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WORKSHOP MEETING MINUTES Special Commission Workshop Located in the Alfonso Gereffi Room March 20, 2017 5:00 PM

1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Hazelle Rogers called the March 20, 2017 Special Workshop to order at 5:02 p.m. in the Alfonso Gereffi Room, located at 4300 N.W. 36th Street, Lauderdale Lakes, Florida 33319.

2. ROLL CALL

3. DISCUSSION

DISCUSSION REGARDING PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 30-33, 30-52, 30-86, AND 30-87.1 AND CREATING SECTION 30-96 OF ARTICLES II AND III OF CHAPTER 30, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

This is a discussion regarding amending Sections to Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances.

Tanya Davis-Hernandez, Director of Development Services and Edward Wallace, Code Compliance Supervisor presented information regarding Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinance. Ms. Davis-Hernandez and Mr. Wallace reviewed the portions of the Code or Ordinances that are being proposed to be amended. The Commission reviewed and evaluated the proposed ordinance section by section with city staff.

Ms. Davis-Hernandez and Mr. Wallace addressed questions from the Commission regarding the addition of a Code Enforcement board; the differences between a Code Enforcement board and the Special Magistrate; creation of the trust fund and solutions for such a fund. Ms. Davis-Hernandez stated that research was done on fifteen cities and eleven of the cities utilize the court system for citations.

City Manager Phil Alleyne spoke of the fine breakdown for violations. Commissioner Sandra Davey expressed her concerns about the amount of offenses per violation.

Commissioner Sandra Davey and Mayor Hazelle Rogers agreed that the offenses should be at a maximum of three. Commissioner Davey further suggested that the fines should be doubled with each offense.

Commissioner Gloria Lewis stated that she was a confused on the way the proposed Ordinance was written. City Attorney James Brady explained that the new items being considered were underlined and the previous items were stricken out. Code Enforcement Supervisor Edward Wallace further explained that the items that were stricken out still appear in other portions of the code and are still violations.

Discussion ensued amongst the Commission regarding certificates of use for restaurants who had outdoor cookouts and if the restaurant owner or the building owner would be held responsible for any violations. Commissioner Beverly Williams spoke of the maintenance of patio screens and working without permits.

DISCUSSION REGARDING PROPOSED ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION 86-5, AMENDING SECTION 86-35 AND CREATING SECTION 86-39 OF CHAPTER 86, ARTICLE II, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

This is a discussion regarding creating a Section and amending Chapter 86 of the Code of Ordinance.

Development Services Director, Tanya Davis-Hernandez and Code Compliance Supervisor, Edward Wallace addressed questions from the Commission regarding the parking issues throughout the City. Vice Mayor Veronica Edwards Phillips stated that she has seen the loading and unloading of cars on State Road 7 and NW 24th Street which was not safe. Mr. Wallace responded that should have been done on the property and not on the street.

City resident Martha McDonald stated that when she moved to the city in the 1980's everyone abided by the rules and now many residents do not because there is no consistency.

City resident Brenda (did not give last name) from Northgate expressed her concerns with parking safety within the City. Discussion ensued amongst the Commission regarding parking on swales and backward parking in driveways.

Commissioner Beverly Williams and Mayor Hazelle Rogers stated that for safety reasons many companies and older residents back in driveways and they do not believe that should be a violation. Commissioner Gloria Lewis requested that a continued discussion for parking issues be placed on the next agenda workshop.

Discussion further ensued amongst the Commission regarding the abuse of trees. Commissioner Sandra Davey stated that some residents have too many trees on their property which cause an infestation of insects and in many cases, the trees are not cared for and become a nuisance for neighbors as they limbs come over to their yards and fences. Development Services Director Tanya Davis-Hernandez stated that there is an Ordinance for the minimum number of trees required on a property but not a maximum.

The consensus from the Commission was to have a future workshop to continue the discussion on both proposed Ordinances.

City Manager Phil Alleyne advised the Commission that the City Clerk will add their nominees to the slate on the Resolution for tomorrow's night meeting.

ITEM 10B - RESOLUTION 2017-043 REQUESTING AN AMENDMENT TO THAT CERTAIN TRAFFIC ENGINEERING AGREEMENT WITH BROWARD COUNTY, DATED AS OF THE 24TH DAY OF JUNE, 1993, REGARDING TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

There was no discussion regarding this item.

ITEM 10C - RESOLUTION 2017-044 AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR AND

CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST, RESPECTIVELY, THAT CERTAIN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SCHOOL BOARD OF BROWARD COUNTY AND THE CITY REGARDING TRANSPORTATION SERVICES FOR A FIVE-YEAR TERM

ITEM 10E - RESOLUTION 2017-046 CREATING A BUDGET ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE FISCAL YEAR 2018 BUDGET

City Manager Phil Alleyne advised the Commission that the City Clerk will add their nominees for the Budget Advisory Committee to the slate on the Resolution for tomorrow's night meeting.

ITEM 10F - RESOLUTION 2017-047 AWARDING RFP #17-1302-01R TO METRO EQUIPMENT SERVICES INC., FOR PHASE I - STORMWATER CONVEYANCE AND WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT, AS THE MOST RESPONSIVE AND RESPONSIBLE PROPOSER, ON A REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL IN AN AMOUNT UP TO ONE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED FORTY-ONE THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED NINETY-TWO AND 55/100 DOLLARS (\$1,541,292.55).

Bobbi Williams, Purchasing Agent provided an overview of the item. Ms. Williams stated that the City solicited qualified firms and competent Contractor to provide all necessary construction services and materials for the Phase I - Stormwater Conveyance and Water Quality Improvement Project (Canals 4, 5A, 6 and 9) in accordance with the construction plans and specification. Ms. Williams stated that Metro Equipment Services Inc. was evaluated independently by an Evaluation Committee of three (3) members, which rated the firm an overall score of 294 out of a possible 300.

ITEM 10G - RESOLUTION 2017-048 AWARDING ITB #17-1302-05B TO VICTORY ENGINEERS AND GENERAL CONTRACTING, LLC FOR THE COMPREHENSIVE PARK IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, AS THE LOWEST RESPONSIVE AND RESPONSIBLE BIDDER, ON A INVITATION TO BID IN AN AMOUNT UP TO ONE HUNDRED NINETY-SIX THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED FIFTY-SIX DOLLARS (\$196,456.60)

Bobbi Williams, Purchasing Agent provided an overview of the item. Ms. Williams stated that the City solicited qualified firms for construction services and material for the Comprehensive Park Improvements Project and Victory Engineers and General Contracting was the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.

ITEM 10H - RESOLUTION 2017-049 AWARDING RFP #17-6365-06R TO E AND F ENTERPRISES, INC. DBA CREATIVE CONTRACTING GROUP FOR THE NW 41ST STREET ENTRYWAY IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, AS THE MOST RESPONSIVE AND RESPONSIBLE PROPOSER, ON A REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL IN AN AMOUNT UP TO THIRTY-FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$34,000).

Bobbi Williams, Purchasing Agent stated that E and F Enterprises, Inc. d/b/a Creative Contracting Group was the most responsive and responsible proposer for the 41st Street Entryway Improvements Project. Ms. Williams stated that project would include construction services to renovate the existing entryway walls, fountains and landscaping at the west intersection of NW 41st Street and State Road 7.

ITEM 10I - RESOLUTION 2017-050 AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO UTILIZE THE PORT CONSOLIDATED, INC. CONTRACT FOR UNLEADED GASOLINE AND DIESEL FUEL

THROUGH THE SOUTHEAST FLORIDA GOVERNMENTAL PURCHASING COOPERATIVE GROUP CONTRACT NO. E-13-17 FOR A THREE YEAR PERIOD, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) PER FISCAL YEAR, FROM MARCH 15, 2017 THROUGH MARCH 14, 2020.

Bobbi Williams stated the most recent contract with MacMillon Oil expired on March 31, 2017 and staff as asking permission to utilize the Port Consolidated, Inc. contract for unleaded gasoline and diesel fuel through the Southeast Florida Governmental Purchasing Cooperative Group.

ITEM 10J - RESOLUTION 2017-051 AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO APPROVE AND EXECUTE A PROCUREMENT PURCHASE EXCEEDING TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000) BUT LESS THAN FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$40,000) WITH HOME DEPOT

Bobbi Williams explained that historically the City uses Home Depot and due to an increase in capital improvements, facility maintenance and other citywide repairs, the need to purchase items from Home Depot has increased. Ms. Williams stated that City Manager has authority to use \$25,000.00 and it is anticipated that about \$40,000.00 will be needed.

City Manager Phil Alleyne spoke regarding the build out of Development Services will require an additional \$15,000.00.

Commissioner Gloria Lewis spoke regarding the amount that the City Manager is allowed to spend.

Commissioner Beverly Williams stated that she is certain that if the staff does not need the funds the money will not be used.

4. DISCUSSION OF PROPOSED ORDINANCE(S)

A. DISCUSSION REGARDING ADOPTING AN ORDINANCE WHICH HOLDS VENUES, BUSINESSES AND OTHER RESPONSIBLE PARTIES ACCOUNTABLE FOR POSTERS AND SNIPE SIGNS PLACED ON PUBLIC PROPERTY.

This is a discussion on a proposed Ordinance related to Snipe Signs. On March 27, 2017, the City Commission adopted a resolution urging Broward County to adopt the an ordinance addressing the defacing of public property and stated the City's support of efforts to improve the visual condition of public property within the City.

Mayor Rogers explained that the City is seeking support from Broward County to create a Countywide Ordinance regarding snipe signs; however, she believes the City should create an Ordinance to deal with the illegal posting of signs within their boundaries.

5. ADDITIONAL WORKSHOP ITEMS

A. DISCUSSION REGARDING LIEN MITIGATION

This is a discussion on creating a lien processes to address further lien reduction after a settlement offer has been provided by the City upon request by the applicant.

