performance goals for Federal-aid highway programs and incorporating performance goals, measures, and targets into the process of identifying needed transportation improvements and project selection.

Although not adopted with the Goals and Objectives, the Route to 2050 MTP identified a series of indicators that ensure consistency with the appropriate federally-mandated performance measures, and to ensure projects funded through the plan would help to achieve performance goals. These indicators will be reviewed twice in this plan. The first time in this chapter as part of the project prioritization process, and later in Chapter 8 as part of the plan evaluation. Table 2-3 shows the relationship between the indicators, the adopted goals, and the prioritization and/or plan evaluation process. For more information on how these indicators correspond to the FAST Act Planning Factors, see Technical Report 4, Goals, Objectives, and Indicators.

Performance Prioritization

The prioritization criteria are based on the MTP goals and objectives (adopted by the MPO Board on May 11, 2023, and documented in Technical Report 4), include relevant required Performance Measures identified in the FAST Act, and were designed for a GIS-based analysis to ensure objectivity in the scoring to the greatest extent practical. The prioritization process was built on the Commitment 2045 MTP effort and utilized the same six planning factors of mobility, accessibility, safety, demographics, environmental stewardship, and economic vitality. However, for the Route to 2050 MTP, these planning areas were paired to create three planning factors: Mobility and Economic Vitality, Accessibility and Demographics, and Safety and Infrastructure hardening. In total, 14 criteria, listed in Table 2-4, were used to score projects in a mode-neutral manner. This prioritization process and scoring approach was endorsed by the Broward MPO Board during its October 12, 2023, meeting.

Chapter 2 Recap

The Route to 2050 MTP emphasizes the critical partnerships that support the Broward MPO's transportation planning efforts. These collaborations include federal, state, regional, and local partners, each playing a vital role in funding, implementing, and overseeing transportation projects. Key partners, such as the FHWA, the FDOT, and regional agencies, help guide the MPO's compliance with federal standards and long-term planning goals, ensuring that transportation projects align with broader strategic objectives.

Additionally, the Route to 2050 MTP aligns with federal and state goals, particularly through the FTP. The MPO's focus on safety, infrastructure hardening, and mobility is reflected in its performance-based planning approach, which uses specific indicators and prioritization criteria to select and fund transportation projects. These measures ensure that the Route to 2050 MTP addresses the needs of the community while promoting sustainable growth and economic vitality.

Existing Conditions

This chapter provides information about the existing transportation system, built environment, and environmentally sensitive lands. Information about future land uses and population projections are also provided.

Introduction

Broward County is a part of the Miami Urbanized Area, which covers the eastern coast of Florida from the southern portion of Martin County to Miami-Dade County. The geographic location and socioeconomic fabric make it a central area for port activity, international travel, and provides connections to South America. To facilitate freight movement, passenger travel, and support local economies, Broward County and the surrounding area rely on an efficient regional transportation system. Detailed in this chapter are the various components of the transportation network in this area, which is the result of regional collaboration between Broward, Palm Beach, and Miami-Dade counties.

To develop an effective and comprehensive MTP document, it is important to have a thorough understanding of the existing conditions. This forms a foundation for analyzing projected trends in demographic growth and travel patterns. The future growth analysis, in combination with stakeholder and public input, informs the development of potential solutions to address gaps in the existing transportation system. This chapter provides information on the first two components of the MTP process mentioned above.


Existing Conditions

Broward County covers 1,230 square miles, with 431 square miles designated as urbanized area and the remaining land dedicated to conservation, as illustrated in Figure 3-1. This figure also identifies the tribal lands within Broward County. The tribal land located within the urbanized area is owned by the Seminole Tribe of Florida. The large area at the western edge of the county, in the conservation area, is owned by the Miccosukee Tribe. This urbanized zone represents Broward's development footprint and is the primary focus of the MPO's transportation investments. Future development is likely to occur with greater density in the already developed areas. Figure 3-2 identifies the sensitive environmental lands and habitats remaining in the urbanized area of the county. This information was used during the project prioritization process to assess whether a proposed project had the potential to impact a sensitive resource.

Existing Transportation Facilities

The following maps present the existing condition of transportation facilities in Broward County. Figure 3-1 outlines the boundaries of Broward County and identifies the portion designated as an urbanized area. Figure 3-3 and Figure 3-4 present the transportation networks within the urbanized area, which includes passenger and freight rail, express transit, and local transit. There are seven communities in Broward that offer microtransit (on demand) service, including Fort Lauderdale, Hallandale Beach, Hollywood, Lauderdale-By-The-Sea, Sunrise, Wilton Manors, and SFRTA at the Cypress Creek Station. Table 3-1 and Table 3-2 offer a statistical overview of the transportation systems in Broward County and the broader urbanized area, respectively. Figure 3-5 and Figure 3-6 present the detailed regional transportation network for the urbanized area and specifically within Broward County.

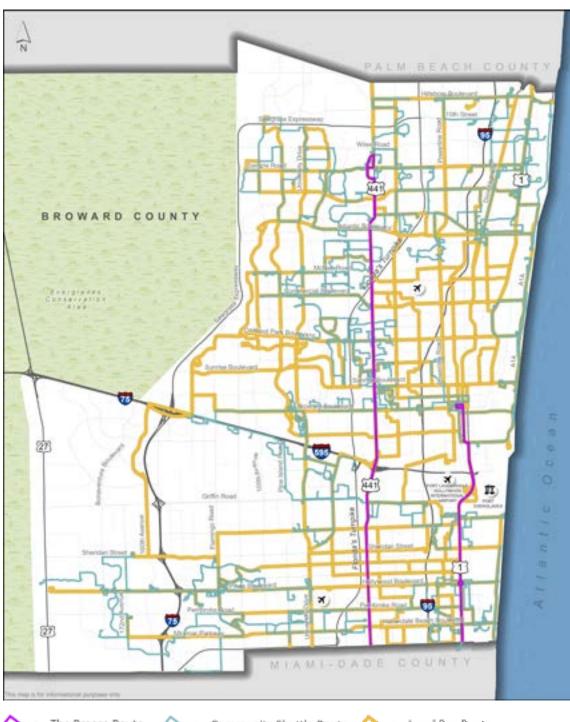



Future Land Use

Land use is an integral component in transportation planning to ensure cohesive, hardened, and robust development practices and activities. Florida's Community Planning Act of 2011 mandates that local governments develop comprehensive plans, which include Future Land Use and Transportation elements. The Broward County Planning Council and the Broward NEXT plan² oversee and set the standard for land use decisions in the County. Local governments must align their land use and transportation plans with the Broward NEXT plan, as well as complement MPO and FDOT guidelines, to ensure consistency throughout the County. Comprehensive plans are subject to mandatory review every seven years as land use and transportation evolve. Table 3-3 summarizes land use distribution in Broward, while Figure 3-7 illustrates the adopted Future Land Use Plan, updated on July 30, 2024.



Population and Employment Growth

The second step in the planning process involves developing growth projections for 2050. The focus is on future trends for population and employment levels as both are key determinants of transportation demand. The regional travel demand model analyzes these factors through attributes such as household size, age, and income to better predict travel patterns.

Figure 3-8 shows the 2050 projections for population, employment, and household characteristics. These values were compared to those of 2020 to determine how much growth may occur. Between 2020 and 2050, Broward County's population is projected to grow by 17.6% to 2.3 million residents. The growth in employment between 2020 and 2050 is similar to the population growth, at 18 percent. Some additional information about the projected population of Broward by the year 2050 is provided in Figure 3-8.

Chapter 3 Recap

This chapter paints a picture of Broward County today, detailing the current transportation system, built environment, and environmentally sensitive areas while forecasting significant growth. With a focus on urbanized zones, Broward's transportation investments are poised to support denser, more sustainable development. We highlight the existing transit networks, including rail and microtransit services in key communities, and showcases how land use planning aligns with state and local guidelines to ensure sustainable growth. Looking ahead to 2050, Broward's population is expected to soar by 17.6% to 2.3 million, with employment growing in tandem, driving a bold vision for an even more connected, dynamic region!

Challenges & Opportunities

This chapter explores the primary challenges facing Broward's transportation system and identifies opportunities that can help turn these challenges into pathways for progress.

As established in Vision 2100, the Broward MPO is tasked with planning a transportation system that will effectively serve the growing needs of Broward. As the MPO looks towards 2050, the region faces several critical challenges that must be addressed to ensure a safe, efficient, and hardened transportation network. These challenges range from ensuring public safety on our roads to managing the impacts of population growth and weather extremes. Simultaneously, new technologies present opportunities to innovate and modernize transportation planning.

Challenge: Crashes



Emphasis Area: Safety

Ensuring the safety and well-being of all road users is the Broward MPO's highest priority. An analysis of crash records from 2017 to 2021 revealed over 300,000 crashes, nearly 1,000 of which were fatal and over 4,000 involving incapacitating injuries. Angle and left-turn collisions were among the most dangerous, along with rear-end and lane departure crashes, which together accounted for a significant portion of severe crashes. Susceptible groups, such as pedestrians, cyclists, motorcyclists, and aging road users, faced disproportionately higher risks. For example, pedestrian crashes were nearly 15 times more likely to result in severe injury, and crashes involving cyclists were over six times as likely to be severe.

Challenge: Growth & Congestion



Emphasis Area: Housing

Broward County is projected to grow by an additional 330,000 residents by 2050, leading to increased demand on the transportation network. This growth will require 130,000 new homes and, with it, the potential for more vehicles on already congested roadways. Currently, South Florida commuters spend an average of 79 hours annually in traffic, and without strategic planning, congestion could worsen significantly. Population growth and the expansion of freight and passenger rail services are expected to place additional strain on critical infrastructure, such as railroad crossings and highway corridors. This challenge necessitates enhanced coordination between various levels of government to manage traffic flow, reduce congestion, and align transportation investments with local and regional housing plans.

Challenge: Weather Extremes



Emphasis Area: Infrastructure Hardening

Broward County's geographic location makes it highly susceptible to the impacts of weather extremes. Coastal Inundation, increased storm surges, and record-breaking rainfall are already affecting the region. Fort Lauderdale, for example, experienced historic rainfall in 2023 with over 100 inches of rain, including 26 inches in a single day. The increasing frequency of extreme weather events, including flooding, heatwaves, and rising groundwater levels, poses significant risks to transportation infrastructure. Five primary stressors threaten Broward's transportation systems: coastal inundation, storm surge, precipitation, extreme heat, and future groundwater elevation. A proactive, hardening approach is necessary to protect the Broward's infrastructure and ensure its long-term functionality.

Challenge: Technology Advancements



Emphasis Area: Technology

Technology advancements present a challenge to Broward's transportation network because they require infrastructure adaptation at a rapid pace. Integrating new technologies can create short-term disruptions during construction and implementation, further straining an already congested network. The rapid pace of technological change complicates longterm transportation planning. While new technologies promise greater efficiency and sustainability, their implementation can be uneven, with gaps in access for residents. This exacerbates challenges in the county, where certain areas may benefit from advancements like shared mobility and real-time data, while others lag behind. The Broward MPO will have to continuously evaluate and adapt policies to balance innovation with, safety, and extreme weather concerns.

Route Markers

To identify potential challenges, the MPO has developed the concept of "Route Markers" as a strategic tool to strengthen and enhance transportation projects. By using data-driven insights, Route Markers guide the planning and implementation of projects that meet Broward's most pressing transportation needs.

What is a Route Marker?

Route Markers are key themes with recognizable icons that provide project-level context for use in the scoping and implementation processes. The Route Markers are visualized on project information pages using simple icons as consistent visual cues in the cost feasible plan project list.

What are the Route Markers?

Projects are assigned to one or more of the following Route Marker categories:


Figure 4-1: What are Route Markers?



Bicycle Suitability

The Bicycle Suitability Route Marker indicates if the project is located on an uncomfortable Bicycle Suitability corridor. Using data that defines how comfortable different corridors are for biking, this Route Marker indicates if a project is in a location that is not suitable for biking. Locations with higher levels of interactions with vehicular traffic have reduced bicycle comfort level and suitability and, therefore, would benefit from greater separation from traffic as well as context-sensitive solutions





Congested Corridor

The Congested Corridor Route Marker indicates if the project is located on a roadway corridor with high levels of traffic congestion, as defined in the Congestion Management Process (CMP). The MPO has developed a toolbox of countermeasures for improving these corridors, which can be incorporated into the project scopes. 








High Injury Network

The High Injury Network Route Marker indicates if a project is located on or intersects with a roadway that experiences high frequency of severe or fatal crashes compared with other roadways. These locations can benefit from engineering, enforcement, and education countermeasures to improve safety.





Susceptible Roadway

The Susceptible Roadway Route Marker indicates if a project is located on or intersects with the MPO defined Susceptibility Network to address infrastructure hardening needs. The MPO has established a toolbox of countermeasures for addressing infrastructure hardening challenges in these areas and can be incorporated into project scopes.



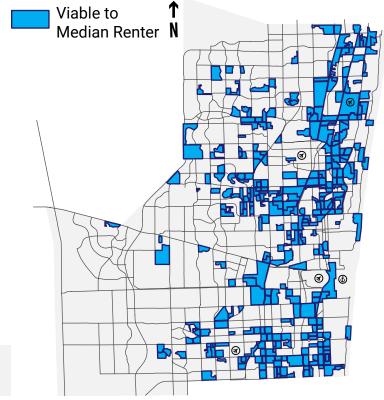

The Housing Route Marker identifies projects located within or near census block groups where the median rent is viable for households with median renter income. Housing is included in the MTP's Route Markers to emphasize the importance of connecting people from their homes to employment and recreation.







How are Route Markers Represented in the plan?

Route Markers are depicted in the plan by the use of icons in the project reporting to represent bicycle suitability, traffic congestion, crashes, roadway susceptibility, and housing planning considerations visually, making it easier to identify the types of issues present in each project area. A binary coding system with an exclamation mark (!) highlights the specific factors that need to be addressed in each project, ensuring clarity and focus on important aspects like safety and congestion. Together, these elements are visually illustrated in the Cost Feasible Plan's project information pages, as shown in Figure 4-8, to guide decision-makers in addressing the unique challenges of each route.

Opportunities

In addition to Route Markers, the Broward MPO has strategically identified opportunities to address key challenges in the MTP's Emphasis Areas. These opportunities are categorized into two types: Program Opportunities, which focus on funding projects that directly tackle these critical areas, and Process Opportunities, aimed at enhancing the MPO's capacity to identify and plan for more effective projects and funding sources.

Program Opportunities

Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSM&O)

FDOT's TSM&O projects present a strategic opportunity to address the challenges posed by rapid population growth and advancing technology in Broward. By leveraging the deployment of Advanced Traffic Management Systems (ATMS) in line with the 2021 FDOT District 4 TSM&O Master Plan, these projects enhance safety, and efficiency without requiring major roadway expansions. Infrastructure improvements such as fiber communications networks, full CCTV coverage, Bluetooth travel time systems, and adaptive signal technologies help optimize traffic flow, reduce congestion, and improve transit reliability. Additionally, upgrades like Modern Vehicle Detection Systems (MVDS), Advanced Dynamic Messaging Signs (ADMS), and Transit Signal Priority (TSP) support a transportation approach that accommodates evolving needs. The integration of these smart technologies—coordinated with signal maintaining agencies—ensures that Broward can proactively manage its growing transportation demands while preparing for future innovations in connected transportation systems.

Broward Safety Action Plan

In 2023, the MPO, in partnership with Broward County, secured a \$5 million Safe Streets and Roads for All planning grant to establish the Broward Regional Comprehensive Safety Action Plan, otherwise known as Broward Safety Action Plan or BSAP. This plan will develop strategies aimed at preventing traffic deaths and serious injuries. The Safety Program goal is zero fatalities and serious injuries across Broward.

By implementing proven safety measures and engaging the public, the MPO is working to make every journey safer for residents and visitors alike. BSAP is set for adoption in June 2025, and will use national best practices to identify high-risk roads and guide policies, programs, and projects to prevent crashes. Annual evaluations will ensure the MPO stays on course toward a safer future. The plan's key outcomes include establishing clear safety goals, preparing projects for funding, and shaping policies that protect all road users, especially susceptible ones like pedestrians and cyclists.

Infrastructure Hardening Framework

In response to the growing environmental risks posed by weather extremes, the MPO has developed a Transportation Infrastructure Hardening Framework as part of the Infrastructure Hardening Program. This nine-step approach evaluates critical roads and proposes adaptive measures to mitigate the effects of extreme weather stressors such as coastal inundation and extreme heat. The MPO's Infrastructure Hardening Toolbox offers practical solutions for incorporating infrastructure hardening into future transportation projects, ensuring the long-term sustainability of Broward's transportation system.

Railroad Grade Separation

To mitigate the impacts of growth and congestion, the MPO is exploring the feasibility of railroad grade separations along key corridors within the Highways & Freight Program. With the expected increase in rail services, grade separations at critical crossings can enhance safety, improve options, and reduce delays for all users.

Roads for Economic Vitality (REV)

Since 2016, REV has empowered local agencies to implement their own transportation safety projects. As a component of the Roads for Families Program, REV funds a wide range of initiatives, from bike lanes and sidewalks to advanced technologies like transit signal priority, as well as safety and sustainability improvements such as traffic calming, intersection upgrades, and multi-use paths. The MPO remains committed to supporting its partners in delivering projects that improve safety and choice for Broward.

Economic Development Projects

The Broward MPO is supporting Broward County Transit's PREMO Plan through its Economic Development Initiative. This initiative aligns with the goals of MAP Broward, which aims to enhance transit services by complementing the premium transit projects like the commuter rail, light rail, and bus rapid transit that are being proposed. The MPO focuses on creating projects that enhance first/last mile pedestrian and bicycle access, improve transit waiting areas, and facilitate easy transfers between routes. By strategically aligning with the PREMO network and prioritizing projects based on the PREMO schedule, the MPO sets the foundation for improved safety and encourages private investment in vibrant, mixed-use spaces.

Concept Development

The MPO has developed an innovative and collaborative Concept Development Process to ensure that projects are truly **community-driven and ready for future implementation**. This approach goes beyond traditional planning, providing professional pre-engineering and planning activities that bridge the gap between vision and reality. By focusing on non-state projects identified through the MPO's MTP programs, this process lays the groundwork for the next phase of transportation design and construction.

The Concept Development Process serves several vital objectives, all aimed at creating projects that meet the unique needs of Broward's residents. It begins by refining transportation challenges and identifying key deficiencies, ensuring that the most critical needs are addressed. From there, the MPO develops detailed project plans, including renderings that bring proposed improvements to life. Planning-level cost estimates are created to give a clear understanding of financial requirements, and utility owners are identified to anticipate any adjustments needed during the design phase.

One of the most crucial aspects of this process is its emphasis on **public and stakeholder engagement**. Local input is essential to the success of any project. Through public meetings, workshops, and ongoing dialogue, the MPO works to secure broad-based support, ensuring that the final plans reflect local needs and aspirations. By bringing together technical expertise and community collaboration, the MPO is advancing projects that are not only technically sound but also embraced by those they are designed to serve.

Covering all active FHWA and FTA discretionary grant programs as of June 2024, the Grant Strategy Tool ensures that the MPO stays ahead of the curve in securing vital funding for transformative transportation projects.

Housing Coordination Plan

The Broward MPO aims to address Broward County's housing crisis through the development of its first Housing Coordination Plan. Building upon the broader goals of the MPO Vision 2100 plan, which envisioned high-capacity transit and sustainable growth in Broward, the Housing Coordination Plan will focus on integrating housing, transportation, and economic development strategies across the region. The Broward MPO seeks to identify actionable transportation projects and policies that will facilitate the creation of more housing, consistent with partner agency plans.

At the core of the Housing Coordination Plan is a vision to have a measurable and lasting impact on the County's housing crisis by strategically investing in transportation infrastructure. The MPO is committed to focusing its investments in areas that are planning for transit-supportive housing, particularly within key activity centers and along corridors slated for transit improvements in Broward County's PREMO Plan.

The key objectives of the plan include prioritizing the development of housing near premium transit options and non-motorized transportation routes. Additionally, it will focus on locating housing near employment and activity centers, supporting densification and land use policies that enhance transit, and ensuring that roadway improvement projects prioritize access to transit in areas with existing or planned housing.



SMART METRO

Transformation at the Broward MPO

The Broward MPO was awarded a \$2 million US Department of Transportation Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) grant to fund the development of SMART METRO platform – an innovative digital twin-based platform that leverages advanced geospatial analysis and cutting-edge artificial intelligence (AI) technology to improve how the MPO plans, manages, and sustains the region. SMART METRO is designed to be a game-changer for the region. By offering a virtual representation of the transportation network, this technology will allow the MPO to understand travel behavior, analyze multiple scenarios, and guide data-driven decisions that can enhance regional mobility and neighborhood hardening. By integrating data from across the region into a single platform, SMART METRO will streamline planning processes, save resources, and enable more efficient decision-making.



Solution Capabilities

SMART METRO is an analytics platform that includes a data exchange, data analytics and modeling, and simulation capabilities that can facilitate and streamline regional planning, bridge data silos, and catalyze public-private partnerships.

Why It Matters

The region faces unique challenges. With over 664,000 residents at risk of impacts by weather extremes by the year 2100, the MPO must proactively plan for the future. SMART METRO will help create projects and policies that are extreme weather ready, while also addressing issues in housing and transportation. SMART METRO will break down data silos, allowing regional partners to work collaboratively on complex issues to plan smarter and holistically. It will provide a "single source of truth" for planning, ensuring that decisions are based on comprehensive, up-to-date data. This will not only improve transportation infrastructure but will also foster economic growth, build stronger and more connected communities and workforce development throughout the region.

Building a Future-Proof Region

As part of the SMART METRO initiative, the Broward MPO is developing a proof of concept. The \$2 million Stage 1 SMART grant will allow the MPO to create a working prototype, integrating data sets from various partners and sources to provide more efficient and scalable solutions for regional planning. SMART METRO's capabilities will provide data and analysis to support public and private-sector investments to help address critical safety issues, extreme weather, housing insecurities, and the need for sustainable transportation infrastructure in communities. SMART METRO will enable users to evaluate how decisions affect growth, and infrastructure hardening.

Preparing the Workforce of Tomorrow

In addition to its planning capabilities, SMART METRO will serve as an important resource for workforce development. Building a skilled workforce equipped with new technology and data stewardship frameworks are essential for platform success and future workforce development. Activities will include a workforce needs assessment, training material development, and interactive workshops. These efforts aim to train the project working groups and expand platform reach to the future workforce. The MPO is also collaborating with Broward County Public Schools (BCPS) and the Museum of Discovery and Science (MODS) to educate students on how real-world scenarios, like transportation and environmental sustainability, intersect. These partnerships will help prepare the next generation of transportation planners, engineers, and data analysts by exposing students to the latest technologies and challenges in the field.

Vision for scalable solutions

SMART METRO is not just a platform for today – it's built for future adaptability. It will feature advanced technology and Al, supporting transportation and simulation capabilities. Over time, it will evolve to enhance operational planning and accommodate additional emerging technologies. This scalable approach ensures that SMART METRO can grow and adapt alongside the region's needs. At the end of the Stage 1 grant, the MPO will measure SMART METRO's success by its compatibility with existing data and models, cost-effectiveness, speed of analysis, and utility.

The MPO is excited about the possibilities SMART METRO offers for transforming how it plans for and invest in the future of the region. Stay tuned for more updates as the MPO moves forward with this groundbreaking initiative.

Public Involvement

This chapter summarizes the public engagement activities conducted during the development of the Route to 2050 MTP.

Introduction

Public involvement was a key aspect of the Route to 2050 MTP development process. As a public agency, the MPO strives to ensure that its programs and documents are accessible to all residents and visitors in Broward County. The MTP is focused on having a variety of engagement opportunities to guarantee a comprehensive outreach approach. This chapter outlines the public involvement activities carried out during the plan development process, segmented into three phases.

Phase 1

Oct 2022 - Aug 2023

Inform the public and stakeholder agencies of the plan's purpose, timeline, and major milestones, and how they can get involved and stay informed as the project progresses.

Phase 2

Sept 2023 - Jun 2024

Share information about the plan development process with the public and identify specific opportunities for stakeholder agencies to provide input at key decision-making points that will affect the development of plan deliverables.

Phase 3

Jul 2024 - Dec 2024

Allow the public to review and provide input on a draft version of the completed plan.

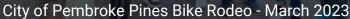
Each phase of outreach strategically builds on the previous one to close gaps and achieve a broad range of community perspectives to guide resource allocation and project prioritization in the 2050 MTP update.

This chapter introduces essential components that are crucial to the plan's development and success, emphasizing the importance public involvement. The MTPs story outlines a narrative framework that supports collaboration through stakeholder coordination and comprehensive public involvement, ensuring the plan resonates with all Broward residents. A copy of the Route to 2050 MTP Public Participation Plan is included as Appendix B.












Demographic Areas

Demographic areas were identified using a quantitative, statistically driven methodology that assigns a demographic score to each Census block group within the county. Demographic scores were generated based on the relative concentration of demographic indicators compared to the countywide average. Demographic indicators were taken from the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color and national origin in programs and activities receiving Federal funds.

Figure 5-1 shows the demographic score for each block group, derived from demographic data. The demographic areas used in subsequent steps of the demographic assessment process are those labeled "high" or "very high," which contain the highest statistical concentration of demographic indicators from the demographic score calculation process.



MTP Story & Messaging

The Route to 2050 MTP story is intended to help people at all stages of life understand how the MTP prioritizes and funds projects that support various transportation needs. The story is meant to involve all residents and visitors of Broward County in the process that improves their transportation system. It marks the Route to 2050 MTP as a pivotal milestone on Broward County's Path to the year 2100 and emphasizes the strategic investment in short and long-term initiatives to help shape the future of transportation.

Outreach efforts and target audiences were based on three key points of the MTP story:

Stakeholder coordination was critical to developing the Route to 2050 MTP and remained a priority throughout the process. Key partners and stakeholders identified in Chapter 2 - Setting the Context, were actively engaged in project prioritization and provided input at each stage.

The Call for Projects, used in the Needs Assessment, required one-on-one meetings between partner agencies and MPO staff to discuss project information. A separate virtual workshop was held to demonstrate the online application tool. Once agencies submitted projects, the applications underwent an initial review for completeness.

Consistent updates were provided at both regional and state levels throughout the MTP's twoyear development. The MTP was a regular agenda item at Committee and Board meetings, and presentations were made to MPO committees, which included representatives from most stakeholder groups. At the state level, quarterly meetings with FDOT ensured alignment with state priorities.

Community Engagement Activities

The MPO utilized various tools and activities to build an informative and interactive community engagement process. These activities were used to capture perspective, and a wide range of transportation needs in the community. Engagement was completed in three phases, which allowed for continuous improvement to ensure all Broward residents were effectively engaged in the development of the MTP.







Throughout the process, the Route to 2050 MTP website served as an essential resource for the most up-to-date information and upcoming events. The MPO also provided two Route to 2050 videos through the Speak Up Broward YouTube channel, which provided an overview of the MTP vision, objectives, public participation process and information about the draft Cost Feasible Plan. The following pages summarize the activities conducted during each phase of the Route to 2050 MTP public involvement process.

Phase 1

Phase 1 took place during the beginning stages of the MTP to build initial awareness of the Route to 2050 MTP and provide resources that keep the public and stakeholders involved in the MTP process. Phase 1 occurred between October 2022 and August 2023 to build a foundation for future engagement. A detailed summary of the Phase 1 outreach activities is provided in Technical Report #1A, "Phase 1 Outreach Evaluation."

Informative Activities:

The Route to 2050 MTP website was developed to share information and updates regarding the MTP update. The website has accrued over 7,000 views to date.



An introductory video was posted to the MPO YouTube Channel to provide an overview of the Route to 2050 plan. Four additional videos were created to explain the emphasis areas (safety, technology, housing, and infrastructure hardening) for the Route to 2050 MTP update.

Story maps were built and shared via the Route to 2050 MTP website. The maps were used to inform visitors about the identification of demographic areas, the results of the safety analysis, and 2050 growth projections.

Interactive Activities:

Weekly social media posts engaged 25,420 accounts across Facebook, Instagram, and LinkedIn.

Thirteen outreach meetings held across Broward, which allowed the MTP team to present updates during regularly scheduled gatherings. The outreach consisted of a variety of stakeholders including: community, non-profit, and government organizations. These groups provided input on the plan's goals and objectives and needs assessment. The MTP team also worked directly with local Chambers of Commerce to engage tourism agencies and visitor bureaus to include their perspective and feedback in the MTP needs identification process.

Workshops were held at community events, where the MPO shared information about the MTP and encourage people to participate in the survey. An online survey was distributed to assess residents' perspectives on transportation priorities, growth strategies, and funding allocations. The survey had 1,881 respondents who provided their opinion on the biggest challenges facing Broward's transportation system. A telephone e-Town Hall was held in May 2023 that reached 1,147 concurrent participants. The e-Town Hall focused on new technologies designed to make Broward safer and smarter. This virtual event was centered around community input, featuring discussion with panelists from the private sector and various levels of government. Through an interactive poll, participants provided feedback about transportation priorities, the importance of integrating emerging technologies into the region's transportation network, and their current use of available transportation technologies.

Phase 2

Phase 2 expanded outreach efforts to include more communities, especially those in traditionally underserved areas or others who were not engaged during Phase 1. Phase 2 occurred between September 2023 and June 2024. A detailed summary of the Phase 2 outreach activities is provided in Technical Report #1B, MTP Phase 2 Outreach.

Informative Activities:

A presentation was developed to provide an overview of the MPO and the significance of the MTP.



Eight posters were created to explain who the MPO is, what the MTP is, and the six funding programs outlined in the plan.

A story map was created to summarize the Phase 1 outreach activities and survey results.

Public Outreach Story Map






Interactive Activities:

To build on the Phase 1 outreach, various stakeholder groups were identified by MPO district. The stakeholder groups included community, social, religious, and charitable organizations. A total of 92 stakeholder groups were contacted and of those, 12 indicated that they were not interested in participating. Another workshop was conducted in May 2024 to engage additional participants. The remaining groups were contacted for presentations during Phase 3 and to make them aware of the virtual meeting room and interactive Cost Feasible Plan map.

Three virtual focus group sessions with 20 participants each were conducted to target different demographic segments. The discussion was based on six key themes, with reoccurring topics centered around having an inclusive plan with accessible projects that are related to the average Broward resident.




Phase 3

Phase 3 was a continuation of efforts to inform and engage the community through review and feedback on drafts of the MTP. Phase 3 occurred between July 2024 and December 2024; efforts included the following:

Informative Activities:

The MTP Summit was held in September 2024, with over 200 participants, focused on future transportation technologies. The discussion centered around new technologies that will support identified focus areas and what partnerships are needed to make this plan a reality. The event featured a panel of community leaders who discussed the future of transportation technologies in Broward.

Interactive Activities:

An interactive map of the Cost Feasible Plan was linked to the website for people to provide comments on the projects.

Telephone e-Town Hall was held in July 2024, with a maximum of 4,629 concurrent viewers. The e-Town Hall featured panelist discussion centered around Broward's transportation future. It emphasized the importance of partnerships in addressing transportation challenges including population growth, weather extremes, and technological advancements. An interactive poll allowed participants to give feedback about their transportation priorities.

Over 30 outreach meetings and workshops were conducted as part of our efforts. The MTP team continued their public involvement activities from Phase 1 and engaged with community groups in another set of outreach meetings. Similar to Phase 1, these outreach meetings included meetings with community, non-profit, and government organizations. A portion of these meetings included follow-up with previous groups the team met with in Phase 1, including Chambers of Commerce to re-engage with the tourism industry, to share the draft cost feasible plan for feedback. The MTP team also engaged with new community groups to broaden the outreach for the plan.








Figure 5-3: Outreach Event Points

Chapter 5 Recap

The Route to 2050 highlights the importance of inclusive community engagement throughout the plan's development. The MPO ensured that its outreach efforts were accessible to all Broward County residents, focusing on demographics and incorporating perspectives. The chapter describes a phased approach to outreach, with each phase building on previous efforts to broaden community input and close participation gaps. By embedding public outreach into decision-making, the MTP strives to allocate resources and prioritize projects effectively and efficiently.

Key aspects of public involvement include the creation of an MTP story to clearly communicate the plan's goals, strategic investments, and funding priorities to residents and visitors. Stakeholder coordination was crucial, involving active engagement with partners in project prioritization, regular updates, and close alignment with regional, state, and county priorities. The MPO used various community engagement tools, including videos, meetings, and an informative website, to keep the public involved and informed throughout the process.

Needs Assessment

This chapter provides an overview of the needs plan development process and the resulting projects. The majority of the projects included in the needs plan were identified by the MPO partners and the public.

Introduction

As Broward County continues to grow and evolve, addressing its transportation needs requires innovative and strategic approaches. With limited opportunities for traditional road widening due to the county's built-out nature and the significant community and environmental impacts such projects could entail, the focus has shifted towards optimizing existing infrastructure, expanding travel options, and enhancing safety across all modes of transportation.

The Route To 2050 MTP needs assessment process began in early 2023 and was designed to comprehensively identify and address these challenges. This process included the key steps identified in Figure 6-1 and described briefly below. As shown in the figure, the MPO's emphasis areas informed the entire needs plan process.

Figure 6-1: Needs Assesment Process



Step 1: Data and Analysis

The Broward MPO conducted a data collection process, gathering both quantitative and qualitative information to support project evaluation and prioritization. This step involved gathering input from the Goals, Objectives, and Indicators, travel demand modeling results, and input from previous plans and studies, including Commitment 2045. Public input was collected through survey tools to identify public opinion and desires. The MPO collaborated with local and regional partners to ensure priorities were aligned with local goals.

For more detailed information on the methodologies and resources used, refer to Technical Report 2 Data Compilation and Review.

Policy & Performance

This includes a review of the adopted goals and corresponding performance measures, which are discussed in more detail in Technical Report 4, which informed the development of the evaluation criteria for prioritizing projects. Commitment 2045 used a performance-based, mode-neutral approach to project prioritization to better align funded projects with the federally required and regional Performance Measures. The Route to 2050 MTP uses a similar performance-based analysis to remain consistent but uses slightly different criteria to match with the revised funding programs. A technical summary of the performance evaluation is provided in Chapter 8.

Travel Demand Model

Data from the model was used to evaluate the plan's performance. The Southeast Florida Regional Planning Model (SERPM), an activity-based model, was updated for use in the development of Route to 2050. Data from the model was used to validate the needs and planning assumptions of Route To 2050.

Prioritization Data

The data used for the project prioritization process came from a variety of sources, which is detailed in the Data Compilation and Review Technical Report. The goal was to utilize readily available data sets.

Land Use

The development of trend population and employment growth for 2050 is detailed in separate technical reports and summarized in Chapter 3. These data were used to identify needs as part of the SERPM model. Specifically, the trend growth data were used in the Existing + Committed model run to identify facilities that are projected to need improvement as a result of anticipated growth.

Emphasis Areas

Building on the efforts of Commitment 2045, the MPO selected four emphasis areas for Route To 2050. A brief overview of each of the emphasis areas and the efforts undertaken as part of the MTP is provided below.

Safety, which was a focus in Commitment 2045, was continued for this MTP. A safety analysis was completed, and is documented in Technical Report 7, Safety Analysis. As a follow up to the analysis completed for Commitment 2045, this effort focused on non-state roadway high-crash locations that involved specific types of incidents for which physical/engineering solutions could be identified. The report also provides a trend analysis, noting common behaviors contributing to crashes. The results of this analysis are being used in the Broward Safety Action Plan, which will identify specific projects that will be amended into the Route to 2050 Cost Feasible Plan.

Infrastructure Hardening, also considered in Commitment 2045, was a more defined effort to identify the Infrastructure Hardening network throughout the county for which mitigation and adaptation projects could be identified.

The assessment utilized previously completed efforts and data, with some updated data provided by Broward County, and focused on the following:

Susceptibility, which was comprised of the following three variables:

- Sensitivity: The capacity of a facility to handle variations in a extreme weather stressor
- Exposure: The degree to which a facility is subjected to adverse weather extremess based on impact


from the following identified stressors:

- 1. Coastal Inundation
- 2. Flooding, current and future (Precipitation & Storm Surge)
- 3. Extreme Heat
- 4. Future Groundwater Elevation
- Adaptive Capacity: The ability of the transportation network to deal with the loss of an impacted facility. This was based on the number of travelers affected and the detour lengths around each affected network segment.

Demographics in recognition of the challenges that socially susceptible populations can face in mobility and recovery, the MPO's Transportation Demographic Areas were incorporated into the assessment.

Figure 6-2 shows how susceptibility and demographics were combined to identify the resulting Infrastructure Hardening network. The results of the Infrastructure Hardening evaluation are provided in Technical Report 8, MTP Infrastructure Hardening Assessment. The corridors identified through this effort were used in the prioritization process and a Infrastructure Hardening funding program was established to address the needs identified. These corridors will also be programmed for studies to determine appropriate solutions, which will be amended into the plan as future projects. The MPO is conducting the long-range planning to encourage its partners to construct Infrastructure Hardening improvements on their roadways.

Emerging Technologies. As part of the collaboration with partner agencies, the MPO learned that while many have technology projects in their plans, very few of them are related to preparing for future advancements, outside of electric infrastructure. As a result, a Technology funding program was established to prepare Broward for emerging technologies. The MPO has several technology projects underway, and the expectation is for these efforts to provide additional projects that will be amended into the Cost Feasible Plan.

Housing Coordination is a new emphasis area for the Route to 2050. Stemming from the provisions of the IIJA that encourages MPOs to develop Housing Coordination Plans in conjunction with housing providers. Specifically, the Housing Coordination Plan is meant to develop regional goals for the integration of housing, transportation, and economic development strategies.

The aim of this plan is to:

- 1. Better connect housing and employment
- 2. Align transportation improvements with housing needs
- 3. Align planning for housing and transportation
- 4. Expand housing and economic development within existing transportation corridors and public transportation services
- 5. Manage the growth of vehicle miles traveled related to housing and economic development in a metropolitan area
- 6. Identify the location of existing and planned housing and employment, and existing transportation options that connect housing and employment
- 7. Include a comparison of transportation plans to land use management plans, including zoning plans that may affect road use, public transportation ridership, and housing development

The MPO initiated this effort by reviewing available data for viable housing and coordinating with Broward County, who was in the process of developing a housing master plan (Housing Broward: 10-Year Housing Master Plan, adopted March 7, 2024). The MPO undertook extensive coordination with Broward County and its own Infrastructure Hardening and Housing Coordination Committee to advance the development of the Housing Coordination Plan. Ultimately the decision was made to separate the development of this plan from the MTP effort. However, the following initial efforts were accomplished through the MTP.

To address items 2 and 3 above, two different efforts were undertaken to identify the location of viable housing. The initial effort utilized information on Low-Income Housing Tax Credit development locations for the MTP project prioritization as a proxy for aligning transportation improvements with housing. Additional work was completed to identify the Housing Route Marker (for more information, see Chapter 6), that relied on data from the U.S. Census and Broward County's Housing Broward plan regarding viable rent. The goal of this Route Marker is to ensure that as the cost feasible projects are developed, the housing needs of nearby residents are addressed. As the Housing Coordination Plan is completed, the information used for this Route Marker will be refined.

To address items 4 and 6 above, a mapping analysis was completed that evaluated public transportation gaps in areas identified in the Housing Route Marker data as having a higher propensity for viable housing. An additional analysis was completed for the year 2050 using the planned improvements identified in the County's PREMO Plan to determine if projected housing densities in 2050 warranted additional investments in public transportation beyond those in the PREMO Plan. For more information, see Technical Report 10, MTP Housing Coordination Assessment. To address item 7 above, zoning code and land use policy recommendations were provided in Technical Report 10. These recommendations focus on common features of zoning codes and land use policies that create unintentional barriers to the development of housing.

Step 2: Identifying Projects

A formal Call for Projects allowed partner agencies (including the Seminole Tribe of Florida) and jurisdictions to submit projects of interest to the MPO for review and potential inclusion in the Route to 2050. The process included meetings with partner agencies to discuss project ideas and the completion of an online submission form. The MPO completed an internal Call for Projects through a collaborative process with each MPO team. This process resulted in projects that address bicycle and pedestrian needs, congestion management, infrastructure hardening, technology, and transit needs. The majority of the identified projects came from the MPO's partners and the public, resulting in a total of 446 identified projects, totaling approximately \$4.6 billion in 2023 dollars.

Step 3: Project Categorization by Funding Program

Projects were categorized and assigned in the Route to 2050 MTP Funding Programs: Roads for Families, Highways & Freight, Economic Development, Technology, Safety, and Infrastructure Hardening, which were built upon the previous 2045 framework.

The identified projects were distributed among five out of the six funding programs, with the Safety and Infrastructure Hardening programs having separate prioritization processes. Projects in the Roads for Families, Highways & Freight, Economic Development, and Technology Programs were used to create the final Cost Feasible Plan and were prioritized accordingly. A summary of needs by funding program is shown in Figure 6-3, and a detailed review of the funding programs and their prioritization can be found in Chapter 7.

Key Plans Used for Identifying MTP Needs



The MPO completed a Congestion Management Process Technical Report in 2022. Information from this effort was utilized to identify needs and evaluate priorities for Route To 2050.




The MPO adopted a **CSMP** in 2019. The MPO relied on this effort to identify unfunded bicycle and pedestrian projects for Route To 2050.



Projects identified in Commitment 2045 were considered for inclusion in Route to 2050. These projects were not automatically included unless submitted by a partner agency through the Call for Projects or the review of SERPM results identified a need that could be met by of these projects.

Step 4: Project Prioritization

Once all the needs were identified they were evaluated through the project prioritization process, which scored and ranked transportation projects based on the criteria presented in Chapter 2. The scoring for Route To 2050 was simplified compared to the weighting applied in Commitment 2045. Points were assigned first by dividing a total possible score of 100 by the three factors. Then, the points associated with each factor were adjusted based on the significance of the factor relative to the MTP goals, and to establish a whole number instead of fractions. This resulted in the weighting of criteria being built into the associated total points available for each factor. Final prioritization scores are a result of the analysis and a total summation of each awarded point per criteria. This prioritization process and scoring approach was endorsed by the Broward MPO Board during its October 12, 2023, meeting.

Identified Needs by Funding Program

This section details the needs identified for each funding program through the process outlined above. Initially, the projects were given an ordinal rank based on their total score. Projects with the same total score were given the same ordinal rank, as illustrated in Table 6-1.

To determine rank within the funding program, the projects were given consecutive numbers. If two or more projects had the same prioritization score, ties were broken based on:

- 1. The need for right-of-way to complete the project, meaning if the project needs right-of-way, it was less of a priority within the set of tied projects;
- 2. The number of Route Markers the project met, where the more Route Markers a project had, the higher it was in the set of tied projects; and
- 3. Alphabetically by project name.