Tanya Davis-Hernandez, Director of Development Services and Edward Wallace, Code Compliance Supervisor, spoke regarding the lien process. Ms. Davis-Hernandez stated that staff is seeking direction from the Commission regarding the process for reducing liens. In recent months staff has been taking request received for further reduction to the City Commission on a case by case basis. There are no administrative policies on how to address liens that cannot be enforced, liens that are old, or liens that are recorded incorrectly. Staff is requesting that a formal process be implemented to provide direction to property owners on how to resolve these type of lien requests.

Commissioner Gloria Lewis likes the idea of bringing the lien requests to the Commission prior to reducing the lien.

B. DISCUSSION ON ROADWAY CONFIGURATION NEAR THE INTERSECTION OF STATE ROAD 7 AND NORTHWEST 29 STREET (TIME CERTAIN - 5:30 PM)

This is a discussion regarding the roadway configuration near the intersection of State Road 7 and NW 29 Street (westbound).

Mayor Hazelle Rogers spoke regarding traffic congestion on N. State Road 7 and N.W. 29th Street.

Ronald Desbrunes, Director of Public Works and a Representative from the Florida Department of Transportation presented a PowerPoint Presentation regarding the configuration of N.W. 29th Street. The Florida Department of Transportation presented the City with a solution to have two lanes on N.W. 29th Street turn right onto N. State Road 7, one lane turn left, and one head west into the Walmart Plaza.

Commissioner Gloria Lewis stated that she liked the idea and asked who would be responsible for the signage change. City Manager Phil Alleyne chimed in that anytime there are changes to the streets, the Department of Transportation would have to update the road signage.

C. DISCUSSION OF THE FY 2016 YEAR-END FINANCIAL AUDIT AND COMPREHENSIVE ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT (TIME CERTAIN - 6:00 P.M.)

This is a discussion on the City's FY 2016 Year-end financial audit and Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

Financial Services Director, Susan Gooding-Liburd and Kenneth Smith, Independent External Auditing Firm of Keefe, McCullough & Company, LLP presented the FY 2016 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.

Mr. Smith advised the Commission that staff was extremely involved with the production of the audit report and that information was provided in a timely manner. Mr. Smith stated that the audit has been finalized; however, he wanted to go over the draft with the Commission. He stated that the audit was good this year and that the City should receive the Audit Award. He informed that in the past, the audit was two reports but this year it has been compiled into one report.

Mr. Smith spoke on the area in the financial statement on page 16 which shows to measure the organization's strength with shows the general fund at 9 million, which has gone up consistenly over the past four years and the general trend is excellent.

Mr. Smith spoke regarding the management letter and stated that in the past the City had about 10 pages of comments and this year there is only one comment. The one comment is on the road to being mitigated based on staff in the Grants area.

Commissioner Gloria Lewis asked a question regarding the compliance section on page 103. Mr. Smith stated that it was a prior year comments. The one outstanding area is Grants and that comment is still applicable. The cause, effect, recommendation and management response has been addressed. This comment was there in since 2012 but there has been some hiring in the area to rectify the issue.

Susan Gooding-Liburd, Financial Services Director read the Management Letter to address the management comments.

Mayor Rogers spoke regarding page 65 and Commissioner Lewis asked to go over page 73. Ms. Gooding-Liburd stated that page 73 is statistical information over a 10 year period.

Discussion ensued regarding pages 65, 73, and page 21. Mayor Rogers asked at what precent of our tax bill are we collecting. Ms. Gooding-Liburd stated that she will find out the exact portion but she is sure its in the 90% range.

Page 65 non major funds, small funds that don't show up in the front of the report because they are not as significant so they are shown in the back part of the report. Revenues and expenditures.

Commissioner Beverly Williams thanked the staff for their hard work on the CAFR.

Ms. Gooding-Liburd stated that she will be available to sit with each Commissioner one on one to go over the report more fully.

Vice Mayor Veronica Edwards Phillips thanked staff for going over the report page by page.

Commissioner Lewis stated that she likes page 79 and this is the first she has seen the breakdown in this manner.

Commissioner Sandra Davey stated that the finance director made herself available to go over the repor.

Mayor Rogers spoke regarding Code Enforcement fees, and public safety. Mayor Rogers stated that BSO charges 8.1% of our revenue and we have to look at the other revenue streams.

Commissioner Gloria Lewis expressed her concern with the item being on tomorrow night's agenda as a draft item.

D. DISCUSSION REGARDING ELECTRONIC MESSAGE BOARD SIGNS (BILLBOARDS)

This is a discussion item regarding electronic message board signs, also referred to as billboards.

Tanya Davis-Hernandez, Director of Development Services and Fernando Leiva, Development Services Manager provided an overview on Electronic Message Board. Ms. Davis-Hernandez provided background from 2010 on an Ordinance which was written to allow for reconstruction of billboards and a text amendment which was bought to the Commission which allowed for five billboards in the City to be electronic message boards.

Commissioner Beverly Williams stated that she was not in support of electronic billboards because the City has no control over inappropriate messages and negative signage.

Mayor Hazelle wants to know what is on the book and how our Ordinance gave rights to allow the Electronic Message Boards. Ms. Davis-Hernandez explained that the Ordinance adopted in 2010 provided for provisions to rebuild, alter or replace nonconforming signs subject to 50 percent or more damage and/or cost of restoration clause. However, in March 2016, the Commission approved amendments to the Land Development Regulations to allow existing nonconforming signs to be rebuilt, replaced or substantially altered subject to conditional use approval by the City Commission. The amendment did not allow for any relocation of billboards in the City.

Mayor Hazelle Rogers asked how many billboards are in the City. Ms. Davis-Hernandez responded that currently, there are five billboards in the City; one billboard is located on Commercial Blvd, one on State Road 7 and three on Oakland Park Blvd. There are two billboards on City-owned land (Commerce Park)

Commissioner Gloria Lewis provided historical background on the electronic message board and stated that the Ordinance in March, 2016 was approved by a 3-2 vote.

The consensus from the Commission is to bring this item back for further discussion.

E. DISCUSSION RELATED TO CORRESPONDENCE FROM THE POLICE UNION

REGARDING RAISES

This is a discussion regarding correspondence received from the Police Union related to pay increases.

City Manager Phil Alleyne stated that a letter is being sent to Cities by the Police Union requesting pay increases for police officers and he wanted to provide information to the Commission as it may be a cost impact.

Captain Andrew Dunbar, Broward Sheriff's Department spoke and stated that the Department is not anticipating any pay increases at this time.

F. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE RETURN OF THE LADDER TRUCK TO THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES FIRE STATION

This is a discussion regarding the return of the ladder truck to the City of Lauderdale Lakes Station.

Mayor Hazelle Rogers spoke regarding returning the Ladder Truck to the Fire Station for residence safety.

Chief Ken Kronheim spoke regarding the different types of fire Apparatus and stated that the Ladder Truck is used to reach upper floors of buildings in the event of an emergency.

G. DISCUSSION REGARDING DATES FOR THE CODE ENFORCEMENT WORKSHOP

This is a discussion regarding the second date to hold a Special Workshop related to certain code compliance ordinances.

The Commission set the date for the next code enforcement workshop to be held on Wednesday, April 19, 2017 at 6:00 p.m.

This Ordinance amends the jurisdiction of, and appointment of members to, the Code Enforcement Board and establishes civil penalties for certain violations of the Code.

Staff Recommendation

Background:

The City Commission held two workshops to discuss and obtain public input on Chapter 30 of the Code Ordinance. Staff is presenting to the City Commission the final version for review and adoption.

In September of 2016, the Lauderdale Lakes City Commission adopted ten ordinances comprising of comprehensive amendments to the City's Code of Ordinances. These amendments added new language to the appearance and safety codes to enable the Code Compliance Division to address Matters of concern that were not previously citable under the City's code provisions, incorporated revisions that added additional breadth and/or restrictions to the Code, and also provides for improved administration and enforcement of code provisions. On October 24, 2016, this item was put on the workshop agenda for discussion, the Commission provided feedback and staff responding to that feedback with correction for review tonight.

This Ordinance serves as the final step in the comprehensive amendment of the City's Code, and addresses the following:

- 1. Jurisdictional designations for the Code Enforcement Board and Special Masters.
- 2. Appointment of members to the Code Enforcement Board.
- 3. Revision of notice requirements.
- 4. Civil penalties for violations of amended code sections.
- 5. Providing for a funding source for the Code Enforcement Trust Fund.

ORDINANCE 2017-003

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 30-32, 30-33, 30-52, 30-86, AND 30-87.1 AND CREATING SECTION 30-96 OF ARTICLES II AND III OF CHAPTER 30 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE GOVERNING OF CODE ENFORCEMENT WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR CRITERIA FOR CONFERRING BENEFITS OF THE TRUST FUND; PROVIDING FOR ADOPTION OF REPRESENTATIONS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION IN CODE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the property values of a community are generally improved by the enhancement of the community's housing stock and evirons, and

WHEREAS, a community's clean, well-lighted and safe streets sustain the entire

community, giving rise to higher aspirations and improving opportunities, and

WHEREAS, the Code Enforcement and Development Services staffs have reviewed

the Code of Ordinances and upon such review made recommendations for improvements to

the Code by way of clarification, consistency and modernization, and

WHEREAS, there is a need for and a public purpose in establishing a code enforcement board and citation process within the City, and

WHEREAS, the City Commission has reviewed the recommendations and determined to implement the same,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES as follows:

SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF REPRESENTATIONS: The foregoing Whereas Clauses are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true, and the same are hereby made a specific part of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT: Section 30-32 of Article II of Division 1 of Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 30-32. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning: Page 28 of 237 *Board, code enforcement board or enforcement board* means the City of Lauderdale Lakes code enforcement board.

Chapter 162 shall mean Chapter 162, Florida Statutes, as currently enacted and as may be amended from time to time.

Citation means a supplemental method of code enforcement provided in Chapter 162, [Florida Statutes], by which a code inspector first notifies a violator of a code or ordinance violation, provides a reasonable time for compliance, for which if not complied, the code inspector shall issue a citation to the violator or property owner that provides for a civil penalty, payment of which shall be due to the town, unless the respondent wishes to contest said violation, and for which the citation shall provide the procedures to contest the citation.