The results of the prioritization process were presented to the MPO's Committees in March 2024 for their review. For more information about the process, see Technical Report 5, Prioritization Process.

Program Ranked through the MTP Prioritization Factors & Metrics



Technology

Technology investments are used to support electric and connected vehicle initiatives, intelligent transportation systems, and real-time data and monitoring. These projects will address existing and future transportation challenges and create a more hardened and responsive network. **There were 31 technology needs identified with a total needs cost of \$82 Million**. Figure 6-7 shows the project locations that were identified under the Technology Funding Program.

Roads for Families

The Roads for Families Program focuses on enhancing roadway infrastructure to address gaps in the local and regional network. This program also includes funding for the Roads for Economic Vitality (REV), a competitive grant program that provides funding to municipalities. **There were 205 projects identified for this program with a total needs cost of \$1.5 Billion**. Figure 6-4 shows the project locations that were identified under the Roads for Families Funding Program.

Program with separate framework/development process



This program supports safety improvements, such as traffic calming and intersection improvements, identified through a county-wide safety analysis to reduce traffic-related injuries and fatalities. The program is separated into state and non-state projects. **Specific needs for this funding program will be developed through the Broward Safety Action Plan**, as indicated in Figure 6-8.

Highways & Freight

The Highways & Freight Program includes initiatives that improve roadway capacity and operating conditions through geometric improvements on roadway networks. This program includes projects to enhance freight movement and alleviate congestion. There were 165 identified projects for this program with a total needs cost of \$3 Billion, not including the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) projects. Figure 6-5 shows the project locations that were identified under the Highways & Freight Funding Program.

Program Ranked through the MTP Prioritization Factors & Metrics



Economic Development




Figure 6-6: Safety Program Needs

This program supports investments in transit infrastructure and enhancing accessibility to existing and planned transit stops and stations. It includes Economic Development Projects, which seek to improve the first/last mile connectivity between different modes of transportation and enhance the overall transit passenger experience. The Economic Development Projects identified are intended to support the premium transit network identified in Broward County's PREMO plan. There were 45 projects identified for this program with a total needs cost of \$500 Million, not including Broward County Transit's PREMO Projects. Figure 6-6 shows the project locations that were identified under the Economic Development Funding Program.

Infrastructure Hardening

The Infrastructure Hardening Program is designed to support projects that mitigate the effects of weather extremes on the region's transportation infrastructure. These projects focus on enhancing the durability and adaptability of the transportation network. These projects were identified and prioritized through an assessment process that measured network sensitivity, exposure and adaptive capacity to extreme weather events. The projects include corridor studies and mast-arm installation.

A total of 44 projects were identified: 23 corridors and 21 mast-arm locations with a total needs cost of \$23 Million. For more information about the Infrastructure Hardening assessment, see Technical Report 8. Figure 6-9 shows the needs identified for the Infrastructure Hardening program.




Figure 6-8: Economic Development Program Needs





Figure 6-9: Infrastructure Hardening Program Needs



Chapter 6 Recap

The Route to 2050 MTP takes a deep dive into identifying future transportation needs across Broward County, driven by data and public input. This process started in 2023 and pulls together everything from travel demand models to safety and infrastructure hardening evaluations, emphasizing key areas like safety, infrastructure hardening, and emerging technologies. The plan builds on past efforts (like the Commitment 2045 MTP) while updating strategies for growth, weather extremes, and housing. With an exciting focus on future-proofing the county, Broward is getting ready to tackle transportation challenges head-on, addressing everything from micro-mobility to tech upgrades like electric infrastructure!

Not only does the Route to 2050 MTP dive into flashy, futuristic projects (like SMART METRO), it also takes a serious approach to community needs—ensuring that housing and public transit are planned together. With \$4.6 billion of need identified for investments this is Broward's roadmap to a safer, more hardened, and smarter transportation system.

Funding

This chapter summarizes how an investment strategy was implemented for Route to 2050. Included in this chapter are the summary of financial resources available for funding transportation improvements, an overview and illustration of the Route to 2050 Cost Feasible Plan, and the Illustrative Plan tables and maps.

Investment in a transportation system that serves the needs of residents, business owners, and visitors to Broward County is the key responsibility of the Broward MPO. For Route to 2050, the MPO continued the complementary funding strategy developed for Commitment 2045, meaning that funds are allocated to "complement" the available state and county funds, ensuring that priorities are addressed.

Five-Step Approach

The five-step approach developed for Commitment 2045 was continued for the development of Route to 2050. This approach ensures that the financial resources of the MPO are allocated to the six funding programs in a manner that corresponds to the policy direction of the MPO Board while remaining consistent with the eligible uses of each funding source.

This five-step process is summarized as follows:

Figure 7-1: Five step approach



Develop Revenue Forecast. The FDOT 2050 Revenue Forecast Handbook (see Technical Report 6 and Appendix C), which includes the forecast specific to the Broward MPO was evaluated and integrated into the MTP.



Convert Revenues to 2023 Dollars. The revenues were adjusted to reflect the present value in 2023 to normalize the allocation of revenues to funding programs.

Step 3

Allocate Revenues to Funding Programs. Revenues were allocated to funding programs according to eligible uses and policy direction from the MPO Board.

Step 4

Assign Prioritized Projects to Funding Programs. The prioritized highway, roadway enhancement, technology, and transit projects were assigned to the appropriate funding programs.

Step 5


Assign Funded Projects to Time Periods and Inflate Dollars. Based on revenue availability, funded projects were prioritized and assigned to a future time period for implementation, with the project cost inflated to be consistent with that time period.

Additional information about the application of this approach is provided in the remainder of this chapter and in Technical Report 14, Financially Feasible Plan.

Financial Resources

Between 2025 and 2050, an estimated \$9.2 billion is available to fund Route to 2050 improvements. The initial five years (2025 to 2029) of Route to 2050 reflect the MPO's adopted and committed Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). This means the first five years of the plan are projects that are either starting construction or advancing towards the construction phase. Additional funding was allocated through 2050 for the TIP projects that were not completed in the first five years. After accounting for the funding necessary to complete existing project commitments listed in the TIP, the remaining years (2030 to 2050) of the plan reflect the transportation improvements that can be funded with revenues that are reasonably expected to be available over this time period.

Key observations about these revenues are as follows:

\$4.8 billion is committed to transportation improvements over the next five years consistent with the MPO's currently adopted TIP (FY 2025 to FY 2029).

An estimated \$4.4 billion in state and federal revenues is forecast to be available from 2030–2050.

\$3.3 billion is designated by law or policy for mode-specific transportation improvements. This includes revenues dedicated to the Strategic Intermodal System, Federal Transportation Alternatives Program, and investments in the transit system. While the MPO's ability to allocate these revenues across MTP Funding Programs is limited, the MTP prioritization process does influence investment in specific projects.


The remaining \$1.1 billion has the flexibility to be allocated across the MTP Funding Programs based on the technical analyses and policy decisions of the Broward MPO.

MPO Attributable Funds

MPO Attributable Funds (also known as Flexible Program Allocations) are federal transportation funds that an MPO like the Broward MPO directly controls and allocates to transportation projects within its region. These funds come from various federal sources and are distributed to MPOs to support projects that align with regional priorities, such as improving safety, reducing congestion, enhancing mobility, and supporting sustainability.

The MPO works with local governments, transportation agencies, and the public to decide which projects should receive these funds, ensuring that the investments meet both short-term needs and long-term goals. Essentially, MPO attributable funds give the organization the ability to prioritize and advance critical transportation improvements in its area. Based on MPO Board policy decisions, the MPO attributable funds have been distributed between the six MTP funding programs as follows:

Strategic Intermodal System

Section 339.64, F.S. provides for the development of a SIS Plan with, among other things, a needs assessment, a project prioritization process, and a finance plan including both 10-year and 20-year cost feasible components. Subsection 339.65(4) requires that FDOT develop and maintain a plan for SIS roadway corridor projects anticipated to be constructed within a period of at least 20 years. The SIS Policy Plan provides direction for updating SIS first and second five-year plans, the SIS Cost Feasible Plan (CFP), and the SIS Unfunded Needs Plan.

FDOT plans for the SIS in coordination with the state's MPOs and other partners. MPOs plan for integrated metropolitan transportation systems in coordination with FDOT and other partners and give emphasis to facilities that serve national, state, and regional transportation functions (23 U.S.C. 134, 49 U.S.C. 5303, F.S. 339.175). Subsection 339.175(1), F.S. notes that facilities that serve national, state, and regional transportation functions include facilities on the SIS. Multiple performance measures established under the MAP-21/FAST Act, for which FDOT and the MPOs set targets, apply to SIS facilities.

Projects in the SIS CFP focus on highways, as FDOT and modal partners have not been able to identify cost-feasible projects beyond the FDOT work program sufficiently to include them in the SIS CFP. Revenue projections relevant to the identification of cost-feasible SIS projects for the SIS 2050 CFP and 2050 LRTPs for the 27 MPOs in Florida are in the FDOT 2050 Revenue Forecast. Right-of-way and construction phases for projects in the SIS 2050 CFP are funded out of the for statewide estimate for SIS All Modes as one of the capacity programs covered by the forecast. Project development and preliminary engineering phases for those projects are funded out of the forecast's statewide estimate for Product Support, a non-capacity program. A portion of the statewide estimate for SIS All Modes is in modal reserves which are available for modes other than highways for specific projects that will be identified and selected in the future. SIS first five-year plans include a statewide modal section. This section in the SIS First Five-Year Plan (FY 2024/2025-FY 2028/2029) includes aviation, spaceport, rail, seaport, transit, and capacity improvements.

The projects in the FDOT District 4 section of the SIS 2050 CFP reflect use of multiple sources (studies, long range transportation plans, and other plans, etc.), input from District staff and consultants with working knowledge of SIS facilities, consultations with MPOs, application of District and State-level project prioritization processes, and consideration of factors such as constructability and the ability of corridors to function in relation to one another (e.g., I-95 and SR-80). The design phases for the projects are timed so they can inform each other and set the stage for funding of subsequent phases. Construction phase cost estimates are inflated to the middle year of the applicable time band.

The SIS CFP is a key source for projects programmed by FDOT in the SIS first and second five-year plans updated annually. The SIS First Five-Year Plan (FY 2023/2024–FY 2027/2028) and the SIS Second Five-Year Plan (FY 2028/2029–FY 2032/2033) are posted on the FDOT website at fdot.gov/planning/systems/sis/plans.shtm

2050 Cost Feasible Plan

Using the approach previously described, revenues were allocated to the six funding programs. Funding from each of the six programs was allocated to the prioritized projects assigned to the program to determine how many projects could be funded. Where appropriate, projects were funded by phase across multiple time bands. Additional information about each funding program is provided in Tables 7-1 through 7-7, with each table summarized briefly below.



Table 7-1: Financial Summary by Funding Program



Unfunded Needs Plan

The Unfunded Needs Plan "takes into account current and future transportation needs without consideration of financial constraints. While not required by Federal regulation, a Needs Plan can aid in inventorying a region's transportation needs to prioritize which projects should be funded to achieve a more efficient and interconnected transportation system." [FDOT MPO Program Management Handbook 4.3.3]. The total cost of unfunded needs amounts to \$4,546,114,555. A detailed breakdown of unfunded projects by program can be found in Appendix D.

Partner Agency Unfunded Needs Plan

A Partner Agency Unfunded Needs Plan can be found in Appendix E and reflects the priority projects identified by Port Everglades and Broward County Transit that align with their specific goals but remain unfunded. Including these plans in the MTP ensures a comprehensive understanding of regional transportation needs, supports coordination among agencies, and strengthens grant applications and policy advocacy by showcasing a unified vision for regional improvements.



Figure 7-8: 2050 Highways & Freight Plan



Other Partner Agencies

Port Everglades

Port Everglades is planning for 2050 with an updated roadmap for future growth over the next 20 years that identifies \$3 billion in capital investments to improve productivity for cargo, cruise, and petroleum businesses that operate at the South Florida seaport. The current 20-Year Master/Vision Plan was approved on June 18, 2020, by the Broward County Board of County Commissioners, which governs the Port as a self-funded enterprise fund. The Port is now in the process of updating its Master/Vision Plan. The MPO is committed to supporting Port Everglades in its effort to secure funding for the maintenance and expansion of the port. Appendix E includes the unfunded project priorities for the port as of August 2024.

South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA)

SFRTA is currently working on a major update to its Transit Development Plan, which will cover the years 2026 to 2035. SFRTA submitted a list of needs as part of the Call for Projects. Funded projects are shown in the Economic Development plan previously presented. Three of the requested projects were unable to be funded and are included in the unfunded needs list in Appendix D. As SFRTA identifies new capital projects, the MPO will update the Route to 2050 MTP as necessary to include them.

Broward County Mobility Advancement Program (MAP)

As noted in Chapter 2, Broward County voters approved a one percent transportation surtax in 2018 to fund a variety of transportation improvements. Known as MAP, the county adopts funded projects as part of its budget on an annual basis, including transit improvements identified through the PREMO plan. The County requested that the PREMO Plan be incorporated into the MTP as a combination of illustrative projects (see Table 7-9 and Figure 7-11) and unfunded needs. The unfunded PREMO projects are included in Appendix E. Other projects funded by MAP will be amended into the MTP as funding requests are received. For more information, visit the MAP and PREMO Plan websites.

Non-Capacity Programs

State Roadway System Preservation

Based on agreement with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and consistent with MPOAC guidelines, FDOT has provided District-level funding estimates related to the preservation of the existing transportation system. Included in this noncapacity program are resurfacing, bridge, and operations and maintenance activities. As a result of this commitment, FDOT has set aside \$8.4 billion (in future YOE) for District 4 state roadway system facilities from 2025 to 2050. These revenues are set aside by FDOT for meeting District and statewide goals and are consistent with current performance measure targets for:

Resurfacing pavements on the SHS

- Repairing and replacing deficient bridges on public roads
- Meeting state and federal criteria
- Maintaining transportation infrastructure once constructe

Non-State Roadway System Preservation

Historically, Broward County uses Constitutional, Local Option, and Ninth Cent gas taxes to fund non-State roadway expansion and maintenance and transit operations. The county's 2023 Transportation Capital Program reflects more than \$177 million for transportation projects, including \$120 million for non-State roadway maintenance, nearly \$31 million for transit operations, and an estimated \$16 million for roadway capital investments. The Broward County Board of County Commissioners oversees the allocation of gas taxes.

Planning & Environmental Linkages

FHWA promotes a tool called Planning and Environment Linkages (PEL). It is "a collaborative and integrated approach to transportation decision-making that 1) considers environmental, community, and economic goals early in the transportation planning process, and 2) uses the information, analysis, and products developed during planning to inform the environmental review process.¹" PEL is meant for complex projects, which means there are significant environmental or built environment constraints, it is controversial or very costly, or has the potential for numerous alternatives that may be confusing. A PEL may also be conducted if the scope of a project isn't well-defined. The goal of PEL is to expedite the project development process so that necessary improvements can be delivered more efficiently, while still adhering to the tenets of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

The MPO has created a transparent process for developing its MTP. For both Commitment 2045 and Route to 2050, collaboration with the public, the MPO's Committees and Board, and partner agencies has been paramount. During the Call for Projects, MPO staff met with partner agencies to review their proposed submittals to ensure they would meet the requirements for inclusion in the MTP. Municipalities were also required to pass resolutions of support for the projects within their jurisdiction that were part of the draft Cost Feasible Plan, ensuring that the proposed projects were consistent with their community's goals. Lastly, as part of the prioritization process, each project was reviewed against available data provided by state and federal resource agencies for natural, historical, and built resources of potential concern. Thereby initiating an early review of potential impacts.

Due to the built-out nature of Broward County, there are very few projects identified in the Cost Feasible Plan that would be candidates for PEL. The majority of the complex projects are initiated by FDOT, which utilizes their own Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM) process to achieve the same goals as FHWA's PEL. However, in recognition of past challenges with advancing projects, the MPO has opted to conduct a variety of feasibility studies to enable a more in-depth exploration of the purpose and need and potential impacts of certain project types to ensure the potential solutions are aligned with the community's goals. The Route Markers, described previously, are another way the MPO is helping to identify project concerns early in the development process.

Goods Movement

The MPO's Freight Transportation Advisory Committee (FTAC) includes members who are directly involved in the movement, storage, and distribution of freight and represent a broad spectrum of the freight community, including warehouse owners, industrial realtors, shipping companies, trucking companies and organizations, railroads, freight forwarders, importer/exporters, and truck parking and distribution companies.

The MPO established the FTAC to provide a forum for an open dialogue in which the freight community can gain insight into the MPO's decisions and upcoming projects and provide much-needed industry input to decision-makers regarding freight transportation priorities and expenditures. As a result, the FTAC played a critical role in reviewing the progress of the Route to 2050 MTP and its contribution to the movement of freight. Its input resulted in the addition of truck parking facilities in the needs and illustrative plans.

Numerous transportation projects that improve freight movement are included in the 2050 Cost Feasible Plan to support movement of people and goods in the Broward region. Types of projects include roadway capacity improvements on interstates, toll roads, primary arterials, interchanges, and major intersections, and the exploration of additional truck parking facilities.

Transportation Safety and Security

Route to 2050 identifies improving safety and security as key planning objectives for the Broward region. In addition, safety and security are also incorporated into the project prioritization process used to develop the 2050 Cost Feasible Plan. Examples of safety/security-related projects included in Route to 2050 include the following:

- Intersection capacity/safety/operational improvements on major evacuation routes
- Technology improvements in roadway and transit modes
- Roadway capacity expansion, including widening and interchange improvement projects on major evacuation routes, and the identification of facilities susceptible to the effects of extreme weather

Safety

As part of the Route to 2050 MTP, a safety analysis was performed to identify and prioritize locations to be further evaluated for possible safety solutions as part of the Broward Safety Action Plan (BSAP). The analysis evaluated system-wide trends, developed a toolbox of countermeasures to address these system-wide trends, and screened the network to identify crash hotspots for which actionable improvements can be made. As previously discussed, this information will be used in the BSAP to develop a set of projects to improve safety throughout Broward. Once identified, these projects will be amended into the 2050 Cost Feasible Plan as appropriate.

Security

Federal requirements for metropolitan planning include consideration of security as a factor in the MTP. The planning process should provide for consideration and implementation of projects, strategies, and services that will increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users. Security goes beyond safety and includes planning to prevent, manage, or respond to threats of a region and its transportation system and users.

USDOT defines transportation system security as the freedom from intentional harm and tampering that affects both motorized and non-motorized travelers and may also include natural disasters. In addition to the possibility of human-caused security issues, the Broward MPO planning area is highly susceptible to hurricanes, floods, and other severe weather events.

Homeland Security. Attention to human-caused and natural disaster security concerns has inevitably increased due to events such as September 11, 2001, and major hurricanes over the past 20 years. The susceptibility of the transportation system and its use in emergency evacuations have become key concerns for the Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

Established by DHS, the Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) focuses on enhancing regional preparedness in major metropolitan areas. The Miami/Fort Lauderdale UASI was established to coordinate with the Florida Division of Emergency Management on expanding regional collaboration and developing integrated regional systems for prevention, protection, response, and recovery.

MPO Security Strategies. Numerous MPO strategies integrate security aspects into the metropolitan planning process of the MPO, including the following:

- Identify and implement transportation projects that add alternate routes and connections.
- Coordinate with Broward County on implementing mitigation actions related to the transportation network.
- Coordinate/partner with local and regional agencies to incorporate transportation security into regional and local projects and plans.
- Identify and implement traffic and transit technologies to improve communications during hazards/events.







Chapter 7 Recap

The Broward MPO is on a mission to invest in a transportation system that meets the needs of residents, businesses, and visitors alike. With the Route to 2050 plan, we've built on the success of the Commitment 2045 MTP, using a strategic funding approach that complements state and county resources to prioritize exciting projects like roadway enhancements, transit improvements, and cutting-edge technology. Evaluation

This chapter addresses two categories of performance measures: the federally-required measures and the regional measures identified by the MPO. Outside of the MTP process, the MPO monitors and documents the federally-required performance measures in the MPO's State of the System Performance Report, which is included in the TIP. The MPO also provides a Performance Measures Dashboard on its website.

Introduction

Performance-based planning was established by the previous transportation funding bills and continued with the IIJA. National performance goals for federal-aid highway programs were established and MPOs are required to incorporate those performance goals, measures and targets into the MTP process. The goal of performance-based planning is to improve the investment efficiency of federal transportation funds, refocus investments on national transportation goals, increase the accountability and transparency of federal transportation funds, and improve decision-making. MPOs are also required to provide a System Performance Report as part of the MTP update.

Federal Performance Measures & System Performance Report

In compliance with the Statewide and Nonmetropolitan Transportation Planning; Metropolitan Transportation Planning Rule, 23 USC 450, the following System Performance Report for the Broward MPO is included for the required Highway Safety (PM1), Bridge and Pavement (PM2), System Performance (PM3), Transit Asset Management, and Transit Safety Targets.

Highway Safety Measures (PM1)

The first of FHWA's performance management rules, referred to as the PM1 rule, establishes measures to assess fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. The rule requires state DOTs and MPOs to annually establish targets and report performance and progress toward targets to FHWA for the following safety-related performance measures.

Safety-related performance measures (PM1):

- 1. Number of fatalities;
- 2. Rate of fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled (VMT);
- 3. Number of serious injuries;
- 4. Rate of serious injuries per 100 million VMT; and
- 5. Number of non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries.

FDOT publishes statewide safety performance targets for the following calendar year in the HSIP Annual Report that it transmits to FHWA each August. The current safety targets established in the 2023 Highway Safety Improvement Program HSIP annual report are set at "0" for each performance measure to reflect Florida's vision of zero deaths.

MPOs must establish safety targets within 180 days of when FDOT establishes targets. MPOs can either agree to program projects that will support the statewide targets or establish their own quantifiable targets for the MPO's planning area.

This System Performance Report discusses the performance for each measure as well as progress achieved in meeting targets over time. Table 8-1 presents statewide performance for each PM1 measure in recent years and the 2024 targets established by FDOT.

The five-year average for fatalities and the fatal crash rate has been steadily increasing. The five-year rolling average for fatalities increased by 4.6% while the fatal crash rate increased by 5.7% from 2017-2021 to 2018-2022. This follows the same trend as the State of Florida; however, the rate of increase is higher in Broward. Serious injuries have been declining since 2015, with both the number and rate of serious injuries decreasing by 8.3% and 3.7%, respectively from 2017-2021 to 2018-2022. Similarly, the number of non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries is also declining, decreasing 2.7% during the same time period. These trends reflect the trends illustrated in the State data.

The Broward MPO agreed to support FDOT's highway safety targets on November 2, 2023. By adopting FDOT's targets, the Broward MPO agrees to plan and program projects that help FDOT achieve these targets.

The Broward MPO recognizes the importance of linking goals, objectives, and investment priorities to establish performance objectives, and that this link is critical to the achievement of national transportation goals and statewide and regional performance targets. As such, the Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP reflects the goals, objectives, and performance measures, as they are available and described in other state and public transportation plans and processes; specifically, the Florida Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), the Florida Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), and the Florida Transportation Plan (FTP).

Florida's Strategic Highway Safety Plan

Florida's Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), published in March 2021, embraces Target Zero and identifies strategies to achieve zero traffic deaths and serious injuries. The SHSP was updated in coordination with Florida's 27 MPOs and the MPOAC. The SHSP development process included review of safety-related goals, objectives, and strategies in MPO plans. The SHSP guides FDOT, MPOs, and other partners in addressing safety and defines a framework for implementation throughout the state. Florida's transportation safety partners have focused on reducing fatalities and serious injuries through the 4Es of engineering, education, enforcement, and emergency response. To achieve zero, FDOT and other safety partners will expand beyond addressing specific hazards and influencing individual behavior to reshaping transportation systems and communities to create a safer environment for all travel. The updated SHSP calls on Florida to think more broadly and inclusively by addressing four additional topics, which could be referred to as the 4Is: information intelligence, innovation, insight into communities, and investments and policies.

HSIP

The HSIP is a core federal-aid program with the purpose to achieve a significant reduction in traffic fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads. The program is managed by the Central Office with District staff performing project activities such as conducting safety studies, project scoping, public involvement, and coordinating with production staff on programming safety projects. To be eligible for HSIP funds, safety improvement projects must address a SHSP emphasis area, be identified through a data-driven process, and contribute to a reduction in fatalities and serious injuries.

Project Development

Transportation projects are identified and prioritized with the MPOs and non-metropolitan local governments. Proposed project data is analyzed using traffic safety data and traffic demand modeling, among other data. The FDOT Project Development and Environment Manual requires that safety be considered in a proposed project's purpose and need, outlining safety factors like crash modification and safety performance. MPOs and local governments consider safety data analysis when determining project priorities.

The Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP increases the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users as required.

The MTP aligns with the Florida SHSP and the FDOT HSIP with specific strategies to improve safety performance focused on prioritized safety projects, pedestrian and/or bicycle safety enhancements, and traffic operation improvements to address our goal to reduce fatalities and serious injuries.

The MTP identifies safety needs within the metropolitan planning area and provides funding for targeted safety improvements. The first goal of Route to 2050 is to Safely Move People and Goods and safety is incorporated throughout the MTP and other MPO programs, including:

Incorporation of safety measures in project ranking criteria (ongoing)

The The MPO has a long history of prioritizing safety in ranking transportation projects during the MTP and annual REV cycles.

Interagency partnering (ongoing)

For many years, the Broward MPO has participated in various partnerships to promote safety awareness and to identify and address safety concerns throughout the community. This includes offering bicycle helmet fittings at community events, development of the Broward Safety Action Plan, and numerous events as part of the Roads for Families program.

Roads for Families Program (ongoing)

The MPO adopted a CSMP in February 2019 and continues to work on its implementation. As part of this effort, the MPO offers training for community partners and conducts community events as noted above.

Additional key components of the MPO's Roads for Families Program are:

Walking for Families! and Biking for Families! (ongoing)

Since 2014, the Broward MPO has organized annual Biking for Families! events to promote the use of Broward's bicycle facilities, bicycle safety, and the benefits of active transportation. Cyclists of all ages and abilities are encouraged and welcome to participate. This annual bike ride also features fun activities such as helmet fittings, bicycle giveaways and more. The MPO organized the first Walking for Families! Event in 2016. Similar to Biking for Families!, these events focus on promoting walking, safety and benefits of active transportation, while exploring community assets and local businesses.

Regional Safety Summit (ongoing)

In partnership with neighboring MPOs, an annual summit focused on promoting and creating safer, and more vibrant communities by encouraging and building the necessary skills to implement roadway enhancements throughout the South Florida region. This summit focuses on local safety projects and includes speakers from across the country and world, to discuss the latest developments in creating safe spaces and enhancing the public realm.

Congestion Management Process and Plan (June 2022)

The congestion management process requires the establishment and use of a coordinated, performance-based approach to transportation decision-making to support national goals for the federal-aid highway and public transportation programs.

In addition to congestion resulting from traffic volume, this report incorporated additional transportation measures used in performance management.

Broward Safety Action Plan (ongoing)

In 2023, the MPO was awarded a \$5 million Safe Streets and Roads for All planning grant in collaboration with Broward County. Together, the MPO and County are developing county-wide implementation strategies to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries with an emphasis on at risk communities.

MTP Safety Funding Program

A stand-alone funding program for safety projects was established in Commitment 2045 and is continued in Route to 2050. For both of these plans, a safety analysis was conducted to identify locations where safety improvements are necessary. The most recent effort is being used in the development of the Broward Safety Action Plan.

Pavement and Bridge Condition Measures (PM2)

FHWA's Bridge & Pavement Condition Performance Measures Final Rule, which is also referred to as the PM2 rule, requires state DOTs and MPOs to establish targets for the following six performance measures:

- 1: Percent of Interstate pavements in good condition
- 2: Percent of Interstate pavements in poor condition
- 3: Percent of non-Interstate National Highway System (NHS) pavements in good condition
- 4: Percent of non-Interstate NHS pavements in poor condition
- 5: Percent of NHS bridges (by deck area) classified as in good condition
- 6: Percent of NHS bridges (by deck area) classified as in poor condition

Pavement condition is assessed based on roughness, cracking, rutting, and faulting. Pavement in good condition suggests that no major investment is needed and should be considered for preservation treatment. Pavement in poor condition suggests major reconstruction investment is needed due to either ride quality or a structural deficiency.

Bridge condition is assessed by inspecting each bridge deck, superstructure, substructure, and culverts. A bridge in good condition suggests that no major investment is needed. A bridge in poor condition is safe to drive on; however, it is nearing a point where substantial reconstruction or replacement is needed.

Federal rules require state DOTs and MPOs to coordinate when setting pavement and bridge condition performance targets and monitor progress towards achieving the targets. States must establish two-year and four-year statewide targets for the PM2 measures. MPOs must establish four-year targets for all six measures. MPOs can either agree to program projects that will support the statewide targets or establish their own quantifiable targets for the MPO's planning area. The two-year and four-year targets represent pavement and bridge condition at the end of calendar years 2023 and 2025, respectively.

This System Performance Report discusses performance for each measure as well as progress achieved in meeting targets over time. Table 8-3 and Table 8-4 present statewide performance for each pavement and bridge measure and the 2023 and 2025 targets established by FDOT.

FDOT established the statewide PM2 targets on December 16, 2022. FDOT is mandated by Florida Statute 334.046 to preserve the state's pavement and bridges to specific standards. FDOT prioritizes funding allocations to ensure the current transportation system is adequately preserved and maintained before funding is allocated for capacity improvements. FDOT is also required by FHWA to develop a Transportation Asset Management Plan (TAMP) for the NHS pavements and bridges within the state.

The TAMP includes investment strategies to make progress toward achievement of the state's targets. FDOT's current TAMP was submitted on December 20, 2022, and recertified by FHWA on February 23, 2023. The percentage of Florida's bridges in good condition is slowly decreasing, which is to be expected as the bridge inventory grows older. Based on analyses of the data, the previous statewide targets are still appropriate for 2023 and 2025.

The percent of interstate pavements in good condition is improving in Broward, increasing from 74.5% in 2021 to 75.5% in 2022. Both of these are above the State's target of ≥60%. Over the past 5 years, none of the interstate pavement in Broward was found to be in poor condition. Generally, interstate pavements in Broward are in better condition compared to the State. Non-interstate pavements in good condition are also improving (an increase of 3.8%), but do not yet meet the adopted State target of ≥40%. The percent of non-interstate pavements in poor condition is below the adopted State target of 5% and is improving, decreasing by 0.1% between 2021 and 2022. Bridges in good condition in Broward showed a slight decline, dropping from 65.1% to 64.3% between 2021 and 2022, while bridges in poor condition remained unchanged at 0.5%. Both of these measures meet the adopted State targets, and the decrease in the percentage of bridges in good condition mirrors the trend at the State level. However, the State data shows an improvement (decrease) in the percent of bridges in poor condition.

The Broward MPO agreed to support FDOT's pavement and bridge condition performance targets on December 8, 2022. By adopting FDOT's targets, the Broward MPO agrees to plan and program projects that help FDOT achieve these targets.

The Broward MPO recognizes the importance of linking goals, objectives, and investment priorities to established performance objectives, and this link is critical to the achievement of national transportation goals and statewide and regional performance targets. As such, the Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP reflects the goals, objectives, performance measures, and targets as they are described in other state and public transportation plans and processes, including the Florida Transportation Plan (FTP) and the Florida Transportation Asset Management Plan.

The FTP is the single overarching statewide plan guiding Florida's transportation future. It defines the state's long-range transportation vision, goals, and objectives and establishes the policy framework for the expenditure of state and federal funds flowing through FDOT's work program. One of the seven goals defined in the FTP is agile, resilient, and quality infrastructure.

The Florida Transportation Asset Management Plan (TAMP) explains the processes and policies affecting pavement and bridge condition and performance in the state. It presents a strategic and systematic process of operating, maintaining, and improving these assets effectively throughout their life cycle.

The Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP seeks to address system preservation, identifies infrastructure needs within the metropolitan planning area, and provides funding for targeted improvements. Goal 1 in the MTP is to Safely Move People and Goods, which includes the following objective and indicators:

Objective

Ensure adequate funding is allocated to maintain and operate the existing transportation system

Indicator

Percentage of pavement in good and poor condition

Indicator

Percentage of bridges in good and poor condition



These indicators are part of the MTP Project Prioritization Process to ensure projects on roadway segments or bridges that are classified as "poor" receive a higher score and, therefore, a higher opportunity for funding to improve the asset's condition.

On or before October 1, 2024, FDOT will provide FHWA and the Broward MPO a detailed report of pavement and bridge condition performance covering the period of January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023. FDOT and the Broward MPO also will have the opportunity at that time to revisit the 2025 PM2 targets.

Performance Measures

National Highway Performance Program (NHPP)

- 1. Percent of person-miles on the Interstate system that are reliable
- 2. Percent of person-miles on the non-Interstate NHS that are reliable

National Highway Freight Program (NHFP)

3. Truck Travel Time Reliability index (TTTR)

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ)

- 4. Annual hours of peak hour excessive delay per capita (PHED)
- 5. Percent of non-single occupant vehicle travel (Non-SOV)
- 6. Cumulative 2-year and 4-year reduction of on-road mobile source emissions (NOx, VOC, CO, PM10, and PM2.5) for CMAQ funded projects.

System Performance, Freight, & Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality Improvement Program Measures (PM3)

FHWA's System Performance/Freight/CMAQ Performance Measures Final Rule, which is referred to as the PM3 rule, requires state DOTs and MPOs to establish targets for the following six performance measures.

The first two performance measures assess the percent of person-miles traveled on the Interstate or the non-Interstate NHS that are reliable. Reliability is defined as the ratio of longer travel times to a normal travel time. The third performance measure assesses the reliability of truck travel on the Interstate system by comparing the worst travel times for trucks against the travel time they typically experience. An increasing TTTR means performance is worsening. Because all areas in Florida meet current national air quality standards, the three CMAQ measures do not apply in Florida.

The PM3 rule requires state DOTs and MPOs to coordinate when establishing performance targets for these measures and to monitor progress towards achieving the targets. FDOT must establish two-year and four-year statewide targets for the PM3 measures. MPOs must establish four-year targets for the measures. MPOs can either agree to program projects that will support the statewide targets or establish their own quantifiable targets for the MPO's planning area. The two-year and four-year targets represent reliability for calendar years 2023 and 2025, respectively.

The System Performance Report discusses condition and performance of the transportation system for each applicable PM3 target as well as the progress achieved in meeting targets over time. Table 8-7 presents recent statewide performance for each PM3 measure, and the 2023 and 2025 targets established by FDOT.

FDOT established the statewide PM3 targets on December 16, 2022. In setting the statewide targets, FDOT reviewed several external and internal factors that affect reliability in the near term. Statewide reliability increased from 2018 to 2022 on both the Interstate and non-Interstate NHS. The truck travel time reliability index declined between 2018 and the pandemic years of 2020 and 2021 and then increased in 2022. Actual performance in 2021 was better than the 2021 targets. Based on the data available and due to the uncertainty of future travel behavior, FDOT believes the previous 2021 targets are still appropriate for 2023 and 2025.

The data in Table 8-8 indicate that person miles traveled reliability on both the interstate and non-interstate system is declining in the Broward MPO region. The interstate system's reliability decreased by 6.3% and the non-interstate system's reliability decreased by 2.3%. This mirrors the trend at the State level, and it is important to note that both of these measures achieve (and are higher than) the State targets. Truck Travel Time Reliability increased by 0.6% between 2021 and 2022. However, it does not yet meet the State target adopted for the year 2023. Although not shown in the table, the data for 2023 shows this measure continues to improve, up to 1.66, a 5.7% increase.

The Broward MPO agreed to support FDOT's PM3 targets on December 8, 2022. By adopting FDOT's targets, the Broward MPO agrees to plan and program projects that help FDOT achieve these targets.

The Broward MPO recognizes the importance of linking goals, objectives, and investment priorities to established performance objectives, and that this link is critical to the achievement of national transportation goals and statewide and regional performance targets. As such, the Broward MPO Route to 2050 reflects the goals, objectives, performance measures, and targets as they are described in other state and public transportation plans and processes, including the Florida Transportation Plan (FTP), Florida's Strategic Intermodal System (SIS), and the Florida Freight Mobility and Trade Plan.

The FTP is the single overarching statewide plan guiding Florida's transportation future. It defines the state's long-range transportation vision, goals, and objectives and establishes the policy framework for the expenditure of state and federal funds flowing through FDOT's work program. One of the seven FTP goals is Efficient and Reliable Mobility for People and Freight.

Florida's SIS is composed of transportation facilities of statewide and interregional significance. The SIS is a primary focus of FDOT's capacity investments and is Florida's primary network for ensuring a strong link between transportation and economic competitiveness. These facilities, which span all modes and include highways, are the workhorses of Florida's transportation system and account for a dominant share of the people and freight movement to, from and within Florida. The SIS includes 92 percent of NHS lane miles in the state. Thus, FDOT's focus on improving performance of the SIS goes hand-in-hand with improving the NHS, which is the focus of the FHWA's TPM program. The SIS Policy Plan was updated in early 2022 consistent with the updated FTP. It defines the policy framework for designating which facilities are part of the SIS, as well as how SIS investments needs are identified and prioritized. The development of the SIS Five-Year Plan by FDOT considers scores on a range of measures including mobility, preservation, safety, and economic competitiveness as part of FDOT's Strategic Investment Tool (SIT).

The Florida Freight Mobility and Trade Plan presents a comprehensive overview of the co ditions of the freight system in the state, identifies key challenges and goals, provides project needs, and identifies funding sources. Truck reliability is specifically called forth in this plan, both as a need as well as a goal. FDOT also developed and refined a methodology to identify freight bottlenecks on Florida's SIS on an annual basis using vehicle probe data and travel time reliability measures. Identification of bottlenecks and estimation of their delay impact aids FDOT in focusing on relief efforts and ranking them by priority. In turn, this information is incorporated into FDOT's SIT to help identify the most important SIS capacity projects to relieve congestion.

The Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP seeks to address system reliability and congestion mitigation through various means, including capacity expansion and operational improvements while ensuring safety is maintained or enhanced. The first two goals of the Route to 2050 MTP are to Safely Move People and Goods and to Create Jobs. Each of these goals includes objectives aimed at reducing congestion and improving reliability. Under the first goal, there is an objective to "improve travel reliability and reduce delay" and another to "implement transportation technologies that improve safety, promote efficiency, and meet the changing needs of travelers." Both of these objectives included criteria for the project prioritization process, including whether the project was located on an identified congested corridor and if it increased/improved the ITS infrastructure. Under the second goal, there are objectives to "maintain or reduce travel time to activity centers" and "support reliable freight movement." Criteria for both of these objectives were utilized in the project prioritization process, including whether the project provided access to an identified activity center and if it was located on a facility with a higher percentage of trucks.

The Route to 2050 also emphasizes a focus on improving system reliability and congestion mitigation through the establishment of the Roadway and Technology funding programs. The Highways & Freight funding program, as explained in Chapter 6, is for expanding roadway capacity and improving operating conditions. The Technology program was designed to fund ITS and real-time data and monitoring, among other initiatives, which should have a positive impact on travel time reliability and congestion mitigation. The Broward MPO is also focused on expanding travel opportunities, with significant investments in transit, bicycle, and pedestrian improvements. This is supported by the Economic Development and Roads for Families programs, and the emphasis placed on improving safety for all users (as noted previously in this chapter).

The MPO completed a Congestion Management Process Technical Report in 2022 that identified congested corridors for both the existing conditions (2019) and future conditions (2045). This document identifies supply- and demand-side strategies for addressing congestion. The document recognizes TSM&O and TDM approaches. Both Broward County and FDOT are implementing TSM&O improvements, which are included in the Cost Feasible Plan, to mitigate congestion on their facilities.

The Broward MPO is part of the South Florida Commuter Services (SFCS) program funded jointly by FDOT Districts Four and Six. SFCS seeks to reduce vehicle miles traveled in South Florida through the promotion of transit use, ridesharing, trip-reduction, and telecommuting. Finally, managed lanes currently exist (or are under construction) on I-95, I-595, and I-75 throughout the Broward MPO region. These lanes are high occupancy toll lanes, and registered carpools and vanpools (with 3 or more people) are able to use the lanes for free.

On or before October 1, 2024, FDOT will provide FHWA and the Broward MPO a detailed report of performance for the PM3 measures covering the period of January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2023. FDOT and the Broward MPO also will have the opportunity at that time to revisit the 2025 PM3 targets.

Transit Asset Management Measures

FTA's Transit Asset Management (TAM) regulations apply to all recipients and subrecipients of FTA funding that own, operate, or manage public transportation capital assets. The regulations require that public transportation providers develop and implement TAM plans, and established state of good repair standards and performance measures. Table 8-9 identifies the TAM performance measures.

Public transportation providers are required to establish TAM targets annually for the following fiscal year and must share its targets with each MPO in which the transit provider's projects and services are programmed in the MPO's TIP. MPOs are not required to establish TAM targets annually when the transit provider establishes targets. Instead, MPO targets must be established when the MPO updates the MTP (although it is recommended that MPOs reflect the most current transit provider targets in the TIP if they have not yet taken action to update MPO targets).

When establishing TAM targets, the MPO can either agree to program projects that will support the transit provider targets or establish its own separate regional TAM targets for the MPO planning area. MPO targets may differ from the targets established by a provider, especially if there are multiple providers in the MPO planning area. Public transit providers, states, and MPOs must coordinate with each other in the selection of performance targets.

FTA defines two tiers of public transportation providers based on number of vehicles and mode parameters. Tier I transit agencies, which are generally larger providers, establish their own TAM targets, while Tier II providers, generally smaller agencies, may participate in a group plan where targets are established by a plan sponsor (FDOT) for the entire group.

The Broward MPO has two Tier I providers operating in the region: Broward County Transit (BCT) and Tri-Rail, operated by the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA). Both of these agencies develop their own TAM Plans. BCT operates fixed route bus, express and community shuttles, and paratransit service throughout Broward County, with connections to Palm Beach and Miami-Dade counties. Tri-Rail is a commuter rail service that extends from Palm Beach County to Miami-Dade County. There are seven Tri-Rail stations in Broward County.

Transit Agency Targets

BCT established the transit asset targets identified in Table 8-10 during the fourth quarter of FY24. SFRTA established the transit asset targets identified in Table 8-11 on during the first quarter of FY24.

The transit asset management targets are based on the condition of existing transit assets and planned investments in equipment, rolling stock, infrastructure, and facilities. The targets reflect the most recent data available on the number, age, and condition of transit assets, and expectations and capital investment plans for improving these assets. The tables summarize both existing conditions for the most recent year available, and the targets.