City commission means the city commission of the City of Lauderdale Lakes.

Code enforcement inspector/officer means any authorized agent or employee of the city whose duty it is to enforce codes and ordinances enacted by the city. The terms "officer" and "inspector" shall have the identical meaning.

Codes means the city's Code of Ordinances, developmental code, business tax receipt code, plumbing code, electrical code, gas code, building code, fire code, landscape code, sign code, zoning code and any other similar code which may be passed in the future, or which currently applies to the city, whether local, state or federal, that relates to the aesthetics, construction, safety, use or location of any structure or real property in the city. For the purposes of this chapter, such term shall include all codified ordinances relating to these areas of regulation, as well as ordinances which, according to their respective terms, provide for codification.

Compliance means the correction of a violation in accordance with the applicable codes including payment of any outstanding civil penalties, liens, or other special assessments liens and/or costs of fees due to the city for enforcement of the subject ordinances violated.

Continuing violation means a violation which remains uncorrected beyond the time period for correction in either civil violation notice or the final order of the special master, whichever is applicable.

Notices means those which shall be provided as set forth in Chapter 162, Florida Statutes, as currently enacted or as may be amended from time to time.

Owner means the person or persons reflected as the property owner in the most recent certified real property ad valorem tax rolls of the county. Additionally, in the case of multiple or joint ownership, notice to one owner shall be considered for the purposes herein as notice to all multiple or joint owners.

Person means any individual, partnership, limited partnership, trust, corporation, association or other entity.

Repeat violation means a violation of a provision of a code of ordinance by a person whom the code enforcement board or the special master, or any other quasi-judicial or judicial process, has previously found in violation, to have violated, or who has admitted violating the same provision within five years prior to the violation, notwithstanding the violations occur at different locations in the city.

Special master means a person appointed pursuant to division 2 of this chapter, <u>and</u> where used herein shall be deemed a special magistrate as provided in Section 162.03, <u>Florida Statutes.</u>

Violator means that person or entity responsible for a violation of the code, and if different, the owner of the property involved.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT: Section 30-33 of Article II of Division 1 of Chapter 30

of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 30-33. - Jurisdiction of code enforcement board and special master.

- (a) There shall be one City of Lauderdale Lakes Code Enforcement Board and one or more special masters.
- (b) Except as otherwise specifically provided herein, the enforcement board shall have the exclusive jurisdiction to hear and decide cases in which violations are alleged of any provision of the building code, plumbing code, electrical code, gas code, and fire code and. chapters 18, 38, 46, and 50 of this code, excluding cases resulting from the issuance of citations in accordance with Section 30-87.1 herein.
- (c) Except as otherwise specifically provided herein, special masters shall have the exclusive jurisdiction to hear and decide cases involving violations of the business tax receipt regulations, and land developmental regulations code, <u>chapters 6, 10, 22, 42, 54, 74, 82, 86 and 90 of this code</u>, and all <u>cases resulting from the issuance of citations in accordance with Section 30-87.1 of this code</u>.
- (d) Should for any reason the enforcement board be unavailable, inactive, vacated or there exists a conflict of interest between a member of the enforcement board and a party to a case or should a hearing held before such enforcement board conclude in a tie vote, such case otherwise within the jurisdiction of the enforcement board shall be heard and decided by a special master. Likewise, should a special master appointed to hear a case be removed from office, unavailable, or there exists a conflict of interest between the appointed special master and a party to a case, the applicable case, otherwise within the jurisdiction of the special masters, shall be heard and decided by the enforcement board.

SECTION 4 AMENDMENT: Section 30-52 of Article II of Division 3 of Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 30-52. - Appointment and qualifications of members.

The city commission shall appoint a seven-member code enforcement board. Each member of the five-member city commission shall nominate for ratification by the city commission one member to the code enforcement board, with the remaining two members appointed by majority vote of the city commission. The terms of office of each member shall commence on July 1 and end on June 30 of the last year of the term for which the appointment is made. Members of the code enforcement board shall be residents of the city and shall not become candidates for election to any public office or hold any other appointive office or position under federal, state, county or municipal government while serving in this position, except one having extraordinary powers only. Appointments to the board shall be made in accordance with applicable laws and ordinances on the basis of experience or interest in the fields of zoning and building control. The membership of the code enforcement board shall, whenever practicable, include an architect, a businessman, an engineer, a general contractor, a subcontractor and a realtor. If this is not practicable, the city commission may appoint such persons of such qualifications as it deems advisable. The city commission may appoint up to two alternate members for the code enforcement board, each of whom may serve in the absence of an appointed board member by appointment of the chair. In the event of a vacancy on the enforcement board, the city commission shall appoint a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term thereof.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT: Section 30-86 of Article II of Division 4 of Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 30-86. - Notices.

- (a) All notices required by this article shall be provided to the alleged violator by:
 - (1) certified mail, return-receipt-requested, provided if such notices are sent under this paragraph to the owner of the property in question at to the address listed in the tax collector's office for tax notices or to the address listed in the county property appraiser's database. An additional notice may also be provided, and to any other address provided to the city may find for by such the property owner, and is returned as unclaimed or refused. For property owned by a corporation, notices may be provided by certified mail to the registered agent of the corporation. If any

notice sent by certified mail is not signed as received within thirty (30) days after the postmarked date of mailing, notice may be provided by posting as described herein and by first class mail directed to the address furnished to the local government with a properly executed proof of mailing or affidavit confirming the first class mailing;

- (2) by hand delivery by the sheriff or other law enforcement officer, code inspector, or other person designated by the city; or
- (3) by leaving the notice at the violator's usual place of residence with any person therein who is above fifteen (15) years of age and informing such person of the contents of the notice;
- (4) in the case of commercial premises, leaving notice with the manager or other person in charge.
- (b) In addition to providing the notice as set forth in subsection (a) of this section, at the option of the enforcement board, or special master, <u>or the city, as applicable</u>, notice may also be served by publication or posting, as follows:
 - (1) Such notice shall be published once during each week for four consecutive weeks (four publications being sufficient) in a newspaper of general circulation in Broward eCounty. The newspaper shall meet such requirements as are prescribed under F.S. ch. 50 for legal and official advertisements. Proof of publication shall be made as provided in F.S. §§ 50.041 and 50.051.
- (c) In lieu of publication as described in subsection (b) of this section, such notice may be posted for at least ten (10) <u>calendar</u> days in at least two locations, one of which shall be the property upon which the violation is alleged to exist and the other of which shall be in the city hall.
- (d) Proof of posting shall be by affidavit of the person placing the notice, which affidavit shall include a copy of a notice posted and the date and places of its posting.
- (e) Notice by publication or posting may run concurrently with, or may follow, an attempt to provide notice by hand delivery or by mail as required under subsection (a) of this section.

(f) Evidence that an attempt has been made to hand deliver or mail notice as provided in subsection (a) of this section, together with proof of publication or posting as provided in subsections (b) and (c) of this section, shall be sufficient to show that the notice requirements of this article have been met, without regard to whether or not the alleged violator actually received notice.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT: Section 30-87.1 of Article II of Division 5 of Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 30-87.1. - Supplemental code enforcement procedures, citation and schedule of civil penalties.

- (a) Intent. It is the intention of this section to further promote, protect and improve the health, safety and welfare of the citizens and residents of the city by providing an equitable, expeditious, effective and inexpensive method of enforcing any code or ordinances in force in the city where a pending or repeated violation continues to exist.
- (b) Adoption. The city by this section adopts the alternate code enforcement system set forth in Part II of Chapter 162, Supplemental County or Municipal Code or Ordinance Enforcement Procedures, presently codified at F.S. § 162.21, as the same may be amended.
- (c) Penalties. The following schedule sets forth those code violations for which civil penalties may be cited under this section of violations and penalties shall be assessed by code inspectors for violations of city codes or ordinances, pursuant to the procedures established in F.S. pt. II of ch. 162. <u>The descriptions of violations are provided for</u> purposes of general identification only. The specific code provisions applicable thereto are indicated in addition to the respective violation description. Amendments affecting the numbering of the referenced sections shall not affect the validity of the fines.

(d) Citations.

- (1) Code inspectors shall have the authority to initiate enforcement proceedings by issuing a citation to a person that may require the appearance of the violator <u>or</u> <u>property owner</u> at an administrative hearing before a special magistrate.
- (2) Prior to issuing a citation, the code inspector shall provide a written notice to the person or the property owner in violation that there is a violation of a city code or ordinance, and shall establish a reasonable time period, not to exceed thirty (30) calendar days, within which the person must correct the violation. If, upon personal investigation, the code inspector finds that the person has not corrected the violation within the designated time period, the code inspector may issue a citation to the person who has committed the violation or the property owner where the violation has occurred.
- (3) Service of notice of a citation shall be deemed appropriate by hand delivering the citation to the violator or property owner; or posting the citation at the location of the mailing address identified in the public records of the county property appraiser or <u>sState Division of Corporations, through the registered agent</u>, for the violator or property owner in a conspicuous manner.
- (4) The code inspector is not required to provide the alleged violator or property owner with a reasonable period of time to correct the violation prior to issuing the citation if a repeat violation is found, or if the code inspector has reason to believe that the violation presents a serious threat to the public health, safety or welfare, or that the Page 10 of 16

violator or the property owner is engaged in violations of an itinerant or transient nature, or if the violation is irreparable or irreversible.

- (5) The citation form shall include, but not be limited, to the following:
 - a. Date and time of issuance;
 - b. Name of the code inspector and jurisdiction;
 - c. Name and address of the violator;
 - d. Code section or ordinance that has been violated;

e. Brief description of the nature of the violation, including location, date and time of violation;

f. Amount of the applicable civil penalty;

g. Procedure for the person to follow in order to pay the civil penalty or to contest the citation;

h. Notice that if the person fails to pay the civil penalty within the time allowed, and fails to request an administrative hearing before the special master within ten calendar days of service of the citation, the person shall be determined to have waived their rights to contest the citation and that, in such a case, an administrative hearing shall be scheduled before a special magistrate judgment may be entered for the applicable maximum civil penalty; and

i. Notice that the person may be liable for reasonable costs of the hearing should the violator be found guilty of the violation.

- (e) Citation issued to appear before a special master magistrate:
 - (1) The person who has been served with a citation to appear before a special magistrate shall either correct the violation, and pay the civil penalty in the manner indicated on the citation; or

- (2) Request an administrative hearing before a special magistrate to appeal the decision of the code inspector. Said appeal shall be filed not later than ten calendar days after the service of the citation.
- (3) Failure of the violator or property owner to correct the violation and pay the civil penalty appeal the decision of the code inspector within the ten (10) calendar days shall constitute a waiver of the violator's right to result in the scheduling of an administrative hearing before a special magistrate. A waiver of the right to an administrative hearing may result in the imposition of a fine against the violator and/or costs which may result in a lien on the property where the violation occurred.
- (4) Should the violator appeal the citation and be found in violation by the special magistrate, in addition to the imposition of a fine, the violator shall be assessed an administrative cost of \$35.00, which may result in a lien on the property where the violation occurred. The special magistrate shall not waive the administrative costs.
- (f) The following table sets forth those code violations for which civil penalties may be cited under this section. The descriptions of violations are provided for purposes of general identification only. The specific code provisions applicable thereto are indicated in addition to the respective violation description. Amendments affecting the numbering of the referenced sections shall not affect the validity of the fines.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT: Section 30-91 of Article III of Chapter 30 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby created to read as follows:

Sec. 30-91. - Criteria for <u>conferring</u> benefits <u>of the</u> trust fund.

In order to be eligible for a trust fund award, <u>the affected property must be owner-occupied</u>, <u>homestead property within the meaning of section 4 of article X of the Florida</u> <u>Constitution and the</u> applicant shall be required to show, by substantial, competent evidence, in the record, <u>must that the applicant meets the</u> be low to moderate income within the meaning of then current HUD guidelines established by a resolution of the city commission, and in compliance with at least two one of the following:

(1) Senior citizen (55 <u>62</u> years of age or older);

Affected property is homestead property within the meaning of section 4 of article X of the Florida Constitution;

(2) The death of the applicant's spouse or significant-other, who provided for substantially all of the applicant's support within a one-year period immediately prior to the filing of the application contemplated in section 30-90;

(3) A debilitating illness, physical or mental condition of the applicant's spouse or significant-other, who provided for substantially all of the applicant's support within a one-year period immediately prior to the filing of the application contemplated in section 30-90;

(4) The hospitalization of the applicant's spouse or significant other, who provided for substantially all of the applicant's support for a period in excess of <u>fourteen (14)</u> calendar days within any 30-day period, or <u>twenty-one (21)</u> calendar days within any 90-day period, next preceding the filing of the application;

(54) Unemployment of the applicant's spouse or significant-other, who provided for substantially all of the applicant's support for a period of three or more months next preceding the date of application as a result of a physical or mental impairment; or

(65) Applicant has conceded the propriety of the violation.

(76) The cause of the violation being entirely out of the property owner's control and the direct result of a violation of this Code by an unrelated third-party.

SECTION 8. CREATION: Section 30-96 of Article III of Chapter 30 of the Code of

Ordinances is hereby created to read as follows:

<u>Sec. 30-96. – Funding.</u>

<u>A funding source for the Code Enforcement Trust Fund shall be established by a</u> resolution adopted by the city commission.

SECTION 9. CONFLICT: All ordinances or Code provisions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 10. SEVERABILITY: If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 11. INCLUSION IN CODE: It is the intention of the City Commission of the City of Lauderdale Lakes that the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lauderdale Lakes and that the sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word "Ordinance" may be changed to "Chapter," "Section," "Article" or such other appropriate word or phrase, the use of which shall accomplish the intentions herein expressed; provided, however, that Section 1 hereof or the provisions contemplated thereby shall not be codified.

SECTION 12. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its final passage.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION 86-5, AMENDING SECTION 86-35 AND CREATING SECTION 86-39 OF CHAPTER 86, ARTICLE II, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE GOVERNING OF PARKING, STOPPING AND STANDING OF VEHICLES WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR ADOPTION OF REPRESENTATIONS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION IN CODE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the property values of a community are generally improved by the enhancement of the community's housing stock, and

WHEREAS, a community's clean, well-lighted and safe streets sustain the entire

community, giving rise to higher aspirations and improving opportunities, and

WHEREAS, the Code Enforcement and Community Development staffs have

reviewed the Code of Ordinances and upon such review made recommendations for

improvements to the Code by way of clarification, consistency and modernization, and

WHEREAS, there is a need for and a public purpose for regulating parking and

the movement of vehicles within the City, and

WHEREAS, the City Commission has reviewed the recommendations and determined to implement the same on a chapter-by-chapter basis,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES as follows:

SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF REPRESENTATIONS: The foregoing Whereas Clauses are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true, and the same are hereby made a specific part of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. CREATION: Section 86-5 of Chapter 86 of Article II of the Code of Ordinances is hereby created to read as follows:

Sec. 86-5. – Reserved Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law Adopted.

<u>The city hereby adopts the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law, established in</u> <u>Chapter 316 of the Florida State Statutes, as it may be amended from time to time. Any</u> <u>violation of the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law warranting a citation or enforcement</u> <u>action shall be hereby considered an enforceable violation of this Code.</u>

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT: Section 86-35 of Chapter 86 Article II of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 86-35. - Parking in residential zones.

- (a) Prohibitions
 - No passenger vehicle shall be parked within a residential district except upon a driveway paved with a hard, dust-free paving material complying with the Florida Building Code, as amended from time to time, or within a carport, garage or screened side yard but not to encroach into any rear setback or easement.
 - 2. No passenger vehicle, recreational vehicle, trailer, or commercial vehicle shall be parked upon a driveway in a manner that is parallel to the right-of-way abutting such driveway, except where a driveway or portion thereof is of a circular or semi-circular design, in which case all vehicles shall be parked parallel to the perimeter edge of such driveway.
 - 3. No passenger vehicle, recreational vehicle, trailer, or commercial vehicle wider than eight feet, longer than 22 feet or taller than eight feet shall be permitted to park in any residentially zoned district. For the purposes of this section, width of vehicles shall be measured using the permanent sides of the vehicle; length shall be measured from front bumper to rear bumper; height shall be measured from level grade to highest permanent point. Trailers used to transport recreational vehicles shall be permitted to exceed the length of the recreational vehicle a maximum of 25 percent.
 - 4. No heavy commercial vehicle or equipment, as defined herein, shall be permitted to park in any residential district, unless otherwise noted.
 - 5. No residentially zoned property shall be utilized for the storage of vehicles for sale by or in the inventory of any motor vehicle dealer. The presence of more than one vehicle displaying a dealer's license plate upon any residential

property shall be prohibited. The same shall be reasonably considered prima facie evidence of the operation of an unlicensed motor vehicle dealership which shall be punishable under the provisions of this code.

- 6. <u>No motor vehicle, regardless of ownership, is permitted in the swale areas</u> adjacent to the following designated collector or arterial roads at any time:
 - a. Oakland Park Boulevard.
 - b. State Road 7 (U.S. 441).
 - c. The Access Road between Oakland Park Blvd and NW 52nd Avenue.
 - d. NW 52nd Avenue (between Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 43rd Court).
 - e. NW 50th Avenue (between Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 36th Street).
 - f. <u>NW 49th Avenue (between Oakland Park Boulevard and southern City Limit).</u>
 - g. NW 47th Terrace (between Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 34th Street).
 - h. NW 44th Street (between SR7 and NW 31st Avenue).
 - i. NW 26th Street (between NW 49th Avenue and NW 39th Way).
 - j. <u>NW 21st Street (between SR7 to the park).</u>
 - k. NW 19th Street.
- (b) Parking within swale areas

1. <u>Motor vehicles parked in the swale areas adjacent to the following designated</u> <u>collector or arterial roads, or near a hazardous or congested area within the city</u> <u>limits, shall be parked wholly within the swale area, except where otherwise</u> <u>prohibited:</u>

- a. Oakland Park Boulevard.
- b. State Road 7 (U.S. 441).
- c. NW 52nd Avenue (between NW 43rd Court and NW 41st Street).
- d. NW 50th Avenue (between NW 43rd Court and NW 42nd Street).
- e. NW 43rd Avenue (between NW 44th Avenue and NW 37th Street).
- f. NW 41st Street.
- g. NW 47th Terrace (Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 34th Street).
- h. NW 44th Street (between NW 43rd Avenue and Oakland Park Blvd.).
- i. NW 33rd Street (between NW 43rd Avenue and Oakland Park Blvd.).
- j. NW 26th Street (between SR7 and NW 39th Way).
- k. NW 21st Street (between SR7 to the Park).

- I. NW 19th Street.
- a. <u>NW 24th Street (between SR 7 and NW 34th Avenue).</u>
- b. NW 29th Street (between SR 7 and NW 33rd Avenue).
- c. NW 33rd Street (between NW 43rd Avenue and NW 46th Avenue).
- d. NW 34th Street (between SR 7 and NW 36th Terrace).
- e. NW 36th Terrace (between Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 34th Street).
- f. NW 35th Avenue (between Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 35th Street).
- g. NW 37th Street (between SR 7 and eastern City Limit).
- h. NW 39th Street (between NW 31st Avenue and NW 31st Terrace).
- i. NW 36th Street (between SR 7 and Cul-de-sac).
- j. <u>NW 41st Street.</u>
- k. NW 43rd Avenue (between Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 36th Street).
- I. <u>NW 46th Avenue (between Oakland Park Boulevard and 33rd Street).</u>
- 2. Where an access-way intersects a public right-of-way or where property abuts the intersection of two or more public rights-of-way, it shall be prohibited to park any vehicle within twenty feet of the intersection of any two streets.
- 3. Except where prohibited herein, private passenger vehicles owned or operated by the owner, occupant, tenant or their guests of real property within a single-family zoning district (RS-2, RS-3, RS-4) shall be permitted to park within swale areas abutting such property between the hours of 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 a.m.
- 4. No person shall drive, operate or park a motor vehicle within a swale area which abuts the private real property of another without the express permission of the owner, lessee and/or occupant of the private real property abutting such swale or swale area, and the city hereby devotes the swale or swale area to the reasonable use of each abutting property owner thereof, his guests, licensees and invitees, to the exclusion of all others; provided that such use shall not be inconsistent with the laws of the city or the rights of the municipal government.
- 5. It shall be unlawful for any owner, agent, operator or person in charge of any commercial or recreational vehicle to park, store or keep such commercial or recreational vehicle on the pavement of, or in the swale area adjacent to, any public street within the city except in accordance with subsections (c) and (d) herein.
- 6. Any vehicle lawfully parked within a swale area or other right-of-way within the city shall be parked with the flow of traffic, parallel to the paved portion of the right-of-way, with two wheels parked upon such paved portion of the right-of-way. No vehicle, or portion thereof, nor anything therein or thereon shall extend into, onto or over such paved portion of the right-of-way by more than 18 inches.