MPO Transit Asset Management Targets

As discussed above, MPOs are not required to establish TAM targets annually each time the transit provider establishes targets. Instead, MPO's must revisit targets each time the MPO updates the MTP. MPOs can either agree to program projects that will support the transit provider targets or establish separate regional TAM targets for the MPO planning area. MPO targets may differ from agency targets, especially if there are multiple transit agencies in the MPO planning area.

On November 2, 2023, the Broward MPO established transit asset management targets for the MPO planning area. These targets were established in consultation with and reflect the targets established by BCT and SFRTA through their TAM Plans. The targets for rolling stock, particularly buses and vans, reflect a composite of all the transit agencies' targets. In instances where targets applied to one specific agency, such as locomotives and track restrictions, the MPO adopted that agency's target. The targets for the MPO's planning area are shown in Table 8-12.

The Broward MPO planning area is served by two Tier 1 transit providers: BCT and SFRTA and therefore must develop TAM Plans. BCT's TAM Plan includes the following Tier 2 transit providers: Coconut Creek, Coral Springs, Dania Beach, Davie, Deerfield Beach, Fort Lauderdale, Hallandale Beach, Hillsboro Beach, Hollywood, Lauderdale-by-the-Sea, Lauderdale Lakes, Lauderhill, Lighthouse Point, Margate, Miramar, Pembroke Pines, Pompano Beach, Tamarac, and West Park.

Transit Asset Management Performance

Generally, both BCT and SFRTA are achieving their adopted targets. BCT plans to address all vehicles (revenue or non-revenue) exceeding their useful life by the end of the fiscal year. SFRTA received a grant from FTA in May 2023 that allows for the replacement of 24 of their vehicles, representing 34% of their fleet. These new vehicles will allow SFRTA to achieve their adopted targets while providing for safer, more efficient, and more reliable service.

The Broward MPO recognizes the importance of linking goals, objectives, and investment priorities to stated performance objectives, and that establishing this link is critical to the achievement of national transportation goals and statewide and regional performance targets. As such, the MTP directly reflects the goals, objectives, performance measures, and targets as they are described in other public transportation plans and processes, including the TAM plans for both BCT and SFRTA, and the current Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP.

Transit Safety Performance

FTA's Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan (PTASP) regulation establishes transit safety performance management requirements for certain providers of public transportation that receive federal financial assistance under 49 U.S.C Chapter 53.

The regulation applies to all operators of public transportation that are a recipient or sub-recipient of FTA Urbanized Area Formula Grant Program funds under 49 U.S.C. Section 5307, or that operate a rail transit system that is subject to FTA's State Safety Oversight Program. The PTASP regulations do not apply to certain modes of transit service that are subject to the safety jurisdiction of another federal agency, including passenger ferry operations regulated by the United States Coast Guard, and commuter rail operations that are regulated by the Federal Railroad Administration.

The provider's PTASP must include targets for the performance measures established by FTA in the National Public Transportation Safety Plan, which was published on January 26, 2017.

The transit safety performance measures are:

Total number of reportable fatalities and rate per total vehicle revenue miles by mode.

Total number of reportable injuries and rate per total vehicle revenue miles by mode.

Total number of reportable safety events and rate per total vehicle revenue miles by mode.

System reliability: mean distance between major mechanical failures by mode.

In Florida, each Section 5307 or 5311 public transportation provider must develop a System Safety Program Plan (SSPP) under Chapter 14-90, Florida Administrative Code. FDOT technical guidance recommends that Florida's transit agencies revise their existing SSPPs to be compliant with the FTA PTASP requirements.

Each provider of public transportation that is subject to the PTASP regulation must certify that its SSPP meets the requirement for a PTASP, including transit safety targets for the federally required measures. Providers were required to certify their initial PTASP and transit safety targets by July 20, 2021. Once the public transportation provider establishes safety targets it must make the targets available to MPOs to aid in the planning process. MPOs are not required to establish transit safety targets annually each time the transit provider establishes targets. Instead, MPO targets must be established when the MPO updates the MTP (although it is recommended that MPOs reflect the current transit provider targets in their TIPs). When establishing transit safety targets, the MPO can either agree to program projects that will support the transit provider targets or establish its own separate regional transit safety targets for the MPO planning area. In addition, the Broward MPO must reflect those targets in MTP and TIP updates.

Transit Agency Safety Targets

The following transit provider(s) operate in the Broward MPO planning area: BCT and SFRTA. Of these, BCT is subject to the PTASP requirements and is responsible for developing a PTASP and establishing transit safety performance targets annually. BCT established the transit safety targets identified in Table 8-13 on October 8, 2022, for FY 23. Table 8-14 shows the safety performance in FY 22.

Safety data for BCT, as shown in Table 8-14, indicates that in 2023 BCT met the target set for the number and rate of fatalities on its community bus service but not on its fixed route and paratransit services. All other safety and reliability targets were met.

On November 2, 2023, the Broward MPO agreed to support Broward County Transit's transit safety targets, thus agreeing to plan and program projects in the TIP that once implemented, are anticipated to make progress toward achieving the targets.

Transit Safety Performance

The Broward MPO recognizes the importance of linking goals, objectives, and investment priorities to stated performance objectives, and that establishing this link is critical to the achievement of national transportation goals and statewide and regional performance targets. As such, the MTP directly reflects the goals, objectives, performance measures, and targets as they are described in other public transportation plans and processes, including the PTASP prepared by Broward County, and the current Broward MPO Route to 2050 MTP. FTA funding, as programmed by the region's transit providers and FDOT, is used for programs and products to improve the safety of the region's transit systems.

Regional Performance Measures

Regional performance measures developed for the Route to 2050 MTP were used to compare today's conditions with the 2050 Needs and Cost Feasible plans. The regional performance measures tie back to the three core Route to 2050 MTP goals. In addition to a summary of regional performance measures for consideration in Route to 2050 MTP, performance targets are shown that reflect challenging, yet achievable performance targets for the Broward region. The performance targets are shown as a way of assessing the level of consistency between 2050 MTP outcomes and the regional transportation vision and goals. The regional performance measures are desired outcomes that reflect the community vision and are complementary to the federally-required performance measures. Tables 8-15, 8-16 and 8-17 summarize the regional performance measures and targets for each of the Route to 2050 MTP goals.

Spoiler alert: Fatalities are rising, but injuries are dropping a bit. So we're on it with our Broward Safety Action Plan, helmet-fitting events, and those ever-popular Roads for Families projects.

Now, the pavement and bridge situation? It's kind of like your favorite reality show, but for roads. We check for cracks and bumps on the highways and bridges to make sure they're not falling apart. Fun fact: Broward's interstate roads are holding up like champs, but non-interstate roads need some TLC to hit state targets. Bridges are aging, though, which, isn't great. But don't worry, the MPO has a plan to prioritize fund, and improve the infrastructure. It's all part of our 2050 game plan, which has big goals like making travel less stressful, prioritize transit and keeping those freight trucks rolling smoothly.

Advancing the Path to 2100

Next Steps

Route To 2050 will guide the Broward MPO as it delivers its commitment to the residents and communities of the Broward region to ensure that the MPO continues to safely move people and goods, create jobs, and foster vibrant communities. Keys to meeting this commitment are implementing projects, advancing the Path to 2100, and confirming the Broward MPO's commitment in the coming years.

Project Implementation

The success of Route to 2050 will be measured by moving identified transportation projects to implementation. From 2025 to 2029, \$4.8 billion is programmed for specific projects in the MPO's Transportation Improvement Program. From 2030 to 2050, the MTP invests \$9.2 billion in funding for transportation projects throughout the Broward region:

Technology Program: \$169 million will be for implementing the MPO's three-tiered approach to technology improvements, addressing how the future will be powered, data-driven, and offer enhanced decision-making.



Roads for Families Program: \$535 million will be invested in bicycle, pedestrian, and traffic calming projects.



Safety Program: \$151 million will be for implementing safety improvements identified in the Broward Safety Action Plan on State roads (\$33.5 million) and non-State roads (\$85.2 million).



Highways & Freight Program: \$6.9 billion will be for roadway and freight improvements on State roads and non-State roads.



Economic Development Program: \$1.4 billion will be for transit projects, including first and last mile connectivity for the County's PREMO corridors.

Infrastructure Hardening Program: \$44 million will be for analyzing corridors and implementing mitigation measures to ensure these facilities are adapted to anticipated changes in extreme weather conditions.

Another Step on the Path to 2100

The Route to 2050 MTP advances the vision of Vision 2100 while progressing the goals of the MPO Board and providing clear direction on how to invest in the future based on the priorities of the MPO Board. This direction includes project priorities for the six funding programs and a structure to advance these projects into the MPO's annual List of Priority Projects and the Five-Year Transportation Improvement Program.

Several critical areas were identified during the development of the Route to 2050 MTP that require additional effort beyond the adoption of this plan. Through the development of Route Markers and initial efforts, the MPO will continue to address the following:

Advancing the Path to 2100





Housing

An initial effort to develop a Housing Coordination Plan began with Route To 2050 and has established the foundations for the MPO to continue collaborating with its partners to complete the Plan before the next MTP update. Additionally, through the implementation of its Economic Development program in collaboration with the county's PREMO Plan, the MPO will work to ensure important first/last mile connections are established to the enhanced transit network.

Technology

A cornerstone of the MPO's technological strategy is the SMART METRO platform. With this innovative tool, the MPO will continue to explore the possibilities of Al and geospatial analysis to create a real time virtual simulation of the region's transportation system. The platforms goal is to have planners simulate travel behavior, analyze various scenarios, and make data-driven decisions to improve regional mobility.



Infrastructure Hardening

Additional efforts to adapt to environmental impacts will be further explored as part of the MPO's Risk-Based Susceptibility Assessment which will analyze current and future hazards to the transportation network. Using the FHWA framework, this assessment will evaluate hazard exposure, likelihood, and potential impacts to prioritize risks and safeguard critical infrastructure. A data-driven tool will be developed to rank Infrastructure Hardening Improvement Plan (IHIP) projects, which will outline strategies for enhancing infrastructure hardening. The IHIP will be publicly accessible, guiding transportation agencies and integrating prioritized projects into the MPO's MTP.



Summary

This resolution seeks to extend the contract for Construction Manager services. The services expired on September 30, 2025, necessitating an extension to ensure uninterrupted Engineering and Construction Engineering and Inspection (CEI) services for the ongoing canal bank stabilization projects.

Staff Recommendation

Background:

In accordance with Resolution 2025-017, Amendment No. 1 to Agreement No. 22-3410-01R for construction manager services will expire on September 30, 2025, necessitating an extension to ensure uninterrupted Engineering and Construction Engineering and Inspection (CEI) services for the ongoing canal bank stabilization projects. Pursuant to Resolution 2022-017, the City Commission approved temporary ARPA-funded positions, including a Construction Manager role awarded to Mr. Bhuiyan Md. Munir. His current agreement, Amendment No. 1 (authorized by Resolution 2025-017), provides a monthly compensation of \$6,360.00 and is set to expire on September 30, 2025.

Staff proposes Amendment No. 2 to extend the term for these services through December 31, 2026. The proposed amendment includes a 5% increase, setting the new monthly compensation at \$6,678.00, which is an increase of \$318.00 per month.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto, in consideration of the mutual covenants, agreements, terms, and conditions contained herein, do agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 - SERVICES

The CONTRACTOR'S responsibility under this Contract is to provide Professional Surveying and Geotechnical Services for the Citywide Drainage Improvement services specifically set in the Scope of Work detailed in **Exhibit "A"** attached hereto and made part hereof.

The CITY's Representative/Liaison during the performance of this Contract shall be Maqsood Nasir, telephone (954) 535-2712 or mmnasir@lauderdalelakes.org.

ARTICLE 2 - TERM

The term of this agreement is through the completion of the project. There are no authorized extensions to perform other services not associated with this project.

ARTICLE 3 - PAYMENTS TO CONTRACTOR

The total amount to be paid by the CITY under this Contract for all services and materials shall be priced using the pricing structure according to **Exhibit "C"**, **Schedule of Professional Fees (CTA Proposal NO 2025-H07.355(REVISED)**. Such payment shall be made within thirty (30) days from the last day of each respective month in which CONTRACTOR has performed the Services and issued an invoice to the CITY's Accounts Payable Department.

CONTRACTOR, as appropriate, shall invoice the CITY for the work performed under this Contract. Invoices received from the CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Contract shall be reviewed and approved by the CITY's Representative. If there is no objection to the invoice, the CITY shall pay the full invoice amount within thirty (30) days of the CITY's receipt of the invoice. If there is a dispute as to the invoiced amount, the CITY shall notify the CONTRACTOR of the dispute within fifteen (15) days of the CITY's receipt of the invoice. The CITY shall pay the CONTRACTOR the undisputed invoiced amount within thirty (30) days of its receipt of the invoice. The disputed amount of the invoice shall not be paid by the CITY until a resolution has been reached between the CITY and the CONTRACTOR as to the disputed portions of the invoice.

<u>Final Invoice</u>: In order for both parties herein to close their books and records, the CONTRACTOR will clearly state "<u>final invoice</u>" on the CONTRACTOR'S final/last billing to the CITY on an annual basis. The final invoice certifies that all services have been properly performed and all charges and costs have been invoiced to the CITY. Since this account will thereupon be closed, and any other further charges if not properly included on this invoice are waived by the CONTRACTOR.

Approval by the CITY shall not constitute nor be deemed a release of the responsibility and liability of the CONTRACTOR, his employees, sub-contractors, agents and Contractors for the accuracy and competency of their designs, working drawings, and specifications or other documents and works; nor shall such approval be deemed to be an assumption of such responsibility by the CITY for a defect or omission in designs, working drawings, and specifications or other documents prepared by the CONTRACTOR, his employees, sub-contractors, agents and Contractors.

<u>Appropriations</u>: Payment under this Contract is subject to annual appropriations of the governing body. The CITY will immediately notify the CONTRACTOR to stop work if funds are not appropriated and will pay CONTRACTOR for all work performed up to the time of the stop work notice.

ARTICLE 4 - TRUTH-IN-NEGOTIATION CERTIFICATE

Signature of this Contract by the CONTRACTOR shall also act as the execution of a truth-in-negotiation certificate certifying that the wage rates, overhead charges, and other costs used to determine the compensation provided for in this Contract are accurate, complete and current as of the date of the Contract and no higher than those charged the CONTRACTOR'S most favored customer for the same or substantially similar service.

Said rates and cost shall be adjusted to exclude any significant sums should the CITY determine that the rates and costs were increased due to inaccurate, incomplete or non-current wage rates. The CITY shall exercise its rights under this Article 4 within one (1) year following the rendering of the final invoice. Said date shall be extended if the Contract is renewed.

ARTICLE 5 - TERMINATION

This Contract may be cancelled by the CONTRACTOR upon ninety (90) days prior written notice to the CITY's representative in the event of substantial failure by the CITY to perform in accordance with this Contract through no fault of the CONTRACTOR. The Contract may also be terminated, in whole or in part, by the CITY, with or without cause, immediately upon written Termination Notice to the CONTRACTOR. Unless the CONTRACTOR is in breach of this Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall be paid for services rendered to the CITY's satisfaction through the date of termination. In the event the CITY elects to terminate this Contract without cause, however, the CITY shall pay the CONTRACTOR a termination fee of One Hundred Dollars (\$100). After receipt of a Termination Notice and except as otherwise directed by the CITY, the CONTRACTOR shall:

- A. Stop work on the date to the extent specified.
- B. Terminate and settle all orders and subcontracts relating to the performance of the terminated work.
- C. Transfer all work in process, completed work and other materials related to the terminated work to the CITY.
- D. Continue and complete all parts of the work that have not been terminated.

<u>Termination for Convenience:</u> The CITY, by written notice, may terminate this Contract, in whole or in part, when it is in the CITY's best interest. If this Contract is terminated, the CITY shall be liable only for the goods and services delivered and accepted. The CITY may provide the CONTRACTOR thirty (30) days prior notice before said termination becomes effective. However, at the CITY's prerogative, a termination for convenience may be effective immediately and may apply to release orders (if applicable) or to the Contract in whole.

ARTICLE 6 - PERSONNEL

The CONTRACTOR represents that it has or will secure at its own expense all necessary personnel required to perform this Contract. Such personnel shall not be employees of or have any contractual relationship with the CITY.

All of the services required hereunder shall be performed by the CONTRACTOR or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in performing the services shall be fully qualified and, if required, authorized or permitted under State and local laws to perform such services.

Any changes or substitutions in the CONTRACTOR's key personnel, as may be listed in **Exhibit "B"**, must be made known to the CITY's Representative and written approval must be granted by the CITY's Representative before said change or substitution can become effective.

The CONTRACTOR warrants that all services shall be performed by skilled and competent personnel.

ARTICLE 7 - SUBCONTRACTING

The CITY reserves the right to accept the use of a subContractor or to reject the selection of a particular subContractor and to inspect all facilities of any subContractors in order to make a determination as to the capability of the subContractor to perform properly under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR is encouraged to seek local vendors for participation in subcontracting opportunities. If the CONTRACTOR uses any subContractors on this project the following provisions of this Article shall apply:

If a subContractor fails to perform or make progress, as required by this Contract, and it is necessary to replace the subContractor to complete the work in a timely fashion, the CONTRACTOR shall promptly do so, subject to acceptance of the new subContractor by the CITY. The substitution of a subContractor shall not be adequate cause to excuse a delay in the performance any portion of this Contract as set forth in the Scope of Work.

The CONTRACTOR, its subContractors, agents, servants, or employees agree to be bound by the Terms and Conditions of this Contract and its agreement with the subContractor for work to be performed for the CITY the CONTRACTOR must incorporate the terms of this Contract.

ARTICLE 8 – INSURANCE

- A. The CONTRACTOR shall not commence work under this Contract until it has obtained all insurance required under this paragraph and such insurance has been approved by the CITY.
- B. All insurance policies shall be issued by companies authorized to do business under the laws of the State of Florida. The CONTRACTOR shall furnish Certificates of Insurance to the CITY's Representative prior to the commencement of operations. The Certificates shall clearly indicate that

the CONTRACTOR has obtained insurance of the type, amount, and classification as required for strict compliance with this paragraph and that no material change or cancellation of the insurance shall be effective without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the CITY'S Representative. Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the CONTRACTOR of its liability and obligations under this Contract.

- C. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain during the term of this Contract, standard Professional Liability Insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
- D. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, Comprehensive General Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence to protect the CONTRACTOR from claims for damages for bodily and personal injury, including wrongful death, as well as from claims of property damages which may arise from any operations under this Contract, whether such operations be by the CONTRACTOR or by anyone directly employed by or contracting with the CONTRACTOR.
- E. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage liability to protect the CONTRACTOR from claims for damages for bodily and personal injury, including death, as well as from claims for property damage, which may arise from the ownership, use or maintenance of owned and non owned automobiles, including rented automobiles whether such operations be by the CONTRACTOR or by anyone directly or indirectly employed by the CONTRACTOR.
- F. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, adequate Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employer's Liability Insurance in at least such amounts as are required by law for all of its employees per Florida Statute 440.02.
- G. It shall be the responsibility of the CONTRACTOR to insure that all subContractors comply with the same insurance requirements referenced above.
- H. Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the CONTRACTOR of its liability and obligation under this section or under any other section if this Section or under any other section of the Contract.
- I. CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for assuring that the insurance certificate required in conjunction with this Section remain in force for the duration of the period of performance for any contractual agreement(s) resulting from this solicitation. If insurance certificates are scheduled to expire during the term hereof, the CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for submitting new or renewed insurance certificates to the CITY at a minimum of thirty (30) calendar days in advance of such expiration. In the event that expired certificates are not replaced with new or renewed certificates which cover the term hereof, the CITY shall suspend the Contract until such time as the new or renewed certificates are received by the CITY in a manner prescribed in this Section; provided however, that this suspension period does not exceed thirty (30) days, the CITY may at its sole discretion, terminate the Contract and seek re-purchasing charges from the CONTRACTOR.
- J. In the judgment of the CITY, prevailing conditions warrant the provision by CONTRACTOR of additional liability insurance coverage or coverage which is different in kind, the CITY reserves the right to require the provision by CONTRACTOR of an amount of coverage different from the amounts or kind previously required and shall afford written notice of such change in requirements thirty (30) days prior to the date on which the requirements shall take effect. Should the CONTRACTOR fail or refuse to satisfy the requirement of changed coverage within thirty (30) days following the CITY's written notice, the CITY, at it's sole option, may terminate the Contract upon written notice to the CONTRACTOR, said termination taking effect on the date that the required change in policy coverage would otherwise take effect.
- K. All insurance, other than Professional Liability and Workers' Compensation, to be maintained by the CONTRACTOR shall specifically include the CITY of Lauderdale Lakes as "Additional Insured" and

shall unequivocally provide thirty (30) days written notice to the CITY prior to any adverse changes, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage thereunder.

ARTICLE 9 - INDEMNIFICATION

The CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY and its officers and employees, from liabilities, damages, losses, and costs, including but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees, to the extent caused by the negligence, recklessness, or intentionally wrongful conduct of the CONTRACTOR, and other persons employed or utilized by CONTRACTOR in the performance of this Contract.

The parties agree that 1% of the total compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR for performance of this Contract shall represent the specific consideration for the CONTRACTOR's indemnification of the Owner. It is the specific intent of the parties hereto that the foregoing indemnification complies with applicable Florida Statutes.

The CONTRACTOR, without exemption, shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, its employees, representatives and elected officials from liability of any nature or kind, including cost and expenses for or on account of any copyrighted, patented, or unpatented invention, process, or item manufactured by the CONTRACTOR. Further, if such a claim is made, or is pending, the CONTRACTOR may, at its option and expense, procure for the CITY the right to use, replace, or modify the item to render it non-infringing. If none of the alternatives are reasonably available, the CITY agrees to return the article on request to the CONTRACTOR and receive reimbursement. If the CONTRACTOR used any design, device or materials covered by letters, patent or copyright, it is mutually agreed and understood, without exception, that the Contract prices shall include all royalties or cost arising from the use of such design, device or materials in any way involved in the work.

It is further the specific intent of the parties that all of the Contract Documents on this Project are hereby amended to include the foregoing indemnification and the "Specific Consideration" thereof.

ARTICLE 10 - SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

The CITY and the CONTRACTOR each binds itself and its partners, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns to the other party of this Contract to the partners, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of such other party, in respect to all covenants of this Contract. Except as above noted, neither the CITY nor the CONTRACTOR shall assign, sublet, convey or transfer its interest in this Contract. Nothing herein shall be construed as creating any rights or benefits hereunder to anyone other than the CITY and the CONTRACTOR.

ARTICLE 11 - REMEDIES

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida. The venue of all actions in State or Federal Court relating to this Contract will be held in Broward County, Florida. No remedy herein conferred upon any party is intended to be exclusive of any other remedy, and each and every such remedy shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to every other remedy given hereunder now or hereafter existing at law or in equity. No single or partial exercise by any part of any right, power, or remedy hereunder shall preclude any other or further exercise thereof.

ARTICLE 12 - CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The CONTRACTOR represents that it presently has no interest and shall acquire no interest, either direct or indirect, in the CITY, which would conflict in any manner with the performance or services required hereunder, as provided for in Florida Statutes 112.311. The CONTRACTOR further represents that no person having such interest shall be employed in the performance hereof.

The CONTRACTOR shall promptly notify the CITY's Representative, in writing, by certified mail, of all potential conflicts of interest for any prospective business association, interest or other circumstance which may influence or appear to influence the CONTRACTOR'S judgment or quality of services being provided hereunder. Such written notification shall identify the prospective business association, interest

or circumstance, the nature of work that the CONTRACTOR undertakes and request an opinion of the CITY, whether or not such association, interest or circumstances will in the CITY's opinion constitute a conflict of interest if entered into by the CONTRACTOR. The CITY agrees to notify the CONTRACTOR of its opinion by certified mail within 30 days of receipt of notification by the CONTRACTOR. If, in the opinion of the CITY, the prospective business association, interest or circumstances would not constitute a conflict of interest by the CONTRACTOR, the CITY shall so state in the notification and the CONTRACTOR may enter into said association, interest or circumstance and it shall be deemed not in conflict of interest with respect to services provided to the CITY by the CONTRACTOR under the terms of this Contract.

ARTICLE 13 - EXCUSABLE DELAYS

The CONTRACTOR shall not be considered in default by reason of any failure in performance if such failure arises as a result of a "Force Majeure." Force Majeure shall mean any delay occasioned by superior or irresistible force occasioned by violence in nature without the interference of human agency such as hurricanes, tornados, flood and total loss caused by fire and other similar unavoidable casualties, changes in federal, state or local laws, ordinances, codes or regulations, enacted after the date of this Agreement and having a substantial impact on the project, or other causes beyond the CONTRACTOR's control or by any other such causes which the CONTRACTOR and the CITY Commission decide in writing justify the delay. Provided, however, that market conditions, labor conditions, construction industry price trends and similar matters which normally impact on the bidding process shall not be considered a Force Majeure.

ARTICLE 14 - PLEDGE OF CREDIT, ARREARS

The CONTRACTOR shall not pledge the CITY's credit or make it a guarantor of payment of surety for any contract, debt, obligation, judgment, lien, or any form of indebtedness.

The CONTRACTOR further warrants and represents that it has no obligation or indebtedness that would impair its ability to fulfill the terms of this Contract.

ARTICLE 15 - DISCLOSURE AND OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

The CONTRACTOR shall deliver to the CITY for approval and acceptance, and before being eligible for final payment of any amounts due, all documents and materials, in both hard copy and electronic mail, prepared by and for the CITY under this Contract.

All written and oral information not in the public domain or not previously known, and all information and data obtained, developed, or supplied by the CITY or at its expense will be kept confidential by the CONTRACTOR and will not be disclosed to any other party directly or indirectly, without the CITY's prior written consent, unless required by a lawful order. All drawings, maps, sketches, programs, database, reports and other data developed or purchased under this Contract for or at the CITY's expense shall be and remain the CITY's property and may be reproduced and reused at the discretion of the CITY.

The CITY and the CONTRACTOR shall comply with provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes (Public Records Law).

All covenants, contracts, representations and warranties made herein, or otherwise made in writing by any party hereto including, but not limited to, representations herein related to the disclosure or ownership of documents, shall survive this Contract and the consummation of the transactions contemplated hereby.

ARTICLE 16 - INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR RELATIONSHIP

The CONTRACTOR and all employees and/or agents of the CONTRACTOR are, and shall be, in the performance of all work services and activities under this Contract, an independent contractor, and not an employee, agent, or servant of the CITY. All persons engaged in any of the work or services performed pursuant to this Contract shall at all times and in all places be subject to the CONTRACTOR'S sole direction, supervision, and control. The CONTRACTOR shall exercise control over the means and

manner in which it and its employees perform the work and in all respects the CONTRACTOR'S relationship and the relationship of its employees to the CITY shall be that of an independent Contractor and not as employees or agents of the CITY.

The CONTRACTOR does not have the power or authority to bind the CITY in any promise, agreement or representation other than specifically provided for in this Agreement. The CONTRACTOR shall be responsible to the CITY for all work or services performed by the Contractor or any person or entity on the CONTRACTOR's behalf, in fulfillment of this Contract.

ARTICLE 17 - CONTINGENT FEES

The CONTRACTOR warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONTRACTOR to solicit or secure this Contract and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual, or firm, other than it's bona fide employee working solely for the CONTRACTOR, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon resulting from the Award or making of this Contract.

ARTICLE 18 - ACCESS AND AUDITS

The CONTRACTOR shall maintain adequate records to justify all charges, expenses, and costs incurred in estimating and performing the work for at least three (3) years after completion of this Contract. The CITY shall have access to such books, records, and documents as required in this section for the purpose of inspection or audit during normal business hours, at the CONTRACTOR'S place of business.

ARTICLE 19 - NONDISCRIMINATION

The CONTRACTOR warrants and represents that all of its employees are treated equally during employment without regard to race, color, religion, disability, sex, age, national origin, ancestry, marital status, or sexual orientation.

ARTICLE 20 - ENFORCEMENT COSTS

If any legal action or other proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Contract, or because of an alleged dispute, breach, default or misrepresentation in connection with any provisions of this Contract, the successful or prevailing party or parties shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees, expenses and court costs, including appellate fees incurred in that action or proceeding, in addition to any other relief to which such party or parties may be entitled.

ARTICLE 21 - AUTHORITY TO PRACTICE

The CONTRACTOR hereby represents and warrants that it has and will continue to maintain all licenses and approvals required to conduct its business, and that it will at all times conduct its business activities in a reputable manner. Proof of such licenses and approvals shall be submitted to the CITY's Representative on an annual basis.

ARTICLE 22 - SEVERABILITY

If any term or provision of this Contract, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Contract, or the application of such terms or provisions to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected, and every other term provision of this Contract shall be deemed valid and enforceable to the extent permitted by law.

ARTICLE 23 - ENTIRETY OF CONTRACTUAL CONTRACT

The CITY and the CONTRACTOR agree that this Contract sets forth the entire Contract between the parties, and that there are no promises or understandings other than those stated herein. None of the provisions, terms and conditions contained in this Contract may be added to, modified, superseded or

otherwise altered, except by written instrument executed by the parties hereto in accordance with Article 24 - Modifications of Work.

ARTICLE 24 - MODIFICATIONS OF WORK

The CITY reserves the right to make changes in Scope of Work, including alterations, reductions therein or additions thereto. Upon receipt by the CONTRACTOR of the CITY's notification of a contemplated change, the CONTRACTOR shall, **in writing**:

- (1) Provide a detailed estimate for the increase or decrease in cost due to the contemplated change,
- (2) Notify the CITY of any estimated change in the completion date, and
- (3) Advise the CITY if the contemplated change shall affect the CONTRACTOR'S ability to meet the completion dates or schedules of this Contract.

If the CITY so instructs in writing, the CONTRACTOR shall suspend work on that portion of the Scope of Work affected by a contemplated change, pending the CITY's decision to proceed with the change.

If the CITY elects to make the change, the CITY shall initiate a contract amendment and the CONTRACTOR shall not commence work on any such change until such written amendment is signed by the authorized representative for the CITY.

Such changes, if any, shall be set forth in writing, which may be transmitted, at the CITY'S discretion, digitally.

ARTICLE 25 - NOTICE

All notices required in this Contract shall be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and if sent to the CITY shall be mailed to:

SECTION 1 – DEFINITIONS

Whenever the following terms appear in the Proposal, the intent and meaning shall be interpreted as follows:

- **1.1.** Addendum(s): Any additions, deletions, or revisions to the Solicitation.
- **1.2. Amendment:** Document signed by the Consultant and the CITY that authorizes an adjustment in the Work, Contract Price, or Contract Time.
- **1.3. Best and Final Proposal(s):** The final quote submitted after negotiations are completed containing the PROPOSER's most favorable terms for price, Services, and products to be delivered.
- 1.4. CBE Firm or SBE Firm: A County Business Enterprise ("CBE") or Small Business Enterprise ("SBE") as defined by Section 1-81.1(c) of the Code of Ordinances of Broward County, Florida, that has a Broward County Business Tax Receipt, is located and doing business in Broward County, and is certified as such by the Broward County Office of Economic Development and Small Business Development.

SECTION 2 - SCOPE OF SERVICES

I. <u>Background:</u>

The City of Lauderdale Lakes is located near the geographic center of Broward County, immediately east of the Florida Turnpike. State Road 7 (U.S. 441) and Oakland Park Boulevard are the major arterial roadways traversing the CITY. Lauderdale Lakes is approximately 4 square miles in size. The predominant land use is residential with approximately 70% of the total housing stock in multi-family units. The CITY also contains a full range of commercial, industrial and institutional land uses, located primarily along arterial roadways.

The City of Lauderdale Lakes has a diverse population and is estimated at 36,760.

The CITY is governed by a Commission/City Manager form of government. Mayor and Commissioners are elected officials and serve for a four year term. The CITY employs a skilled and diverse workforce of approximately 144 full-time and part-time employees across nine (9) departments: Mayor and City Commission, City Manager, City Clerk, Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA), Development Services, Financial Services, Human Resources and Risk Management, Parks and Human Services, and Public Works.

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) has awarded the City of Lauderdale Lakes funding from the Resilient Florida Programs in the amount of \$3.5 million to design, permit, and improve the City's drainage system.

II. Scope of Work

Surveying. The project limit is specific to 14 areas identified on appendix "A". The limits of the survey shall be extended 10' outside of the R/W. Please see below the required scope for the Citywide Surveying Services for the City of Lauderdale Lakes Citywide Drainage Improvements Project:

1. Topographic services:

The Surveying Services Consultant shall locate above ground features within the project limits including, but not limited to: canal banks, guardrails, trees, above ground utilities, fences, trees, tree types including diameter and height, culverts, bridges, docks, sidewalk, bus stops, pavement, natural ground elevations, etc. The survey should pick the existing elevations at 25' interval for the Roadways with 10' interval at the intersections and roundabouts.

2. Existing Drainage System Survey:

The Surveying Services Consultant will locate all drainage structures including inlets, grates, manholes, pipe inverts, bottoms, pipe sizes, pipe types, and pipe connections including drainage outfalls.

3. Boundary Survey:

The Surveying Services Consultant will locate Right-of-Way Lines of the entire Roadway network in the City including Sidewalks, Driveways, Curbs & Gutters, Swale Areas and other related items.

4. Utility Survey:

The Surveying Services Consultant will provide above and below ground utilities information including manholes, pipe inverts, bottoms, pipe sizes, pipe types, and pipe connections including water meters, valves, fire hydrants, force main, underground communication lines and other related elements.

5. Roadway Survey:

The Surveying Services Consultant will locate all the street signs with type, signals, and pavement widths.

6. AutoCAD File

The Surveying Services Consultant is required to provide AutoCAD file in addition to PDF file certified by a Florida Registered Professional Surveyor.

Geotechnical Services.

- 1. The Geotechnical Services project must be managed/supervised by a registered professional (i.e., Certified Engineering Geologist or Geotechnical Engineer).
- 2. The materials testing must be staffed with registered professional (i.e., Certified Engineering Geologist or Geotechnical Engineer) and technicians experienced in Geotechnical Engineering.

Scope of Work

The Citywide Geotechnical Services is limited within the public Right-of-Way (R/W) for the City of Lauderdale Lakes Citywide Drainage Improvements Project. Project tasks shall include, but are not necessarily limited to, those items noted below. If the consultant feels that additional tasks are warranted, they must be clearly identified in the consultant's proposal.

- 1. Site Reconnaissance
- 2. Subsurface soil sampling
- 3. Boring logs
- 4. Geotechnical engineering analyses
- 5. Geotechnical observation and hydraulic Conductivity Test/Percolation Test
- 6. Field sampling/testing/observation

SECTION 3 – QUALIFICATIONS

Pursuant to Florida Statutes 287.055, Consultant Competitive Negotiations Act (CCNA), the City of Lauderdale Lakes (hereinafter referred to as the CITY) welcome project teams; however, the primary consultant must be the surveyor. Since Florida law requires the CITY to make a determination of a Consultant's qualifications prior to employment, the Qualifications Package of this Request for Qualifications will be used by the CITY to make this determination. Additionally, evaluation points will be assigned to information contained in the package to prepare a short-list of firms. Short-listed firms may be invited for oral interviews prior to final selection.

Minimum Requirements

In order for a Proposal to be considered by the CITY, Proposers shall demonstrate, in their Proposals, compliance with the following minimum requirements:

- a) Proposers must be currently certified, licensed and authorized to work in the State of Florida to perform planning, architectural and civil engineering services.

NO PROPOSER SHALL BE ENTITLED TO RELY ON ANY ANNOUNCEMENT OF AN AWARD, AND THE CITY SHALL IN NO WAY BE ESTOPPED IN THE REVOCATION OF AN AWARD PREVIOUSLY GRANTED.

SECTION 9- REJECTION CRITERIA

Your proposal shall be considered non-responsive if any of the following criteria exist (this list is not all inclusive):

- 9.1 All questions and instructions, including the questions in the Qualifications Package, have not been properly completed.
- 9.2 The instructions, order and matrixes in the Proposal Package have not been properly followed.
- 9.3 The RFQ response Package is found to have concealed or contained false and/or misleading information.
- 9.4 The CITY did not receive the Response to the RFQ Package prior to the submittal deadline electronically.
- 9.5 Your firm is not licensed with the Florida Secretary of State to do business in Florida. **You must submit a State of Florida Certificate of Status for your firm.**
- 9.6 Executed Non-Collusive/and or Drug Free Workplace Affidavits are not submitted with the response.
- 9.7 The proposal/bid bond/fidelity bond, if required, is not included in the Package.
- 9.8 The Proposal signature page and certification is not properly executed.

SECTION 10 - WAIVERS

The CITY in its sole discretion, reserves the right to reject any and all proposals, accept any proposal or any combination of proposals or waive any minor irregularity or technicality in proposals received and may, at its sole discretion, request a re-proposal, when in its sole judgment, it will best serve public interest.

SECTION 11 - INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 11.1 The PROPOSER shall not commence work under this Contract until it has obtained all Insurance required under this paragraph and such insurance has been approved by the CITY.
- 11.2 All insurance policies shall be issued by companies authorized to do business under the laws of the State of Florida. The PROPOSER shall furnish Certificates of Insurance to the CITY's representative prior to the commencement of operations. The Certificates shall clearly indicate that the PROPOSER has obtained insurance of the type, amount, and classification as required for strict compliance with this paragraph and that no material change or cancellation of the insurance shall be effective without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the CITY's representative. Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the PROPOSER of its liability and obligations under this Contract.
- 11.3 The PROPOSER shall maintain during the term of this Contract, standard Professional Liability Insurance in the minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence for Errors and Omissions.
- 11.4 The PROPOSER shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, Comprehensive General Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence to protect the PROPOSER from claims for damages for bodily and personal injury, including wrongful death, as well as from claims of property damages which may arise from any operations under this Contract, whether such operations be by the PROPOSER or by anyone directly employed by or contracting with the PROPOSER.
- 11.5 The PROPOSER shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage liability to protect the PROPOSER from claims for damages for bodily and personal injury, including death, as well as from claims for property damage, which may arise from the ownership, use or maintenance of owned and non-owned automobiles, including rented automobiles whether such operations be by the PROPOSER or by anyone directly or indirectly employed by the PROPOSER.
- 11.6 The PROPOSER shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, adequate Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employer's Liability Insurance in at least such amounts as are required by law for all of its employees per Florida Statute 440.02.

Exceptions: Workers' Compensation Insurance will not be required if the individuals performing the work are a corporation officer, sole proprietor, or partner. In such case, the firm shall provide copies of their waivers as provided by Florida Statutes 440.055.

- 11.7 All insurance, other than Professional Liability and Workers' Compensation, to be maintained by the PROPOSER shall specifically include the City of Lauderdale Lakes as "Additional Insured" and shall unequivocally provide thirty (30) days written notice to the CITY prior to any adverse changes, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage thereunder.
- 11.8 Required insurance shall support PROPOSER's indemnity set forth in the Contract and shall unequivocally provide thirty (30) days written notice to the CITY prior to any adverse change, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage there under. Said liability insurance must be acceptable to and approved by the CITY as to form and types of coverage. In the event that the statutory liability of the CITY is amended during the term of this Contract to exceed the above limits, the PROPOSER shall be required, upon thirty (30) days written notice by the CITY, to provide coverage at least equal to the amended statutory limit of liability of the CITY
- 11.9 It shall be the responsibility of the PROPOSER to insure that all SubProposers comply with the same insurance requirements referenced above.
- 11.10 Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the Successful PROPOSER of its liability and obligation under this section or under any other section if this section or under any other section of the Contract.

- 11.11 Issuance of a contract is contingent upon receipt of the insurance documents within five (5) business days after a Notification of Tentative Award is issued to the PROPOSER by an authorized official of the CITY. If the insurance certificate is received within the specific time frame, but not in the manner prescribed in this Section, the Successful PROPOSER shall be verbally notified of such deficiency and shall have an additional five (5) calendar days to submit a corrected certificate to the CITY. If the Successful Proposer fails to submit the required insurance documents in the manner prescribed in this Agreement within five (5) business days after the Notification Of Tentative Award the Successful PROPOSER shall be in default of the terms and conditions and the any proposed Contract shall deemed terminated immediately. Under these circumstances, the Successful PROPOSER may be prohibited from submitting future Proposals to the CITY for a period of twelve (12) months.
- 11.12 Successful PROPOSER shall be responsible for assuring that the insurance certificate required in conjunction with this Section remain in force for the duration of the period of performance for any contractual agreement(s) resulting from this solicitation. If insurance certificates are scheduled to expire during the term hereof, the Successful PROPOSER shall be responsible for submitting new or renewed insurance certificates to the CITY at a minimum of thirty (30) calendar days in advance of such expiration. In the event that expired certificates are not replaced with new or renewed certificates which cover the term hereof, the CITY shall suspend the Contract until such time as the new or renewed certificates are received by the CITY in a manner prescribed in this Section; provided however, that this suspension period does not exceed thirty (30) days, the CITY may at its sole discretion, terminate the Contract and seek re-Purchasing charges from the Successful PROPOSER.
- 11.13 In the judgment of the CITY, prevailing conditions warrant the provision by Successful PROPOSER of additional liability insurance coverage or coverage which is different in kind, the CITY reserves the right to require the provision by Successful PROPOSER of an amount of coverage different from the amounts or kind previously required and shall afford written notice of such change in requirements thirty (30) days prior to the date on which the requirements shall take effect. Should the Successful PROPOSER fail or refuse to satisfy the requirement of changed coverage within thirty (30) days following the CITY's written notice, the CITY, at its sole option, may terminate the Contract upon written notice to the PROPOSER, said termination taking effect on the date that the required change in policy coverage would otherwise take effect.
- 11.14 An original or certified sample copy of the signed Certificate or Certificates of Insurance, evidencing that required insurance coverage(s) has been procured by PROPOSER in the types and amount(s) required hereunder, shall be included with the Proposal response.
- 11.15 After award, except as to Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability, said Certificate(s) shall clearly state that coverage required by the Contract has been endorsed to include the City of Lauderdale Lakes, a political subdivision of the State of Florida, its officers, agents and employees as Additional Insured.

SECTION 12- GENERAL CONDITIONS

It is the sole responsibility of the PROPOSER to become thoroughly familiar with the Solicitation requirements and all terms and conditions affecting the process of this Solicitation. Leas of ignorance by the PROPOSER of conditions that exist, or that may exist, will not be accepted as a basis for varying the requirements of this Solicitation.

<u>ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS</u>: No additional terms and conditions included with the proposal response shall be evaluated or considered, have no force or effect, and are inapplicable to this proposal unless agreed to in writing by the City. It is understood and agreed that the conditions in these Proposal Documents are the only conditions applicable to this proposal and the Proposer's authorized signature on the Proposal Form attests to this.