- 7. Except those motor vehicles parked in accordance with subsection b(1) herein, any motor vehicle lawfully parked within the swale area adjacent to any paved right-of-way shall be parked with two wheels upon such paved portion of the right-of-way and two wheels upon the swale area. No portion of such vehicle, nor anything therein or thereon, shall extend into, onto or over the paved portion of the adjacent right-of-way by more than 18 inches.
- 78. Nothing contained in this section shall prohibit the operation of a city vehicle, emergency vehicle on an emergency service call, or vehicle owned by a utility which is in the course of official business, to park upon the swale area anywhere within the city.
- (c) Parking of commercial vehicles
 - 1. Commercial or heavy commercial vehicles actively engaged in a lawful repair, moving or construction activity for the owners, lessee or occupants, of a property shall be permitted to park upon such property between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Sundays and national holidays. Construction and moving vehicles actively engaged in a permitted operation may be parked overnight in a residential zone, provided the vehicle is not operating between the hours of 7:00 a.m. Monday through Saturday and 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. Sundays and national holidays.
 - 2. Within single-family zoning districts (RS-2, RS-3, RS-4) commercial vehicles shall be parked entirely upon a paved driveway, within a garage, within a carport, or on an area in the side yard located five feet behind the front building setback and a minimum of one foot from the side property line but shall not encroach into any rear setback or easement. Side yard parking areas should be paved if vehicle ingress-egress is frequent enough to cause degradation to the grass area. In all cases the commercial vehicle shall be opaquely screened on three sides by a wall, fence or hedge a minimum of six feet in height.
 - 3. Within single-family zoning districts (RS-2, RS-3, RS-4) commercial vehicles shall be parked on a paved driveway shall not have attached any ladders, or other attachments, which exceed the height of the highest point on the vehicle by more than two feet and such vehicle shall have any signage thereon covered entirely by an opaque cover as permitted in section 86-11 herein. Commercial vehicles may cover signage with a magnetic cover provided it is the same color of the commercial vehicle.
 - 4. Commercial vehicles within multi-family districts (RM-10, RM-16 and RM-20) parked in paved areas that are sufficiently screened from public view. The approved site plan shall dictate the location of areas approved for the parking of commercial and recreational vehicles.
 - 5. Commercial vehicles shall not be used in the conduct of a home business, unless the business has an approved home occupational license from the city. Any person owning or having use of a vehicle parked in a residential

district associated with an approved home occupational license shall also abide by the requirements of section 1112 of the land development regulations.

- 6. No commercial equipment may be stored on a commercial vehicle that is parked on a residentially zoned lot. Such commercial equipment shall be stored only within a fully enclosed structure. No commercial equipment or material which is hazardous, obnoxious, offensive, or has bad odors or dust emanating therefrom may be stored on any residentially zoned property.
- 7. The restrictions contained herein shall not apply to the temporary parking of any commercial vehicle or equipment while its owner or operator is performing lawful and authorized public or private work, including but not limited to performing service or construction work, making deliveries of merchandise or household items, public utility service work, or any authorized emergency vehicles as defined herein. Additionally, vehicles owned and operated by a physically impaired individual when a medical doctor has certified that the vehicle is necessary due to said physical impairment shall also be exempt from the restrictions contained herein.
- (d) Parking of recreational vehicles
 - 1. Within single-family zoning districts (RS-2, RS-3, RS-4) recreational vehicles shall be parked entirely upon a paved driveway, within a garage, a carport, or on an area in the side yard located five feet behind the front building setback and a minimum of one foot from the side property line but shall not encroach into any rear setback or easement. Side yard parking areas should be paved if vehicle ingress-egress is frequent enough to cause degradation to the grass area. In all cases the recreational vehicle shall be opaquely screened on three sides by a wall, fence or hedge a minimum of six feet in height.
 - 2. Recreational vehicles shall be permitted to be temporarily parked in the front of single-family homes, to allow for loading, unloading, cleaning and minor repairs, provided such time period does not exceed 24 hours prior to or after the recreational vehicles have been used by the resident, but in no case shall the loading and unloading period exceed a total of 48 hours within a sevenday period.
 - 3. Recreational vehicles within multi-family districts (RM-10, RM-16 and RM-20) parked in paved areas that are sufficiently screened from public view. The approved site plan shall dictate the location of areas approved for the parking of commercial and recreational vehicles.
 - 4. Recreational vehicles shall not be occupied and may not maintain electrical, water or sewage connections at any time while parked upon a residentially zoned property except that electrical service connections may be attached for a maximum of 24 hours prior to and in preparation for departure from the property.

5. Parking or storage of recreational vehicles shall be limited to those owned by the occupants of the property or their guests.

SECTION 4. CONFLICT: All ordinances or Code provisions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY: If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. INCLUSION IN CODE: It is the intention of the City Commission of the City of Lauderdale Lakes that the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lauderdale Lakes and that the sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word "Ordinance" may be changed to "Chapter," "Section," "Article" or such other appropriate word or phrase, the use of which shall accomplish the intentions herein expressed; provided, however, that Section 1 hereof or the provisions contemplated thereby shall not be codified.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its final passage.

Summary			
An ordinance to amend the FY 2017 Operating and Capital Improvement Budget per Ordinance 2016-31.			

An ordinance to amend the FY 2017 Operating and Capital Improvement Budget per Ordinance 2016-31. To successfully operate the City and conform to accounting principles and standards, budget amendments are requested for the funds shown below.

Staff Recommendation

Background:

General Fund (Fund 001)

The City accepted the Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS16) Grant Award from the U.S. Department of Justice to partially fund two (2) Police Officers at its March 28, 2017 City Commission meeting (Resolution 2017- 041). There are five (5) months remaining in the fiscal year, it is estimated that the City will contribute \$31,000 and the grantor will provide \$42,000 for a total of \$73,000. Staff recommends funding from the fund balance in the amount of \$31,000.

(0011500-3410-COPS16)

The COPS13 grant for two (2) Police Officers will expire June 2017. The City will need to absorb the full cost of the Officers for the next twelve (12) months. At this time, it is estimated that the cost is \$30,000 for the remainder of the fiscal year. Staff recommends funds from the General Fund Contingency in the amount of \$30,000.

(0011500-3410-COPS13)

The City is requesting to launch the Lauderdale Lakes Football and Cheer Program. The program was introduced at the March 28, 2017, City Commission Workshop. The estimated cost of the program is \$80,500, of which, the program will generate its own revenue with the exception of a \$20,000 contribution from the General Fund. Staff recommends funds from the General Fund Contingency in the amount of \$20,000. In addition, other revenue and expenditure accounts will be adjusted to facilitate the new program. **(0011128)**

The Alzheimer Care Center Fund is requesting General Fund support in the amount of \$25,000 for contractual nursing staff. (1121200)

The Minor Home Repair Fund is requesting General Fund support in the amount of \$45,340 for the cost of completing two (2) properties that will not be reimbursed by the Minor Home Repair Grant. (1147070)

Grants Fund (Fund 102)

The City accepted the Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS16) Grant Award from the U.S. Department of Justice to partially fund two (2) Police Officers at its March 28, 2017 City Commission meeting (Resolution 2017- 041). There are five (5) months remaining in the fiscal year, it is estimated that \$42,000 will be provided by the grantor and the City will contribute \$31,000 for a total of \$73,000. (1021500)

Impact Fee Fund (Fund 103)

City of Lauderdale Lakes entered into an agreement with the State of Florida Department of Transportation for the purposes of the completion of the multi-purpose pathway of the Lauderdale Lakes C-13 Greenway from NW 29th Avenue to NW 31st Avenue intersection (Resolution 2017-028). In addition, the City accepted a grant in the amount of \$458,452.80 which has a matching funds component of \$250,000. At this time, \$38,823 is needed for the purchases of surveillance cameras. Staff recommends use of the Impact Fee Fund in the amount of \$38,823. (1031302)

Law Enforcement Trust Fund (Fund 107)

Lauderdale Lakes District Command is requesting to attend the National Preventing Crime in the Black Community Conference scheduled in May 2017 in the amount of \$4,540.50 for five (5) personnel. This conference is necessary to ensure that new teams will understand how to combat crime in the City. The team is made of up a collection of law enforcement personnel and staff members to get a holistic approach to crime prevention. Members of the team will have an opportunity to engage active practitioners through the sharing of innovative ideas and prevention strategies. (1071500)

Alzheimer Care Center Fund (Fund 112)

Contractual staffing of qualified nursing positions is used to fill staffing shortages, during weekend service hours and special events. Contractual staffing is advantageous to the City since it provides immediate hiring of qualified nurses and provides leverage to upgrade or downgrade the level of care when needed. Is it anticipated that additional funding will be needed to support the minimum nursing care needs in the amount of \$25,000. Staff recommends that funds be transferred from the General Fund Contingency Account in the amount of \$25,000. (1121200)

Minor Home Repair Fund (Fund 114)

The City's 40th Year Minor Home Repair Grant was not extended. However, repair has been completed on two (2) properties totaling \$45,340. Staff recommends funds be transferred from the General Fund Contingency in the amount of \$45,340. (1147070)

Transportation Fund (Fund 116)

During the FY 2016, Staff transferred funds from the Transportation Fund into the Capital Improvements Project to complete various projects. However, some of the projects were not completed on time or are no longer needed at this time. Staff recommends a transfer of \$200,000 from the Capital Improvements Project Fund Balance into the Transportation Fund to restore the available balance. (1161316)

Capital Improvements Project Fund (Fund 315)

During the FY 2016, Staff transferred funds from the Transportation Fund into the Capital Improvements Project to complete various projects. However, some of the projects were not completed on time or are no longer needed at this time. Staff recommends a transfer of \$200,000 from the Capital Improvements Project Fund Balance into the Transportation Fund. (3151316)

Staff Recommendation

Background:

It is recommended that the City Commission authorize the City Manager and City Attorney to enter into agreement and accept grant funding from the Children Services Council in the amount of \$75,453.00 for the implementation of the 2017 Summer "MOST" Camp Program. The Children's Services Council agreement requires a City match in the amount of \$26,460.00.