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION: Any Contract issued is conditional upon the approval of the annual budget appropriations to implement the Contract.

<u>ASSIGNMENT</u>: Any Purchase Order or Contract issued pursuant to this solicitation and the monies which may become due hereunder are not assignable, in whole or part without prior consent and approval by the City Manager or designated representative.

AWARD OF CONTRACT. The CITY reserves the right to accept any Bid or combination of Bid alternates which, in the CITY'S judgment will best serve the CITY'S interest, reject any and all Bids, waive any and all informalities and/or irregularities, and disregard all nonconforming, nonresponsive, unbalanced or conditional Bids. Also, the CITY reserves the right to reject the Bid of any BIDDER, if the CITY believes that it would not be in the best interest of the CITY to make an award to that BIDDER, whether because the Bid is non-conforming, non-responsive, unqualified, of doubtful financial ability or fails to meet any other pertinent standard or criteria established by the CITY.

The Successful Contractor(s) shall not begin work until a Contract has been awarded by the City Commission (if required) and a notice to proceed has been issued. Contractor(s) agree and understand that the issuance of a Purchase Order and/or Task Order shall be issued and provided to the Contractor(s) following Commission award.

<u>BID FORM</u>. Bids must be submitted on the Bid Form provided by the CITY. The BIDDER will be responsible for correctly completing all blanks on the Bid Form.

Bids by partnerships must be executed in the partnership name, signed by a partner, and accompanied by evidence of authority to sign. The name of the person executing the Bid Document shall be typed or printed below the signature.

Bids by corporations must be executed in the corporate name by the president, vice-president or other corporate officer, attested by the secretary of the corporation and accompanied by evidence of authority to sign. The name of the person executing the Bid Document and state of incorporation shall be typed or printed below the signature. The Bid shall contain an acknowledgement of receipt of all Addenda.

BID SECURITY (IF APPLICABLE). Each Bid must be accompanied by a Bid security made payable to the City of Lauderdale Lakes in an amount of five percent (5%) of the BIDDER'S maximum Bid price and in the form of a certified check or cashier's check drawn upon any State or National Bank of Florida or a Bid Bond issued by a surety meeting the requirements of Paragraph 5.1 of the General Conditions. Said check or Bid Bond shall be made payable to the CITY and shall be given as a guarantee that BIDDER, upon receipt of Notice of Tentative Award of the contract, will enter into the Contract with the CITY, and furnish the necessary documents including, but not limited to: insurance certificates, Payment Bond and Performance Bond; each of the said Bonds to be in the amount stated on the Invitation to Bid.

The Bid Security of the SUCCESSFUL BIDDER will be retained until such BIDDER has executed the Construction Contract and furnished the required contract security whereupon the Bid security will be returned. If the apparent SUCCESSFUL BIDDER fails to execute and deliver the Construction Contract and furnish the required contract security within fifteen (15) calendar days after the Notice of Tentative Award, which is issued prior to CITY Commission award of Construction Contract, the CITY may annul the Notice of Tentative Award, and the Bid security of that BIDDER will be forfeited. The CITY may then accept the Bid of the next lowest responding BIDDER, or re-advertise for bids. If the Bid of the next lowest BIDDER is accepted, this acceptance shall bind such BIDDER as though it was the original SUCCESSFUL BIDDER. There shall be no binding contract until such time as the CITY accepts the Construction Contract and makes final award of the contract. The Bid Security of other BIDDERS whom CITY believes to have a reasonable chance of receiving the award may be retained by the CITY until the earlier of the seventh day after the effective date of the Construction Contract or the ninety-first day after the Bid opening, whereupon Bid security furnished by such BIDDERS will be returned. Bid security with Bids which are not competitive or responsive will be returned upon award of the Bid.

BONDING (IF APPLICABLE). Prior to commencing work, the CONTRACTOR shall execute and furnish to CITY a performance bond and a payment bond, in a form approved by the CITY and as provided by state law, each written by a corporate surety, having a resident agent in the State of Florida and having been in business with a record of successful continuous operation for at least five (5) years. The surety company shall have at least the following minimum qualification in accordance with the latest edition of A.M. Best's Insurance Guide, published by Alfred M. Best Company, Inc., Ambest Road, Oldwick, New Jersey 08858: B+ to A+.

The penal sum stated in each bond shall be the amount equal to the total amount payable under the terms of this Agreement. The performance bond shall be conditioned that the CONTRACTOR performs the contract in the time and manner prescribed in the Agreement. The payment bond shall be conditioned that the CONTRACTOR promptly makes payments to all persons who supply the CONTRACTOR with labor, materials and supplies used directly or indirectly by the CONTRACTOR in the performance of the Work provided for in this Agreement and any change orders and shall provide that the surety shall pay the amount not exceeding the sum provided in the bonds, together with interest at the maximum rate allowed by law and that the CONTRACTOR and surety shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY to the extent of any and all payments in connection with the performance of this Agreement which the CITY may be required to make by law.

Pursuant to the requirements of Section 255.05(1) (a), Florida Statutes, the CONTRACTOR shall record the payment and performance bonds in the public records of Broward County, at its own expense.

<u>CLEAN AIR ACT AND FEDERAL POLLUTION CONTROL ACT:</u> CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1387).

<u>COORDINATION.</u> The Contractor shall notify all utilities, transportation department, etc., in writing, with a copy to the Public Works Director before construction is started and shall coordinate his Work with them. The Contractor shall cooperate with the owners of any underground or overhead utility lines in their removal, construction and rearrangement operations in order that services rendered by these parties will not be unnecessarily interrupted.

The Contractor shall arrange his Work and dispose of his materials so as to not interfere with the operation of other Contractors engaged upon adjacent work and to join his Work to that of others in a proper manner and to perform his Work in the proper sequence in relation to that of other Contractors all as may be directed by the Public Works Director. Each Contractor shall be responsible for any damage done by him or his agents to the work performed by another Contractor.

The Contractor shall contact the Broward County Transportation Department and the Florida Department of Transportation, as applicable, to verify and obtain location of any and all traffic conduits, loops, and street light underground services.

CONTRACT EXTENSION: The City reserves the right to automatically extend any Contract for up to ninety (90) calendar days beyond the stated Contract term, under the same terms and conditions of said Contract. The City shall notify the Successful Proposer in writing of such extensions. Additional extensions over the first ninety (90) day extension may occur, if the City and the Successful Proposer are in mutual agreement of such extensions.

<u>COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAWS, REGULATIONS AND EXECUTIVE ORDERS:</u> Proposers are required to comply with all provisions of federal, state, county and local laws, ordinances rules and regulations that are applicable to the services being offered in the ITB. Lack of knowledge of the Proposer shall in no way be a cause for relief from responsibility.

<u>DAVIS-BACON ACT:</u> CONTRACTOR shall comply with the computation of wages for mechanics and laborers in accordance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704 and supplements of 29 C.F.R Part 5.

<u>DEBARRED OR SUSPENDED BIDDERS OR PROPOSERS:</u> The bidder or proposer certifies, by submission of a response to this solicitation, that neither it nor its principals and subcontractors are presently debarred or suspended by any Federal department or agency.

<u>DELETION/OVERSIGHT/MISSTATEMENT:</u> Any deletion, oversight or misstatement of the Specifications shall not release the Proposer from the responsibility of supplying complete and fully operational units, together with all appurtenances necessary for unrestricted operation as determined by the City in its sole discretion.

EMPLOYEES: Employees of the Contractor shall at all times be under its sole direction and not be an employee or agent of the City. The Contractor shall supply competent employees. The City may require the Contractor to remove an employee or subcontractor it deems careless, incompetent, insubordinate or otherwise objectionable without any cost to the City or without any increase in Contract Price. Contractor shall be responsible to the City for the acts and omissions of all employees working under its directions whether or not the actions taken go beyond the normal scope of employment.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY: CONTRACTOR will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. To include any revisions and/or amendments to the 41 C.F.R, 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, Equal Employment Opportunity (30 Fed. Reg. 12319, 12935, 3 C.F.R. Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal employment Opportunity, and implementing regulations at 41 C.F.R. Part 60 (Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor).

EXPENSES: Neither the CITY nor its representatives shall be liable for any expenses incurred in connection with preparation of a response to this ITB. All expenses in the preparation of this ITB are the sole responsibility of the Proposer. All Submittals should be prepared to provide a straightforward and concise description of the respondents' qualifications and ability to meet the requirements of the ITB.

INDEMNIFICATION: Proposer agrees to protect, defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City, its employees, representatives, and elected officials from any and all claims and liabilities including all attorney's fees and court costs, including appeals, for which the City, its employees, representatives, and elected officials can or may be held liable as a result of injury (including death) to persons or damage to property occurring by reason of any negligence, recklessness, or intentional wrongful misconduct of the Proposer, its employees, or agents, arising out of or connected with this Contract. The Proposer shall not be required to indemnify the City or its agents, employees, representatives, or elected officials when an occurrence results solely from the wrongful acts or omissions of the City, or its agents, employees or representatives.

The parties agree that one per cent (1%) of the total compensation paid to the Proposer for performance of this Contract shall represent the specific consideration for the Proposer's indemnification of the Owner.

It is the specific intent of the parties hereto that the foregoing indemnification complies with F.S. 725.06 (Chapter 725). It is further the specific intent and agreement of the parties that all of the Contract Documents on this Project are hereby amended to include the foregoing indemnification and the "Specific Consideration" therefore.

INTERPRETATIONS: All Proposers shall carefully examine the Proposal Documents. Any ambiguities or inconsistencies shall be brought to the attention of the City in writing prior to the opening of Proposals; failure to do so on the part of the Proposer will constitute an acceptance by the Proposer of any subsequent decision by the City. Any questions concerning the intent, meaning and interpretations of the Proposal Documents shall be requested in writing, and received by the City at least fourteen (14) days prior to the Proposal Opening. Inquiries shall be addressed to the Purchasing Agent. No person is authorized to give oral interpretations of, or make oral changes to the Proposal. Therefore, oral statements given before the proposal opening will not be binding. Any interpretation of, or changes to the proposal will be made in the form of a written Addendum to the proposal and will be furnished to all Proposers. Receipt of all addenda

shall be acknowledged by the Proposers in the appropriate place on the Proposal Form.

<u>LOCAL PREFERENCE.</u> Any qualified local business shall receive bidding preferences pursuant to Section 82-356 (I) of the CITY's Code of Ordinances, which states:

"If a qualified local business submits a response to either an inquiry made pursuant to informal competitive conditions or a formal solicitation as required in Section 82-356 of the code, and the original Bid of the qualified local business is within ten percent (10%) of the low Bid, then the CITY shall give the qualified local business the opportunity to meet the price of the low Bid. The order of preference by which the qualified local business shall be given the opportunity to match the low Bid shall be from the lowest to the highest Bid, as long as the initial Bid was within ten percent (10%) of the low Bid." NOT APPLICABLE FOR THIS SOLICITATION

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS To be eligible for award of a contract in response to this solicitation, the Bidder must demonstrate that they have successfully completed services, as specified in the Technical Specifications / Scope of Services section of this solicitation, are normally and routinely engaged in performing such services for a minimum of three (3) years, and are properly and legally licensed to perform such work. In addition, the Bidder must have no conflict of interest with regard to any other work performed by the Bidder for the City of Lauderdale Lakes. Master Electrician is preferred.

MODIFICATION OF AN OFFER: Any modification of an Offer by the Proposer shall be submitted to the Department of Financial Services prior to the Solicitation Closing Date & Time. The Proposer shall submit the new Offer and a letter, on company letterhead, signed by an authorized agent of the Proposer stating that the new submittal supersedes the previously submitted Offer. The proposer must present certification to assure that they are indeed an authorized representative of the Proposer's firm at the time such communication to modify the Proposal is presented. A City representative will verify this information prior to acceptance of the modified proposal. The sealed envelope shall contain the same information as required for submitting the original Offer. In addition the envelope shall be marked with a statement that this Offer replaces the previously submitted Offer. No modifications of an Offer shall be accepted after the Solicitation Closing Date & Time.

NO EXCLUSIVE CONTRACT .Proposer agrees and understands that the contract shall not be construed as an exclusive arrangement and further agrees that the City may, at any time, secure similar or identical services from another vendor at the City's sole option.

<u>MON-COLLUSION:</u> Every BIDDER shall provide an affidavit on the form provided indicating that it has not divulged, discussed or compared its Bid with other BIDDERS and has not colluded with any other BIDDER or parties to a Bid whatsoever. (Note: Premiums, rebates or gratuities are not permitted with, prior to, or after any delivery of material.) Any such violation will result in the cancellation and/or return of materials (as applicable) as being non-conforming and removal from the CITY'S Bid list(s).

<u>PAYMENTS/INVOICES.</u> Payment terms will be considered to be net 30 days after the date of satisfactory delivery at the place of acceptance and receipt of correct invoice at the office specified, whichever occurs last, in accordance with the Florida Local Government Prompt Payment Act. Bidder may offer cash discounts for prompt payment but they will not be considered in determination of award.

<u>PAYMENT METHOD:</u> The City requires all vendors to receive payment by electronic funds transfer (EFT). This allows you as a vendor of the City of Lauderdale Lakes to receive your payment fast and safely. Accordingly, firms must presently have the ability to accept electronic funds transfer payments or take whatever steps necessary to implement acceptance before the commencement of a contract. EFT application is provided in the Vendor Registration Application.

The City is further transitioning to vendor payments using the Purchasing Card (P-Card) Program utilizing the MASTERCARD and VISA networks. Purchases from this contract will be eventually made utilizing the City's Purchasing Card. Contractors will receive payment from the purchasing card in the same manner as other credit card purchases. Once fully implemented, the City will provide a deadline or window in which

Contractors must have the ability to accept credit card payments. Note that any costs associated with the participation in this payment program shall be borne by the Contractor. The City reserves the right to revise this program as necessary.

<u>PAYMENT SCHEDULE:</u> Payments will be based on a schedule of payment to be developed upon award of this Contract. In addition, the City reserves the right to inspect records supporting the firm's billings.

<u>PERMITS, TAXES, LICENSES.</u> The successful Contractor shall, at their own expense, obtain all necessary permits, pay all licenses, fees and taxes, required to comply with all local ordinances, state and federal laws, rules and regulations applicable to business to be carried out under this contract.

PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS: CONTRACTOR must comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, Pub. L. No. 89-272 (1965) (codified as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act at 42 U.S.C. § 6962). During the performance of this contract, the Contractor shall make maximum use of products containing recovered materials that are EPA - designated items unless the product cannot be acquired

PROPOSALS TO REMAIN OPEN: All proposals shall remain open for the number of days after the day of the proposal opening stated in the special provisions, or if no such number of days is stated, all proposals shall remain open for ninety (90) days after the date of proposal opening prior to award. The City may, in its sole discretion, release any proposal prior to that date.

<u>PROTESTS.</u> Any actual or prospective bidder, offeror, or contractor who is aggrieved in connection with the solicitation or award of a contract may protest to the Director of Financial Services or designee. The protest shall be submitted in writing within five business days after such aggrieved person knows or should have known of the facts giving rise thereto. Service of a protest by mail or courier shall not expand the time frame period allowed for delivery of a protest. Upon the filing of a formal written protest the contractor or vendor shall post a bond, payable to the City of Lauderdale Lakes, in an amount equal to five percent of the total bid or estimated contract amount, or \$5,000.00, whichever is less. The bond shall be conditioned upon the payment of all costs which may be adjudged against the protesting contractor or vendor in the event the protest is resolved adversely to the protester. Please refer to the City's Procurement Code, Article XIII, Lauderdale Lakes Procurement Code, Sec 82-364.

PUBLIC ENTITY CRIMES: Pursuant to F.S. 287.133. as amended: a person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a proposal on a Contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a proposal on a Contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit proposals on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a Contractor, supplier, Subcontractor, or consultant under a Contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in s. 287.017 for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.

RESPONSIBILITY In order to be considered as a responsible Contractor, Contractor shall be fully capable to meet all of the requirements of the solicitation and subsequent contract, must possess the full capability, including financial and technical, to perform as contractually required, and must be able to fully document the ability to provide good faith performance.

RESPONSIVENESS. In order to be considered responsive to the solicitation, the Contractor's bid shall fully conform in all material respects to the solicitation and all of its requirements, including all form and

substance.

SCRUTINIZED COMPANIES: Subject to Odebrecht Construction, Inc., v. Prasad, 876 F.Supp.2d 1305 (S.D. Fla. 2012), affirmed, Odebrecht Construction, Inc., v. Secretary, Florida Department of Transportation, 715 F.3d 1268 (11th Cir. 2013), with regard to the "Cuba Amendment," the Contractor certifies that it is not on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List or the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List or the Scrutinized Companies that Boycott Israel List created pursuant to Section 215.4725, Florida Statutes (2018), that it is not engaged in a boycott of Israel, and that it does not have business operations in Cuba or Syria, as provided in section 287.135, Florida Statutes (2018), as may be amended or revised. The City may terminate this Agreement at the City's option if the Contractor is found to have submitted a false certification as provided under subsection (5) of section 287.135, Florida Statutes (2018), as may be amended or revised, or been placed on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List or the Scrutinized Companies with activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List or the Scrutinized Companies that Boycott Israel List created pursuant to Section 215.4725, Florida Statutes (2018), or is engaged in a boycott of Israel or has been engaged in business operations in Cuba or Syria, as defined in Section 287.135, Florida Statutes (2018), as may be amended or revised.

SUB-CONTRACTORS, SUPPLIERS AND OTHERS. If the Bid Form requires the identity of certain SUB-CONTRACTORS, Suppliers and other persons and organizations, including those who are to furnish the principal items of material and equipment, to be submitted, the BIDDER shall provide such identification. If requested by the CITY, BIDDER shall provide an experience statement with pertinent information regarding similar projects and other evidence of qualification for each SUB-CONTRACTOR, Supplier, person or organization. If the CITY after due investigation has reasonable objection to any proposed SUB-CONTRACTOR, Supplier, other person or organization, either may, before the Notice of Tentative Award is given, request the apparent SUCCESSFUL BIDDER to submit an acceptable substitute without an increase in Bid price. If the apparent SUCCESSFUL BIDDER declines to make any such substitution, the CITY may award the contract to the next lowest BIDDER that proposes to use acceptable SUB-CONTRACTORS, Suppliers and other persons and organizations. The declining to make requested substitutions will not constitute grounds for sacrificing the Bid Security of any BIDDER. Any SUB-CONTRACTOR, Supplier, other person or organization listed and to whom the CITY does not make written objection prior to the giving of the Notice of Tentative Award will be deemed acceptable to the CITY subject to revocation of such acceptance after the Effective Date of the Contract as provided in Paragraph 6.5.2 of the General Conditions. SUB- CONTRACTORS shall not be changed without the approval of the CITY. No acceptance by the CITY of any such SUB-CONTRACTOR, Supplier or other person or organization shall constitute a waiver of any right of the CITY to reject defective WORK or materials not conforming to these specifications.

In contracts where the Contract Price is on the basis of Cost-of-the-WORK Plus a Fee, the apparent SUCCESSFUL BIDDER, prior to the Notice of Tentative Award, shall identify in writing to the CITY those portions of the WORK that such BIDDER proposes to subcontract and after the Notice of Tentative Award the Successful BIDDER may only subcontract other portions of the WORK with the CITY'S written consent.

No BIDDER shall be required to employ any SUB-CONTRACTOR, other person or organization against which BIDDER has reasonable objection.

No more than seventy percent (70%) of the dollar value of the total contract WORK may be accomplished by SUB-CONTRACTORS. Balance of the WORK must be accomplished by the SUCCESSFUL BIDDER'S own forces. Each BIDDER must furnish with its Bid Form, a list of the items it proposes to subcontract and the estimated cost of these items.

<u>SUBSTITUTE OR "OR-EQUAL" ITEMS.</u> The Contract, if awarded, will be on the basis of material and equipment described in the Drawings or specified in the Specifications without consideration of possible substitute or "or-equal" items. The procedure for submittal of any such application, including those applications made after award of the Construction

Contract by SUCCESSFUL BIDDER for consideration by CITY, is set forth in Section 6.4 of the General Conditions which may be supplemented in the General Requirements.

<u>SUBSTITUTION OF KEY PERSONNEL.</u> It is the intention of the City that the Contractor's personnel proposed for the contract will be available for the contract term. In the event the Consultant wishes to substitute personnel, he shall propose personnel of equal or higher qualifications and all replacement personnel are subject to City approval. In the event substitute personnel are not satisfactory to the City and the matter cannot be resolved to the satisfaction of the City, the City reserves the right to cancel the Contract for cause.

TERMINATION FOR CAUSE: If, through any cause, the Contractor shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, or if the Contractor shall violate any of the provisions of this Agreement, the City may upon written notice to the Contractor terminate the right of the Contractor to proceed under this Agreement, or with such part or parts of the Agreement as to which there has been default, and may hold the Contractor liable for any damages caused to the City by reason of such default and termination. In the event of such termination, any completed services performed by the Contractor under this Agreement shall, at the option of the City, become the City's property and the Contractor shall be entitled to receive equitable compensation for any work completed to the satisfaction of the City. The Contractor, however, shall not be relieved of liability to the City for damages sustained by the City by reason of any breach of the Agreement by the Contractor, and the City may withhold any payments to the Contractor for the purpose of setoff until such time as the amount of damages due to the City from the Contractor can be determined.

TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE: The City reserves the right, in its best interest as determined by the City, to cancel contract by giving written notice to the Contractor thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of such cancellation.

<u>VENUE</u>: All contracts shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida and venue shall be in Broward County, Florida.

<u>WITHDRAWAL OF AN OFFER:</u> An Offer shall be irrevocable unless the Offer is withdrawn as provided herein. A Proposal may be withdrawn only by written communication delivered to the Department of Financial Services prior to the Solicitation Closing Date & Time. The proposer must present certification to assure that they are indeed an authorized representative of the Proposer's firm at the time such communication to withdraw the Proposal is presented. A representative will verify this information prior to return of Proposer's proposal. An Offer may also be withdrawn after one hundred and eighty (180) calendar days after the Solicitation Closing Date & Time, provided that it is withdrawn prior to the recommendation for award, by submitting a letter to the Department of Financial Services at the address identified in this Solicitation. The withdrawal letter must be on company letterhead and signed by an authorized agent of the Proposer.

<u>PUBLIC RECORDS/TRADE SECRETS/COPYRIGHT.</u> The Proposer's response to the Solicitation is a public record pursuant to Florida law, which is subject to disclosure by the City under the State of Florida Public Records Law, Florida Statutes Chapter 119.07 ("Public Records Law"). The City shall permit public access to all documents, papers, letters or other material submitted in connection with this Solicitation and the Contract to be executed for this Solicitation, subject to the provisions of Chapter 119.07 of the Florida Statutes.

Any language contained in the Proposer's response to the Solicitation purporting to require confidentiality of any portion of the Proposer's response to the Solicitation, except to the extent that certain information is in the City's opinion a Trade Secret pursuant to Florida law, shall be void. If a Proposer submits any documents or other information to the City which the Proposer claims is Trade Secret information and exempt from Florida Statutes Chapter 119.07 ("Public Records Laws"), the Proposer shall clearly designate that it is a Trade Secret and that it is asserting that the document or information is exempt. The Proposer must specifically identify the exemption being claimed under Florida Statutes 119.07. The City shall be the final arbiter of whether any information contained in the Proposer's response to the Solicitation constitutes a Trade Secret. The City's determination of whether an exemption applies shall be final, and the proposer

agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City and the City's officers, employees, and agent, against any loss or damages incurred by any person or entity as a result of the City's treatment of records as public records. Proposals purporting to be subject to copyright protection in full or in part will be rejected.





Hourly Charges

ATTACHMENT 1

1. Entire Agreement.

This Grant Agreement, including any Attachments and Exhibits referred to herein and/or attached hereto (Agreement), constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreements, whether written or oral, with respect to such subject matter. Any terms and conditions included on Grantee's forms or invoices shall be null and void.

2. Grant Administration.

- a. <u>Order of Precedence.</u> If there are conflicting provisions among the documents that make up the Agreement, the order of precedence for interpretation of the Agreement is as follows:
 - i. Standard Grant Agreement
 - ii. Attachments other than Attachment 1, in numerical order as designated in the Standard Grant Agreement
 - iii. Attachment 1, Standard Terms and Conditions
 - iv. The Exhibits in the order designated in the Standard Grant Agreement
- b. All approvals, written or verbal, and other written communication among the parties, including all notices, shall be obtained by or sent to the parties' Grant Managers. All written communication shall be by electronic mail, U.S. Mail, a courier delivery service, or delivered in person. Notices shall be considered delivered when reflected by an electronic mail read receipt, a courier service delivery receipt, other mail service delivery receipt, or when receipt is acknowledged by recipient. If the notice is delivered in multiple ways, the notice will be considered delivered at the earliest delivery time.
- c. If a different Grant Manager is designated by either party after execution of this Agreement, notice of the name and contact information of the new Grant Manager will be submitted in writing to the other party and maintained in the respective parties' records. A change of Grant Manager does not require a formal amendment or change order to the Agreement.
- d. This Agreement may be amended, through a formal amendment or a change order, only by a written agreement between both parties. A formal amendment to this Agreement is required for changes which cause any of the following:
 - (1) an increase or decrease in the Agreement funding amount;
 - (2) a change in Grantee's match requirements;
 - (3) a change in the expiration date of the Agreement; and/or
 - (4) changes to the cumulative amount of funding transfers between approved budget categories, as defined in Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan, that exceeds or is expected to exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total budget as last approved by Department.
 - A change order to this Agreement may be used when:
 - (1) task timelines within the current authorized Agreement period change;
 - (2) the cumulative transfer of funds between approved budget categories, as defined in Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan, are less than twenty percent (20%) of the total budget as last approved by Department;
 - (3) changing the current funding source as stated in the Standard Grant Agreement; and/or
 - (4) fund transfers between budget categories for the purposes of meeting match requirements.
 - This Agreement may be amended to provide for additional services if additional funding is made available by the Legislature.
- e. All days in this Agreement are calendar days unless otherwise specified.

3. Agreement Duration.

The term of the Agreement shall begin and end on the dates indicated in the Standard Grant Agreement, unless extended or terminated earlier in accordance with the applicable terms and conditions. The Grantee shall be eligible for reimbursement for work performed on or after the date of execution through the expiration date of this Agreement, unless otherwise specified in Attachment 2, Special Terms and Conditions. However, work performed prior to the execution of this Agreement may be reimbursable or used for match purposes if permitted by the Special Terms and Conditions.

4. Deliverables.

The Grantee agrees to render the services or other units of deliverables as set forth in Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan. The services or other units of deliverables shall be delivered in accordance with the schedule and at the pricing outlined in the Grant Work Plan. Deliverables may be comprised of activities that must be completed prior to Department making payment on that deliverable. The Grantee agrees to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement and all attachments and exhibits incorporated by the Standard Grant Agreement.

5. Performance Measures.

The Grantee warrants that: (1) the services will be performed by qualified personnel; (2) the services will be of the kind and quality described in the Grant Work Plan; (3) the services will be performed in a professional and workmanlike manner in accordance with industry standards and practices; (4) the services shall not and do not knowingly infringe upon the intellectual property rights, or any other proprietary rights, of any third party; and (5) its employees, subcontractors, and/or subgrantees shall comply with any security and safety requirements and processes, if provided by Department, for work done at the Project Location(s). The Department reserves the right to investigate or inspect at any time to determine whether the services or qualifications offered by Grantee meet the Agreement requirements. Notwithstanding any provisions herein to the contrary, written acceptance of a particular deliverable does not foreclose Department's remedies in the event deficiencies in the deliverable cannot be readily measured at the time of delivery.

6. Acceptance of Deliverables.

- a. <u>Acceptance Process.</u> All deliverables must be received and accepted in writing by Department's Grant Manager before payment. The Grantee shall work diligently to correct all deficiencies in the deliverable that remain outstanding, within a reasonable time at Grantee's expense. If Department's Grant Manager does not accept the deliverables within 30 days of receipt, they will be deemed rejected.
- b. Rejection of Deliverables. The Department reserves the right to reject deliverables, as outlined in the Grant Work Plan, as incomplete, inadequate, or unacceptable due, in whole or in part, to Grantee's lack of satisfactory performance under the terms of this Agreement. The Grantee's efforts to correct the rejected deliverables will be at Grantee's sole expense. Failure to fulfill the applicable technical requirements or complete all tasks or activities in accordance with the Grant Work Plan will result in rejection of the deliverable and the associated invoice. Payment for the rejected deliverable will not be issued unless the rejected deliverable is made acceptable to Department in accordance with the Agreement requirements. The Department, at its option, may allow additional time within which Grantee may remedy the objections noted by Department. The Grantee's failure to make adequate or acceptable deliverables after a reasonable opportunity to do so shall constitute an event of default.

7. Financial Consequences for Nonperformance.

a. Withholding Payment. In addition to the specific consequences explained in the Grant Work Plan and/or Special Terms and Conditions, the State of Florida (State) reserves the right to withhold payment when the Grantee has failed to perform/comply with provisions of this Agreement. None of the financial consequences for nonperformance in this Agreement as more fully described in the Grant Work Plan shall be considered penalties.

b. <u>Invoice reduction</u>

If Grantee does not meet a deadline for any deliverable, the Department with reduce the invoice by 1% for each day the deadline is missed, unless an extension is approved in writing by the Department.

- c. <u>Corrective Action Plan</u>. If Grantee fails to correct all the deficiencies in a rejected deliverable within the specified timeframe, Department may, in its sole discretion, request that a proposed Corrective Action Plan (CAP) be submitted by Grantee to Department. The Department requests that Grantee specify the outstanding deficiencies in the CAP. All CAPs must be able to be implemented and performed in no more than sixty (60) calendar days.
 - i. The Grantee shall submit a CAP within ten (10) days of the date of the written request from Department. The CAP shall be sent to the Department's Grant Manager for review and approval. Within ten (10) days of receipt of a CAP, Department shall notify Grantee in writing whether the CAP proposed has been accepted. If the CAP is not accepted, Grantee shall have ten (10) days from receipt of Department letter rejecting the proposal to submit a revised proposed CAP. Failure to obtain Department approval of a CAP as specified above may result in Department's termination of this Agreement for cause as authorized in this Agreement.
 - ii. Upon Department's notice of acceptance of a proposed CAP, Grantee shall have ten (10) days to commence implementation of the accepted plan. Acceptance of the proposed CAP by Department does not relieve Grantee of any of its obligations under the Agreement. In the event the CAP fails to correct or eliminate performance deficiencies by Grantee, Department shall retain the right to

require additional or further remedial steps, or to terminate this Agreement for failure to perform. No actions approved by Department or steps taken by Grantee shall preclude Department from subsequently asserting any deficiencies in performance. The Grantee shall continue to implement the CAP until all deficiencies are corrected. Reports on the progress of the CAP will be made to Department as requested by Department's Grant Manager.

iii. Failure to respond to a Department request for a CAP or failure to correct a deficiency in the performance of the Agreement as specified by Department may result in termination of the Agreement.

8. Payment.

- a. <u>Payment Process.</u> Subject to the terms and conditions established by the Agreement, the pricing per deliverable established by the Grant Work Plan, and the billing procedures established by Department, Department agrees to pay Grantee for services rendered in accordance with Section 215.422, Florida Statutes (F.S.).
- b. <u>Taxes.</u> The Department is exempted from payment of State sales, use taxes and Federal excise taxes. The Grantee, however, shall not be exempted from paying any taxes that it is subject to, including State sales and use taxes, or for payment by Grantee to suppliers for taxes on materials used to fulfill its contractual obligations with Department. The Grantee shall not use Department's exemption number in securing such materials. The Grantee shall be responsible and liable for the payment of all its FICA/Social Security and other taxes resulting from this Agreement.

- d. Reimbursement for Costs. - e. <u>Invoice Detail.</u> All charges for services rendered or for reimbursement of expenses authorized by Department pursuant to the Grant Work Plan shall be submitted to Department in sufficient detail for a proper pre-audit and post-audit to be performed. The Grantee shall only invoice Department for deliverables that are completed in accordance with the Grant Work Plan.
- f. <u>Interim Payments.</u> Interim payments may be made by Department, at its discretion, if the completion of deliverables to date have first been accepted in writing by Department's Grant Manager.
- g. <u>Final Payment Request.</u> A final payment request should be submitted to Department no later than sixty (60) days following the expiration date of the Agreement to ensure the availability of funds for payment. - h. <u>Annual Appropriation Contingency</u>. The State's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature. This Agreement is not a commitment of future appropriations. Authorization for continuation and completion of work and any associated payments may be rescinded, with proper notice, at the discretion of Department if the Legislature reduces or eliminates appropriations.
- i. <u>Interest Rates.</u> All interest rates charged under the Agreement shall be calculated on the prevailing rate used by the State Board of Administration. To obtain the applicable interest rate, please refer to: <u>www.myfloridacfo.com/Division/AA/Vendors/default.htm.</u>
- j. <u>Refund of Payments to the Department.</u> Any balance of unobligated funds that have been advanced or paid must be refunded to Department. Any funds paid in excess of the amount to which Grantee or subgrantee is entitled under the terms of the Agreement must be refunded to Department. <u>If this Agreement is funded with federal funds and the Department is required to refund the federal government</u>, the Grantee shall refund the Department its share of those funds.

9. Documentation Required for Cost Reimbursement Grant Agreements and Match.

If Cost Reimbursement or Match is authorized in Attachment 2, Special Terms and Conditions, the following conditions apply. Supporting documentation must be provided to substantiate cost reimbursement or match requirements for the following budget categories:

- a. <u>Salary/Wages</u>. Grantee shall list personnel involved, position classification, direct salary rates, and hours spent on the Project in accordance with Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan in their documentation for reimbursement or match requirements.
- b. Overhead/Indirect/General and Administrative Costs. If Grantee is being reimbursed for or claiming match for multipliers, all multipliers used (i.e., fringe benefits, overhead, indirect, and/or general and administrative rates) shall be supported by audit. If Department determines that multipliers charged by Grantee exceeded the rates supported by audit, Grantee shall be required to reimburse such funds to Department within thirty (30) days of written notification. Interest shall be charged on the excessive rate.
- c. Contractual Costs (Subcontractors). Match or reimbursement requests for payments to subcontractors must be substantiated by copies of invoices with backup documentation identical to that required from Grantee. Subcontracts which involve payments for direct salaries shall clearly identify the personnel involved, salary rate per hour, and hours spent on the Project. All eligible multipliers used (i.e., fringe benefits, overhead, indirect, and/or general and administrative rates) shall be supported by audit. If Department determines that multipliers charged by any subcontractor exceeded the rates supported by audit, Grantee shall be required to reimburse such funds to Department within thirty (30) days of written notification. Interest shall be charged on the excessive rate. Nonconsumable and/or nonexpendable personal property or equipment costing \$5,000 or more purchased for the Project under a subcontract is subject to the requirements set forth in Chapters 273 and/or 274, F.S., and Chapter 69I-72, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.) and/or Chapter 69I-73, F.A.C., as applicable. The Grantee shall be responsible for maintaining appropriate property records for any subcontracts that include the purchase of equipment as part of the delivery of services. The Grantee shall comply with this requirement and ensure its subcontracts issued under this Agreement, if any, impose this requirement, in writing, on its subcontractors.
 - i. For fixed-price (vendor) subcontracts, the following provisions shall apply: The Grantee may award, on a competitive basis, fixed-price subcontracts to consultants/contractors in performing the work described in Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan. Invoices submitted to Department for fixed-price subcontracted activities shall be supported with a copy of the subcontractor's invoice and a copy of the tabulation form for the competitive procurement process (e.g., Invitation to Bid, Request for Proposals, or other similar competitive procurement document) resulting in the fixed-price subcontract. The Grantee may request approval from Department to award a fixed-price subcontract resulting from procurement methods other than those identified above. In this instance, Grantee shall request the advance written approval from Department's Grant Manager of the fixed price negotiated by Grantee. The letter of request shall be supported by a detailed budget and Scope of Services to be performed by the subcontractor. Upon receipt of Department Grant Manager's approval of the fixed-price amount, Grantee may proceed in finalizing the fixed-price subcontract.
 - ii. If the procurement is subject to the Consultant's Competitive Negotiation Act under section 287.055, F.S. or the Brooks Act, Grantee must provide documentation clearly evidencing it has complied with the statutory or federal requirements.
- d. <u>Travel.</u> All requests for match or reimbursement of travel expenses shall be in accordance with Section 112.061, F.S.
- e. <u>Direct Purchase Equipment</u>. For the purposes of this Agreement, Equipment is defined as capital outlay costing \$5,000 or more. Match or reimbursement for Grantee's direct purchase of equipment is subject to specific approval of Department, and does not include any equipment purchased under the delivery of services to be completed by a subcontractor. Include copies of invoices or receipts to document purchases, and a properly completed Exhibit B, Property Reporting Form.
- f. <u>Rental/Lease of Equipment.</u> Match or reimbursement requests for rental/lease of equipment must include copies of invoices or receipts to document charges.
- g. <u>Miscellaneous/Other Expenses</u>. If miscellaneous or other expenses, such as materials, supplies, non-excluded phone expenses, reproduction, or mailing, are reimbursable or available for match or reimbursement under the terms of this Agreement, the documentation supporting these expenses must be itemized and include copies of receipts or invoices. Additionally, independent of Grantee's contract obligations to its subcontractor, Department shall not reimburse any of the following types of charges: cell phone usage; attorney's fees or court costs; civil or administrative penalties; or handling fees, such as set percent overages associated with purchasing supplies or equipment.
- h. <u>Land Acquisition.</u> Reimbursement for the costs associated with acquiring interest and/or rights to real property (including access rights through ingress/egress easements, leases, license agreements, or other site access agreements; and/or obtaining record title ownership of real property through purchase) must be supported by the following, as applicable: Copies of Property Appraisals, Environmental Site Assessments, Surveys and Legal

Descriptions, Boundary Maps, Acreage Certification, Title Search Reports, Title Insurance, Closing Statements/Documents, Deeds, Leases, Easements, License Agreements, or other legal instrument documenting acquired property interest and/or rights. If land acquisition costs are used to meet match requirements, Grantee agrees that those funds shall not be used as match for any other Agreement supported by State or Federal funds.

10. Status Reports.

The Grantee shall submit status reports quarterly, unless otherwise specified in the Attachments, on Exhibit A, Progress Report Form, to Department's Grant Manager describing the work performed during the reporting period, problems encountered, problem resolutions, scheduled updates, and proposed work for the next reporting period. Quarterly status reports are due no later than twenty (20) days following the completion of the quarterly reporting period. For the purposes of this reporting requirement, the quarterly reporting periods end on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31. The Department will review the required reports submitted by Grantee within thirty (30) days.

11. Retainage.

The following provisions apply if Department withholds retainage under this Agreement:

- a. The Department reserves the right to establish the amount and application of retainage on the work performed under this Agreement up to the maximum percentage described in Attachment 2, Special Terms and Conditions. Retainage may be withheld from each payment to Grantee pending satisfactory completion of work and approval of all deliverables.
- b. If Grantee fails to perform the requested work, or fails to perform the work in a satisfactory manner, Grantee shall forfeit its right to payment of the retainage associated with the work. Failure to perform includes, but is not limited to, failure to submit the required deliverables or failure to provide adequate documentation that the work was actually performed. The Department shall provide written notification to Grantee of the failure to perform that shall result in retainage forfeiture. If the Grantee does not correct the failure to perform within the timeframe stated in Department's notice, the retainage will be forfeited to Department.
- c. No retainage shall be released or paid for incomplete work while this Agreement is suspended.
- d. Except as otherwise provided above, Grantee shall be paid the retainage associated with the work, provided Grantee has completed the work and submits an invoice for retainage held in accordance with the invoicing procedures under this Agreement.

12. Insurance.

- a. <u>Insurance Requirements for Sub-Grantees and/or Subcontractors.</u> The Grantee shall require its sub-grantees and/or subcontractors, if any, to maintain insurance coverage of such types and with such terms and limits as described in this Agreement. The Grantee shall require all its sub-grantees and/or subcontractors, if any, to make compliance with the insurance requirements of this Agreement a condition of all contracts that are related to this Agreement. Sub-grantees and/or subcontractors must provide proof of insurance upon request.
- b. <u>Deductibles.</u> The Department shall be exempt from, and in no way liable for, any sums of money representing a deductible in any insurance policy. The payment of such deductible shall be the sole responsibility of the Grantee providing such insurance.
- c. <u>Proof of Insurance.</u> Upon execution of this Agreement, Grantee shall provide Department documentation demonstrating the existence and amount for each type of applicable insurance coverage *prior to* performance of any work under this Agreement. Upon receipt of written request from Department, Grantee shall furnish Department with proof of applicable insurance coverage by standard form certificates of insurance, a self-insured authorization, or other certification of self-insurance.
- d. <u>Duty to Maintain Coverage</u>. In the event that any applicable coverage is cancelled by the insurer for any reason, or if Grantee cannot get adequate coverage, Grantee shall immediately notify Department of such cancellation and shall obtain adequate replacement coverage conforming to the requirements herein and provide proof of such replacement coverage within ten (10) days after the cancellation of coverage.
- e. <u>Insurance Trust.</u> If the Grantee's insurance is provided through an insurance trust, the Grantee shall instead add the Department of Environmental Protection, its employees, and officers as an additional covered party everywhere the Agreement requires them to be added as an additional insured.

13. Termination.

a. <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. When it is in the State's best interest, Department may, at its sole discretion, terminate the Agreement in whole or in part by giving 30 days' written notice to Grantee. The Department shall notify Grantee of the termination for convenience with instructions as to the effective date of termination or the specific stage of work at which the Agreement is to be terminated. The Grantee must submit all invoices for work to be paid under this Agreement within thirty (30) days of the effective date of termination. The Department shall not pay any invoices received after thirty (30) days of the effective date of termination.

- b. <u>Termination for Cause.</u> The Department may terminate this Agreement if any of the events of default described in the Events of Default provisions below occur or in the event that Grantee fails to fulfill any of its other obligations under this Agreement. If, after termination, it is determined that Grantee was not in default, or that the default was excusable, the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if the termination had been issued for the convenience of Department. The rights and remedies of Department in this clause are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this Agreement.
- c. <u>Grantee Obligations upon Notice of Termination</u>. After receipt of a notice of termination or partial termination unless as otherwise directed by Department, Grantee shall not furnish any service or deliverable on the date, and to the extent specified, in the notice. However, Grantee shall continue work on any portion of the Agreement not terminated. If the Agreement is terminated before performance is completed, Grantee shall be paid only for that work satisfactorily performed for which costs can be substantiated. The Grantee shall not be entitled to recover any cancellation charges or lost profits.
- d. <u>Continuation of Prepaid Services.</u> If Department has paid for any services prior to the expiration, cancellation, or termination of the Agreement, Grantee shall continue to provide Department with those services for which it has already been paid or, at Department's discretion, Grantee shall provide a refund for services that have been paid for but not rendered.
- e. <u>Transition of Services Upon Termination, Expiration, or Cancellation of the Agreement.</u> If services provided under the Agreement are being transitioned to another provider(s), Grantee shall assist in the smooth transition of Agreement services to the subsequent provider(s). This requirement is at a minimum an affirmative obligation to cooperate with the new provider(s), however additional requirements may be outlined in the Grant Work Plan. The Grantee shall not perform any services after Agreement expiration or termination, except as necessary to complete the transition or continued portion of the Agreement, if any.