Background:

The City of Lauderdale Lakes has received Children Services Council funding for Summer Camp Programming for several years. The proposed FY 2017 grant award is \$75,453.00 for the period of May 1, 2017 through August 31, 2017.

The Children Services Council Summer "Most" grant will benefit the City by supplying funding for staff, field trips, supplies, rental fees, and educational materials for program implementation. The Summer "Most" Camp places emphasis on enhancing participant's academic, physical and social achievements. The academic components of the camp program allow students to maintain and/or enhance their educational achievement levels over the summer months. The Summer "Most" Program offers 60 minutes per day of reading activities, 30 minutes per day of math activities, and two (2) hours per week of science activities for academic enhancement. The reading and math components are taught by certified teachers using approved CSC curriculum. Campers will have daily scheduled sports and fitness activities to combat childhood obesity. In addition to sports and fitness, each child will partake in a Swim Central Water Safety course for drown prevention. Also, the program includes a full range of cultural and interactive activities to improve the camp participants social skills and exposure to arts and culture, music, and social studies.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST, RESPECTIVELY, AN AGREEMENT TO ACCEPT GRANT FUNDING FROM THE CHILDREN'S SERVICES COUNCIL OF BROWARD COUNTY FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE 2017 "MOST" CAMP PROGRAM IN THE AMOUNT OF SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED FIFTY THREE (\$75,453.00) DOLLARS, FOR THE PERIOD OF MAY 1, 2017, THROUGH AUGUST 31, 2017, A SUMMARY OF WHICH IS ATTACHED HERETO AS EXHIBIT A, AND A FACSIMILE COPY OF WHICH CAN BE INSPECTED IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK, TO PROVIDE FOR SUMMER CAMP OPPORTUNITIES FOR ELIGIBLE YOUTH; PROVIDING FOR A PARTIAL CITY MATCH IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWENTY-SIX THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY AND NO/100 (\$26,460.00) DOLLARS; PROVIDING FOR INSTRUCTIONS TO THE CITY CLERK; PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF REPRESENTATIONS; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Administration has recommended that the City enter into an agreement with the Children's Services Council of Broward County ("CSC") for grant funding in the amount of Seventy Five Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-Three (\$75,453.00) Dollars, for the City's 2017 "Most" Summer Camp Program, with a partial match from the City not to exceed Twenty-Six Thousand Four Hundred Sixty and No/100 (\$26,460.00) Dollars, and

WHEREAS, the "Most" grant will benefit the City by supplying funding for staff, field trips, supplies and educational materials for the Summer program implementation, and

WHEREAS, the Summer "Most" program offers thirty (30) minutes per day of math activities and two (2) hours per week of science activities for academic enhancement, which are administered by certified teachers, using approved CSC curricula, and WHEREAS, in addition to academic enhancements, there will be sports and fitness programs in which each child will participate to combat childhood obesity, a Swim Central Water Safety course for drowning prevention, as well as cultural, art, music programs and interactive activities to improve the social skills of participants, and

WHEREAS, City staff has recommended that it would be prudent and in the best interest of the youth of the City to accept the CSC funding to provide a positive, safe environment for youth that enhances academic achievement, supports social and physical development and strengthens youth relationships with adults and peers, within the context of their families, schools and communities,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAUDERDALE LAKES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. ADOPTION OF REPRESENTATIONS: The foregoing Whereas paragraphs are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true, and the same are hereby made a specific part of this Resolution.

Section 2. AUTHORIZATION AND DIRECTION: The City Commission hereby authorizes and directs Mayor and City Clerk to execute and attest, respectively, an Agreement to accept funding from the Children's Services Council of Broward County for the implementation of the 2017 "MOST" Summer Camp Program, in the amount of Seventy Five Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Three (\$75,453.00) Dollars, for the period of May 1, 2017, through August 31, 2017, a summary of which is attached as **Exhibit A**, and a facsimile copy of which can be inspected in the office of the City Clerk, with a partial match of funds from the City, not to exceed Twenty-Six Thousand Four Hundred Sixty and No/100 (\$26,460.00) Dollars. Section 3. INSTRUCTIONS TO THE CITY CLERK: The City Clerk is hereby authorized to obtain five (5) fully executed copies of the subject Agreement, with one to be maintained by the City; with three to be delivered to Children's Services Council of Broward County, and with one to be directed to the office of the City Attorney.

The Children Services Council agreement requires a City Match in the amount of \$26,460.00.

The Children Services Council Summer "Most" grant will benefit the City by supplying funding for staff, field trips, supplies, and educational materials for program implementation. The Summer "Most" Camp places emphasis on enhancing participant's academic, physical and social achievements. The academic components of the camp program allow students to maintain and/or enhance their educational acheivement levels over the summer months. The Summer "Most" Program offers 60 minutes per day of reading activities, 30 minutes per day of math activities, and two (2) hours per week of science activities for academic enhancement. The reading and math components are taught by certified teachers using approved CSC curriculums. Campers will have daily scheduled sports and fitness activities to combat Childhood Obesity. In addition to sports and fitness, each child will partake in a Swim Central Water Safety course for drown prevention. This Agreement, entered into this <u>1st day of May, 2017</u>, by and between the CHILDREN'S SERVICES COUNCIL, an independent special tax district of the State of Florida, hereinafter referred to as "CSC," and City of Lauderdale Lakes, a not for profit Florida corporation, hereinafter referred to as "PROVIDER."

WHEREAS, this Agreement will enable PROVIDER to provide services, not otherwise funded by any other public funding source; and WHEREAS, funding given to PROVIDER has been found and declared to be for a public purpose.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

I. <u>TERMS OF AGREEMENT</u>

The term of this agreement shall be for the period of **May 1, 2017, through August 31, 2017.** The CSC exercises the **final** renewal option for the period of **May 1, 2017, through August 31, 2017. 2017.** The Agreement may not be renewed for an additional term. The current Renewal Option Period shall be referred to as the "Agreement Term."

PROVIDER understands and acknowledges that the funding will only be for the Agreement Term stated herein. This Agreement is renewable at the sole discretion of the CSC, contingent upon but not limited to the following:

- A. Continued demonstrated and documented need for the services or priority area of funding;
- B. Satisfactory program performance by PROVIDER; and
- C. The availability of funds from CSC. In accordance with Chapter 2000-461 of the Laws of the State of Florida, the CSC is prohibited from creating obligations in anticipation of budgeted revenues from one fiscal year to another without year to year extension provisions in the agreements. It is necessary that fiscal funding out provisions be included in all proposals in which the terms are for periods longer than one (1) year. Therefore, the following funding out provisions are an integral part of this Agreement and must be agreed to by the PROVIDER:

The CSC may, during the contract period, terminate or discontinue the services covered in this proposal at the end of CSC'S then current fiscal year upon forty-five (45) days prior written notice to the successful proposer. Such prior written notice will state that the lack of appropriated funds is the reason for termination.

This written notification will thereafter release CSC of all further obligations in any way related to the services covered herein. The Funding Out statement must be included as part of any agreement. No agreement will be considered that does not include this provision for "funding out".

D. This Agreement may be terminated with cause or without cause in accordance with the provisions contained in Section VI of this Agreement.

II. SCOPE OF WORK

- A. PROVIDER agrees to provide the services and meet the performance measures set forth in Exhibit A, Scope of Work.
- B. PROVIDER agrees to attend seminars and/or training sessions as requested by CSC staff.
- C. PROVIDER agrees to comply with the Monitoring/Reporting Requirements specified in Section V of this Agreement.
- D. <u>Background Screening:</u> All staff working in the program must comply with Level 2 background screening and fingerprinting requirements in accordance with DCF screening requirements and all applicable federal, state, county, city, and other government agency background screening requirements.

III. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

The Bid Solicitation and PROVIDER Proposal Response are hereby incorporated by reference as a part of this Agreement in the following Order of Precedence: Executed Contract, Bid Solicitation Requirements, PROVIDER Application for Funding.

IV. FUNDING AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- A. The annual maximum amount payable by CSC to PROVIDER for FY 16/17 shall be **<u>\$75,453.00</u>**. ("Contract Amount").
- B. The PROVIDER agrees to provide a CSC-required Match in the amount of <u>\$27,108.00</u> for the period of May 1, 2017, through August 31, 2017.
- C. The PROVIDER agrees to obtain and utilize leveraged funding from the Broward Sheriff's Office (BSO) Law Enforcement Trust Fund (LETF) in the amount of <u>\$2,300.00</u>; and the Alzheimer's Association Grant in the amount of <u>\$2,700.00</u>. City of Lauderdale Lakes will provide additional match/leverage to employ additional needed staff members in the amount of <u>\$27,697.00</u> for a total <u>of \$32,697.00</u>.
- D. The CSC agrees to pay for units of service or other deliverables actually provided, invoiced and documented as specified in Exhibit A, Scope of Work. An original

invoice, in the format prescribed by the CSC, is due on or before the tenth (10th) day of the month following the month in which services were rendered. CSC agrees to reimburse PROVIDER on a monthly billing basis.