14. Notice of Default.

If Grantee defaults in the performance of any covenant or obligation contained in the Agreement, including, any of the events of default, Department shall provide notice to Grantee and an opportunity to cure that is reasonable under the circumstances. This notice shall state the nature of the failure to perform and provide a time certain for correcting the failure. The notice will also provide that, should the Grantee fail to perform within the time provided, Grantee will be found in default, and Department may terminate the Agreement effective as of the date of receipt of the default notice.

15. Events of Default.

Provided such failure is not the fault of Department or outside the reasonable control of Grantee, the following non-exclusive list of events, acts, or omissions, shall constitute events of default:

- a. The commitment of any material breach of this Agreement by Grantee, including failure to timely deliver a material deliverable, failure to perform the minimal level of services required for a deliverable, discontinuance of the performance of the work, failure to resume work that has been discontinued within a reasonable time after notice to do so, or abandonment of the Agreement;
- b. The commitment of any material misrepresentation or omission in any materials, or discovery by the Department of such, made by the Grantee in this Agreement or in its application for funding;
- c. Failure to submit any of the reports required by this Agreement or having submitted any report with incorrect, incomplete, or insufficient information;
- d. Failure to honor any term of the Agreement;
- e. Failure to abide by any statutory, regulatory, or licensing requirement, including an entry of an order revoking the certificate of authority granted to the Grantee by a state or other licensing authority;
- f. Failure to pay any and all entities, individuals, and furnishing labor or materials, or failure to make payment to any other entities as required by this Agreement;
- g. Employment of an unauthorized alien in the performance of the work, in violation of Section 274 (A) of the Immigration and Nationality Act:
- h. Failure to maintain the insurance required by this Agreement;
- i. One or more of the following circumstances, uncorrected for more than thirty (30) days unless, within the specified 30-day period, Grantee (including its receiver or trustee in bankruptcy) provides to Department adequate assurances, reasonably acceptable to Department, of its continuing ability and willingness to fulfill its obligations under the Agreement:
 - i. Entry of an order for relief under Title 11 of the United States Code;
 - ii. The making by Grantee of a general assignment for the benefit of creditors;
 - iii. The appointment of a general receiver or trustee in bankruptcy of Grantee's business or property; and/or

iv. An action by Grantee under any state insolvency or similar law for the purpose of its bankruptcy, reorganization, or liquidation.

16. Suspension of Work.

The Department may, in its sole discretion, suspend any or all activities under the Agreement, at any time, when it is in the best interest of the State to do so. The Department shall provide Grantee written notice outlining the particulars of suspension. Examples of reasons for suspension include, but are not limited to, budgetary constraints, declaration of emergency, or other such circumstances. After receiving a suspension notice, Grantee shall comply with the notice. Within 90 days, or any longer period agreed to by the parties, Department shall either: (1) issue a notice authorizing resumption of work, at which time activity shall resume; or (2) terminate the Agreement. If the Agreement is terminated after 30 days of suspension, the notice of suspension shall be deemed to satisfy the thirty (30) days' notice required for a notice of termination for convenience. Suspension of work shall not entitle Grantee to any additional compensation.

17. Force Majeure.

The Grantee shall not be responsible for delay resulting from its failure to perform if neither the fault nor the negligence of Grantee or its employees or agents contributed to the delay and the delay is due directly to acts of God, wars, acts of public enemies, strikes, fires, floods, or other similar cause wholly beyond Grantee's control, or for any of the foregoing that affect subcontractors or suppliers if no alternate source of supply is available to Grantee. In case of any delay Grantee believes is excusable, Grantee shall notify Department in writing of the delay or potential delay and describe the cause of the delay either (1) within ten days after the cause that creates or will create the delay first arose, if Grantee could reasonably foresee that a delay could occur as a result; or (2) if delay is not reasonably foreseeable, within five days after the date Grantee first had reason to believe that a delay could result. THE FOREGOING SHALL CONSTITUTE THE GRANTEE'S SOLE REMEDY OR EXCUSE WITH RESPECT TO DELAY. Providing notice in strict accordance with this paragraph is a condition precedent to such remedy. No claim for damages, other than for an extension of time, shall be asserted against Department. The Grantee shall not be entitled to an increase in the Agreement price or payment of any kind from Department for direct, indirect, consequential, impact or other costs, expenses or damages, including but not limited to costs of acceleration or inefficiency, arising because of delay, disruption, interference, or hindrance from any cause whatsoever. If performance is suspended or delayed, in whole or in part, due to any of the causes described in this paragraph, after the causes have ceased to exist Grantee shall perform at no increased cost, unless Department determines, in its sole discretion, that the delay will significantly impair the value of the Agreement to Department, in which case Department may: (1) accept allocated performance or deliveries from Grantee, provided that Grantee grants preferential treatment to Department with respect to products subjected to allocation; (2) contract with other sources (without recourse to and by Grantee for the related costs and expenses) to replace all or part of the products or services that are the subject of the delay, which purchases may be deducted from the Agreement quantity; or (3) terminate Agreement in whole or in part.

18. Indemnification.

- a. The Grantee shall be fully liable for the actions of its agents, employees, partners, or subcontractors and shall fully indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Department and its officers, agents, and employees, from suits, actions, damages, and costs of every name and description arising from or relating to:
 - i. personal injury and damage to real or personal tangible property alleged to be caused in whole or in part by Grantee, its agents, employees, partners, or subcontractors; provided, however, that Grantee shall not indemnify for that portion of any loss or damages proximately caused by the negligent act or omission of Department;
 - ii. the Grantee's breach of this Agreement or the negligent acts or omissions of Grantee.
- b. The Grantee's obligations under the preceding paragraph with respect to any legal action are contingent upon Department giving Grantee: (1) written notice of any action or threatened action; (2) the opportunity to take over and settle or defend any such action at Grantee's sole expense; and (3) assistance in defending the action at Grantee's sole expense. The Grantee shall not be liable for any cost, expense, or compromise incurred or made by Department in any legal action without Grantee's prior written consent, which shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- c. Notwithstanding sections a. and b. above, the following is the sole indemnification provision that applies to Grantees that are governmental entities: Each party hereto agrees that it shall be solely responsible for the negligent or wrongful acts of its employees and agents. However, nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by either party of its sovereign immunity or the provisions of Section 768.28, F.S. Further, nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency or subdivision of the State to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract or this Agreement.

d. No provision in this Agreement shall require Department to hold harmless or indemnify Grantee, insure or assume liability for Grantee's negligence, waive Department's sovereign immunity under the laws of Florida, or otherwise impose liability on Department for which it would not otherwise be responsible. Any provision, implication or suggestion to the contrary is null and void.

19. Limitation of Liability.

The Department's liability for any claim arising from this Agreement is limited to compensatory damages in an amount no greater than the sum of the unpaid balance of compensation due for goods or services rendered pursuant to and in compliance with the terms of the Agreement. Such liability is further limited to a cap of \$100,000.

20. Remedies.

Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to make Grantee liable for force majeure events. Nothing in this Agreement, including financial consequences for nonperformance, shall limit Department's right to pursue its remedies for other types of damages under the Agreement, at law or in equity. The Department may, in addition to other remedies available to it, at law or in equity and upon notice to Grantee, retain such monies from amounts due Grantee as may be necessary to satisfy any claim for damages, penalties, costs and the like asserted by or against it.

21. Waiver.

The delay or failure by Department to exercise or enforce any of its rights under this Agreement shall not constitute or be deemed a waiver of Department's right thereafter to enforce those rights, nor shall any single or partial exercise of any such right preclude any other or further exercise thereof or the exercise of any other right.

22. Statutory Notices Relating to Unauthorized Employment and Subcontracts.

- a. The Department shall consider the employment by any Grantee of unauthorized aliens a violation of Section 274A(e) of the Immigration and Nationality Act. If Grantee/subcontractor knowingly employs unauthorized aliens, such violation shall be cause for unilateral cancellation of this Agreement. The Grantee shall be responsible for including this provision in all subcontracts with private organizations issued as a result of this Agreement.
- b. Pursuant to Sections 287.133, 287.134, and 287.137 F.S., the following restrictions apply to persons placed on the convicted vendor list, discriminatory vendor list, or the antitrust violator vendor list:
 - Public Entity Crime. A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids, proposals, or replies on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a Grantee, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, F.S., for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months following the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.
 - ii. <u>Discriminatory Vendors</u>. An entity or affiliate who has been placed on the discriminatory vendor list may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids, proposals, or replies on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity.
 - iii. Antitrust Violator Vendors. A person or an affiliate who has been placed on the antitrust violator vendor list following a conviction or being held civilly liable for an antitrust violation may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on any contract to provide any good or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on any contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a Grantee, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with a public entity; and may not transact new business with a public entity.
 - iv. Notification. The Grantee shall notify Department if it or any of its suppliers, subcontractors, or consultants have been placed on the convicted vendor list, the discriminatory vendor list, or antitrust violator vendor list during the life of the Agreement. The Florida Department of Management Services is responsible for maintaining the discriminatory vendor list and the antitrust violator vendor list and posts the list on its website. Questions regarding the discriminatory vendor list or antitrust violator vendor list may be directed to the Florida Department of Management Services, Office of Supplier Diversity, at (850) 487-0915.

23. Compliance with Federal, State and Local Laws.

- a. The Grantee and all its agents shall comply with all federal, state and local regulations, including, but not limited to, nondiscrimination, wages, social security, workers' compensation, licenses, and registration requirements. The Grantee shall include this provision in all subcontracts issued as a result of this Agreement.
- b. No person, on the grounds of race, creed, color, religion, national origin, age, gender, or disability, shall be excluded from participation in; be denied the proceeds or benefits of; or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in performance of this Agreement.
- c. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida.
- d. Any dispute concerning performance of the Agreement shall be processed as described herein. Jurisdiction for any damages arising under the terms of the Agreement will be in the courts of the State, and venue will be in the Second Judicial Circuit, in and for Leon County. Except as otherwise provided by law, the parties agree to be responsible for their own attorney fees incurred in connection with disputes arising under the terms of this Agreement.

24. Build America, Buy America Act (BABA).

- Recipients or Subrecipients of an award of Federal financial assistance from a program for infrastructure are required to comply with the Build America, Buy America Act (BABA), including the following provisions:
- a. All iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States--this means all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States;
- b. All manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States-this means the manufactured product was manufactured in the United States; and the cost of the components of the manufactured product that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product, unless another standard for determining the minimum amount of domestic content of the manufactured product has been established under applicable law or regulation; and
- All construction materials are manufactured in the United States-this means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States.
 The Buy America preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated
 - into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

25. Scrutinized Companies.

- a. Grantee certifies that it is not on the Scrutinized Companies that Boycott Israel List or engaged in a boycott of Israel. Pursuant to Section 287.135, F.S., the Department may immediately terminate this Agreement at its sole option if the Grantee is found to have submitted a false certification; or if the Grantee is placed on the Scrutinized Companies that Boycott Israel List or is engaged in the boycott of Israel during the term of the Agreement.
- b. If this Agreement is for more than one million dollars, the Grantee certifies that it is also not on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan, Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List, or engaged with business operations in Cuba or Syria as identified in Section 287.135, F.S. Pursuant to Section 287.135, F.S., the Department may immediately terminate this Agreement at its sole option if the Grantee is found to have submitted a false certification; or if the Grantee is placed on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List, or Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List, or engaged with business operations in Cuba or Syria during the term of the Agreement.
- c. As provided in Subsection 287.135(8), F.S., if federal law ceases to authorize these contracting prohibitions then they shall become inoperative.

26. Lobbying and Integrity.

The Grantee agrees that no funds received by it under this Agreement will be expended for the purpose of lobbying the Legislature or a State agency pursuant to Section 216.347, F.S., except that pursuant to the requirements of Section 287.058(6), F.S., during the term of any executed agreement between Grantee and the State, Grantee may lobby the executive or legislative branch concerning the scope of services, performance, term, or compensation regarding that agreement. The Grantee shall comply with Sections 11.062 and 216.347, F.S.

27. Record Keeping.

The Grantee shall maintain books, records and documents directly pertinent to performance under this Agreement in accordance with United States generally accepted accounting principles (US GAAP) consistently applied. The Department, the State, or their authorized representatives shall have access to such records for audit purposes during the term of this Agreement and for five (5) years following the completion date or termination of the Agreement. In the event that any work is subcontracted, Grantee shall similarly require each subcontractor to maintain and allow access to such records for audit purposes. Upon request of Department's Inspector General, or other authorized State official, Grantee shall provide any type of information the Inspector General deems relevant to Grantee's integrity or responsibility. Such information may include, but shall not be limited to, Grantee's business or financial records, documents, or files of any type or form that refer to or relate to Agreement. The Grantee shall retain such records for the longer of: (1) three years after the expiration of the Agreement; or (2) the period required by the General Records Schedules maintained by the Florida Department of State (available at: http://dos.myflorida.com/library-archives/records-management/general-records-schedules/).

28. Audits.

- a. <u>Inspector General</u>. The Grantee understands its duty, pursuant to Section 20.055(5), F.S., to cooperate with the inspector general in any investigation, audit, inspection, review, or hearing. The Grantee will comply with this duty and ensure that its sub-grantees and/or subcontractors issued under this Agreement, if any, impose this requirement, in writing, on its sub-grantees and/or subcontractors, respectively.
- b. <u>Physical Access and Inspection</u>. Department personnel shall be given access to and may observe and inspect work being performed under this Agreement, with reasonable notice and during normal business hours, including by any of the following methods:
 - i. Grantee shall provide access to any location or facility on which Grantee is performing work, or storing or staging equipment, materials or documents;
 - ii. Grantee shall permit inspection of any facility, equipment, practices, or operations required in performance of any work pursuant to this Agreement; and,
 - iii. Grantee shall allow and facilitate sampling and monitoring of any substances, soils, materials or parameters at any location reasonable or necessary to assure compliance with any work or legal requirements pursuant to this Agreement.
- c. Special Audit Requirements. The Grantee shall comply with the applicable provisions contained in Attachment 5, Special Audit Requirements. Each amendment that authorizes a funding increase or decrease shall include an updated copy of Exhibit 1, to Attachment 5. If Department fails to provide an updated copy of Exhibit 1 to include in each amendment that authorizes a funding increase or decrease, Grantee shall request one from the Department's Grants Manager. The Grantee shall consider the type of financial assistance (federal and/or state) identified in Attachment 5, Exhibit 1 and determine whether the terms of Federal and/or Florida Single Audit Act Requirements may further apply to lower tier transactions that may be a result of this Agreement. For federal financial assistance, Grantee shall utilize the guidance provided under 2 CFR §200.331 for determining whether the relationship represents that of a subrecipient or vendor. For State financial assistance, Grantee shall utilize the form entitled "Checklist for Nonstate Organizations Recipient/Subrecipient vs Vendor Determination" (form number DFS-A2-NS) that can be found under the "Links/Forms" section appearing at the following website: https://apps.fldfs.com/fsaa.
- d. Proof of Transactions. In addition to documentation provided to support cost reimbursement as described herein, Department may periodically request additional proof of a transaction to evaluate the appropriateness of costs to the Agreement pursuant to State guidelines (including cost allocation guidelines) and federal, if applicable. Allowable costs and uniform administrative requirements for federal programs can be found under 2 CFR 200. The Department may also request a cost allocation plan in support of its multipliers (overhead, indirect, general administrative costs, and fringe benefits). The Grantee must provide the additional proof within thirty (30) days of such request.
- e. No Commingling of Funds. The accounting systems for all Grantees must ensure that these funds are not commingled with funds from other agencies. Funds from each agency must be accounted for separately. Grantees are prohibited from commingling funds on either a program-by-program or a project-by-project basis. Funds specifically budgeted and/or received for one project may not be used to support another project. Where a Grantee's, or subrecipient's, accounting system cannot comply with this requirement, Grantee, or subrecipient, shall establish a system to provide adequate fund accountability for each project it has been awarded.
 - i. If Department finds that these funds have been commingled, Department shall have the right to demand a refund, either in whole or in part, of the funds provided to Grantee under this Agreement for non-compliance with the material terms of this Agreement. The Grantee, upon such written notification from Department shall refund, and shall forthwith pay to Department, the amount of

- money demanded by Department. Interest on any refund shall be calculated based on the prevailing rate used by the State Board of Administration. Interest shall be calculated from the date(s) the original payment(s) are received from Department by Grantee to the date repayment is made by Grantee to Department.

In the event that the Grantee recovers costs, incurred under this Agreement and reimbursed by Department, from another source(s), Grantee shall reimburse Department for all recovered funds originally provided under this Agreement and interest shall be charged for those recovered costs as calculated on from the date(s) the payment(s) are recovered by Grantee to the date repayment is made to Department.
- iii. Notwithstanding the requirements of this section, the above restrictions on commingling funds do not apply to agreements where payments are made purely on a cost reimbursement basis.

29. Conflict of Interest.

The Grantee covenants that it presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required.

30. Independent Contractor.

The Grantee is an independent contractor and is not an employee or agent of Department.

31. Subcontracting.

- a. Unless otherwise specified in the Special Terms and Conditions, all services contracted for are to be performed solely by Grantee.
- b. The Department may, for cause, require the replacement of any Grantee employee, subcontractor, or agent. For cause, includes, but is not limited to, technical or training qualifications, quality of work, change in security status, or non-compliance with an applicable Department policy or other requirement.
- c. The Department may, for cause, deny access to Department's secure information or any facility by any Grantee employee, subcontractor, or agent.
- d. The Department's actions under paragraphs b. or c. shall not relieve Grantee of its obligation to perform all work in compliance with the Agreement. The Grantee shall be responsible for the payment of all monies due under any subcontract. The Department shall not be liable to any subcontractor for any expenses or liabilities incurred under any subcontract and Grantee shall be solely liable to the subcontractor for all expenses and liabilities incurred under any subcontract.
- e. The Department will not deny Grantee's employees, subcontractors, or agents access to meetings within the Department's facilities, unless the basis of Department's denial is safety or security considerations.
- f. The Department supports diversity in its procurement program and requests that all subcontracting opportunities afforded by this Agreement embrace diversity enthusiastically. The award of subcontracts should reflect the full diversity of the citizens of the State. A list of minority-owned firms that could be offered subcontracting opportunities may be obtained by contacting the Office of Supplier Diversity at (850) 487-0915.
- g. The Grantee shall not be liable for any excess costs for a failure to perform, if the failure to perform is caused by the default of a subcontractor at any tier, and if the cause of the default is completely beyond the control of both Grantee and the subcontractor(s), and without the fault or negligence of either, unless the subcontracted products or services were obtainable from other sources in sufficient time for Grantee to meet the required delivery schedule.

32. Guarantee of Parent Company.

If Grantee is a subsidiary of another corporation or other business entity, Grantee asserts that its parent company will guarantee all of the obligations of Grantee for purposes of fulfilling the obligations of Agreement. In the event Grantee is sold during the period the Agreement is in effect, Grantee agrees that it will be a requirement of sale that the new parent company guarantee all of the obligations of Grantee.

33. Survival.

The respective obligations of the parties, which by their nature would continue beyond the termination or expiration of this Agreement, including without limitation, the obligations regarding confidentiality, proprietary interests, and public records, shall survive termination, cancellation, or expiration of this Agreement.

34. Third Parties.

The Department shall not be deemed to assume any liability for the acts, failures to act or negligence of Grantee, its agents, servants, and employees, nor shall Grantee disclaim its own negligence to Department or any third party. This Agreement does not and is not intended to confer any rights or remedies upon any person other than the parties. If Department consents to a subcontract, Grantee will specifically disclose that this Agreement does not create any third-party rights. Further, no third parties shall rely upon any of the rights and obligations created under this Agreement.

35. Severability.

If a court of competent jurisdiction deems any term or condition herein void or unenforceable, the other provisions are severable to that void provision, and shall remain in full force and effect.

36. Grantee's Employees, Subcontractors and Agents.

All Grantee employees, subcontractors, or agents performing work under the Agreement shall be properly trained technicians who meet or exceed any specified training qualifications. Upon request, Grantee shall furnish a copy of technical certification or other proof of qualification. All employees, subcontractors, or agents performing work under Agreement must comply with all security and administrative requirements of Department and shall comply with all controlling laws and regulations relevant to the services they are providing under the Agreement.

37. Assignment.

The Grantee shall not sell, assign, or transfer any of its rights, duties, or obligations under the Agreement, or under any purchase order issued pursuant to the Agreement, without the prior written consent of Department. In the event of any assignment, Grantee remains secondarily liable for performance of the Agreement, unless Department expressly waives such secondary liability. The Department may assign the Agreement with prior written notice to Grantee of its intent to do so.

38. Compensation Report.

If this Agreement is a sole-source, public-private agreement or if the Grantee, through this agreement with the State, annually receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds, the Grantee shall provide an annual report, including the most recent IRS Form 990, detailing the total compensation for the entities' executive leadership teams. Total compensation shall include salary, bonuses, cashed-in leave, cash equivalents, severance pay, retirement benefits, deferred compensation, real-property gifts, and any other payout. The Grantee must also inform the Department of any changes in total executive compensation between the annual reports. All compensation reports must indicate what percent of compensation comes directly from the State or Federal allocations to the Grantee.

39. Execution in Counterparts and Authority to Sign.

This Agreement, any amendments, and/or change orders related to the Agreement, may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute the same instrument. In accordance with the Electronic Signature Act of 1996, electronic signatures, including facsimile transmissions, may be used and shall have the same force and effect as a written signature. Each person signing this Agreement warrants that he or she is duly authorized to do so and to bind the respective party to the Agreement.

These Special Terms and Conditions shall be read together with general terms outlined in the Standard Terms and Conditions, Attachment 1. Where in conflict, these more specific terms shall apply.

1. Scope of Work.

The Project funded under this Agreement is Citywide Drainage Improvements Project. The Project is defined in more detail in Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan.

2. Duration.

- a. Reimbursement Period. The reimbursement period for this Agreement is the same as the term of the Agreement.
- b. Extensions. There are extensions available for this Project.
- c. <u>Service Periods.</u> Additional service periods may be added in accordance with 2.a above and are contingent upon proper and satisfactory technical and administrative performance by the Grantee and the availability of funding.

3. Payment Provisions.

- a. <u>Compensation.</u> This is a cost reimbursement Agreement. The Grantee shall be compensated under this Agreement as described in Attachment 3.
- b. Invoicing. Invoicing will occur as indicated in Attachment 3.
- c. Advance Pay. Advance Pay is not authorized under this Agreement.

4. Cost Eligible for Reimbursement or Matching Requirements.

Reimbursement for costs or availability for costs to meet matching requirements shall be limited to the following budget categories, as defined in the Reference Guide for State Expenditures, as indicated:

5. Equipment Purchase.

No Equipment purchases shall be funded under this Agreement.

6. Land Acquisition.

There will be no Land Acquisitions funded under this Agreement.

7. Match Requirements

The Agreement requires at least a 50% match on the part of the Grantee. Therefore, the Grantee is responsible for providing \$3,500,000.00 through cash or third party in-kind towards the project funded under this Agreement. The Grantee may claim allowable project expenditures made on July 1, 2021 or after for purposes of meeting its match requirement as identified above.

Each payment request submitted shall document all matching funds and/or match efforts (i.e., in-kind services) provided during the period covered by each request. The final payment will not be processed until the match requirement has been met.

8. Insurance Requirements

Required Coverage. At all times during the Agreement the Grantee, at its sole expense, shall maintain insurance coverage of such types and with such terms and limits described below. The limits of coverage under each policy maintained by the Grantee shall not be interpreted as limiting the Grantee's liability and obligations under the Agreement. All insurance policies shall be through insurers licensed and authorized to issue policies in Florida, or alternatively, Grantee may provide coverage through a self-insurance program established and operating under the laws of Florida. Additional insurance requirements for this Agreement may be required elsewhere in this Agreement, however the minimum insurance requirements applicable to this Agreement are:

a. Commercial General Liability Insurance.

The Grantee shall provide adequate commercial general liability insurance coverage and hold such liability insurance at all times during the Agreement. The Department, its employees, and officers shall be named as an additional insured on any general liability policies. The minimum limits shall be \$250,000 for each occurrence and \$500,000 policy aggregate.

b. Commercial Automobile Insurance.

If the Grantee's duties include the use of a commercial vehicle, the Grantee shall maintain automobile liability, bodily injury, and property damage coverage. Insuring clauses for both bodily injury and property damage shall provide coverage on an occurrence basis. The Department, its employees, and officers shall be named as an additional insured on any automobile insurance policy. The minimum limits shall be as follows:

\$200,000/300,000 Automobile Liability for Company-Owned Vehicles, if applicable \$200,000/300,000 Hired and Non-owned Automobile Liability Coverage

c. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Coverage.

The Grantee shall provide workers' compensation, in accordance with Chapter 440, F.S. and employer liability coverage with minimum limits of \$100,000 per accident, \$100,000 per person, and \$500,000 policy aggregate. Such policies shall cover all employees engaged in any work under the Grant.

d. Other Insurance. None.

9. Quality Assurance Requirements.

There are no special Quality Assurance requirements under this Agreement.

10. Retainage.

Retainage is permitted under this Agreement. Retainage may be up to a maximum of 5% of the total amount of the Agreement.

11. Subcontracting.

The Grantee may subcontract work under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the Department's Grant Manager except for certain fixed-price subcontracts pursuant to this Agreement, which require prior approval. The Grantee shall submit a copy of the executed subcontract to the Department prior to submitting any invoices for subcontracted work. Regardless of any subcontract, the Grantee is ultimately responsible for all work to be performed under this Agreement.

12. State-owned Land.

The work will not be performed on State-owned land.

13. Office of Policy and Budget Reporting.

There are no special Office of Policy and Budget reporting requirements for this Agreement.

14. Common Carrier.

a. Applicable to contracts with a common carrier – firm/person/corporation that as a regular business transports people of commodities from place to place. If applicable, Contractor must also fill out and return PUR 1808 before contract execution If Contractor is a common carrier pursuant to section

- 908.111(1)(a), Florida Statutes, the Department will terminate this contract immediately if Contractor is found to be in violation of the law or the attestation in PUR 1808.
- b. Applicable to solicitations for a common carrier Before contract execution, the winning Contractor(s) must fill out and return PUR 1808, and attest that it is not willfully providing any service in furtherance of transporting a person into this state knowing that the person unlawfully present in the United States according to the terms of the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, 8 U.S.C. ss. 1101 et seq. The Department will terminate a contract immediately if Contractor is found to be in violation of the law or the attestation in PUR 1808

15. Additional Terms.

<u>Documentary Evidence Requirement for Subcontractor(s)</u>. If any work associated with this Agreement is completed by a subcontractor(s), the Grantee shall require that such subcontractor(s) submit documentary evidence (e.g., workshop agendas; meeting recordings) to Grantee demonstrating that the subcontractor(s) has fully performed its Project obligation(s). The Grantee shall forward copies of all such documentary evidence to the Department with the Grantee's relevant deliverable(s), using the approved Project Timeline set forth in Attachment 3 to this Agreement (Grant Work Plan).

Sea Level Impact Projection Study Requirement. If the project is within the designated area, pursuant to Section 161.551, F.S. and Chapter 62S-7, *Florida Administrative Code*, the Grantee is responsible for performing a Sea Level Impact Projection (SLIP) study and submitting the resulting report to the Department. The SLIP study report must be received by the Department, approved by the Department, and be published on the Department's website for at least thirty (30) days before construction can commence. This rule went into effect July 1, 2021, and applies to certain state-funded construction projects located in the coastal building zone as defined in the rule.

PROJECT LOCATION: The Project is located in City of Lauderdale Lakes within Broward County, Florida.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The Citywide Drainage Improvements Project (Project) includes a feasibility study, design, and installation of a new drainage system and also the repair and/or replacement of the existing roadway drainage system including inlets, piping and swale improvements throughout the City of Lauderdale Lakes. This project consists of pre-design, design and permitting and construction.

TASKS AND DELIVERABLES:

Task 1: Pre-Design

Description: The Grantee will perform a pre-design or feasibility study of the Project and produce a final pre-design or feasibility study report that will detail the scope of the problem in the Project area, outline design options, and identify the tasks required to complete a resolution to the problem. If the Project is located within the "coastal building zone" designated pursuant to Section 161.551, *Florida Statutes*, and Chapter 62S-7, *Florida Administrative Code*, the Grantee will perform a Sea Level Impact Projection study.

Deliverables: The Grantee will submit all final pre-design documents; a feasibility study report or comparable certificate of completion, signed by a Florida-registered Professional Engineer; and, if applicable for the Project, the Sea Level Impact Projection study report.

Task 2: Design and Permitting

Description: The Grantee will complete the design of the Project and obtain all necessary permits for construction of the Project.

Deliverables: The Grantee will submit all final design documents as signed by a Florida-registered Professional Engineer. If applicable, the Grantee will also submit final permit documents from all appropriate state and federal regulatory agencies.

Task 3: Construction

Description: The Grantee will construct the Project in accordance with the construction contract documents. Project costs associated with the Construction task include work approved through construction bids and/or construction-phase engineering and monitoring services contracts. Eligible activities may include mobilization, demobilization, construction observation or inspection services, physical and environmental surveys, and mitigation projects. Construction shall be conducted in accordance with all state or federal permits. The Grantee does not anticipate that the funding under this Agreement will result in a fully completed project, so this Agreement will cover only a portion of the work described herein.

PERFORMANCE MEASURES: The Grantee will submit all deliverables for each task to the Department's Grant Manager on or before the Task Due Date listed in the Project Timeline. The Grantee must also submit Exhibit A, Progress Report Form, to the Department's Grant Manager, with every deliverable and payment request. For interim payment requests, Exhibit A may serve as the deliverable for a task. The Department's Grant Manager will review the deliverable(s) to verify that they meet the specifications in the Grant Work Plan and the task description, to include any work being performed by any subcontractor(s). Upon review and written acceptance by the Department's Grant Manager of deliverables under the task, the Grantee may proceed with payment request submittal.

CONSEQUENCES FOR NON-PERFORMANCE: For each task deliverable not received by the Department at one hundred percent (100%) completion and by the specified due date listed in the Agreement's most recent Project Timeline, the Department will reduce the relevant Task Funding Amount(s) paid to Grantee in proportion to the percentage of the deliverable(s) not fully completed and/or submitted to the Department in a timely manner.

PAYMENT REQUEST SCHEDULE: Following the Grantee's full completion of a task, the Grantee may submit a payment request for cost reimbursement using both Exhibit A, Progress Report Form, and Exhibit C, Payment Request Summary Form. Interim payment requests cannot be made more frequently than monthly and must be made using Exhibit A, detailing all work progress made during that payment request period, and Exhibit C. Upon the Department's receipt of Exhibit A and C, along with all supporting fiscal documentation and deliverables, the Department's Grant Manager will have ten (10) working days to review and approve or deny the payment request.

- If the Agreement exceeds \$35,000.00, and if Grantee is acting on behalf of Department in its performance of services under the Agreement, Grantee must allow public access to all documents, papers, letters, or other material, regardless of the physical form, characteristics, or means of transmission, made or received by Grantee in conjunction with the Agreement (Public Records), unless the Public Records are exempt from section 24(a) of Article I of the Florida Constitution or section 119.07(1), F.S.
- The Department may unilaterally terminate the Agreement if Grantee refuses to allow public access to Public Records as required by law.
- 2. Additional Public Records Duties of Section 119.0701, F.S., If Applicable.
 - For the purposes of this paragraph, the term "contract" means the "Agreement." If Grantee is a "contractor" as defined in section 119.0701(1)(a), F.S., the following provisions apply and the contractor shall:
- Keep and maintain Public Records required by Department to perform the service.
- Upon request, provide Department with a copy of requested Public Records or allow the Public Records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119, F.S., or as otherwise provided by law.
- A contractor who fails to provide the Public Records to Department within a reasonable time may be subject to penalties under section 119.10, F.S.
- d. Ensure that Public Records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from Public Records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the contract if the contractor does not transfer the Public Records to Department.
- Upon completion of the contract, transfer, at no cost, to Department all Public Records in possession of the contractor or keep and maintain Public Records required by Department to perform the service. If the contractor transfers all Public Records to Department upon completion of the contract, the contractor shall destroy any duplicate Public Records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from Public Records disclosure requirements. If the contractor keeps and maintains Public Records upon completion of the contract, the contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining Public Records. - Permits. The Grantee acknowledges that receipt of this grant does not imply nor guarantee that a federal, state, or local permit will be issued for a particular activity. The Grantee agrees to ensure that all necessary permits are obtained prior to implementation of any grant-funded activity that may fall under applicable federal, state, or local laws. Further, the Grantee shall abide by all terms and conditions of each applicable permit for any grant-funded activity. Upon request, the Grantee must provide a copy of all acquired and approved permits for the project.
- 2. <u>Ineligibility</u>. If the Grantee fails to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement; Attachment 3 (Grant Work Plan), and all other applicable attachments and exhibits, the Grantee shall be ineligible to be considered for funding under the Resilient Florida Program for two (2) consecutive funding cycles. The Department shall make its determination of ineligibility within thirty (30) days of this Agreement's end date and notify the Grantee in writing if determined ineligible. If the failure to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement is due to the Grantee's contractor or subcontractor(s), then the Grantee should submit that documentation in writing to the Department's Grant Manager.
- 3. Additional Documentation for Contractual Costs. In addition to the documentation requirements in paragraph 11 of Attachment 2 (Subcontracting), and in paragraph 9.c. of Attachment 1 (Contractual Costs (Subcontractors)), Grantee shall provide the following for all subcontractual agreements that the Grantee executes for this project:
 - a. A valid link or documentation that outlines their entity's procurement processes as required in Attachment 1, paragraph 9.c; and
 - b. A certification statement signed by the Grantee's designated grant manager indicating the procurement process that was utilized per their entities' policies and procedures for all subcontractors. The certification must include a listing of all subcontractor quotes/bids amounts, along with the company name, address, and the details of how and why they made their determinations for those subcontractors that were selected and utilized for this Agreement.
- 4. <u>Attachment 3, Grant Work Plan, Performance Measures.</u> All deliverables and reports submitted to the Department should be submitted electronically and must be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act, also known as "508 Compliant," in all formats provided.
- 5. <u>Copyright, Patent and Trademark.</u> The Department reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use, for state government purposes:
 - a. The copyright in any work developed under this Agreement; and
 - b. Any rights or copyright to which the Grantee or subcontractor purchases ownership with grant support.
- 6. Grant funds may not be used to support ongoing efforts to comply with legal requirements, including permit conditions, mitigation, and settlement agreements.
- 7. <u>Funding Source.</u> With the exception of audiovisuals not intended for presentation to the general public that are produced either as research instruments or for documenting experimentation or findings (unless otherwise required under the special terms of this Agreement), Grantee agrees to include the Department's logo (which

can be found on the Department's website at: https://floridadep.gov or by contacting the Grant Manager for a copy) on all publications, printed reports, maps, audiovisuals (including videos, slides, and websites), and similar materials, as well as the following language:

The views, statements, findings, conclusions, and recommendations expressed herein are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect the views of the State of Florida or any of its subagencies."

8. <u>Final Project Report</u>. The Grantee shall submit Exhibit F, Final Project Report Form, prior to requesting final payment. The Final Project Report may be submitted in lieu of the final quarterly status report, only in instances where the next quarterly report falls after the project's completion date.

ATTACHMENT 8

Contract Provisions for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) Agreements

The Department, as a Non-Federal Entity as defined by 2 CFR §200.69, shall comply with the following provisions, where applicable. For purposes of this Grant Agreement between the Department and the Grantee, the term "Recipient" shall mean "Grantee."

Further, the Department, as a pass-through entity, also requires the Grantee to pass on these requirements to all lower tier subrecipients/contractors, and to comply with the provisions of the award, the SLFRF implementing regulation, including applicable provisions of the OMB Uniform Guidance (2 CFR Part 200), and all associated terms and conditions. Therefore, Grantees must include these requirements in all related subcontracts and/or sub-awards. Grantees can include these requirements by incorporating this Attachment in the related subcontract and/or sub-awards, however for all such subcontracts and sub-awards, the Grantee shall assume the role of the Non-Federal Entity and the subrecipients shall assume the role of the Recipient.

2 CFR PART 200 APPENDIX 2 REQUIREMENTS

1. Administrative, Contractual, and Legal Remedies

The following provision is required if the Agreement is for more than \$150,000. In addition to any of the remedies described elsewhere in the Agreement, if the Recipient materially fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this Contract, including any Federal or State statutes, rules, or regulations, applicable to this Contract, the Non-Federal Entity may take one or more of the following actions.

- A. Temporarily withhold payments pending correction of the deficiency by the Recipient.
- B. Disallow (that is, deny both use of funds and any applicable matching credit for) all or part of the cost of the activity or action not in compliance.
- C. Wholly or partly suspend or terminate this Contract.
- D. Take other remedies that may be legally available.

The remedies identified above, do not preclude the Recipient from being subject to debarment and suspension under Presidential Executive Orders 12549 and 12689. The Non-Federal entity shall have the right to demand a refund, either in whole or part, of the funds provided to the Recipient for noncompliance with the terms of this Agreement.

2. <u>Termination for Cause and Convenience</u>

Termination for Cause and Convenience are addressed elsewhere in the Agreement.

3. Equal Opportunity Clause

The following provision applies if the agreement meets the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" as defined by 41 CFR Part 60-1.3:

During the performance of this Agreement, the Recipient agrees as follows:

- A. The Recipient will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The Recipient will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following:
 - i. Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Recipient agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- B. The Recipient will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Recipient, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.
- C. The Recipient will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's

- essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the Recipient's legal duty to furnish information.
- D. The Recipient will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other Agreement or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of the Recipient's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- E. The Recipient will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- F. The Recipient will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- G. In the event of the Recipient's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this Agreement or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this Agreement may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Recipient may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- H. The Recipient will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Recipient will take such action with respect to any subcontractor purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance.

4. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act

Where applicable, if the Agreement is in excess of \$100,000 and involves the employment of mechanics or laborers, the Recipient must comply with 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under 40 U.S.C. 3702 of the Act, each Recipient must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous, or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.

5. Rights to Inventions Made Under Agreement

If the Federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 CFR §401.2 (a) and the Non-Federal Entity or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the Non-Federal Entity or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.

6. Clean air Act (42 U.S. C. 7401-7671q.), the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387), and EPA Regulations

If the Agreement is in excess of \$100,000, the Recipient shall comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387), and by the EPA (40 CFR Part 15). Violations must be reported to the

Federal Awarding Agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

- i. The Grantee shall include these requirements for the Clean Air Act and the Federal Water Pollution Act in each subcontract exceeding \$100,000 financed in whole or in part with SLFRF funds.

Summary

This resolution authorizes the City to utilize the Dennis Project to implement the City's S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) programs for youth, in an amount not to exceed \$29,000.00 for Fiscal Year 2026.

Staff Recommendation

Background:

The City of Lauderdale Lakes launched a pilot Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math (S.T.E.A.M) program for youth ages 6 to 18, which ran from October 2024 to March 2025 and utilized ARPA loss revenue allocation funds. This initiative provided hands-on learning experiences in robotics, coding, engineering, digital arts, and scientific exploration, fostering critical thinking and problem-solving skills among participants. The program successfully engaged youth in high-quality educational activities that prepared them for future academic and career opportunities in STEAM-related fields. This was a successful program that had a positive impact on the community. A total of \$24,000 was utilized for the pilot program's duration.

At the February 12, 2024, Commission Workshop, staff presented an overview of the pilot program, highlighting its positive outcomes. During this discussion, the Commission was also presented with a request to reappropriate Human Services funding to support the program.

Request: Staff is seeking approval from the Commission to enter into a contract with The Dennis Project to continue the STEAM program for Fiscal Year 2026, totaling \$30,000. This extension will allow the program to expand its impact and continue providing valuable educational opportunities for youth in the community. The extended program will incorporate additional advanced coursework, mentorship opportunities, and industry partnerships to further enhance the learning experience. It is recommended that the City Commission approve the continuation of the STEAM program into FY26, including authorizing staff to enter into the necessary contractual agreement with The Dennis Project.

We envision all underrepresented youth with access to a seat at the table in STEM innovation.

TDP began with a passion to provide accessible, quality STEM programs in low-income neighborhoods and we provide the following outreach programs:

- Girls Represent in STEM: Girl-centered STEM learning
- Super STEM Explorers: Co-ed STEM outreach for youth in K-12
- Game Changers Teen Enrichment: Provides employability, college readiness, and soft skills training to teens and young adults.
- Fathers Stepping Up Fatherhood Initiative: Inspires men to become committed, involved dads.
- Train-the-Trainer and Technical Assistance: Increases the STEM capacity of informal educators to facilitate engaging STEM and family programming.

Summary

This resolution authorizes the execution of the Uniform Collection Agreement for Non-Ad Valorem Assessments between the City and The Honorable Abbey Ajayi, Broward County's first Constitutional Tax Collector.

Staff Recommendation

Background:

Pursuant to Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, local governments may utilize the Uniform Method for the levy, collection, and enforcement of non-ad valorem assessments. This method allows such assessments to be included on the annual property tax bill, promoting administrative efficiency and improving collection rates.

The City has long participated in this method through agreements with Broward County for the collection of assessments related to:

- Fire Rescue (since 1997)
- Solid Waste and Stormwater (since 2001)

As of 2025, Broward County transitioned to a Constitutional Tax Collector system, and The Honorable Abbey Ajayi was elected as the County's first Constitutional Tax Collector. As a result, a new Uniform Collection Agreement must be executed in order to continue participation in this collection method for FY 2025-26.