In order to be deemed proper as defined by the Florida Prompt Payment Act, all invoices must comply with the requirements set forth in this Agreement and must be submitted on the forms as prescribed by CSC. Invoices and/or documentation returned to PROVIDER for corrections may be cause for delay in receipt of payment. Late submission may result in delay in receipt of payment. CSC shall pay PROVIDER within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of PROVIDER'S properly submitted invoice.

- E. The PROVIDER shall submit the invoice for the end of the CSC'S fiscal year, for payment to the CSC no more than fifteen (15) days after the last day of the month the contract is terminated. If the PROVIDER fails to do so, all rights to payment are forfeited and the CSC will not honor any requests submitted after the aforesaid time period. Any payment due under the terms of this contract may be withheld until all reports due from the PROVIDER are received by the CSC and any necessary adjustments thereto have been approved by the CSC.
- F. In the event this Agreement provides for more than one service or program, the Programs Manager may shift funding between services and/or program(s) components, at any time, upon written notice to PROVIDER; however, Programs Manager may not increase funding in excess of the Contract Amount and the total of these adjustments shall not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total Contract Amount.
- G. Submission of accurate, timely documentation and other requested information as required by CSC shall be considered a factor in evaluating future funding requests. Invoices and/or documentation returned to PROVIDER for corrections may not be considered as submitted and shall be cause for delay in receipt of reimbursement.
- H. PROVIDER attests to CSC that no other reimbursement is available or used for invoiced services unless expressly authorized by CSC. This Agreement specifically excludes Medicaid covered services provided to Medicaid certified clients. PROVIDER shall bill and pursue collection of third party and client payments (where applicable) for services rendered under this Agreement. In the event CSC pays PROVIDER for a service that later becomes eligible for Medicaid or other third party coverage, then PROVIDER agrees to deduct the amount paid by CSC on its next invoice. In the event the PROVIDER has submitted a final invoice, PROVIDER shall reimburse CSC in the amount received by Medicaid or other third party payor within (30) days of receipt of that Medicaid payment. Additionally, the PROVIDER must note in the client file the date when clients become eligible for Medicaid or other third party payor. PROVIDER shall keep accurate and complete records of any fees collected, reimbursement, or compensation of any kind received from any client or other third party, for any service covered by this Agreement, and shall make all such records available to CSC upon request. PROVIDER shall report such fees; reimbursement, compensation or funding to CSC for such payments received which will be deducted from PROVIDER's invoices.

- I. No capital equipment shall be purchased under this Agreement. Capital equipment is defined by the Florida Statutes, Chapter 274, as items with a value greater than \$1000 which have a life expectancy of more than one year.
- J. PROVIDER shall submit a W-9 IRS form providing the name, address and Federal I.D. Number of the official payee to whom payment shall be made.
- K. It is PROVIDER'S responsibility to advise the Programs Manager, in writing, of changes in name, address and/or telephone number.

V. MONITORING, REQUIRED RECORDS AND REPORTS

A. MONITORING:

PROVIDER agrees:

- 1. To assign appropriate staff as necessary to attend meetings with CSC staff to discuss issues and recommendations concerning quality of service; service delivery systems, coordination of services, consumer satisfaction, records maintenance, and funding maximization, etc.
- 2. To provide full access at administrative and service delivery sites to CSC during all announced and unannounced visits, for the purpose of examination of records and data covered by this Agreement as well as observation of service delivery, and consumer/PROVIDER staff interaction. CSC and PROVIDER shall maintain the confidentiality of Client services and records in full accordance with any federal or state laws or federal regulations mandating such confidentiality.
- 3. To make all records and files pertaining to Clients subject at all times to inspection, review and/or audit by CSC.
- 4. That, if documentation is not readily available, then payments may be suspended until such time as PROVIDER has rescheduled another monitoring appointment to occur within thirty (30) days.
- 5. To respond to any monitoring findings within the time frame specified therein, that back-up documentation to be used to support the billings and outcomes provided shall be approved in writing by CSC staff.
- 6. That, findings of monitoring reports, responsiveness to corrective action, and all the performance requirements of this Agreement and timeliness of requested information shall be considered factors in evaluating future funding requests.
- 7. To provide CSC access to records and client files developed relevant to this Agreement regarding assessment of Performance Measures beyond the expiration of this Agreement, as applicable.
- 8. Any monitoring reports, evaluation reports and/or accreditation reports from other agencies or funding sources for similar services provided shall be submitted to

CSC within thirty (30) days of receipt. Such reports shall be sent to Programs Manager.

B. REPORTS:

PROVIDER agrees:

- PROVIDER agrees to comply and participate in any data collection as required by the CSC. In the event that the PROVIDER is approached by a third party to participate in a program evaluation study of a CSC funded program, PROVIDER agrees to submit the request to CSC and obtain prior approval from CSC. If approved, PROVIDER agrees to furnish CSC with any and all related program evaluation reports.
- 2. Also, PROVIDER agrees to furnish CSC with any and all reports required in this Agreement within the accompanying time requirements as noted.
- 3. In the event services similar or identical to those covered under this agreement are purchased and/or subsidized in whole or in part by another public or private funding source, notice of funding specifics shall be submitted to the Programs Manager.
- 4. <u>Statistical Demographic Report</u>: The PROVIDER agrees to maintain and report monthly (where applicable) information on client demographics which includes last four digits of social security number, Broward County Schools student identification, age, gender, race, cultural influence, language spoken at home, country of birth, parental marital status, education levels and status in SAMIS or other format provided by, or approved in writing by, the CSC. PROVIDER agrees to track overall Client household income, other benefits received, types of services provided, and other information as required by the CSC.
- <u>Client Satisfaction Surveys</u>: The PROVIDER agrees to furnish the CSC with compiled results of any and all Client Satisfaction Surveys administered by the PROVIDER. Survey reports shall include the total number of surveys administered/mailed and the total number of surveys completed/returned. Upon CSC request, PROVIDER shall submit raw data from all administered Client Satisfaction Surveys.

The CSC may, at its discretion, administer or require the PROVIDER to administer Client Satisfaction Surveys, as deemed necessary. PROVIDER shall provide necessary client information and facilitate the administration of client satisfaction surveys, as directed by the CSC.

6. <u>Client Performance Measure Data Reporting</u>: The PROVIDER shall submit Client Performance Measure data, in the format provided by the CSC, within time frames specified by the CSC. The PROVIDER shall also report any barriers experienced in performance measurement achievement. The report should also include any noteworthy activities that have occurred during the term of this Agreement and such other information as requested.

- 7. <u>Actual Expenditure Report</u>: The PROVIDER shall submit to the CSC an Actual Expenditure Report which reports by line item actual expenditures incurred in the performance of this contract. The report shall be submitted in a format to be provided by the CSC. Such expenditure information will be used to compile historical unit cost data and to analyze appropriate funding levels. Significant discrepancies between budgeted and actual costs may result in recoupment of funds. A final Actual Expenditure Report shall be submitted through SAMIS by the PROVIDER within sixty (60) days after the end of the contract.
- C. OTHER REQUIREMENTS:
 - 1. INTERNAL DOCUMENTATION

PROVIDER agrees to maintain the following, as applicable: (1) Personnel files including hiring records, job descriptions, policies, evaluation procedures, and background screening results, (2) Authorized time sheets, records, and attendance sheets, (3) Daily activity log and monthly calendar, (4) Signature of person at sites authorizing presentations, (5) Training modules, (6) Pre and post session questionnaires, (7) Client information release form, (8) Community Resource Inventory Organizational Profile update, (9) Emergency Disaster Plan and (10) Such other information as requested by CSC.

2. UNITS OF SERVICE

PROVIDER shall document and maintain permanent client records that reflect individual beginning and ending service times, dates of service and nature of service for all units of service provided under this Agreement.

3. TRACKING SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

PROVIDER shall comply with the CSC'S Services and Activities Management Information System (SAMIS), as applicable, identifying all Clients referred to and from the program(s) funded under this Agreement. This shall include, but not be limited to, client information related to client demographics, and identification, referral sources, performance measurement data, service provision data and fiscal activities for all programs funded under this agreement.

4. PRO CHILDREN ACT COMPLIANCE

The PROVIDER shall comply with Public Law 103227 Part C Environmental Tobacco Smoke, also known as the Pro Children Act of 1994, which requires that smoking not be permitted in any portion of any indoor area routinely used or leased or contracted for by an entity and used routinely or regularly for provision of health, day care, education or library programs either directly or through State or local governments, by Federal grant, contract loan, or loan guarantee. The law does not apply to children's services provided in the private residences, facilities funded solely by Medicare or Medicaid funds, and portions of facilities used for inpatient drug or alcohol treatment. Failure to comply with the provisions of the law may result in the imposition of a civil monetary penalty of up to \$ 1,000 per day and/or the imposition of an administrative compliance order on the responsible entity.

5. REVENUE MAXIMIZATION DOCUMENTATION

PROVIDER agrees to comply with any and all reporting and documentation requirements necessary for eligibility for Federal, State and other match funding opportunities to CSC for services provided under this Agreement, e.g., Title IV-E of the Social Security Act, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Block Grant, Medicaid Targeted Case Management, etc.

The PROVIDER shall complete all necessary and appropriate forms for all clients served under this Agreement. This data will be used by the CSC in federal funding revenue maximization efforts. All eligibility information shall be reported to the CSC quarterly, unless otherwise specified by the CSC, and copies of all eligibility forms shall be retained in the individual client/family case files and available for unannounced review by the CSC. Such eligibility information shall not be used as a determination of client eligibility for program services funded under this Agreement.