City staff recommends that the City Commission authorize execution of the Uniform Collection Agreement to allow the Broward County Tax Collector to collect the City's Fire, Solid Waste, and Stormwater assessments via the annual property tax bill. This agreement ensures that collected funds are remitted directly to the City in a timely and efficient manner.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of Lauderdale Lakes ("City Commission") on December 19, 1996, adopted Resolution 96-51, providing for and conveying the City's intent to use the uniform method of collecting the non-ad valorem assessment for the City's fire and other public safety services commencing FY October 1, 1997, primarily because such method, pursuant to section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, would provide for a continuing annual collection of special assessment beginning November 1, 2001, for the all property located with the city's jurisdiction as more specifically set forth in the legal description attached to said Resolution, which authorized the City's fire and other public safety services special assessment, and;

WHEREAS, the City Commission, on January 23, 2001, adopted Resolution 01-026, and Resolution 01-025 providing for and conveying the City's intent to use the uniform method of collecting the non-ad valorem assessment for the City's stormwater utility services and solid waste services, respectively, and primarily because such method, pursuant to section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, would provide for a continuing annual collection of special assessment beginning November 1, 2001, for the all property located with the city's jurisdiction as more specifically set forth in the legal description attached to said Resolution, and;

WHEREAS, historically thought 2025, the Broward County Department of Finance and Administrative Services served as the tax collector for Broward County under Article IV of the Broward County Charter;

WHEREAS, an amendment to the Florida Constitution was approved by the state's electorate to require that all designated Constitutional Officers, including Tax Collectors, be elected officials;

WHEREAS, in November 2024 general election, the electors of Broward County elected the Honorable Abbey Ajayi as the Broward County Tax Collector ("County Tax Collector") and she was thereafter sworn into office on January 7, 2025, and;

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the fact that the City has previously entered into an agreement with Broward County providing for the uniform collection of the City's non-ad valorem special assessments by the Broward County Department of Finance and Administrative Services, Broward County's legal authority or obligation to provide for the collection and remittance of the City's non-ad valorem assessment has terminated by virtue of the election of the County Tax Collector and;

WHEREAS, at its duly published and noticed meeting on July 22, 2025, the City Commission passed and adopted Resolutions 2025-093, Resolution 2025-094 and Resolutions 2025-095, respectively providing for and authorizing special assessments for stormwater utility rates, solid waste assessment rate and Fire-Rescue assessment rate, in full accordance with section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, and;

WHEREAS, the County Tax Collector's proposed Agreement provides for, among other things, reimbursement to the Tax Collector for the actual costs of collection of the non-ad

valorem assessments, which reimbursement amount may not exceed two (2) percent of the amount of the Assessments collected and remitted, and is such reimbursement is authorized pursuant to Section 197.3632(8)(c), Florida Statutes;

WHEREAS, the County Tax Collector's proposed Agreement further provides for reimbursement to the Tax Collector for necessary administrative costs associated with the collection and enforcement of the Assessments by the Tax Collector under the uniform methodology, which is authorized in accordance with Section 197.3632(2), Florida Statutes, and Rule 12D18.004(2), Florida Administrative Code. Administrative cost may include but is not limited to, those costs associated with personnel, forms, supplies, data processing, computer equipment, postage and programming.

WHEREAS, the City Commission has determined that entering into the Agreement with the County Tax Collector is necessary, appropriate and in the best interest of the City of Lauderdale Lakes, including its residents, businesses and visitors, for the primary public purpose of providing for the continuation of a uniform collection and remittance of the City's above-referenced non-ad valorem special assessment in accordance with section 197.3632, F.S.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF RECITALS: The foregoing RECITALS are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true, and the same are hereby made a part of this Resolution.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY: The City Commission hereby approve and authorizes the Mayor and City Clerk to execute and attest, respectively that certain Agreement for Uniform Collection of Non-Ad Valorem Special Assessments by and between the City and the Honorable

Abbey Ajayi, Broward County Tax Collector, in substantially the form and content as the draft Agreement attached to this Resolution hereto as **Exhibit A**, and incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 3. INSTRUCTIONS: The City Commission hereby instructs the City Manager, by and through the City Clerk to forthwith transmit a copy of this Resolution, including the executed Agreement for Uniform Collection of Non-Ad Valorem Special Assessments to the Broward County Tax Collector.

SECTION 4. CONFLICTS: All resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of any such conflict.

SECTION 5. SEVERANCE: If any clause, section, other part or application of this Resolution is held by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, in part or application, it shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of this Resolution.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon passage and adoption by the City Commission.

AGREEMENT FOR UNIFORM COLLECTION OF NON-AD VALOREM SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this day of
2025, by and between the City of Lauderdale Lakes ("City"), whose address is 4300 NW
36 th Street, Lauderdale Lakes, Florida 33319 and the Honorable Abbey Ajayi, the state-
constitution Tax Collector in and for the Broward County political subdivision, whose
address is 115 S. Andrews Avenue, A100, Fort Lauderdale, Florida 33301 ("Tax Collector")

SECTION I Purpose

- 1. The City is authorized to impose and to levy, and by appropriate Resolution has expressed its intent to use the statutory uniform methodology form of collection of, non-ad valorem assessments for certain projects or improvements ("Assessments"), by Chapter 76-441, as amended, Laws of Florida, Sections 197.3631, 197.3632 and 197.3635, Florida Statutes, and rules adopted by the City, and other applicable provision of law.
- 2. The purpose of this Agreement is to establish the terms and conditions under which the Tax Collector shall, pursuant to Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, collect and enforce those certain non-ad valorem special assessments imposed and levied by City.
- 3. City acknowledges that the Tax Collector has no duty, authority or responsibility in the imposition and levy of any non-ad valorem assessments, including the City's "Assessments," and that it is the sole responsibility and duty of the City to follow

all procedural and substantive requirements for the imposition and levy of constitutionally lienable non-ad valorem assessments, including the Assessments.

SECTION II Term

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon execution, effective for 2025, and shall continue and extend uninterrupted from year-to-year, automatically renewed for successive periods not to exceed one (1) year each, unless the City shall inform the Tax Collector, as well as Property Appraiser and the Department of Revenue, by January 10th of that calendar year, that the City intends to discontinue to use the uniform methodology for such Assessments using form DR-412 promulgated by the Florida Department of Revenue.

SECTION III <u>Duties and Responsibilities of City</u>

The City shall:

- 1. Reimburse the Tax Collector for the actual costs of collection of the non-ad valorem assessments, which reimbursement amount will not exceed two (2) percent of the amount of the Assessments collected and remitted pursuant to Section 197.3632(8)(c), Florida Statutes;
- 2. Reimburse Tax Collector for necessary administrative costs for the collection and enforcement of the Assessments by the Tax Collector under the uniform methodology, pursuant to Section 197.3632(2), Florida Statutes, and Rule 12D-18.004(2), Florida Administrative Code, to include, but not be limited to, those costs associated with personnel, forms, supplies, data processing, computer equipment, postage and programming.

- 3. Pay for or alternatively reimburse the Tax Collector for any separate tax bill (not the tax notice) necessitated by any subsequent inability of the Tax Collector to merge the non-ad valorem special assessment roll as certified pursuant to Section 197.3532(7), Florida Statutes, and Rule 12D-18.004(2) Florida Administrative Code.
- 4. Upon being billed timely, pay directly for necessary advertising relating to implementation of the uniform non-ad valorem special assessment law pursuant to Sections 197.3632 and 197.3635, Florida statutes, and Rule 12D-18.004(2), Florida Administrative Code.
- 5. Timely certify the applicable non-ad valorem assessment roll to the Tax Collector in accordance with the requirements of Section 197.3632(10), Florida Statutes, and Rule 12D-18.006, Florida Administrative Code.
- 6. To the extent provided by law, indemnify and hold harmless Tax Collector to the extent of any legal action which may be filed in local, state or federal courts or administrative agency against Tax Collector regarding the imposition, levy, roll preparation and certification of the Assessments; City shall pay for or reimburse Tax Collector for fees and costs (including attorney's fees and costs) for services rendered by the Tax Collector with regard to any such legal action.

SECTION IV <u>Duties of the Tax Collector</u>

- 1. The Tax Collector shall take all actions legally required to collect the Assessments pursuant in accordance with Chapter 197, Florida Statutes.
- 2. The Tax Collector agrees to cooperate with the City in implementation of the uniform methodology for collecting Assessments pursuant to and as limited by Sections 197.3632 and 197.3635, Florida Statutes.

3. If the Tax Collector discovers errors or omissions on such roll, Tax Collector may request that the City file a corrected roll or a correction of the amount of any assessment. The City shall bear the cost of any such error or omission.

4. Tax Collector hereby agrees to accept Intent Resolution Nos. 95-51, 01-025, and 01-026 attached hereto and incorporated as part of this agreement as Composite Exhibit A, as required by Section 197.3632(3)(a), Florida Statutes.

SECTION VI Miscellaneous

1. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter contained herein and may not be amended, modified or rescinded, except in writing and signed by the parties hereto.

2. Should any provision of this Agreement be declared to be invalid, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

3. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida.

4. This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which together will constitute but one and the same instrument.

AGREEMENT made this Agreement day of Agreement 1996, between WILLIAM MARKHAM, as Broward County Property Appraiser ("Markham"), and The City of Lauderdale Lakes, Florida, a municipal corporation, ("City").

- 1. City desires to develop and implement a non ad valorem assessment roll for the year 1996 and succeeding years, to provide funds from property owners within the City for Emergency Medical Service (EMS) purposes. The City desires to use the services of Markham to create and maintain a non ad valorem tax roll, and Markham is prepared to do so on behalf of City. Each party represents that it has satisfied all conditions precedent necessary to enter into this agreement.
- 2. Markham agrees to perform the following services for City:
- A. Create a Non Ad Valorem Assessment Roll for the City for the year 1996 and each succeeding year until this agreement is terminated by either of the parties thereto, using data presently in his computer as to the property characteristics the City intends to use for purposes of levying the non ad valorem assessments. Should the City desire to use additional property characteristics than those already in the computer records, to advise City whether this is possible, when it can be accomplished, and the cost of so doing.
- B. Provide the City with an annual preliminary estimate of each type of property within the City (e.g., single family residential, vacant land, condominium, etc.) for the City's planning purposes in establishing its non ad valorem assessments.
- C. Receive from the City its preliminary non ad valorem assessment levy for each type of property and preliminarily extend that amount against each parcel of real property within the City.
- D. Furnish the City with a machine-readable and paper copy of the Non Ad Valorem Roll when such preliminary amounts have been extended.
- E. Include the City's non ad valorem tax levy in the TRIM notice sent to each property owner in August of each year.
- F. Receive from the City corrections to the roll and update the Non Ad Valorem Tax Roll with the changed and corrected information.
- G. Provide the City's Uniform Non Ad Valorem Assessment Roll to the Broward County Revenue Collector's office so that the tax bills mailed on or about November 1 will include

the amount for the City's assessment levies.

- 3. City agrees to perform the following acts in connection with this agreement:
- A. Advise the property owners within the City in an appropriate and lawful manner of the City's intention to utilize the uniform non ad valorem assessment method described in Sections 197.3631 through 197.3635. Florida Statutes. Carry out its responsibilities under said sections.
- B. Timely provide the Property Appraiser with information required to prepare the Uniform Non Ad Valorem Assessment Roll.
- C. Establish an appropriate appeal process for property owners who wish to contest the classification of their property or amounts of uniform non ad valorem assessments.
- D. Advise the property owners within the City as appropriate that the Property Appraiser's office is acting in a ministerial capacity for the City in connection with the non ad valorem assessments.
- E. Timely pay the Property Appraiser the necessary administrative costs incurred in carrying out his functions under this agreement, including but not limited to those costs associated with personnel, forms, supplies, data processing, computer equipment, postage and programming.
- 4. The parties understand that the Property Appraiser's best estimate of set up costs for the year 1996 are \$.30 per parcel of real estate (folio number) and that estimated annual maintenance costs are \$.15 per parcel for the year 1997. The parties understand that this estimate does not include any amounts for extraordinary programming or other services required by the City.
- 5. The parties understand the following as the appropriate time frame for the duties to be performed under this Agreement:

City to notify Property Appraiser of its intention to use the Property Appraiser's services to provide a uniform non ad valorem assessment roll: Fifteen days from date.

Signed agreement: Thirty days from date.

Property Appraiser to provide the City with number of units of each type of property within the City, as requested by the City:

June 1.

City to provide the Property Appraiser with the preliminary non ad valorem assessment for each type of property within the City according to the categories furnished by the Property Appraiser's office: June 1.

Property Appraiser to furnish notice to each property owner within the City of the proposed uniform non ad valorem assessments: Included in the TRIM notice sent according to Chapter 200, Florida Statutes.

City appeal process completed: No later than October 1.

City to furnish Property Appraiser with changes and corrections to the Uniform non Ad Valorem Assessment Roll: October 1.

City to furnish Property Appraiser with final assessment rates for each category of property: October 1.

Property Appraiser to turn Uniform Non Ad Valorem Roll to Broward County Revenue Collector for collection: Together with City's Ad Valorem Tax Roll.

6. TERMINATION This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon written notice by the terminating party to the other party, providing for termination for the succeeding year. notice shall be sent no later than January 1 of the year. Markham will perform no further work after the written termination notice is received.



(+/-10) flex pave fitness trail with the purchase and installation of fitness stations with equipment, bike racks, benches, and a water fountain. WHEREAS, the CITY desires to retain a CONTRACTOR for the Project as expressed in its Invitation to Bid No. ITB25-6310-21B for Otis Gray Park Improvement project, which closed on September 26, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR has expressed its willingness and capability to perform the necessary work to accomplish the Project.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 - DEFINITIONS

Wherever used in this Agreement or in the other Contract Documents, the following terms have the meanings indicated which are applicable to both the singular and plural forms:

- **1.1** Agreement The written agreement between CITY and CONTRACTOR covering the Work to be performed including other Contract Documents that are attached to or incorporated in the Agreement. Also referred to as "Contract".
- **1.2** Change Order A document which is signed by the CITY and authorizes an addition, deletion or revision in the Work within the general scope of this Agreement, or an adjustment in the Term or Compensation, issued on or after the Effective Date of the Agreement.
- **1.3** CITY The City of Lauderdale Lakes or its authorized agents, inspectors or representatives acting within the scope of duties entrusted to them by the CITY.
- 1.4 <u>Contractor</u> The individual, partnership, corporation, joint-venture, or other legal entity with whom the CITY has entered into the Agreement.
- **1.5** <u>Contract Documents</u> The Contract Documents shall consist of the Drawings, Plans and Specifications, Notice to Proceed, Certificate(s) of Insurance, Payment and Performance Bonds and any additional documents which are required to be submitted under the Contract, and all amendments, modifications and supplements, change orders and work directive changes issued on or after the effective date of the Agreement.
- **1.6 Drawings** The drawings which show the character and scope of the Work to be performed and which are referred to in the Contract Documents.
- 1.7 Engineer The CITY'S Engineer of the City of Lauderdale Lakes, Florida, or the authorized agents,

inspectors or representatives acting within the scope of duties entrusted to them by the CITY.

- **1.8** <u>Notice to Proceed</u> A written notice given by CITY to CONTRACTOR fixing the date on which the Work shall commence and the CONTRACTOR begins to perform its obligations under the Contract Documents.
- **1.9 Specifications** Those portions of the Contract Documents consisting of written technical descriptions of materials, equipment, construction systems, standards and workmanship regarding the project.
- **1.10** Worksite Location(s) inclusive of each site described in the plans and/or specifications.

ARTICLE 2 - CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

2.1 Enumeration of Contract Documents:

The Contract Documents comprise the entire agreement between CITY and CONTRACTOR and consist of the following:

- (1) This Agreement.
- (2) Construction performance bond.
- (3) Construction payment bond.
- (4) Insurance certificate(s) per ITB requirements.
- (5) Notice of Award and Notice to Proceed.
- (6) Request for Proposal and the Specifications prepared by the CITY (Exhibit 1)
- (7) CONTRACTOR's Response to the CITY's Invitation to Bid No. **ITB25-6310-21B** dated September 26, 2025 (Exhibit 2).
- (8) Schedule of Prices.
- (9) Standard General Conditions of the Construction contract for the City of Lauderdale Lakes Florida (Exhibit 3).

Any amendments executed by the CITY and the CONTRACTOR shall become part of this Agreement. Documents not included in this Article do not, and shall not, form any part of this Agreement. In the event of any conflict between the documents or any ambiguity or missing specification or instruction, the following priority is established:

- a. Specific direction from the City Commission (or designee).
- b. This Agreement dated 2025.
- c. Exhibit 1. Invitation to ITB25-6310-21B
- d. Exhibit 2. Bid submitted September 26, 2025
- e. Exhibit 3. Standard General Conditions of the Construction Contract.

2.2 Conflict, Error or Discrepancy:

If, during the performance of the Work, CONTRACTOR finds a conflict, error or discrepancy in the Contract Documents, CONTRACTOR shall so report to the CITY, in writing at once and, before proceeding with the Work affected, shall obtain a written interpretation or clarification from CITY.

2.3 Representation of CONTRACTOR:

Execution of the Contract by the CONTRACTOR is a representation that CONTRACTOR has visited the Work site and is familiar with the local conditions under which the Work is to be performed.

ARTICLE 3 - SCOPE OF WORK

The CONTRACTOR shall furnish all labor, materials and equipment and perform all the necessary work in the manner and form provided in the contract documents.

ARTICLE 4 - TERM

The Work to be performed under this Agreement shall commence upon the date specified in the Notice to Proceed and. subject authorized adjustments, shall be completed to than one (1) year after the execution of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR agrees that all Work under this Agreement shall be pursued on schedule, diligently and uninterrupted at a rate of progress which will ensure full completion within the agreed term. Failure to achieve timely, substantial and/or final completion shall be regarded as a material breach of this Agreement, and shall be subject to the appropriate remedies including but not limited to liability for liquidated damages in accordance with Article 10.

ARTICLE 5 - COMPENSATION

CITY shall pay CONTRACTOR for the performance of all work, in accordance with Article 13, subject to additions and deductions by Change Order as provided in this Agreement, up to <u>Eight Hundred and Thirty-Nine Thousand and Fifty Dollars and No/100 (\$839,050.00)</u>. Compensation for future performance and work must be approved by City Commission.

ARTICLE 6 - CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

6.1 Liability for Contracted Work:

As an inducement for CITY to enter into this Agreement, CONTRACTOR has represented an expertise in professional construction of public construction projects by qualified and licensed general construction contractors. In reliance upon those representations, CITY hired CONTRACTOR to construct the Project. CONTRACTOR shall be liable for any defective or negligent work, whether patent or latent, and/ or any negligence, strict liability or breach of other legal duty.

6.2 Shop Drawings and Samples:

- **6.2.1** CONTRACTOR shall submit to CITY for review and approval five (5) copies of all Shop Drawings for all equipment, apparatus, machinery, fixtures, piping, wiring, fabricated structures and manufactured articles seven (7) calendar days before the scheduled commencement of the construction work. The purpose of the Shop Drawing is to show the suitability, efficiency, technique of manufacture, installation requirements, details of the item and evidence of compliance with the Contract Documents. The data shown on the Shop Drawings will be complete with respect to quantities, dimensions, specified performance and design criteria, materials and similar data to enable CITY to review the information as required.
- **6.2.2** CONTRACTOR shall also submit to CITY, for review and approval, all samples required by the Contract Documents which shall clearly identify material, supplier, pertinent data such as catalog numbers and the intended use.
- **6.2.3** Before submission of each Shop Drawing or sample, CONTRACTOR shall have determined and verified all quantities, dimensions, specified performance criteria, installation requirements, materials, catalog numbers and similar data and reviewed or coordinated each Shop Drawing or sample with other Shop Drawings and samples and with the requirements of the Work and the Contract Documents.
- **6.2.4** At the time of each submission, CONTRACTOR shall give CITY specific written notice of each variation that the Shop Drawings or samples may have from the requirements of the Contract Documents, and, in addition, shall specifically note each variation on each Shop Drawing submitted for review and approval. Failure by the CITY to notice or identify CONTRACTOR's failure to make the notation shall not relieve CONTRACTOR from the responsibility to comply with the Contract Documents.
- **6.2.5** Approval of the Shop Drawings by CITY shall be general and shall not relieve CONTRACTOR of responsibility for the accuracy of such drawings nor for the proper fittings and construction of the Work, nor for the furnishing of material or work required by the Agreement and not indicated on the drawings. No work called for by any Shop Drawing shall be done until the drawings have been approved by CITY.

6.3 Supervision:

CONTRACTOR shall supervise and direct the Work competently and efficiently, devoting such attention and applying CONTRACTOR's best skill, attention and expertise. CONTRACTOR shall be solely responsible for and have control over the means, methods, techniques, sequences and procedures of construction. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that the finished Work complies accurately with the Contract Documents.

6.4 On Site Management:

CONTRACTOR shall keep on the Work site at all times during its progress a competent on-site manager and any necessary personnel who shall not be replaced without written notice to CITY unless the personnel proves to be unsatisfactory to CONTRACTOR or to the CITY. The on-site Manager shall be CONTRACTOR's representative at the site and shall have authority to act on behalf of CONTRACTOR. All communications given to the on-site Manager shall be as binding as if given to CONTRACTOR.

6.5 Labor:

- **6.5.1** Construction services shall be performed by qualified construction contractors licensed to do business in the State of Florida. Suppliers shall be selected and paid by the CONTRACTOR; the CITY reserves the right to approve all suppliers and materials.
- **6.5.2** CONTRACTOR shall provide and pay for competent, suitably qualified personnel to perform the work as required by the Contract Documents. CONTRACTOR shall not permit employment of unfit persons or persons not skilled in tasks assigned to them. CONTRACTOR shall at all times maintain good discipline and order at the Work site. Except in connection with the safety or protection of persons, the Work, or property adjacent to the site, and except as otherwise indicated in the Contract Documents, all Work at the site shall be performed during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. CONTRACTOR will not permit overtime Work or the performance of Work on Saturday, Sunday or any legal holiday without CITY's written consent.

6.6 Materials:

- **6.6.1** Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall furnish, pay for and assume full responsibility for all materials, equipment, transportation, machinery, tools, appliances, water, heat, utilities and all other facilities and services necessary for the furnishing, performance, testing, start-up and proper completion of the Work.
- **6.6.2** CONTRACTOR warrants that all materials and equipment shall be of good quality and new, unless otherwise provided in the Contract Documents and that the work will be free from defects whether patent or latent in nature. All materials and equipment shall be applied, installed, connected, erected, used, cleaned and conditioned in accordance with the instructions of the applicable supplier except as otherwise provided in the Contract Documents.

6.7 Subcontractors, Suppliers and Others:

- **6.7.1** Prior to the execution of this Agreement and in any event prior to the commencement of any work, CONTRACTOR shall furnish, in writing to the CITY, the names of persons or entities (including those who are to furnish materials or equipment fabricated to a special design) proposed for each principal portion of the Work. CITY shall advise CONTRACTOR, in writing, of any proposed person or entity to which CITY has an objection. CONTRACTOR shall not contract with a proposed person or entity to whom CITY has made an objection. If CITY objects to a person or entity proposed by CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall propose another to whom CITY has no objection. CONTRACTOR shall not change a subcontractor, person or entity previously selected if CITY makes objection to the change.
- **6.7.2** CONTRACTOR shall be fully responsible to CITY for all acts and omissions of the CONTRACTOR, its employees, subcontractors, suppliers, other persons directly or indirectly employed by its subcontractors or suppliers, persons for whose acts any of them may be liable and any other persons or organizations performing or furnishing supplies under a direct or indirect Contract with CONTRACTOR. Nothing in the Contract Documents shall create any contractual relationship between CITY and any such Subcontractor, supplier or other person or organization, nor shall it create any obligation on the part of CITY.

to pay or to cause the payment of any money due any subcontractor, supplier, employee or agent except as may otherwise be required by law.

6.7.3 All Work performed for CONTRACTOR by a Subcontractor will be pursuant to an appropriate agreement between CONTRACTOR and the Subcontractor which specifically binds the Subcontractor to all applicable terms and conditions of the Contract Documents for the benefit of CITY.

6.8 Patent Fees and Royalties:

CONTRACTOR shall pay all license fees and royalties and assume all costs incident to the use of the license in the performance of the Work or the incorporation in the Work of any invention, design, process, product or device which is the subject of patent rights or copyrights held by others.

6.9 Permits:

CONTRACTOR shall obtain and pay for all permits and licenses and all related costs for inspection and administration. There will be no cost for permits issued by the CITY.

6.10 Compliance with Laws and Regulations:

CONTRACTOR shall comply with and give all notices required by laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and lawful orders of public authorities applicable to the performance of the Work. CITY shall not be responsible for monitoring CONTRACTOR's compliance with any laws and regulations. CONTRACTOR shall promptly notify CITY if the Contract Documents as observed by CONTRACTOR are at variance with applicable laws and regulations.

6.11 Risk of Loss; Ownership:

The risk of loss, injury or destruction shall be on CONTRACTOR until acceptance of the Work by CITY. Title to the Work shall pass to CITY upon acceptance of the Work by CITY.

6.12 Taxes:

CONTRACTOR shall pay all sales, consumer, use and other similar taxes. CONTRACTOR is responsible for reviewing the pertinent state laws and regulations involving such taxes and complying with all requirements.

6.13 Use of Premises:

- **6.13.1** CONTRACTOR shall confine equipment, the storage of materials and equipment and the operations of workers to the work site and areas identified in and permitted by the Contract Documents and shall not unreasonably encumber the premises with equipment or other materials. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for any damage to any land or areas or to the owner or occupant of any contiguous land or areas, resulting from the performance of the Work. Should any owner or occupant because of the performance of the Work make any claim against CITY, CONTRACTOR shall promptly attempt to settle with the claimant by agreement or otherwise resolve the claim.
- **6.13.2** During the progress of the Work, CONTRACTOR shall keep the premises free from accumulations of waste materials, rubbish and other debris resulting from the Work. At the completion of the Work, CONTRACTOR shall remove all waste materials, rubbish and debris from and about the premises as well as all tools, appliances, equipment and machinery, and surplus materials, and shall leave the site clean and ready for occupancy by CITY. CONTRACTOR shall restore to original condition all property not designated for alteration by the Contract Documents including fencing, parking lots and grounds.
- **6.13.3** CONTRACTOR shall not permit any part of any structure or land to be treated in any manner that will endanger the structure or any land, nor shall CONTRACTOR subject any part of the Work or adjacent property to stresses or processes that will endanger it.

6.14 Access to Work:

CONTRACTOR shall provide CITY, its consultants, representatives and personnel, independent testing laboratories and governmental agencies with jurisdictional interests with access to the work at reasonable times for their observation, inspection and testing. CONTRACTOR shall provide proper and safe conditions for access and shall advise these authorized persons of CONTRACTOR's site safety procedures and programs.

6.15 Safety and Protection:

6.15.1 CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with the Work to prevent damage, injury or loss to all employees on the work site and other persons and organizations who may be affected. This paragraph applies to all the Work, materials and equipment, whether in storage on or off the site; and other property at the site or adjacent to the site.

6.15.2 CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations of any public body having jurisdiction for the safety of persons or property or to protect them from damage, injury or loss.

6.16 Environmental:

The CONTRACTOR has fully inspected the worksite and agrees to accept the worksite in an "as is" physical condition, without representation or warranty by the CITY of any kind, including, without limitation, any and all existing environmental claims or obligations that may arise from the presence of any "contamination" on, in or about the worksite. Further CONTRACTOR and all entities claiming by, through or under CONTRACTOR, releases and discharges the CITY from any claim, demand, or cause of action arising out of or relating to the CONTRACTOR's use, handling, storage, release, discharge, treatment, removal, transportation, decontamination, cleanup, disposal and/or presence of any hazardous substances including asbestos on, under, from or about the worksite. The CONTRACTOR shall have no liability for any pre-existing claims or "contamination" on the worksite.

CONTRACTOR shall not use, handle, store, discharge, treat, remove, transport or dispose of Hazardous Substances including asbestos at, in, upon, under, to or from the worksite until receipt of instructions from the CITY. At such time, a CITY approved change order, which shall not include any profit, shall authorize the CONTRACTOR to perform such services.

CONTRACTOR shall immediately deliver to CITY complete copies of all notices, demands or other communications received by CONTRACTOR from any governmental or quasi-governmental authority or any insurance company or board of fire underwriters or like or similar entities regarding in any way alleged violations or potential violations of any Environmental Law or otherwise asserting the existence or potential existence of any condition or activity on the worksite which is or could be dangerous to life, limb, property or the environment.

CONTRACTOR indemnifies and agrees to protect, defend, and hold harmless, the CITY and its respective employees, agents, successors, and assigns from and against any and all claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, expenses, including but not limited to mitigation, restoration, and natural restoration expenses, liabilities, assessments, fines, penalties, charges, administrative and judicial proceedings and orders, judgments, causes of action, in law or in equity, remedial action requirements and/or enforcement actions of any kind (including, without limitation, attorneys' fees and costs) directly or indirectly arising out of or attributable to, in whole or in part, the CONTRACTOR's (or any of its employees, agents, invitees, contractors or sub-contractors) use, handling, storage, release, threatened release, discharge, treatment, removal, transportation, decontamination, cleanup, disposal and/or presence of a Hazardous Substance on, under, from, to or about the worksite or any other activity carried on or undertaken on or off the worksite by the CONTRACTOR or its employees, agents or subcontractors, in connection with the use, handling, storage, release, threatened release, discharge, treatment, mitigation, natural resource restoration, removal, transportation, decontamination, cleanup, disposal and/or presence or any Hazardous Substance located, transported, or present on, undue, from, to, or about the worksite. This indemnity is intended to be operable under 42 U.S.C. section 9607, as amended, and any successor section.

The scope of the indemnity obligations includes, but is not limited to: (a) all consequential damages; (b) the cost of any required or necessary repair, cleanup, or detoxification of the applicable real estate and the preparation and implementation of any closure, remedial or other required plan, including without limitation; (b) of 625

the costs of removal or remedial action incurred by the United States government or the State of Florida or response costs incurred by any other person, or damages from injury to, destruction of, or loss of, natural resources, including the cost of assessing such injury, destruction, or loss, incurred pursuant to the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, as amended; (ii) the clean-up costs, fines, damages, or penalties incurred pursuant to any applicable provisions of Florida law; and (iii) the cost and expenses of abatement, correction or cleanup, fines, damages, response costs, or penalties which arise from the provisions of any other statute, law, regulation, code, ordinance, or legal requirement, state or federal; and (c) liability for personal injury or property damage arising under any statutory or common law tort theory, including damages assessed for the maintenance of a public private nuisance, response costs, or for the carrying on of an abnormally dangerous activity.

The indemnification obligations contained herein are supported by separate consideration of \$10.00 which the proposer acknowledges as adequate.

6.17 Indemnification:

- 6.17.1 In addition to, CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the CITY, its officers, agents and employees, from or on account of all claims, damages, losses, liabilities and expenses, direct, indirect or consequential including but not limited to fees and charges of engineers. architects, attorneys, consultants and other professionals and court costs arising out of or in consequence of the performance of this Agreement at all trial and appellate levels. Indemnification shall specifically include but not be limited to claims, damages, losses, liabilities and expenses arising out of or from (a) the negligent or defective design of the project and Work of this Agreement; (b) any act, omission or default of the CONTRACTOR, its Subcontractors, agents, servants or employees; (c) any and all bodily injuries, sickness, disease or death; (d) injury to or destruction of tangible property, including any resulting loss of use; (e) other such damages, liabilities, or losses received or sustained by any person or persons during or on account of any operations connected with the construction of this Project including the warranty period; (f) the use of any improper materials; (g) any construction defect including both patent and latent defects; (h) failure to timely complete the work; (i) the violation of any federal, state, county or city laws, ordinances or regulations by CONTRACTOR, its subcontractors, agents, servants, independent contractors or employees; (j) the breach or alleged breach by CONTRACTOR of any term of the Contract, including the breach or alleged breach of any warranty or guarantee.
- **6.17.2** CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the CITY, its officers, agents and employees, from all damages, liabilities, losses, claims, fines and fees, and from any and all suits and actions of every name and description that may be brought against CITY, its officers, agents and employees, on account of any claims, fees, royalties, or costs for any invention or patent and/or for the infringement of any and all copyrights or patent rights claimed by any person, firm, or corporation.
- **6.17.3** CONTRACTOR shall pay all claims, losses, liens, settlements or judgments of any nature in connection with the foregoing indemnifications including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees and costs at trial and appellate levels.
- **6.17.4** If any Subcontractor, supplier, laborer, or materialmen of CONTRACTOR or any other person directly or indirectly acting for or through CONTRACTOR files or attempts to file a mechanic's or construction lien against the real property on which the work is performed or any part or against any personal property or improvements or make a claim against any monies due or to become due from the CITY to CONTRACTOR or from CONTRACTOR to a Subcontractor, for or on account of any work, labor, services, material, equipment, or other items furnished in connection with the Work or any change order, CONTRACTOR agrees to satisfy, remove, or discharge such lien or claim at its own expense by bond, payment, or otherwise within five (5) calendar days of the filing or from receipt of written notice from the CITY.

Additionally, until such time as such lien or claim is satisfied, removed or discharged by CONTRACTOR, all monies due to CONTRACTOR, or that become due to CONTRACTOR before the lien or claim is satisfied, removed or otherwise discharged, shall be held by CITY as security for the satisfaction, removal and discharge of such lien and any expense that may be incurred while obtaining the discharge. If CONTRACTOR shall fail to do so, CITY shall have the right, in addition to all other rights and remedies provided by this Agreement or by law, to satisfy, remove, or discharge such lien or claim by whatever means CITY chooses at the entire and sole cost and expense of CONTRACTOR which costs and expenses shall, without limitation, include attorney's fees, litigation costs, fees and expenses and all court costs and assessments, and which shall be deducted from any amount owing to CONTRACTOR. In the event the page 507 of 625

amount due CONTRACTOR is less than the amount required to satisfy CONTRACTOR'S obligation under this, or any other section of the Agreement, the CONTRACTOR shall be liable for the deficiency due the CITY.

6.18 Survival of Obligations:

All representations, indemnifications, warranties and guarantees made in, required by, or given in accordance with this Agreement, as well as all continuing obligations indicated in the Contract Documents, shall survive final payment, completion and acceptance of the work and termination or completion of the Agreement.

6.19 Correction or Removal of Defective Work:

If required by CITY, CONTRACTOR shall promptly correct all defective Work, whether or not fabricated, installed or completed, or, if the Work has been rejected by CITY, remove it from the site and replace it with non-defective Work. CONTRACTOR shall bear all direct, indirect and consequential costs for the correction or removal of defective work (including but not limited to fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys and other professionals).

If the work is defective, or CONTRACTOR fails to supply sufficient skilled workers or suitable materials or equipment, or fails to furnish or perform the Work in such a way that the completed Work will conform to the Contract Documents, CITY may order CONTRACTOR to stop the Work, or any portion, until the cause for such order has been eliminated; however, this right of CITY to stop the Work shall not give rise to any duty on the part of CITY to exercise this right for the benefit of CONTRACTOR or any other party.

6.20 Force Majeure:

No party shall hold the other responsible for damages or for delays in performance caused by force majeure, acts of God, or other acts or circumstances beyond the control of the other party or that could not have been reasonably foreseen and prevented. For this purpose, such acts or circumstances shall include, but not be limited to, weather conditions affecting performance, floods, epidemics, war, riots, strikes, lockouts, or other industrial disturbances, or protest demonstrations. Should such acts or circumstances occur, the parties shall use their best efforts to overcome the difficulties and to resume the Work as soon as reasonably possible with the normal pursuit of the Work.

Inclement weather, continuous rain for less than three (3) days or the acts or omissions of subcontractors, third-party contractors, materialmen, suppliers, or their subcontractors, shall not be considered acts of force majeure.

No party shall be liable for its failure to carry out its obligations under the Agreement during a period when such party is rendered unable by force majeure to carry out its obligation, but the obligation of the party or parties relying on such force majeure shall be suspended only during the continuance of the inability and for no longer period than the unexpected or uncontrollable event.

The CONTRACTOR further agrees and stipulates that its right to excuse its failure to perform by reason of force majeure shall be conditioned upon giving written notice of its assertion that a Force Majeure delay has commenced within two (2) hours after such an occurrence.

ARTICLE 7 - CITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

7.1 CITY shall furnish data required of CITY under the Contract Documents.

7.2 CITY shall make visits to the site at intervals appropriate to the various stages of construction to observe the progress and quality of the executed work and to determine, in general, if the Work is proceeding in accordance with the Contract Documents.

7.3 Technical Clarifications and Interpretations:

7.3.1 CITY shall issue, with reasonable promptness, such written clarifications or interpretations of the technical requirements of the Contract Documents as it may determine necessary, which shall be consistent with or reasonably inferable from the overall intent of the Contract Documents. Should CONTRACTOR follows

to request interpretation of questionable items in the Contract Documents, CITY shall not entertain any excuse for failure to execute the work in a satisfactory manner.

7.3.2 CITY shall interpret and decide matters concerning performance under the requirements of the Contract Documents, and shall make decisions on all claims, disputes or other matters in question. Written notice of each claim, dispute or other matter will be delivered by claimant to the other party but in no event later than five (5) days after the occurrence of the event, and written supporting data will be submitted to the other party within five (5) calendar days after such occurrence. All written decisions of the CITY on any claim or dispute will be final and binding.

ARTICLE 8 - BONDS AND INSURANCE

8.1 Payment and Performance Bonds:

- **8.1.1** Prior to commencing work, the CONTRACTOR shall execute and furnish to CITY a performance bond and a payment bond, in a form approved by the CITY and as provided by state law, each written by a corporate surety, having a resident agent in the State of Florida and having been in business with a record of successful continuous operation for at least five (5) years. The surety company shall have at least the following minimum qualification in accordance with the latest edition of A.M. Best's Insurance Guide, published by Alfred M. Best Company, Inc., Ambest Road, Oldwick, New Jersey 08858: B+ to A+.
- **8.1.2** The penal sum stated in each bond shall be the amount equal to the total amount payable under the terms of this Agreement. The performance bond shall be conditioned that the CONTRACTOR performs the contract in the time and manner prescribed in the Agreement. The payment bond shall be conditioned that the CONTRACTOR promptly makes payments to all persons who supply the CONTRACTOR with labor, materials and supplies used directly or indirectly by the CONTRACTOR in the performance of the Work provided for in this Agreement and any change orders and shall provide that the surety shall pay the amount not exceeding the sum provided in the bonds, together with interest at the maximum rate allowed by law and that the CONTRACTOR and surety shall indemnify and save harmless the CITY to the extent of any and all payments in connection with the performance of this Agreement which the CITY may be required to make by law.
- **8.1.3** Pursuant to the requirements of Section 255.05(1)(a), Florida Statutes, the CONTRACTOR shall record the payment and performance bonds in the public records of Broward County, at its own expense.

8.2 Bonds, Reduction After Final Payment:

The performance and payment bonds shall continue in effect for one (1) year after final payment becomes due except as otherwise provided by law or regulation or by the Contract Documents with the final sum of these bonds reduced after final payment to an amount equal to twenty five percent (25%) of the Agreed Compensation, or an additional bond shall be conditioned that CONTRACTOR shall correct any defective or faulty Work or material which appears within one (1) year after final completion of the Agreement, upon notification by the CITY.

8.3 Duty to Substitute Surety:

If the surety on any Bond furnished by CONTRACTOR is declared bankrupt or becomes insolvent or its right to do business is terminated in the State of Florida or it ceases to meet the requirements of other applicable laws or regulations, CONTRACTOR shall within three (3) days substitute another bond and surety, both of which must be acceptable to CITY. The CITY shall have the right to disapprove any CONTRACTOR or subcontractor selected by any surety.

8.4 Insurance:

8.4.1 At the time of execution of the Agreement, the CONTRACTOR shall submit certificate(s) of insurance evidencing the required coverage and specifically providing that the CITY is an additional, named, first party insured with respect to the required coverage and the operations of the CONTRACTOR under the Agreement. The certificates of insurance shall not only name the types of policies provided, but shall also specifically refer to this Agreement and shall state that the insurance is as required by Article 8 and its subparts of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not commence work under this Agreement until after

CONTRACTOR has obtained all of the minimum insurance described and the policies of such insurance detailing the provisions of coverage have been received and approved by CITY. CONTRACTOR shall not permit any subcontractor to begin work until after similar minimum insurance to cover subcontractor has been obtained and approved. In the event the insurance certificate provided indicates that the insurance shall terminate and lapse during the term of this Agreement, then in that event, CONTRACTOR shall furnish, at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to expiration of the date of the insurance, a renewed certificate of insurance as proof that equal and like coverage and extension is in effect. CONTRACTOR shall not continue to perform the services required by this Agreement unless all required insurance remains in full force and effect.

- **8.4.2** Insurance Companies selected by CONTRACTOR must be acceptable the CITY. All of the policies of insurance so required to be purchased and maintained shall contain a provision or endorsement that the coverage afforded shall not be canceled, materially changed or renewal refused until at least thirty (30) Calendar days written notice has been given to CITY by certified mail.
- **8.4.3** The CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain at its own expense and keep in effect during the full term of this Agreement a policy or policies of insurance which must include the following coverage and minimum limits of liability:
- (a) Worker's Compensation Insurance for statutory obligations imposed by Worker's Compensation or Occupational Disease Laws.
- (b) Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance for all owned, non-owned and hired automobiles and other vehicles used by the CONTRACTOR in the performance of the Work with the following minimum limits of liability:
- \$1,000,000.00 Combined Single Limit, Bodily Injury and Property Damage Liability, per occurrence

Coverage must be offered in a form no more restrictive than the latest edition of the Comprehensive General Liability Policy without restrictive endorsements, as filed with the Florida Department of Insurance and shall specifically include the following minimum limits not less than those required for Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability:

- 1. Premises and Operations;
- 2. Independent Contractors;
- 3. Product and Completed Operations Liability;
- 4. Broad Form Property Damage;
- 5. Broad Form Contractual Coverage applicable to this Agreement and specifically confirming the indemnification and hold harmless provision in this Agreement; and
- 6. Personal Injury coverage with employment contractual exclusions removed and deleted.
- (c) Builder's Risk Insurance in an amount not less than the replacement cost for the construction of the Work. Coverage shall be "All Risk" coverage for one hundred percent (100%) of the completed value with a deductible of not more than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) per claim.
- **8.4.4** CONTRACTOR shall maintain the Products and Completed Operations Liability Insurance for a period of at least two (2) years after final payment for the Work and furnish CITY with evidence of the continued insurance coverage at the time of final payment.
- **8.4.5** The required insurance coverage shall be issued by an insurance company authorized and licensed to do business in the State of Florida, with the minimum rating of B+ to A+, in accordance with the latest edition of A.M. Best's Insurance Guide.
- **8.4.6** All required insurance policies shall preclude any underwriter's rights of recovery or subrogation against CITY with the express intention of the parties being that the required insurance coverage protects both parties as the primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above described insurance.
- **8.4.7** The CONTRACTOR shall ensure that any company issuing insurance to cover the requirements contained in this Agreement agrees that they have no recourse against CITY for payment or assessments in any form on any policy of insurance.
- 8.4.8 The clauses "Other Insurance Provisions" and "Insurers Duties in the Event of an Occurrence, Claim or Page 570 of 625

Suit" as it appears in any policy of insurance in which CITY is named as an additional named insured shall not apply to CITY. CITY shall provide written notice of occurrence to the Insurer within fifteen (15) working days of CITY's actual notice of such an event.

- **8.4.9** The CONTRACTOR shall not commence performance of its obligations under this Agreement until after it has obtained all of the minimum insurance described and the CITY's approved.
- **8.4.10** The CONTRACTOR agrees to perform the work under the Agreement as an independent CONTRACTOR, and not as a subcontractor, agent or employee of CITY.
- **8.4.11** CONTRACTOR shall require each of its subcontractors to maintain the insurance required for each category, and CONTRACTOR shall provide verification to CITY upon its request.
- **8.4.12** Violation of the terms of this paragraph and its subparts shall constitute a material breach of the Agreement, and CITY, at its sole discretion, may cancel the Agreement and all rights, title and interest of the CONTRACTOR shall cease and terminate.
- **8.4.13** CITY shall not be responsible for purchasing and maintaining any insurance to protect the interests of CONTRACTOR, subcontractors or others performing the Work. CITY specifically reserves all statutory and common law rights and immunities. Nothing contained in this Agreement is intended to limit or waive any rights or immunities including, but not limited to, the procedural and substantive provisions of Chapter 768, Florida Statutes.

ARTICLE 9 - WARRANTIES: TESTS AND INSPECTIONS: CORRECTION OF DEFECTIVE WORK

9.1 Warranty of Title:

The CONTRACTOR warrants to the CITY that it possesses good, clear and marketable title to all equipment and materials provided and that there are no pending liens, claims or encumbrances against the equipment and materials.

9.2 Warranty of Specifications:

The CONTRACTOR warrants that all equipment, materials and workmanship furnished, whether furnished by the CONTRACTOR, its subcontractors or suppliers, will comply with the specifications, drawings and other descriptions supplied or adopted and that all services will be performed in a workmanlike manner.

9.3 Warranty of Merchantability:

CONTRACTOR warrants that any and all equipment to be supplied pursuant to the Agreement is merchantable, free from defects, whether patent or latent in material or workmanship, and fit for the ordinary purposes for which it is intended.

9.4 Correction Period:

CONTRACTOR warrants all material and workmanship for a minimum of two (2) year(s) from date of acceptance by the CITY. If, within two (2) year(s) after the date of final completion or such longer period of time as may be prescribed by laws or regulations, or by the terms of any applicable special guarantee required by the Contract Documents, any work is found to be defective, whether observed before or after acceptance by CITY, CONTRACTOR shall promptly, without cost to CITY and in accordance with CITY's written instructions, either correct such defective work, or, if it has been rejected by CITY, remove it from the site and replace it with Work that is not defective and that is satisfactorily correct, and remove and replace any damage to other Work. If CONTRACTOR does not promptly comply with the terms of such instructions, or in an emergency where delay would cause serious risk of loss or damage, CITY may have the defective workmanship corrected or the rejected Work removed and replaced, and all direct, indirect and consequential costs of such removal and replacement (including but not limited to fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys and other professionals) shall be paid by CONTRACTOR.

- **9.4.1** Where defective Work (and damage to other work) has been corrected, removed or replaced under this Article, the correction period with respect to such Work will be extended for an additional period of <u>two</u> (2) year(s) after such correction, removal or replacement has been satisfactorily completed.
- **9.4.2** Nothing contained in this Article shall be construed to establish a period of limitation with respect to other obligations which CONTRACTOR might have under the Contract Documents. Establishment of the time period of two (2) year(s) as described in above paragraph relates only to the specific obligation of the CONTRACTOR to correct the work, and has no relationship to the time within which the obligation to comply with the Contract Documents may be sought to be enforced, nor to the time within which proceedings may be commenced to establish CONTRACTOR's liability with respect to the CONTRACTOR's obligation other than specifically to correct the Work.
- **9.5** CONTRACTOR warrants to the CITY that it will comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, regulations and orders in carrying out its obligations under this Agreement.
- **9.6** CONTRACTOR warrants to the CITY that it is not insolvent, it is not in bankruptcy proceedings or receivership, nor is it engaged in or threatened with any litigation, arbitration or other legal or administrative proceedings or investigations of any kind which would have an adverse effect on its ability to perform its obligations under the Agreement.
- **9.7** CONTRACTOR warrants to the CITY that the performance of the work provided for in the Contract Documents will not result in the breach of any term or provision, or constitute a default under any indenture, mortgage, contract, or agreement to which the CONTRACTOR is a party.
- **9.8** CONTRACTOR warrants that there has been no violation or copyrights of patent rights either in the United States of America or in foreign countries in connection with the Work of the Agreement.
- **9.9** No warranty, either express or implied, may be modified, excluded or disclaimed in any way by CONTRACTOR. All warranties shall remain in full force and effect, notwithstanding acceptance and payment by CITY.

9.10 Tests and Inspections:

- **9.10.1** CONTRACTOR shall give CITY timely notice of readiness of the work for all required inspections, tests or approvals. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility, pay all costs and furnish CITY the required certificates of inspection, testing or approval for all materials, equipment or the Work or any part unless otherwise specified.
- **9.10.2** Neither CITY nor other inspectors shall have authority to permit deviations from nor to relax any of the provisions of the Contract Documents, nor to delay the Agreement by failure to inspect the materials and work with reasonable promptness.
- **9.10.3** The payment of any compensation, the giving of any gratuity or the granting of any favor by the CONTRACTOR to any inspectors, directly or indirectly, is strictly prohibited and punishable to the full extent of the law, and any such action on the part of the CONTRACTOR will constitute a termination of this Agreement.

9.11 Warranty Information

The CONTRACTOR shall deliver to the CITY and the CITY shall execute all applicable product and equipment registration, manuals, instructions, keys, accessories and warranty documents in accordance with manufacturers' policies and procedures. CONTRACTOR shall facilitate any necessary warranty claims free of charge.

ARTICLE 10 - LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

If the awarded BIDDER fails to complete the project by the completion date stated on the Bid Form, it is understood that five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) per calendar day will be deducted as liquidated damages, for each day beyond the substantial completion time and five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) per salendar of 625

day will be deducted as liquidated damages, for each day beyond the final completion time unless time extension is approved by the City Manager, it being agreed that the damage suffered by the CITY for such delay(s) cannot be specifically ascertained.

ARTICLE 11 - CHANGES IN THE WORK

- 11.1 One or more changes to the work within the general scope of this Agreement may be ordered by Change Order. The Contractor shall proceed with any such changes, and they shall be accomplished in strict accordance with the Contract Documents and the terms and conditions described in this Article.
- **11.2** A Change Order shall mean a written order to the CONTRACTOR executed by the parties after execution of this Agreement, directing a change in the work and may include a change in the agreed compensation in accordance with Article 12 or the time for the CONTRACTOR's performance.
- 11.3 The execution of a Change Order by the CONTRACTOR shall constitute conclusive evidence of the CONTRACTOR's agreement to the ordered changes in the work and the CONTRACTOR, by executing the Change Order, waives and forever releases any claim against the CITY for additional time or compensation for matters relating to or arising out of or resulting from the work included within or affected by the executed Change Order.
- 11.4 The CONTRACTOR shall notify and obtain the consent and approval of the CONTRACTOR's surety with reference to all Change Orders if such notice, consent or approval is required by the CONTRACTOR's surety or by law. The CONTRACTOR's execution of the Change Order shall constitute the CONTRACTOR's warranty to the CITY that the surety has been notified of, and consents to, such Change Order and the respective increase in the Performance bond amount commensurate with the Change Order(s). Furthermore, upon the CONTRACTOR's execution of the Change Order(s), the surety shall be conclusively deemed to have been notified of such Change Order by the CONTRACTOR in the increase in the required Performance Bond amount, and to have expressly consented.

ARTICLE 12 - CHANGE IN COMPENSATION

Change orders approved by CITY shall be computed as follows:

12.1 Cost of the Work:

The term "Cost of the Work" means the sum of all direct costs necessarily incurred and paid by CONTRACTOR in the proper performance of the Work. Except as otherwise may be agreed to in writing by CITY, these costs shall be in amounts no higher than those prevailing in the locality of the Project, shall include only the following items and shall not include any of the costs itemized in Paragraph 12.2:

- **12.1.1** Payroll costs for employees in the direct employ of CONTRACTOR in the performance of the Work under schedules of job classifications agreed upon by CITY and CONTRACTOR. Payroll costs for employees not employed full time on the work shall be apportioned on the basis of their time spent on the Work. Payroll costs shall include, but not limited to, salaries and wages plus the cost of fringe benefits which shall include social security contributions, unemployment, excise and payroll taxes, worker's compensation, health and retirement benefits, bonuses, sick leave, vacation and applicable holiday pay.
- **12.1.2** Cost of all materials and equipment furnished and incorporated in the Work, including costs of transportation and storage, and required suppliers and field services. All cash discounts, rebates and refunds and all returns from sale of surplus materials and equipment shall accrue to CITY, and CONTRACTOR shall make provisions so that they may be obtained.
- **12.1.3** Supplemental costs including the following:
- **12.1.3.1** Cost, including transportation and maintenance of all materials, supplies, equipment, machinery, appliances, office and temporary facilities at the site and hand tools not owned by the workers, which are 373 of 625

consumed in the performance of the Work.

- **12.1.3.2** Rentals of all construction equipment and machinery and the parts whether rented from CONTRACTOR or others in accordance with rental agreements approved by CITY, and the costs of transporting, loading, unloading, installing, dismantling and removal. The rental of any such equipment, machinery or parts shall cease when the use is no longer necessary for the Work.
- **12.1.3.3** Sales, consumer, use or similar taxes related to the Work, and for which CONTRACTOR is liable, imposed by laws or regulations.
- **12.1.3.4** Royalty payments and fees for permits or licenses.
- **12.1.3.5** The cost of utilities, fuel and sanitary facilities at the Work site.
- **12.1.3.6** Minor expenses such as telegrams, long distance telephone calls, telephone service at the site, expressage and similar petty cash items in connection with the Work.
- 12.1.3.7 Cost of premiums for additional bonds and insurance required because of changes in the Work.

12.2 Not Included in the Cost of the Work:

The term "cost of the Work" shall not include any of the following.

- **12.2.1** Payroll costs and other compensation of CONTRACTOR's officers, executives, principals (of partnership and sole proprietorships), general managers, engineers, architects, estimators, attorneys, auditors, accountants, purchasing and contracting agents, expediters, timekeepers, clerks and other personnel employed by CONTRACTOR whether at the site or in CONTRACTOR's principal or a branch office for general administration of the Work and not specifically included in the agreed upon schedule of job classifications referred to in Paragraph 12.1.1, all of which are to be considered administrative costs covered by CONTRACTOR's fee.
- **12.2.2** Expenses of CONTRACTOR's principal and branch offices other than CONTRACTOR's office at the site.
- **12.2.3** Any part of CONTRACTOR's capital expenses, including interest on CONTRACTOR's capital employed for the Work and charges against CONTRACTOR for delinquent payments.
- **12.2.4** Cost of premiums for all bonds and for all insurance whether or not CONTRACTOR is required by the Contract Documents to purchase and maintain them.
- **12.2.5** Costs due to the negligence of CONTRACTOR, any subcontractor, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or for whose acts any of them may be liable, including but not limited to, the correction of defective Work, disposal of materials or equipment wrongly supplied and making good any damage to property.
- **12.2.6** Other overhead or general expense costs of any kind and the costs of any item not specifically and expressly included in Paragraph 13.1.

12.3 Cost Breakdown Required:

Whenever the cost of any Work is to be determined pursuant to this Article, CONTRACTOR will submit in form acceptable to the CITY an itemized cost breakdown together with supporting documentation. Whenever a change in the Work is to be based upon mutual acceptance of a lump sum, whether the amount is an addition, credit, or no-change-in-cost, the CONTRACTOR shall submit an estimate substantiated by a complete itemized breakdown as follows:

- (a) The breakdown shall list quantities and unit prices for materials, labor, equipment and other items of cost.
- (b) Whenever a change involves the CONTRACTOR and one (1) or more subcontractors and the change is an increase in the agreed compensation, the overhead and profit percentage for the CONTRACTOR and each subcontractor shall be itemized separately.

ARTICLE 13 - PAYMENTS TO CONTRACTOR AND COMPLETION OF WORK

13.1 Progress Payments:

13.1.1 CONTRACTOR may request payments for work completed during the project at intervals of not more than once a month. The CONTRACTOR's requisition shall show a complete breakdown of the project components, the quantities completed and the amount due, together with a certification by the CONTRACTOR that the CONTRACTOR has disbursed to all subcontractors and suppliers their pro-rata shares of the payment out of previous progress payments received by the CONTRACTOR for all work completed and materials furnished in the previous period or properly executed releases of liens by all subcontractors, suppliers and materialmen who were included in the CONTRACTOR's previous applications for payment, and any other supporting documentation as may be required by the CITY, the ENGINEER or Contract Documents. Each requisition shall be submitted in triplicate to the CITY for approval. The CITY shall make payment to the CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) calendar days after approval of the CONTRACTOR's requisition for payment. Any rejection by the CITY of any specific item (s) shall result in CONTRACTOR being notified of the rejection within five (5) Business days of the rejection.

13.1.2 Five percent (5%) of all monies earned by the CONTRACTOR shall be retained by the CITY until the work is totally completed and accepted by the CITY.

13.2 Inspection:

CITY shall make an inspections as necessary and notify CONTRACTOR in writing of all particulars in which this inspection reveals that the Work is incomplete or defective. CONTRACTOR shall immediately take the necessary measures to remedy any deficiencies within five (5) calendar days of the inspection.

13.3 Final Application for Payment:

After CONTRACTOR has completed all corrections to the satisfaction of CITY and delivered all maintenance and operating instructions, schedules, warranties, guarantees, bonds, certificates of inspection, marked up record documents and other documents required by the Contract Documents or requested by the CITY, CONTRACTOR may make application for final payment. The final application for payment shall be accompanied by (1) complete and legally effective releases or waivers of all liens arising out of or filed in connection with the work; or (2) CONTRACTOR's receipts in full covering all labor, materials and equipment for which a lien could be filed; or (3) a final affidavit stating that all laborers, materialmen, suppliers and subcontractors who worked for CONTRACTOR under this Contract have been paid in full or if the fact be otherwise, identifying the name of each lien or who has not been paid in full and the amount due or to become due each for labor, services or materials furnished. If any subcontractor or supplier fails to furnish a release or receipt in full, CONTRACTOR shall furnish a bond satisfactory to CITY to indemnify CITY against any lien, or the CITY may directly pay any subcontractor or supplier and deduct that amount due to CONTRACTOR.

In addition, CONTRACTOR shall also submit with the final application for payment, the completed set of "As-Built" drawings for review and approval. The "As-Built" drawings shall be prepared, sealed and certified by a professional surveyor licensed by the State of Florida. Final payment to CONTRACTOR shall not be made until the shop drawings have been reviewed and approved by the CITY. Prior to approval, if necessary, the drawings may be returned to CONTRACTOR for changes or modifications if in the opinion of CITY they do not represent correct or accurate "As-Built" drawings.

13.4 Final Payment and Acceptance:

13.4.1 If, on the basis of observing the Work during construction and final inspection, and review of the final Application for Payment and accompanying documentation, the CITY is satisfied that the Work has been completed and CONTRACTOR's other obligations under the Contract Documents have been fulfilled, CITY will give written notice to CONTRACTOR that the Work is acceptable. Otherwise, the Application will be returned to CONTRACTOR indicating in writing the reasons for refusing to make final payment, in which case CONTRACTOR shall make the necessary corrections and resubmit the Application. Thirty (30) days after presentation to CITY of the Application and accompanying documentation, in appropriate form and substance, the amount will become due and will be paid by CITY to CONTRACTOR.

- 13.4.2 If, through no fault of CONTRACTOR, final completion of the Work is significantly delayed and the occurrence is confirmed, CITY shall, upon receipt of CONTRACTOR's final Application for Payment, without terminating the Agreement, make payment of the balance due for that portion of the Work fully completed and accepted. If the remaining balance to be held by CITY for Work not fully completed or corrected is less than the retainage stipulated in the Agreement, and if bonds have been furnished as required, the written consent of the surety to the payment of the balance due for that portion of the Work fully completed and accepted shall be submitted by CONTRACTOR to the CITY with the Application for such payment. Such payment shall be made under the terms and conditions governing final payment, except that it shall not constitute a waiver of claims held by the CITY.
- 13.5 Final payment, constituting the entire unpaid balance of the agreed compensation, shall be paid by the CITY to CONTRACTOR when the work has been completed, the Contract fully performed, and a final certificate for payment has been issued by the CITY ENGINEER. The making of final payment shall constitute a waiver of claims by CITY except those arising from:
- (1) Faulty or defective work and latent defects discovered after acceptance.
- (2) Failure of the work to comply with the requirements of the contract documents.
- (3) Terms of special warranties required by those contract documents.
- (4) Any of CONTRACTOR's continuing obligations under this Agreement.

The acceptance of final payment by CONTRACTOR or the subcontractor for materials and supplies shall constitute a waiver of claims except those previously made in writing and identified as unsettled at the time of final application for payment.

13.6 CITY's Right to Withhold Payment:

The CITY may withhold in whole or in part, final payment or any progress payment to such extent as may be necessary to protect itself from loss on account of:

- **13.6.1** Defective work not remedied.
- **13.6.2** Claims filed or evidence indicating the probable filing of claims by other parties against the CONTRACTOR.
- **13.6.3** Failure of the CONTRACTOR to make payment to subcontractors or suppliers for materials or labor.
- **13.6.4** Damage to another contractor, subcontractor or supplier not remedied.
- **13.6.5** Liability for liquidated damages has been incurred by the CONTRACTOR.
- **13.6.6** Evidence that the Work cannot be completed for the unpaid balance of the agreed compensation.
- **13.6.7** Evidence that the work will not be completed within the Agreement's term.
- **13.6.8** Failure to carry out the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

When the above grounds are removed or resolved or the CONTRACTOR provides a surety bond or a consent of surety satisfactory to the CITY which will protect the CITY in the amount withheld, payment may be made in whole or in part.

ARTICLE 14 - TERMINATION OF THE CONTRACT

The CITY retains the right to terminate this Agreement with or without cause, with thirty (30) days prior written notice. Additionally, the CITY may also terminate this Agreement upon fifteen (15) days notice upon the occurrence of any one or more of the following events:

- **14.1** If CONTRACTOR commences a voluntary case or a petition is filed against CONTRACTOR, under any chapter of the Bankruptcy Code, or if CONTRACTOR takes any equivalent or similar action by filing a petition or otherwise under any other federal or state law in effect at such time relating to the bankruptcy or insolvency.
- **14.2** If CONTRACTOR makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors.

- **14.3** If a trustee, receiver, custodian or agent of CONTRACTOR is appointed under applicable law or under Contract, whose appointment or authority to take charge of property of CONTRACTOR is for the purpose of enforcing a Lien against such property or for the purpose of general administration of such property for the benefit of CONTRACTOR's creditors.
- **14.4** If CONTRACTOR persistently fails to perform the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents, including but not limited to, failure to supply sufficient skilled Workers or suitable materials or equipment or failure to adhere to the progress schedule as same may be revised from time to time.
- **14.5** If CONTRACTOR disregards any local, state or federal laws or regulations.
- **14.6** If CONTRACTOR otherwise violates any provisions of this Agreement.

Further, CONTRACTOR may be excluded from the Work site and the CITY take possession of the Work and of all CONTRACTOR's tools, appliances, construction equipment and machinery at the site and use them without liability to CONTRACTOR for trespass or conversion, incorporate in the Work all materials and equipment stored at the site or for which CITY has paid CONTRACTOR but which are stored elsewhere, and finish the Work as CITY may deem expedient. In this instance, CONTRACTOR shall not be entitled to receive any further compensation until the Work is finished.

- 14.7 If CONTRACTOR commits a default due to its insolvency or bankruptcy, the following shall apply:
- **14.7.1** Should this Agreement be entered into and fully executed by the parties, funds released and the CONTRACTOR (Debtor) files for bankruptcy, the following shall occur:
- a. In the event the Debtor files a voluntary petition under 11 U.S.C. 301 or 302, or an order for relief is entered under 11 U.S.C. 303, the Debtor shall acknowledge the extent, validity, and priority of the lien recorded in favor of the CITY. The Debtor further agrees that in the event of this default, the CITY shall, at its option, be entitled to seek relief from the automatic stay provisions in effect pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 362. The CITY shall be entitled to relief from the automatic stay pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 362(d)(1) or (d)(2), and the Debtor agrees to waive the notice provisions in effect pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 362 and any applicable Local Rules of the United States Bankruptcy Court. The Debtor acknowledges that such waiver is done knowingly and voluntarily.
- b. Alternatively, in the event the CITY does not seek stay relief, or if stay relief is denied, the CITY shall be entitled to monthly adequate protection payments within the meaning of 11 U.S.C. 361. The monthly adequate protection payments shall each be in an amount determined in accordance with the Note and Mortgage executed by the Debtor in favor of the CITY.
- c. In the event the Debtor files for bankruptcy under Chapter 13 of Title 11, United States Code, in addition to the foregoing provisions, the Debtor agrees to cure any amounts in arrears over a period not to exceed twenty-four (24) months from the date of the confirmation order, and such payments shall be made in addition to the regular monthly payments required by the Note and Mortgage. Additionally, the Debtor shall agree that the CITY is over secured and, therefore, entitled to interest and attorney's fees pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 506(b). Such fees shall be allowed and payable as an administrative expense. Further, in the event the CONTRACTOR has less than five (5) years of payments remaining on the Note, the CONTRACTOR agrees that the treatment afforded to the claim of the CITY under any confirmed plan of reorganization shall provide that the remaining payments shall be satisfied in accordance with the Note, and that the remaining payments or claim shall not be extended or amortized over a longer period than the time remaining under the Note.
- **14.7.2** Should this Agreement be entered into and fully executed by the parties, and the compensation has not been forwarded to Debtor, the following shall occur:

In the event the Debtor files a voluntary petition pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 301 or 302, or an order for relief is entered under 11 U.S.C. 303, the Debtor acknowledges that the commencement of a bankruptcy proceeding constitutes an event of default under the terms of this Agreement. Further, the Debtor acknowledges that this Agreement constitutes an executory contract within the meaning of 11 U.S.C. 365. The CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the Agreement is not capable of being assumed pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 365(c) (2), unless the CITY expressly consents in writing to the assumption. In the event the

CITY consents to the assumption, the Debtor agrees to file a motion to assume the Agreement within ten (10) days after receipt of written consent from the CITY, regardless of whether the bankruptcy proceeding is pending under Chapter 7, 11, or 13 of Title 11 of the United States Code. The Debtor further acknowledges that this Agreement is not capable of being assigned pursuant to 11 U.S.C. 365(b)(1).

ARTICLE 15 – OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

All documents, as-built plans and specifications resulting from the Project under this Agreement shall be deemed the sole property of the CITY, and the CITY shall have all rights incident to the sole ownership.

The CONTRACTOR shall agree to indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, from liabilities, damages, losses, and costs, including but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees, to the extent caused by the negligence, recklessness, or intentionally wrongful conduct of the CONTRACTOR and other persons employed or utilized by the CONTRACTOR.

ARTICLE 16 - COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

CONTRACTOR shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws, codes, ordinances, rules, and regulations in performing its duties, responsibilities, and obligations pursuance to this Agreement.

ARTICLE 17 - NOTICE

ARTICLE 18 - LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

The City desires to enter into this Agreement only if in so doing the City can place a limit on the City's liability for any cause of action arising out of the Agreement, so that its liability never exceed the agreed sum of \$1,000.00. CONTRACTOR expresses its willingness to enter into this Agreement with CONTRACTOR'S recovery from the City for any action or claim arising from this Agreement to be limited to \$1,000.00.

Accordingly, and notwithstanding any other term or condition of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees that the City shall not be liable to CONTRACTOR for damages in an amount in excess of

\$1,000.00, for any action or claim of the CONTRACTOR or any third party arising out of this Agreement. Nothing contained in this paragraph or elsewhere in this Agreement is any way intended to be a waiver of the limitation placed upon the City's liability as set forth in Chapter 768, Florida Statutes. Additionally, the City does not waive sovereign immunity, and no claim or award against the City shall include attorney's fees, investigative costs or pre-judgment interest.

ARTICLE 19 - MISCELLANEOUS

- **19.1** The duties and obligations imposed by this Agreement and the rights and remedies available to the parties and, in particular but without limitation, the warranties, guaranties and obligations imposed upon CONTRACTOR and all of the rights and remedies available to CITY are in addition to, and are not to be construed in any way as a limitation of, any rights and remedies available to any or all of them which are otherwise imposed or available by laws or regulations, by special warranty or guarantee or by other provisions of the Contract Documents. This Article will be as effective as if repeated specifically in the Contract Documents will survive final payment and termination or completion of the Agreement.
- 19.2 CONTRACTOR shall not assign or transfer the Contract or its rights, title or interests. The obligations undertaken by CONTRACTOR pursuant to the Agreement shall not be delegated or assigned to any other person or firm. Violation of the terms of this Article shall constitute a material breach of Agreement by CONTRACTOR and the CITY may, at its discretion, cancel the Contract and all rights, title and interest of CONTRACTOR which shall immediately cease and terminate.
- **19.3** CONTRACTOR and its employees, volunteers and agents shall be and remain an independent contractors and not agents or employees of CITY with respect to all of the acts and services performed by and under the terms of this Agreement. This Agreement shall not in any way be construed to create a partnership, association or any other kind of joint undertaking or venture between the parties.
- 19.4 CITY reserves the right to audit the records of CONTRACTOR relating in anyway to the work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement at any time during the performance and term of this Agreement and for a period of three (3) years after completion and acceptance by CITY. If required by CITY, CONTRACTOR agrees to submit to an audit by an independent certified public accountant selected by CITY. CONTRACTOR shall allow CITY to inspect, examine and review the records of CONTRACTOR at any and all times during normal business hours during the term of the Contract.
- **19.5** The remedies expressly provided in this Agreement to CITY shall not be deemed to be exclusive but shall be cumulative and in addition to all other remedies in favor of CITY now or later existing at law or in equity.
- **19.6** This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida, and venue for any action shall be in Broward County, Florida.
- **19.7** Should any part, term or provision of this Agreement be decided by the courts to be invalid, illegal or in conflict with any state or federal law, the validity of the remaining portion or provision shall not be affected.

Note. The fiscal year budget was revised per Ordinance 2025-001 and 2025-007; increasing the overall budget by \$1,224,750.

General Fund Revenue 90%:

- Ad Valorem Revenue exceeded the amount budgeted for the year this happens
 when some payments are made later and, in the year, and do not enjoy the
 discount for early payment. The majority of property tax revenues are received in
 December through March; remaining portions trickle in throughout the year. The
 BCPA invoiced property owners in November 2024.
- **Franchise Taxes** is 78% of the budget or \$2,929,664. Included in this category are state revenue and revenue from franchise agreements, such as utility services.
- **Utility Taxes** is 97% of the budget or \$3,223,476. This category of revenue includes taxes on public services, which are collected generally 2 months in arrears.
- Sales and Use Taxes is 86% of the budget or \$4,935,677. Included in this category are State Revenue, which are generally collected 2 months in arrears. Included in this category are intergovernmental revenue from the Federal, State and County governments.
- **Service Revenue** is 70% of the budget or \$1,326,810. The most significant portion of the Service Revenue is related to EMS services, approximately 70% of the budget.
- Permits/Licenses/Insp Revenue is 39% of the budget or \$345,657. This category
 of revenue includes Business Tax Receipts, engineering and planning and zoning
 fees. Most of the receipts for this year are for business licensee. As of August 31,
 2025, less than 1% of the amount budgeted for engineering fees have been
 collected.
- Fines & Forfeitures is 11% of the budget or \$56,526 (net of court settlements). A portion of this revenue is generated from the court settlements litigated by the City Attorney. As of August 31, 2025, \$354,062 have been collected. The anticipated revenues from this source are received from Kineret, LLC., at \$17,187.50 monthly, for a total of \$171,875 to date. Marketplace Plaza LLC has also paid \$165,000. Other revenue sources in this category includes payment of fines and liens from code enforcement actions.
- Miscellaneous Revenue is 81% of the budget or \$2,036,012. A significant portion
 of this revenue source includes interest income and administrative fees, community
 contributions, and Public Emergency medical transport.
- General Fund Expenditure 79%:
- Mayor & City Commission Office is 64% of the budget or \$279,204. Expenses are less than the budget.

- **City Attorney** is above target at 123% of the budget or \$761,379. The budget for the City Attorney includes a monthly retainage for municipal legal services and funding for general and special litigations that are directed by the Commission.
- City Clerk's Office is 80% of budget or \$420,807. Expenses are less than budget.
- City Manager Office is 77% of budget or \$929,463. Expenses are less than budget.
- **Financial Services Department** is 66% of the budget or \$1,364,272. Expenses are less than budget.
- **General Administration** is 79% of the budget or \$3,026,331. Expenses are less than budget. The account is non-departmental and accounts for the City's utility services, tangible insurances, telephone services, and other citywide activities.
- Human Resources & Risk Management is 99% of budget or \$393,119. Expenses
 are less than budget.
- **Development Services** is 54% of budget or \$814,972. Expenses are less than budget primarily due to salaries and benefits within the department.
- Public Works is 68% of budget of the budget or \$2,183,010. Expenses are less than budget.
- Parks and Human Services is 73% of budget or \$2,568,986. Expenses are less than budget.
- City Boards are 36% of the budget or \$15,850. Expenses are less than budget.
- **Gen. Fund Debt** is 76% of the budget or \$946,818. The Debt Service payments are usually due in January and July. This category of expenditures also includes payments for the City's leased vehicles.
- BSO EMS is 90% of budget or \$4,010,494.
- **BSO Police** is 90% of budget or \$9,517,251.
- Revenue Loss expenditures are \$663,473. Expenses in this budget include the
 programs and projects approved per Resolution 2022-031, establishing funding
 under the US Treasury final ruling. City staff provides a quarterly status update
 during the City Commission Workshops. Projects include Human Services
 Assistance Programs, Teen Center programs, Commercial Improvement programs,
 and a Restaurant Assistance program.

CONTRACT #25-3410-18R COMMUNITY BUS SERVICE

This Contract is made as of the _______, 2025 by and between THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES, a municipal corporation existing under the laws of the State of Florida ("CITY"), and LIMOUSINES OF SOUTH FLORIDA INC., a corporation authorized to do business in the State of Florida, ("CONTRACTOR"), whose Federal I.D. Number is 59-2564092.

WHEREAS, the City of Lauderdale Lakes solicited proposals from qualified firms to provide day to day management, operation and maintenance of the public transportation services for Lauderdale Lakes North/South and East/West routes, and;

WHEREAS, at its meeting of XXXXXX, 2025, by Resolution #2025-XXX, the CITY Commission authorized the proper CITY officials to execute this Contract hereinafter referred to as "Contract #25-3410-18R and;

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR is willing and able to perform the work of Community Bus Services for the compensation and on the terms, conditions and specifications hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto, in consideration of the mutual covenants, agreements, terms, and conditions contained herein, do agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 - SERVICES

The CONTRACTOR'S responsibility under this Contract is to provide transportation services as more specifically set in the Scope of Services detailed in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made part hereof.

The CITY's Representative/Liaison during the performance of this Contract shall be Ericka Lockett telephone (954) 535-2808.

ARTICLE 2 - TERM

The initial term is two (2) year, beginning November 1, 2025, and ending October 31, 2027, unless sooner terminated or later extended or renewed, in accordance with the other terms and conditions set forth herein. At the CITY's sole option, the Term may be renewed for three (3) additional years, such option to be exercised on a year-to-year basis, in the absolute discretion of the CITY. In the event of an exercise of the option(s) to renew, the terms and conditions set forth herein, exclusive of the rights set forth in this specific subsection, shall apply equally to such renewed Term. The CITY may provide a minimum of ten (10) calendar days notice before the end of any effective Term, of its intent to renew the Term.

Extension of Contract:

The CITY reserves the right to automatically extend the Contract for up to ninety (90) calendar days beyond the stated Contract term, under the same terms and conditions of said Contract. The CITY shall notify the CONTRACTOR in writing of such extensions. Additional extensions over the first ninety (90) day extension may occur, if the CITY and the CONTRACTOR are in mutual agreement of such extensions.

ARTICLE 3 - PAYMENTS TO CONTRACTOR

- A. The total amount to be paid by the CITY under this Contract for all services and materials shall be priced using the pricing structure according to Exhibit "B", Schedule of Professional Fees. Such payment shall be made within thirty (30) days from the last day of each respective month in which CONTRACTOR has performed the Services and issued an invoice to the CITY's Accounts Payable Department.
- B. CONTRACTOR, as appropriate, shall invoice the CITY for the work performed under this Contract. Invoices received from the CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Contract shall be reviewed and approved by the CITY's Representative. If there is no objection to the invoice, the CITY shall pay the full invoice amount within thirty (30) days of the CITY's receipt of the invoice. If there is a dispute as to the invoiced amount, the CITY shall notify the CONTRACTOR of the dispute within fifteen (15) days of the CITY's receipt of the invoice. The CITY shall pay the CONTRACTOR the undisputed invoiced amount within thirty (30) days of its receipt of the invoice. The disputed amount of the invoice shall not be paid by the CITY until a resolution has been reached between the CITY and the CONTRACTOR as to the disputed portions of the invoice.
- C. <u>Final Invoice</u>: In order for both parties herein to close their books and records, the CONTRACTOR will clearly state "<u>final invoice</u>" on the CONTRACTOR'S final/last billing to the CITY. The final invoice certifies that all services have been properly performed and all charges and costs have been invoiced to the CITY. Since this account will thereupon be closed, and any other further charges if not properly included on this invoice are waived by the CONTRACTOR.
 - Approval by the CITY shall not constitute nor be deemed a release of the responsibility and liability of the CONTRACTOR, his employees, sub-contractors, agents and Contractors for the accuracy and competency of their designs, working drawings, and specifications or other documents and works; nor shall such approval be deemed to be an assumption of such responsibility by the CITY for a defect or omission in designs, working drawings, and specifications or other documents prepared by the CONTRACTOR, his employees, sub-contractors, agents and Contractors.
- D. <u>Appropriations</u>: Payment under this Contract is subject to annual appropriations of the governing body. The CITY will immediately notify the CONTRACTOR to stop work if funds are not appropriated and will pay CONTRACTOR for all work performed up to the time of the stop work notice.

ARTICLE 4 - TRUTH-IN-NEGOTIATION CERTIFICATE

Signature of this Contract by the CONTRACTOR shall also act as the execution of a truth-in-negotiation certificate certifying that the wage rates, overhead charges, and other costs used to determine the compensation provided for in this Contract are accurate, complete and current as of the date of the Contract and no higher than those charged the CONTRACTOR'S most favored customer for the same or substantially similar service.

Said rates and cost shall be adjusted to exclude any significant sums should the CITY determine that the rates and costs were increased due to inaccurate, incomplete or non-current wage rates. The CITY shall exercise its rights under this Article 4 within one (1) year following the rendering of the final invoice. Said date shall be extended if the Contract is renewed.

ARTICLE 5 - TERMINATION

This Contract may be cancelled by the CONTRACTOR upon ninety (90) days prior written notice to the CITY's representative in the event of substantial failure by the CITY to perform in accordance with this Contract through no fault of the CONTRACTOR. The Contract may also be terminated, in whole or in part, by the CITY, with or without cause, immediately upon written Termination Notice to the CONTRACTOR. Unless the CONTRACTOR is in breach of this Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall be paid for services rendered to the CITY's satisfaction through the date of termination. In the event the CITY elects to terminate this Contract without cause, however, the CITY shall pay the CONTRACTOR a termination fee of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) upon compliance with A through D of this Article 5. After receipt of a Termination Notice and except as otherwise directed by the CITY, the CONTRACTOR shall:

- A. Stop work on the date to the extent specified.
- B. Terminate and settle all orders and subcontracts relating to the performance of the terminated work.
- Transfer all work in process, completed work and other materials related to the terminated work to the CITY.
- D. Continue and complete all parts of the work that have not been terminated.

ARTICLE 6 - PERSONNEL

The CONTRACTOR represents that it has or will secure at its own expense all necessary personnel required to perform this Contract. Such personnel shall not be employees of or have any contractual relationship with the CITY.

All of the services required hereunder shall be performed by the CONTRACTOR or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in performing the services shall be fully qualified and, if required, authorized or permitted under State and local laws to perform such services.

Any changes or substitutions in the CONTRACTOR's key personnel, as may be listed in Exhibit "C", must be made known to the CITY's Representative and written approval must be granted by the CITY's Representative before said change or substitution can become effective.

The CONTRACTOR warrants that all services shall be performed by skilled and competent personnel.

ARTICLE 7 - SUBCONTRACTING

The CITY reserves the right to accept the use of a sub-Contractor or to reject the selection of a particular sub-Contractor and to inspect all facilities of any sub-Contractors in order to make a determination as to the capability of the sub-Contractor to perform properly under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR is encouraged to seek local vendors for participation in subcontracting opportunities. If the CONTRACTOR uses any sub-Contractors on this project the following provisions of this Article shall apply:

If a sub-Contractor fails to perform or make progress, as required by this Contract, and it is necessary to replace the sub-Contractor to complete the work in a timely fashion, the CONTRACTOR shall promptly do so, subject to acceptance of the new sub-Contractor by the CITY. The substitution of a sub-Contractor shall not be adequate cause to excuse a delay in the performance any portion of this Contract as set forth in the Scope of Work.

The CONTRACTOR, its sub-Contractors, agents, servants, or employees agree to be bound by the Terms and Conditions of this Contract and its agreement with the sub-Contractor for work to be performed for the CITY the CONTRACTOR must incorporate the terms of this Contract.

ARTICLE 8 - FEDERAL AND STATE TAX

The CITY is exempt from payment of Florida State Sales and Use Taxes.

The CITY will sign an exemption certificate submitted by the CONTRACTOR. The CONTRACTOR shall <u>not</u> be exempted from paying sales tax to its suppliers for materials used to fulfill contractual obligations with the CITY, nor is the CONTRACTOR authorized to use the CITY's Tax Exemption Number in securing such materials.

The CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for payment of its own and its share of its employees' payroll, payroll taxes, and benefits with respect to this Contract.

ARTICLE 9 – INSURANCE

- A. The CONTRACTOR shall not commence work under this Contract until it has obtained all insurance required under this paragraph and such insurance has been approved by the CITY.
- B. All insurance policies shall be issued by companies authorized to do business under the laws of the State of Florida. The CONTRACTOR shall furnish Certificates of Insurance to the CITY's Representative prior to the commencement of operations. The Certificates shall clearly indicate that the CONTRACTOR has obtained insurance of the type, amount, and classification as required for strict compliance with this paragraph and that no material change or cancellation of the insurance shall be effective without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the CITY'S Representative. Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the CONTRACTOR of its liability and obligations under this Contract.
- C. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, Comprehensive General Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence to protect the CONTRACTOR from claims for damages for bodily and personal injury, including wrongful death, as well as from claims of property damages which may arise from any operations under this Contract, whether such operations be by the CONTRACTOR or by anyone directly employed by or contracting with the CONTRACTOR.
- D. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage liability to protect the CONTRACTOR from claims for damages for bodily and personal injury, including death, as well as from claims for property damage, which may arise from the ownership, use or maintenance of owned and non owned automobiles, including rented automobiles whether such operations be by the CONTRACTOR or by anyone directly or indirectly employed by the CONTRACTOR.
- E. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain, during the life of this Contract, adequate Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employer's Liability Insurance in at least such amounts as are required by law for all of its employees per Florida Statute 440.02.
- F. It shall be the responsibility of the CONTRACTOR to ensure that all sub-Contractors comply with the same insurance requirements referenced above.
- G. Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the CONTRACTOR of its liability and obligation under this section or under any other section if this Section or under any other section of the Contract.
- H. CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for assuring that the insurance certificate required in conjunction with this Section remain in force for the duration of the period of performance for any contractual agreement(s) resulting from this solicitation. If insurance certificates are scheduled to expire during the term hereof, the CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for submitting new or renewed insurance certificates to the CITY at a minimum of thirty (30) calendar days in advance of such expiration. In the event that expired certificates are not replaced with new or renewed certificates which cover the term

hereof, the CITY shall suspend the Contract until such time as the new or renewed certificates are received by the CITY in a manner prescribed in this Section; provided however, that this suspension period does not exceed thirty (30) days, the CITY may at its sole discretion, terminate the Contract and seek re-purchasing charges from the CONTRACTOR.

- In the judgment of the CITY, prevailing conditions warrant the provision by CONTRACTOR of additional liability insurance coverage or coverage which is different in kind, the CITY reserves the right to require the provision by CONTRACTOR of an amount of coverage different from the amounts or kind previously required and shall afford written notice of such change in requirements thirty (30) days prior to the date on which the requirements shall take effect. Should the CONTRACTOR fail or refuse to satisfy the requirement of changed coverage within thirty (30) days following the CITY's written notice, the CITY, at it's sole option, may terminate the Contract upon written notice to the CONTRACTOR, said termination taking effect on the date that the required change in policy coverage would otherwise take effect.
- J. All insurance, other than Workers' Compensation, to be maintained by the CONTRACTOR shall specifically include the CITY of Lauderdale Lakes as "Additional Insured" and shall unequivocally provide thirty (30) days written notice to the CITY prior to any adverse changes, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage thereunder.

ARTICLE 10 - INDEMNIFICATION

The CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY and its officers and employees, from liabilities, damages, losses, and costs, including but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees, to the extent caused by the negligence, recklessness, or intentionally wrongful conduct of the CONTRACTOR, and other persons employed or utilized by CONTRACTOR in the performance of this Contract.

The parties agree that 1% of the total compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR for performance of this Contract shall represent the specific consideration for the CONTRACTOR's indemnification of the Owner. It is the specific intent of the parties hereto that the foregoing indemnification complies with Florida Statute 725.06 (Chapter 725).

The CONTRACTOR, without exemption, shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, its employees, representatives and elected officials from liability of any nature or kind, including cost and expenses for or on account of any copyrighted, patented, or unpatented invention, process, or item manufactured by the CONTRACTOR. Further, if such a claim is made, or is pending, the CONTRACTOR may, at its option and expense, procure for the CITY the right to use, replace, or modify the item to render it non-infringing. If none of the alternatives are reasonably available, the CITY agrees to return the article on request to the CONTRACTOR and receive reimbursement. If the CONTRACTOR used any design, device or materials covered by letters, patent or copyright, it is mutually agreed and understood, without exception, that the Contract prices shall include all royalties or cost arising from the use of such design, device or materials in any way involved in the work.

It is further the specific intent of the parties that all of the Contract Documents on this Project are hereby amended to include the foregoing indemnification and the "Specific Consideration" thereof.

ARTICLE 11- SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

The CITY and the CONTRACTOR each binds itself and its partners, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns to the other party of this Contract to the partners, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of such other party, in respect to all covenants of this Contract. Except as above noted, neither the CITY nor the CONTRACTOR shall assign, sublet, convey or transfer its interest in this Contract. Nothing herein shall be construed as creating any rights or benefits hereunder to anyone other than the CITY and the CONTRACTOR.

ARTICLE 12 - REMEDIES

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida. The venue of all actions in State or Federal Court relating to this Contract will be held in Broward County, Florida. No remedy herein conferred upon any party is intended to be exclusive of any other remedy, and each and every such remedy shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to every other remedy given hereunder now or hereafter existing at law or in equity. No single or partial exercise by any part of any right, power, or remedy hereunder shall preclude any other or further exercise thereof.

ARTICLE 13 - CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The CONTRACTOR represents that it presently has no interest and shall acquire no interest, either direct or indirect, in the CITY, which would conflict in any manner with the performance or services required hereunder, as provided for in Florida Statutes 112.311. The CONTRACTOR further represents that no person having such interest shall be employed in the performance hereof.

The CONTRACTOR shall promptly notify the CITY's Representative, in writing, by certified mail, of all potential conflicts of interest for any prospective business association, interest or other circumstance which may influence or appear to influence the CONTRACTOR'S judgment or quality of services being provided hereunder. Such written notification shall identify the prospective business association, interest or circumstance, the nature of work that the CONTRACTOR undertakes and request an opinion of the CITY, whether or not such association, interest or circumstances will in the CITY's opinion constitute a conflict of interest if entered into by the CONTRACTOR. The CITY agrees to notify the CONTRACTOR of its opinion by certified mail within 30 days of receipt of notification by the CONTRACTOR. If, in the opinion of the CITY, the prospective business association, interest or circumstances would not constitute a conflict of interest by the CONTRACTOR, the CITY shall so state in the notification and the CONTRACTOR may enter into said association, interest or circumstance and it shall be deemed not in conflict of interest with respect to services provided to the CITY by the CONTRACTOR under the terms of this Contract.

ARTICLE 14 - EXCUSABLE DELAYS

The CONTRACTOR shall not be considered in default by reason of any failure in performance if such failure arises as a result of a "Force Majeure." Force Majeure shall mean any delay occasioned by superior or irresistible force occasioned by violence in nature without the interference of human agency such as hurricanes, tornados, flood and total loss caused by fire and other similar unavoidable casualties, changes in federal, state or local laws, ordinances, codes or regulations, enacted after the date of this Agreement and having a substantial impact on the project, or other causes beyond the CONTRACTOR's control or by any other such causes which the CONTRACTOR and the CITY Commission decide in writing justify the delay. Provided, however, that market conditions, labor conditions, construction industry price trends and similar matters which normally impact on the bidding process shall not be considered a Force Majeure.

ARTICLE 15- PLEDGE OF CREDIT, ARREARS

The CONTRACTOR shall not pledge the CITY's credit or make it a guarantor of payment of surety for any contract, debt, obligation, judgment, lien, or any form of indebtedness.

The CONTRACTOR further warrants and represents that it has no obligation or indebtedness that would impair its ability to fulfill the terms of this Contract.

ARTICLE 16 - DISCLOSURE AND OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

The CITY and the CONTRACTOR shall comply with provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes (Public Records Law).

All covenants, contracts, representations and warranties made herein, or otherwise made in writing by any party hereto including, but not limited to, representations herein related to the disclosure or ownership of documents, shall survive this Contract and the consummation of the transactions contemplated hereby.

ARTICLE 17 - INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR RELATIONSHIP

The CONTRACTOR and all employees and/or agents of the CONTRACTOR are, and shall be, in the performance of all work services and activities under this Contract, an independent contractor, and not an employee, agent, or servant of the CITY. All persons engaged in any of the work or services performed pursuant to this Contract shall at all times and in all places be subject to the CONTRACTOR'S sole direction, supervision, and control. The CONTRACTOR shall exercise control over the means and manner in which it and its employees perform the work and in all respects the CONTRACTOR'S relationship and the relationship of its employees to the CITY shall be that of an independent Contractor and not as employees or agents of the CITY.

The CONTRACTOR does not have the power or authority to bind the CITY in any promise, agreement or representation other than specifically provided for in this Agreement. The CONTRACTOR shall be responsible to the CITY for all work or services performed by the Contractor or any person or entity on the CONTRACTOR's behalf, in fulfillment of this Contract.

ARTICLE 18 - CONTINGENT FEES

The CONTRACTOR warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONTRACTOR to solicit or secure this Contract and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual, or firm, other than it's bona fide employee working solely for the CONTRACTOR, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon resulting from the Award or making of this Contract.

ARTICLE 19 - ACCESS AND AUDITS

The CONTRACTOR shall maintain adequate records to justify all charges, expenses, and costs incurred in estimating and performing the work for at least three (3) years after completion of this Contract. The CITY shall have access to such books, records, and documents as required in this section for the purpose of inspection or audit during normal business hours, at the CONTRACTOR'S place of business.

ARTICLE 20 - NONDISCRIMINATION

The CONTRACTOR warrants and represents that all of its employees are treated equally during employment without regard to race, color, religion, disability, sex, age, national origin, ancestry, marital status, or sexual orientation.

ARTICLE 21 - ENFORCEMENT COSTS

If any legal action or other proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Contract, or because of an alleged dispute, breach, default or misrepresentation in connection with any provisions of this Contract, the successful or prevailing party or parties shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees, expenses and court costs, including appellate fees incurred in that action or proceeding, in addition to any other relief to which such party or parties may be entitled.

ARTICLE 22 - AUTHORITY TO PRACTICE

The CONTRACTOR hereby represents and warrants that it has and will continue to maintain all licenses and approvals required to conduct its business, and that it will at all times conduct its business activities in a reputable manner. Proof of such licenses and approvals shall be submitted to the CITY's Representative on an annual basis.

ARTICLE 23 - SEVERABILITY

If any term or provision of this Contract, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Contract, or the application of such terms or provisions to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected, and every other term provision of this Contract shall be deemed valid and enforceable to the extent permitted by law.

ARTICLE 24- ENTIRETY OF CONTRACTUAL CONTRACT

The CITY and the CONTRACTOR agree that this Contract sets forth the entire Contract between the parties, and that there are no promises or understandings other than those stated herein. None of the provisions, terms and conditions contained in this Contract may be added to, modified, superseded or otherwise altered, except by written instrument executed by the parties hereto in accordance with Article 25 - Modifications of Work.

ARTICLE 25 - MODIFICATIONS OF WORK

The CITY reserves the right to make changes in Scope of Work, including alterations, reductions therein or additions thereto. Upon receipt by the CONTRACTOR of the CITY's notification of a contemplated change, the CONTRACTOR shall, **in writing**:

- Provide a detailed estimate for the increase or decrease in cost due to the contemplated change,
- (2) Notify the CITY of any estimated change in the completion date, and
- (3) Advise the CITY if the contemplated change shall affect the CONTRACTOR'S ability to meet the completion dates or schedules of this Contract.

If the CITY so instructs in writing, the CONTRACTOR shall suspend work on that portion of the Scope of Work affected by a contemplated change, pending the CITY's decision to proceed with the change.

If the CITY elects to make the change, the CITY shall initiate a contract amendment and the CONTRACTOR shall not commence work on any such change until such written amendment is signed by the authorized representative for the CITY.

Such changes, if any, shall be set forth in writing, which may be transmitted, at the CITY'S discretion, digitally.

ARTICLE 26 - NOTICE

All notices required in this Contract shall be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and if sent to the CITY shall be mailed to:

ARTICLE 27 - CAPTIONS AND PARAGRAPH HEADINGS

Captions and paragraph headings contained in this Contract are for convenience and reference only and in no way define, describe, extend or limit the scope and intent of this Contract, nor the intent of any provisions hereof.

No waiver by the CITY of any provision of this Contract shall be deemed to be a waiver of any other provisions hereof or of any subsequent breach of the same or any other provision or the enforcement hereof. CITY's consent to of or approval of any act by Contractor requiring consent or approval shall not be deemed to render unnecessary the obtaining of CITY's consent or approval of any subsequent act by Contractor requiring the CITY'S consent or approval, whether or not similar to the act so consented to or approved.

ARTICLE 30 - COUNTERPARTS

This Contract may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same Contract.

ARTICLE 31 - EXHIBITS ARE INCLUSIONARY

SCOPE OF WORK

Community Bus Services

GENERAL SCOPE OF SERVICES:

The City of Lauderdale Lakes seek the services of a qualified Contractor to provide day to day management, operation and maintenance of the public transportation services for Lauderdale Lakes North/South and East/West routes. The services shall be nine (9) hours per day, Monday through Friday within the City, at the locations and according to the schedules set forth.

II. PROPOSER'S SERVICES:

- A. The Proposer agrees to provide all services necessary for the day-to-day management, operation and maintenance of the public transportation services for the Lauderdale Lakes, North/South and East/West Transit Routes according to Exhibit "A", Bus schedule – North/South and East/West routes.
- B. The Proposer shall provide free public transportation services (until such time as City determines a fare to be appropriate), within the City at the locations and according to the schedules set forth in Exhibit "A", Bus schedule North/South and East/West routes.
- C. The established service shall be for two (2) buses on a fixed route basis with designated intermediate stops a minimum of fifty (50) hours per week (9:00 am 5:55 pm) Saturdays 6 hours per week (8:00am-2pm) for Route #1 and fifty (50) hours per week (9:00 am 5:55 pm) Saturdays 6 hours per week (8:00am-2pm) for Route # 2 and a minimum of five (5) days per week for both routes. The hours of operation may be amended from time to time at the discretion of the City and Broward County to respond to budgetary constraints and/or the needs of the community.
- D. The City and Proposer shall maintain a minimum average of seven (7) passengers per revenue hour on the route operated by the City and Proposer. In the event that City and Proposer do not maintain such minimum average of passengers, City and Proposer shall attempt to increase ridership, which may include modification of the route.
- E. The Vehicle shall be operated by a properly licensed operator ("vehicle chauffeurs") employed by the Proposer. The Proposer is required to have a Class A or B CDL license. These employees shall provide full utilization of vehicle to all including disabled passengers while in service.
- F. Vehicle chauffeurs hired by Proposer shall issue Broward County bus route timetables or other transit information to any passenger requesting such material.
- G. Insofar as possible, scheduled service shall be coordinated with existing Broward County bus service. It is the intent of the parties that City's scheduled service shall not duplicate existing Broward County bus service.
- H. The Proposer shall maintain the vehicle provided by the City in accordance with the Manufacturer's standards and keep vehicle in reasonable and operating conditions at all times.
- I. The Proposer will be held responsible for meeting the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) while the vehicle provided herein is utilized for City transportation. To the extent that any

terms of the eventual Contract are inconsistent with the ADA, the requirements of the ADA shall prevail.

- J. The Proposer shall at all times comply with the requirements of Broward County Ordinance 92-8, pertaining to the maintenance of a Drug-Free Workplace Program.
- K. The Proposer shall at all times comply with all applicable requirements of the United States Department of Transportation and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), which shall include, but not be limited to regulations for drug and alcohol testing. To the extent that any terms of the intended Contract are inconsistent with the United States Department of Transportation regulations, the requirements of the United States Department of Transportation shall control.
- L. The Proposer agrees that throughout the term of this Agreement that the Broward County Transit (BCT) logo, the Broward County assigned identification number and the City of Lauderdale Lakes logo shall be conspicuously displayed on the rear of the vehicle at all times.
- M. The Proposer shall maintain certain records of information and data in the format prescribed by Broward County and shall furnish such records to Broward County, with a copy to the City, on a monthly basis.
- N. The Proposer shall, at all times, ensure that the vehicles are equipped with fully operational Florida Relay System equipment to assist the hearing and speech impaired riders.
- O. Per the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 and the Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992, Provider may not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, family or religious status, in the selection and retention of any employees and/or subcontractors.

III. <u>CITY'S SERVICES:</u>

- A. The City shall review all policies established by the Proposer relative to the public transportation services.
- B. City shall review the service planning, including adjustments to the routes, schedules, and such other factors that affect the quality of service provided.
- C. The City shall provide Proposer with bus route timetable prepared by Broward County Mass Transit Division sufficient to inform City and Broward County residents, visitors and passengers of service to be made available.
- D. The City, in coordination with Broward County, shall be responsible for designation of transit stops. It is understood that passengers will be able to board at designated stops or depart from anywhere along the route as well as designated stops.
- E. The City shall lease to Proposer two (2) twenty (20) passenger, wheelchair accessible, passenger vehicles, obtained from County, to be used in regular service route. Such vehicles shall comply with the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 and all applicable federal and state regulations. The vehicle shall be leased to the Proposer for Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per year. Prior to acceptance of the vehicle by Proposer, the Proposer, at its own cost, shall have the right to inspect, or cause to be inspected, the vehicle by a mechanic designated by the Proposer.
- F. The City shall provide the manufacturer's warranties and maintenance shop manuals to the Proposer.

IV. <u>COMPENSATION:</u>

- A. In return for services provided by the Proposer, the City agrees to pay the Proposer on an hourly basis, per hour in revenue service. The funds shall be used by Proposer solely for the purposes of maintaining, operating and properly equipping the vehicle and for no other purpose. City shall not be responsible for payment of any other monies to the Proposer.
- B. The City shall hold the funds distributed by Broward County to support the public transportation service and remit the applicable amount of such funds monthly to Proposer as they become due. Proposer shall submit invoices to the City documenting hours of service provided by the Proposer during the preceding month, together with such additional documentation which may be required by the City (e.g. ridership statistics). Within thirty (30) days of receipt of such invoices, City shall compensate Proposer pursuant to the terms set forth in the Agreement.

V. PERFORMANCE STANDARDS:

- A. The public transportation service described in the Agreement shall begin operations when the notice to proceed is issued, and such service shall run according to the schedule set forth in Exhibit "A". The schedule shall be followed unless otherwise agreed upon in writing by the parties.
- B. The Proposer shall complete one hundred percent of all scheduled trips on a daily basis, subject to delays which are attributable to (added: traffic conditions), vehicular accidents, and mechanical breakdowns.

VI. PERSONNEL REQUIREMENTS:

- A. Proposer shall designate a Project Manager who will oversee the complete operation of the public transportation service and will serve as the day-to-day liaison with the City.
- B. Vehicle chauffeurs employed by the Proposer during the term of the intended Contract shall be properly licensed operators. The vehicle chauffeurs shall possess the qualifications required by the State of Florida and Broward County. The vehicle chauffeurs shall be required to attend and successfully complete Broward County's training program prior to operating the vehicles. All drivers shall possess the following qualifications and adhere to the following standards. Proposer shall immediately dismiss any driver from performing services, should the driver fall to maintain said qualifications or standards as listed below:
- Minimum age for drivers shall be 21 years.
- > Drivers must possess a valid Florida Commercial driver's license as required by law.
- > Drivers shall have no more than three (3) moving violations or accidents (counted individually or combined) within a five (5) year period. Drivers shall have no history of a conviction for a DUI.
- Drivers must be capable of speaking, writing, and understanding the English language fluently.
- > Drivers shall operate the vehicle in a safe and timely manner.
- > Drivers shall be courteous to all passengers and the general public at all times and shall respond to passenger questions regarding the use of the subject service.
- > At all times while on duty, drivers shall wear clean and presentable uniforms which include a company shirt, appropriate length shorts, skirt or pants and closed toe shoes.
- Drivers shall distribute or collect flyers, handouts, surveys, etc. as City may request from time to time.
- Drivers shall not accept gratuitles.
- > Drivers shall assist all passengers, including passengers with disabilities with entering and exiting the vehicles.
- > Drivers shall not smoke or play radios, or permit passengers to do the same in the vehicles (unless the passenger is using headphones with radios).
- > Driver shall not talk on cellular phones nor have on headphones while operating vehicles.
- > Drivers shall not be convicted of a crime during the term of the Contract.

Drivers shall not test positive for drug test administered by a responsible testing facility or in cooperation with the drug-testing program at Broward County or the City.

VII. CONDITION AND MAINTENANCE OF VEHICLES

- Proposer shall maintain the vehicles in accordance with manufacturer's standards.
- B. Proposer shall supply any additional vehicles to provide for back-up service within thirty (30) minutes in the event that vehicle is out of service. Proposer shall provide an ADA accessible backup vehicle should it be necessary to continue service as outlined in this contract.
- C. Vehicle shall be maintained in good condition, operationally and be in clean appearance at all times. The vehicle shall be kept in good repair and condition, satisfactory to the City at a minimum to the standards listed below;
 - 1. Equipping of Vehicle:
 - > The vehicle shall be equipped with all required safety equipment.
 - > The vehicle shall be equipped with two-way communications to be provided by the Proposer.
 - The vehicles shall conform to the standards required by the Americans With Disabilities (ADA).
 - The vehicle shall have heating and air conditioning systems that are fully operational every day the vehicle is in service.

2. Maintenance of vehicle

- The interiors of the vehicle shall be cleaned at least once per day and the exterior shall be cleaned at least once per week. The vehicle shall be exterminated for pests at least once per week. Proposer shall have a continuing obligation to ensure cleanliness of the vehicle, and Proposer shall perform additional cleaning and extermination for pests as circumstances may warrant.
- The vehicle and equipment of the vehicle shall be maintained in fully operational condition at all times during the term of the contract. Proposer shall cause all components of each vehicle, including its body, frame, graphic wrap, furnishings, mechanical, electrical, hydraulic, rims, tires or other operating systems to be maintained according to manufacturer's recommendations. Proposer shall cause any vehicle damaged in an accident or otherwise to be repaired to be replaced immediately, including the graphic wraps. Proposer shall, at its sole cost and expense, provide fuel, lubricants, parts and supplies as required for the maintenance and operation of the vehicle.
- The vehicle shall be safe for operation on public streets and highways and shall meet all requirements of the Florida Department of Transportation Rule Chapter 14-90, "Minimum Requirements for Transit Coaches and System Equipment." All parts of the vehicle and equipment mounted on or in the vehicle shall conform at a minimum to all applicable federal motor vehicle safety standards.
- Proposer shall initiate and maintain an effective safety and mechanical inspection program.
- The vehicle shall be available for inspection by the City prior to Proposer placing them in service and at any time thereafter at the City's discretion. City has the sole discretion to reject temporarily or permanently any vehicle which City deems acceptable for reasons of safety, disrepair or appearance.

VIII. RECORD KEEPING, REPORTING AND AUDITING

A. The Proposer shall maintain such records and accounts including property, personnel, and financial records as are deemed necessary by City to ensure a proper accounting record. The system of accounting will be in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and

practices. All project records prepared by Proposer shall be owned by City and made available to City at no charge. City may elect to authorize representatives to inspect, audit, and analyze the records of Proposer relating to the subject service. City shall have the right to audit the books, records and accounts of the Proposer. Proposer shall keep such books, records, and accounts as may be necessary in order to record complete and correct entries related to the project or according to the scheduled reporting periods.

- B. Proposer shall record on a daily basis and report daily to the City all disruptions in service, to include but not limited to late service, vehicle breakdowns, accidents, if a vehicle is out of service and any other incidents affecting service.
- C. Proposer's Project Manager shall also document passenger complaints and describe any actions taken to resolve such complaints on a weekly basis. Proposer agrees to submit copies of such documentation to the City on a weekly basis.
- D. Proposer shall maintain daily records of total passenger utilization and total mileage logged on the vehicle while performing the services. Proposer's Project Manager shall provide accurate reports on ridership by trip to the City on a monthly basis.
- City shall approve Proposer's forms that may be required.
- F. In the event funds paid to Proposer are subsequently disallowed by the City because of accounting errors or charges not in conformity with the services to be rendered, Proposer shall refund promptly to the City such disallowed funds or such disallowed funds will be withheld from subsequent payment by the City to the Proposer. No payment will be withheld or disallowed until the City has given the Proposer written notice of the reason, with ten (10) days to correct, cure or otherwise reasonably satisfy the City. No more than the disputed amount will be withheld. Both City and Proposer shall diligently pursue the resolution of any dispute regarding the accounting or charges.
- G. Proposer shall retain all financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, and any other documents pertinent to these services for a period of five (5) years after termination of the resultant contract, or if an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of five (5) years, the records shall be retained until resolution of the audit findings. The contract shall also adhere to Public Records, Chapter 119 of the Florida Statue.

IX. PRE-SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

The following items shall be delivered to the City by Proposer at least two (2) days prior to the start of service and are subject to approval by the City:

- A. An operations manual for the subject services which describes all operations, procedures and policies, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - Vehicle operating procedures
 - > Communications operating procedures
 - > Driver conduct rules and regulations
 - Safety procedures
 - > Accident procedures
 - Administration and reporting procedures, and
 - > Other operating procedures and policies, as required for proper operation of the subject service
- B. Job descriptions for drivers and administrative personnel
- C. Maintenance procedures for the vehicle.
- D. Training procedures for drivers.

K. MISCELLANEOUS REQUIREMENTS

- A. The City will manage and receive all funds for advertising on or in the buses. Advertising of any alcohol, tobacco, adult entertainment, gambling, overtly sexual material, or obscene or offensive materials will be prohibited. If the City reasonably objects to any advertisement, such advertisement shall be removed within fifteen (15) days of written notice.
- B. <u>FINES:</u> The Proposer acknowledges that the City will incur certain costs or damages in monitoring and seeking conformance with the requirement of the Agreement, or in the event of a breach of this Agreement, the amount(s) of which cannot be specifically ascertained, notwithstanding their respective efforts to do so. Accordingly, the Proposer and City have established a governing schedule of fines. The Schedule of fines the City will assess against the Proposer as a consequence of the Proposer's fallure to conform to the customer service requirements as outlined in the Agreement are as follows:
- > Fallure to provide backup service within thirty (30) minutes in the event that one or more vehicles are out of service shall result in a fine of \$30.00 per hour per affected bus or van.
- > Failure to provide heat or air conditioning shall result in a fine of \$30.00 per hour per affected bus or van.
- > Failure to maintain vehicles shall result in a fine of \$15.00 per hour per affected bus or van.
- > Failure to maintain transit schedule within a 15 minute window, excluding acts of weather, road construction/closing, or driver illness shall result in a fine of \$6.00 per hour per affected bus or van.
- > Failure to notify the City regarding any changes in schedule shall result in a fine of \$6.00 per hour per affected bus or van.
- *All fines shall be prorated for any portion less than one (1) hour.
 - CITY OF C. COMPORTMENT; CHANGE OF PERSONNEL: At all times when such personnel are in the LAUDERDALE LAKES, whether or not on duty, such personnel shall comport themselves in a manner which will not bring disrespect upon the City or call into the question the competence or demeanor of such person relative to the performance of the transportation services, which, by its minors and the handicapped. nature, requires such personnel to potentially come into contact with The City reserves the right to require the change of any personnel upon not less than three (3) business be replaced, or in the absence of a day's written notice, setting forth the name of the person to name, the route taken and the time of day in which the transportation services were provided.
 - D. <u>DUTY ROSTER:</u> The Proposer shall provide the City with the name of each personnel, and the route and date of such individual's duty station. Such roster shall be provided on a weekly basis as of Friday of the week preceding.
 - E. HOLDING OF FUNDS: The City shall hold the funds distributed by Broward County to support the public transportation service and remit the applicable amount of such funds monthly to Proposer as they become due. Proposer shall submit invoices to the City documenting hours of service provided by the Proposer during the preceding month together with such additional documentation which may be required by the City (e.g. ridership statistics). Within thirty (30) days of receipt of such invoices, City shall compensate Proposer pursuant to the terms set forth herein.
 - F. LIVING WAGE REQUIREMENT: To the extent Proposer is a "covered employer" within the meaning of Broward County Ordinance No. 2002-45, as may be amended from time to time, City agrees to and shall pay to all of its employees providing "covered services," as defined therein, a living wage as required by such ordinance, and City shall fully comply with the requirements of such ordinance and shall satisfy, comply with, and complete all of the obligations set forth therein. City shall be responsible for and shall ensure that all of its subcontractors that qualify as covered employers fully comply with the requirements of such ordinance and satisfy, comply with, and complete all of the obligations set forth therein.

It has come to our attention that the Agreement between the City of Lauderdale Lakes and Limousines of South Florida, Inc. for the Community Bus Service (Contract #19-3410-04R), dated March 26, 2019, has expired. As you are aware, the original contract was for a term of two years, with three (3) one-year renewal options. The final renewal, executed on May 3, 2023, expired on April 30, 2024.

Attached for your reference are copies of the original Agreement and the most recent Renewal Extension.

In light of the expiration of the existing contract and to ensure continuity of service, Limousines of South Florida, Inc. respectfully proposes to continue providing Community Bus Service to the City under a month-to-month agreement for a period of six (6) months, beginning August 1, 2025, and ending January 31, 2026.

ALL TERMS AND CONDITIONS PURCHASE ORDER #:

If there is a conflict between these additional Terms and Conditions and the Terms and Conditions listed on the Purchase Order, these additional Terms and Conditions shall prevail. For the purpose of this Purchase order and these Purchase Order Additional terms and Conditions, the terms Purchase Order and Contract may be used interchangeably, and when so used, deemed to have the same meaning in the context of this document.

Article 1. <u>Time of Completion</u>: The Work must begin upon notification to CONTRACTOR and Issuance of this Purchase Order by the CITY, and shall be carried on at a rate to insure its full completion as per the attached Schedules and Scope of Work, the rate of progress and the time of completion being essential conditions of this Contract, time being of the essence.

Article 2. General: The CONTRACTOR hereby certifies each and every clause of the Contract Documents has been read, the location of the proposed work has been examined as is necessary to understand fully the nature of the obligation made, and the Work will be completed in the time limits specified, in accordance with the plans and specifications.

All Work under this contract shall be done to the satisfaction of the City's Project Manager who shall, in all cases, determine the amount, quality, fitness and acceptability of the Work to be paid for hereunder, and shall decide all questions which may arise as to the fulfillment of the Contract on the part of the CONTRACTOR; and their decision thereon shall be final and conclusive as to the CONTRACTOR; and such determination and decision, in case any questions shall arise, shall be a condition precedent to the right of the CONTRACTOR to receive any money hereunder.

Article 3. <u>Progress Payments:</u> CONTRACTOR may make Application for Payment for Work completed during the Project at intervals of not more than once a month. The Contractor's application shall show a complete breakdown of the Project components showing the quantitles completed and the amount requested, together with such supporting evidence as may be required by the CITY.

Each Application for Payment shall be submitted in triplicate to the CITY for approval. The CITY shall make payment to the CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) days after approval by the CITY of CONTRACTOR'S Application for Payment and submission of an acceptable updated progress schedule.

The CITY may withhold, in whole or in part, payment to such extent as may be necessary to protect itself from loss on account of:

- A. Defective work not remedied.
- Claims filed or reasonable evidence indicating probable filing of claims by other parties against CONTRACTOR.
- Failure of CONTRACTOR to make payment properly to subcontractors or for material or labor.
- D. Damage to another CONTRACTOR not remedied.

 E. Liquidated damages and costs incurred by the CiTY for extended construction administration.

When the above grounds are removed or resolved satisfactorily to the CITY, payment may be made.

Article 4. Acceptance and Final Payment: Upon receipt of written notice from CONTRACTOR the work is complete and ready for final inspection and acceptance, CiTY shall, within ten (10) calendar days, make an inspection thereof. If CiTY finds the Work acceptable, the requisite documents have been submitted, the requirements of the Contract Documents fully satisfied, and all conditions of the permits and regulatory agencies have been met, the CiTY's Projects Manager shall approve the Final Payment.

Before the Final Payment, CONTRACTOR shall deliver to CITY a complete waiver of ilen(s) or release of all lien(s), as applicable, arising out of this Contract, or receipts in full for all work; and an Affidavit certifying that all suppliers and subcontractors have been paid in full, and that all other indebtedness connected with the Work has been paid.

Final payment constituting the entire unpaid balance of the Contract sum shall be paid by CITY to the CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) days after completion of all Work, Contract fully performed and a final certificate for payment has been issued by the CITY'S representative.

Article 5. <u>Guarantee</u>: All work, materials and equipment furnished by the CONTRACTOR shall conform to industry and CITY standards. Any part of the equipment, materials, or work included in this Contract which proves defective, by reason of faulty materials or workmanship shall be corrected within twenty four (24) hours by CONTRACTOR at no additional cost to the CITY.

Article 6. Qualifications: CONTRACTOR, and the Individual executing this Contract on behalf of the CONTRACTOR, warrants to the CITY that the CONTRACTOR is a Florida Contractor in good standing, and that the CONTRACTOR has all the required licenses and certifications of competency required by the State of Florida and the County of Broward to perform the Work herein described.

- Article 7. Quality and Workmanship: The workmanship must be of the highest quality in its respective field,
- Article 8. <u>Barricades and Signs</u>: CONTRACTOR shall provide signs, barricades, and flashing lights necessary for the protection of the Work and the safety of the public.
- Article 9. The Contract Documents: The Purchase Order consists of the General Conditions, Additional terms and conditions, Agreement of Award letter, to include the Schedules and Pricing, and any applicable Change Orders.
- Article 10. <u>Debris</u>: CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for the prompt and complete removal and lawful disposal of all debris that results from performance of the Work.
- Article 11. Equipment, Work and Personnel: Unless otherwise stated in the Contract Documents, all

equipment to be incorporated in the Work are to be of the most suitable type of their respective kinds and shall be acceptable to the CITY. The CITY reserves the right to remove any of CONTRACTOR'S equipment or personnel not acceptable to the CITY for reason(s) expressed by the CITY.

Article 12. Compliance With Occupational Safety and Health Requirements: CONTRACTOR certifies that all material, equipment, etc., contained in his/her bid meets all applicable O.S.H.A. requirements. CONTRACTOR further certifies that, if the material, equipment, etc., delivered is subsequently found to be defective in any applicable O.S.H.A. requirement effect on the date of delivery, all costs necessary to comply with the requirements shall be borne by the CONTRACTOR.

Article 13. Entire Contract: Modification: No statements, representations, warranties, either written or oral, from whatever source arising, except as expressly stated in this Contract, shall have any legal validity between the parties or be binding upon any of them. The parties acknowledge that this Contract contains the entire understanding and Contract of the parties. No modifications hereof shall be effective unless made in writing and executed by the parties hereto with the same formalities as this Contract is executed. If any term in the CONTRACTOR's Proposal appears to be in direct or apparent conflict with the Contract, then the terms of the contract shall prevall.

Article 14. <u>Venue</u>: This Contract and the terms hereof shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida and venue for all actions in a court of competent jurisdiction shall lie in Broward County, Florida.

Article 15. <u>Deletion/Oversight/Misstatement</u>: Any deletion, oversight or misstatement of the Specifications shall not release the CONTRACTOR from the responsibility of supplying a complete and fully operational unit, together with all appurtenances necessary for unrestricted operation as determined by the CITY in its sole discretion.

Article 16. Indemnification: CONTRACTOR agrees to protect, defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the CITY, its employees, representatives, and elected officials from any and all claims and liabilities including all attorney's fees, expenses, and court costs, including appeals, for which the CITY, its employees and representatives, can or may be held liable as a result of injury (including death) to persons or damage to property occurring by reason of any negligence, recklessness, or intentional wrongful misconduct of the CONTRACTOR, its employees, or agents, arising out of or connected with this The CONTRACTOR shall not be required to contract. Indemnify the CITY or its agents, employees, or representatives, when an occurrence results solely from the wrongful acts or omissions of the CITY, or its agents, employees or representatives.

The CONTRACTOR, without exemption, shall indemnify and save harmless, the CITY, its employees and its Commission Members from liability of any nature or kind, including cost and expenses for or on account of any copyrighted, patented, or unpatented invention, process, or item manufactured by the CONTRACTOR. Further, if such a claim is made, or is pending, the CONTRACTOR may, at its option and expense, procure for the CiTY the right to use, replace or modify the item to render it non-infinging. If none of the alternatives are reasonably available, the CiTY agrees to

return the article on request to the CONTRACTOR and receive reimbursement.

If the CONTRACTOR used any design, device or materials covered by letters, patent or copyright, it is mutually agreed and understood, without exception, the contract prices shall include all royalties or cost arising from the use of such design, device or materials in any way involved in the work.

The parties agree that 1% of the total compensation paid to the CONTRACTOR for performance of this Contract shall represent the specific consideration for the CONTRACTOR'S indemnification of the Owner.

It is the specific intent of the parties hereto that the foregoing indemnification complies with Florida Statute 725.06 (Chapter 725). It is further the specific intent and Contract of the parties that all of the Contract Documents on this Project are hereby amended to include the foregoing indemnification and the "Specific Consideration" therefor.

Article 17. <u>Definition of Terms</u>: Terms used in this Contract shall have the meanings assigned to them in the Industry.

Article 18. <u>Intent of Specifications</u>: These Specifications cover only the general requirements as to the type of construction. The removal and disposal of existing materials will conform to all OSHA, CiTY, State, County, Federal, and EPA requirements relating to this operation.

Article 19. Exceptions to Specifications: Any exceptions to the Specifications must be listed and explained. Failure to list any exceptions means CONTRACTOR is in 100% compliance with Specifications. All materials may be inspected upon delivery for compliance with Specifications. Deviations will not be tolerated and will be cause for rejection unless they were originally listed in CONTRACTOR'S proposal or approved (in writing) by the CITY. Any deletion, oversight or misstatement of these Specifications shall not release the CONTRACTOR from the responsibility of performing the Work as per industry and CITY standards as determined by the CITY in its sole discretion.

Article 20. <u>Silence of Specifications</u>: The apparent Silence of Specifications as to any details or the omission from them of a detailed description concerning any point, shall be regarded as meaning that only the best commercial practices are to prevail and that materials of the first quality and correct type, size and design are to be used.

Article 21. <u>Joint Preparation</u>: The preparation of this Contract has been a joint effort of the parties, and the resulting document shall not, solely as a matter of judicial construction, be construed more severely against one of the parties than the other. It is the parties further intention that this Contract be construed liberally to achieve its intent.

Article 22. Enforcement Costs: If any legal action or other proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Contract, or because of an alleged dispute, breach, default or misrepresentation in connection with any provisions of this Contract, the successful or prevailing party or parties shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees, expenses and court costs, including appellate fees incurred in that action or proceeding, in addition to any other relief to which such party or parties may be entitled.

Article 23. <u>Subcontracting:</u> The CITY reserves the right to accept the use of a subcontractor or to reject the selection of a particular subcontractor and to inspect all facilities of any subcontractors in order to make a determination as to the capability of the subcontractor to perform properly under this Contract. The CONTRACTOR is encouraged to seek minority and women business enterprises, to include local businesses for participation in subcontracting opportunities. If the CONTRACTOR uses any subcontractors on this project the following provisions of this Article shall apply:

If a subcontractor falls to perform or make progress, as required by this Contract, and it is necessary to replace the subcontractor to complete the work in a timely fashion, the CONTRACTOR shall promptly do so, subject to acceptance of the new subcontractor by the CITY. The substitution of a subcontractor shall not be adequate cause to excuse a delay in the performance of any portion of this contract as set forth in the Scope of Work.

The CONTRACTOR, its subcontractors, agents, servants, or employees agree to be bound by the Terms and Conditions of this Contract and in its Contract with the subcontractor for work to be performed for the CITY the CONTRACTOR must incorporate the terms of this Contract.

Article 24. <u>Subcontractors:</u> No more than fifty percent (50%) of the dollar value of the total Contract WORK may be accomplished by subcontractors. Balance of the WORK must be accomplished by the CONTRACTOR'S own forces. Each CONTRACTOR must furnish with its Bid Form, a list of the items it proposes to subcontract and the estimated cost of these items.

Article 25 <u>Licenses and Permits</u>: It shall be the responsibility of the CONTRACTOR to obtain and supply at no additional cost to the CITY, any and all licenses and permits required to complete the Contract. A copy of these licenses and permits shall be submitted to the CITY prior to commencement of work.

Article 26. <u>Insurance:</u> It shall be the responsibility of the CONTRACTOR to provide evidence of the following minimum amounts of insurance coverage;

Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability coverage to apply to all employees for Statutory Limits in compliance with applicable state and federal laws. Coverage must include Employer's Liability with a minimum limit of \$100,000 each incident;

Business Auto Policy or similar form shall have minimal limits of \$500,000 Per Occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage Liability. This shall include, Owned, Hired and Non-Owned Vehicles;

Commercial General Liability or similar form shall have minimum limits of \$500,000 Per Occurrence Combined Single Limit for Personal Injury, Bodily Injury, and Property Damage Liability. Coverage shall include Premises and/or Operations, Independent Contractors, Products and /or Complete Operations, Contractual Liability and Broad Form Property Damage Endorsements. Coverage for the hazards of explosion, collapse and underground property damage (XCU) must also be included when applicable to the work to be performed.

All Risk Property Insurance: When applicable, coverage must include real and personal property and in an amount equal to the replacement cost of all real and personal property and in an amount equal to the replacement cost of all real and personal property of the CITY's for which the CONTRACTOR is responsible and over which he exercises control. Builders Risk Insurance must be provided to cover property under construction and an installation Floater must cover all machinery, vessels, air conditioners, or electric generators to be installed. This insurance shall include a waiver of subrogation as to the CONSULTANT, the CITY, the CONTRACTOR, and their respective officers, agents, employees, and subcontractors.

- Coverage to be provided on a full replacement cost basis.
- Losses in excess of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) shall be jointly payable to the CONTRACTOR and the CITY.
- Policy must be specifically endorsed to eliminate any "Occupancy Clause" or similar warranty or representation that the CITY will not occupy the building(s), addition(s) or structure(s).
- d. Maximum Deductible \$5,000 each claim.
- e. Flood Insurance. When the buildings or structures are located within an Identified special flood hazard area, flood insurance protecting the interest of the CONTRACTOR and the CITY must be afforded for the lesser of the total insurable value of such buildings or structures, or the maximum amount of flood insurance coverage available under the National Flood Program.

An original or certified copy of the signed Certificate or Certificates of Insurance, evidencing that required Insurance coverage(s) has been procured by CONTRACTOR in the types and amount(s) required hereunder, shall be included with the bid response.

After award, except as to Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability, said Certificate(s) shall clearly state that coverage required by the Contract has been endorsed to include the CITY of Lauderdale Lakes, a political subdivision of the State of Florida, its officers, agents and employees as Additional Insured. Required insurance shall support Contractor's indemnity set forth in the Contract and shall unequivocally provide thirty (30) days written notice to the CITY prior to any adverse change, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage thereunder. Said liability insurance must be acceptable to and approved by the CITY as to form and types of coverage. In the event that the statutory liability of the CITY is amended during the term of this Contract to exceed the above limits, CONTRACTOR shall be required, upon thirty (30) days written notice by the CITY, to provide coverage at least equal to the amended statutory limit of liability of the CITY.

It shall be the responsibility of the CONTRACTOR to insure that all subcontractors comply with the same insurance requirements referenced above.

Article 27. Independent Contractor Relationship: The CONTRACTOR is, and shall be, in the performance of all work services and activities under this Contract, an independent contractor, and not an employee, agent, or servant of the CITY. All persons engaged in any of the Work

or services performed pursuant to this Contract shall at all times and in all places be subject to the CONTRACTOR'S sole direction, supervision, and control. The CONTRACTOR shall exercise control over the means and manner in which it and its employees perform the Work and in all respects the CONTRACTOR'S relationship and the relationship of its employees to the CITY shall be that of an independent contractor and not as employees or agents of the CITY.

Article 28. Severability: If any term or provision of this Contract, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Contract, or the application of such terms or provisions to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected, and every other term provision of this Contract shall be deemed valid and enforceable to the extent permitted by law.

Article 29. Waiver: No waiver by the CITY of any provision of this Contract shall be deemed to be a waiver of any other provisions hereof or of any subsequent breach by of the same, or any other provision or the enforcement thereof. CITY's consent to or approval of any act requiring consent or approval shall not be deemed to render unnecessary the obtaining of CITY's consent to or approval of any subsequent consent or approval of, whether or not similar to the act so consented or approved.

Article 30. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>: The CITY and the CONTRACTOR each binds itself and its partners, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns to the other party of this Contract to the partners, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of such other party, in respect to all covenants of this Contract. Except as above noted neither CITY nor the CONTRACTOR shall assign, sublet, convey or transfer its interest in this Contract. Nothing herein shall be construed as creating any rights or benefits hereunder to anyone other than the CITY and the CONTRACTOR.

Article 31. <u>Termination:</u> Any Contract resulting from this Request For Quotation may be terminated, in whole or in part, by the CITY, with or without cause, immediately upon providing written notice to the CONTRACTOR. Unless the CONTRACTOR is in breach of this Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall be paid for the services rendered to the CITY's satisfaction through the date of termination. After CONTRACTOR's receipt of

the notice of termination, and except as otherwise directed by the CITY, the CONTRACTOR shall stop work on the date set forth in the notice of termination, and terminate and settle all orders and subcontracts relating to the performance of the terminated work.

Article 32 Annual Appropriation: This Bid is conditional upon the City having funding to implement the Contract.

Article 33. F.O.B. POINT, INSTALLED AS INDICATED: The F.O.B. point shall be installed at the location(s) specified herein on the attached specifications.

Article 34. Alternate or Equal: Unless otherwise specified, the mention of the particular manufacturer's brand name or number in the Specifications does not imply that this particular product is the only one that will be considered for purchase. This reference is intended solely to designate the type or quality of merchandise that will be acceptable. Alternate offers will be considered only if they can be demonstrated to be of equal quality to the specification, and must include descriptive literature and Specifications. Failure to provide descriptive literature and Specifications with alternate offers may be cause for disqualification of the Alternate.

Article 35. <u>Liquidated Damages</u> Should scheduled and/or assigned work not be completed by the required date, CONTRACTOR acknowledges that the CITY will suffer damages, the nature and extent of such damages suffered by the CITY not being capable of specific determination. Therefore, CONTRACTOR agrees to pay the CITY not as a penalty, but as liquidated damages a sum equal to One Hundred and Twenty Dollars (\$120.00) per day for each day elapsing between expiration of such time limit until the date of full completion of that portion of the work and CITY acceptance of it.

Where any deductions from or forfeitures of payment in connection with the work of this contract are duly and properly imposed against the CONTRACTOR, in accordance with the terms of this Contract, State Laws, governing ordinances or regulations, the total amount thereof may be withheld from any monies due or to become due the CONTRACTOR under the Contract; and when deducted, shall be deemed and taken as payment in such amount.