VI. <u>TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT AND NOTICE</u>

- A. It is the intent of the CSC to assure consistent and orderly delivery of children's services. It is the further intent of the CSC to terminate Agreements only in those situations where such action is essential for the protection of its interest and the interests of children, as determined by the CSC.
- B. This Agreement may be terminated by the PROVIDER without cause upon no less than <u>forty-five (45)</u> days written notice. Said notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery.
- C. This Agreement may be terminated by the CSC without cause upon no less than <u>forty-five (45) days</u> written notice. Said notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery.
- D. In the event that funds needed to finance this Agreement become unavailable, the CSC may terminate the contract upon no less that twenty-four (24) hours notice in writing to the PROVIDER. Said notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery. The CSC shall endeavor, whenever possible and consistent with its legal obligations and principles of prudent management to provide 30 days notice for Termination for Lack of Funds. The CSC shall be the final authority as to the availability of funds and extension of notice beyond the minimum time herein stated.
- E. In addition to the rights set forth in sub paragraphs C and D above, this Agreement may be terminated by the CSC with cause upon no less than twenty-four (24) hours written notice. Said notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery. The CSC at its discretion may waive any breach by the PROVIDER in writing, but such waiver shall not constitute a waiver of any further breaches, including breaches of the same type.
- F. The above provision shall not limit the CSC'S right to remedies at law or to damages.

VII. AUDIT RIGHT AND RETENTION OF RECORDS

CSC shall have the right to audit the books, records, and accounts of PROVIDER that are related to the Scope of Services under this Agreement. PROVIDER shall keep such books, records, and accounts as may be necessary in order to record complete and correct entries related to the Scope of Services under this Agreement. As defined in the Florida Single Audit Act, the PROVIDER agrees to allow the CSC, the comptroller, the Auditor General or other auditing body access to its records as required by Florida Statutes 215.97, Florida Single Audit Act.

PROVIDER shall preserve and make available, at reasonable times for examination and audit by CSC, all financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, and any other documents pertinent to this Agreement for the required retention period of the Florida Public Records Act (Chapter 119, Florida Statutes), if applicable, or, if the Florida Public Records Act is not applicable, for a minimum period of the Agreement Term of this Agreement and for five (5) years after termination of this Agreement. If any audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of the retention period or five (5) years, whichever is longer, the books, records, and accounts shall be retained until resolution of the audit findings. If the Florida Public Records Act is determined by CSC to be applicable to PROVIDER'S records, PROVIDER shall comply with all requirements thereof; however, no confidentiality or nondisclosure requirement of either federal or state law shall be violated by PROVIDER. Any incomplete or incorrect entry in such books, records, and accounts shall be a basis for CSC'S disallowance and recovery of any payment upon such entry.

VIII. PUBLIC RECORDS LAW COMPLIANCE

CSC is a public agency in Florida and as such, PROVIDER's records pertaining to this Agreement are subject to the Public Records Laws of Florida (Florida Statutes, Chapter 119). PROVIDER is required to, and does hereby agree to, comply with all applicable public records laws, including, without limitation:

- A. PROVIDER will keep and maintain public records required by CSC to perform the service hereunder;
- B. Upon request from CSC's custodian of public records, PROVIDER will provide CSC with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Florida Statutes Chapter 119 or as otherwise provided by law.
- C. PROVIDER will ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the Agreement term and following completion of the Agreement if PROVIDER does not transfer the records to CSC.
- D. Upon completion of the Agreement, PROVIDER will transfer, at no cost, to CSC all public records in possession of PROVIDER or keep and maintain public records required by CSC to perform the service. If PROVIDER transfers all public records to CSC upon completion of the Agreement, PROVIDER shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records upon disclosure requirements. If PROVIDER keeps and maintains public records upon

completion of the Agreement, PROVIDER shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to CSC, upon request from CSC's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of CSC.

IF PROVIDER HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO THE PROVIDER'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, CONTACT THE CSC CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT (954) 377-1000; <u>records@cscbroward.org</u>; 6600 WEST COMMERICAL BLVD., LAUDERHILL, FL 33319

IX. <u>OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS</u>

Any and all reports, photographs, surveys, studies, films, books, tapes, recordings, curricula, statistical compilations, materials, presentations, media materials, pamphlets, flyers, software and any other data and documents provided or created in connection with this Agreement (herein referred to as "Documents") are and shall remain the property of CSC. Upon termination of this Agreement, all documents prepared by PROVIDER, whether finished or unfinished, shall become the property of CSC and shall be delivered by PROVIDER to the CSC, at CSC request, within seven (7) days of termination of this Agreement by either party. Any compensation due to PROVIDER shall be withheld until all documents are received as provided herein. PROVIDER nor its officials, agents or employees shall cause the copyright or trademark of any Documents (as defined herein) that are provided or created in connection with this Agreement without the prior written approval of CSC, in its sole discretion.

X. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

PROVIDER is an independent contractor under this Agreement. Services provided by PROVIDER shall be by employees of PROVIDER and subject to supervision by PROVIDER, and not as officers, employees, or agents of the CSC. Employee compensation, personnel policies, tax responsibilities, social security and health insurance, employee benefits, travel, per diem policies and other similar administrative procedures applicable to services rendered under this Agreement shall be those of PROVIDER.

XI. <u>SUBCONTRACTING</u>

PROVIDER shall not assign the responsibility of this Agreement to another party or subcontract for any of the work contemplated under this Agreement, without prior written approval of the Programs Manager. No such approval by the Programs Manager shall be deemed in any event or in any manner to provide for the incurrence of any obligation by the CSC in addition to the total dollar amount stated in this Agreement. All such assignments or subcontracts shall be subject to the conditions of this Agreement and to any conditions of approval that the CSC shall deem necessary.

XII. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

- Α. Within 180 days of the close of its fiscal year, PROVIDER agrees to submit to the CSC a certified independent fiscal audit of all its corporate activities and any accompanying management report(s) issued in conjunction with the audited financial statements. This audit shall be conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). If PROVIDER is subject to an audit under the guidelines consistent with: 1.) Government Auditing Standards (GAS), issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; 2.) Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133, Audit of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations; when and to the extent such OMB Circular A-133 is superseded, the "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards or 3.) The Florida Single Audit Act, Florida Statutes 215.97, and rules of the Auditor General of Florida, then a single bound report is to be provided to the CSC. Audit extensions may be granted in writing by the Programs Manager upon receipt in writing of such request with appropriate justification by the PROVIDER.
- B. <u>Supplanting:</u> The PROVIDER shall not use funds provided by the CSC to replace funds from other funding sources.

XIII. BOARD MEMBERS AND MEETINGS

Within 30 days of the effective date of this Agreement, PROVIDER will submit to the CSC a calendar of its scheduled Board meetings for the current fiscal year and an updated list of Board Members.

XIV. PUBLICIZING CSC SUPPORT

PROVIDER shall identify the CSC'S support on its letterhead, agency newsletter, annual reports and any other printed materials, display CSC support through banners and flyers and utilize every reasonable opportunity to publicize the funding received from the CSC. CSC agrees to provide PROVIDER with a camera-ready logo for such use.

XV. <u>PUBLICATIONS</u>

PROVIDER agrees to supply the CSC, without charge, up to three (3) copies of any publication developed in connection with implementation of programs addressed by this Agreement. Such publications will state that the program is supported by the CSC. PROVIDER agrees that the CSC will have unlimited use of copyrighted materials developed under this Agreement.

XVI. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION

The PROVIDER, its agents, employees or subgrantees will not use or disclose any information concerning a recipient of services under this contract for any purpose not in conformity with state statutes and any applicable federal regulations (45 CFR, Part 205.50) except upon written consent of the recipient, or his/her responsible parent or guardian when authorized by law.

Written Statement of Purpose(s) for Collection of Social Security Numbers:

In accordance with Florida Law, PROVIDERS shall inform all CSC funded program participants and their parents/guardians, in writing, of the purpose(s) for which CSC collects and uses partial social security numbers (last four digits) from its participants and the parents/guardians of such participants. CSC-funded programs shall provide all individuals from whom it collects a partial social security numbers with a copy of a written statement that includes the following:

"The Children's Services Council of Broward County ("CSC") collects and uses partial social security numbers (last four digits) of participants of CSC-funded programs and the parents/guardians of such participants so that CSC may collect and use data from other agencies for comparison purposes in order for CSC to track and measure the impact of CSC-funded programs and services and to assist CSC with maintaining and improving successful programs and services. All individual information will be safeguarded and will not be disclosed. CSC's collection of the partial social security numbers from its participants and the parents/guardians of such participants is imperative for the performance of CSC's duties and responsibilities as prescribed by law. The partial social security numbers collected by CSC shall not be used by CSC for any purpose other than the purpose provided in this written statement."

XVII. NOTIFICATION FOR USE OF PARTICIPANT DATA

PROVIDER agrees to inform recipients of services of myriad uses of data by the CSC.

Written Statement of Purpose for Authorizing Collection of Data for Research

In compliance with research ethical standards, PROVIDERS shall inform all CSC funded program participants and their parents/guardians, in writing, of the purpose(s) for which CSC collects and uses data from its participants and the parents/guardians of such participants. PROVIDERS shall also request parental consent for CSC and/or PROVIDER to obtain education records for the purpose of research (20 U.S.C SS 1232g(a)(4)(B)(iv); U.S.C SS 1232(b). CSC-funded programs shall provide all individuals enrolled in their programs with a copy of a written statement that includes the following:

"In order to continue funding programs like this one, Children's Services Council of Broward County ("CSC") and authorized users conducts research to see how participants do while in the program, as well as after they leave the program. In addition to performance measurement data collected from participants in their program, CSC research staff may give participants additional surveys and assessments. CSC may also collect information on participants after they complete the program. The information collected after participants leave the program will come from county and state public health databases like Florida Department of Education. The information participants provide will not be used to identify them. CSC has created many safeguards to protect participants' privacy and to prevent unauthorized use or access to it. CSC is not allowed to release any of participants' personal information (Open Government Sunset Review Act; Section 119.15, F.S.)."

XVIII. SECURITY OBLIGATIONS

PROVIDER shall maintain an appropriate level of data security for the information the PROVIDER is collecting or using in the performance of this contract. This includes, but is not limited to, approving and tracking all PROVIDER employees that request system or information

access and ensuring that user access has been removed from all terminated PROVIDER employees.

XIX. CLIENT RISK PREVENTION AND INCIDENT REPORTING

- A. PROVIDER shall immediately report knowledge or reasonable suspicion of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of a child, aged person, or disabled adult to the Florida Abuse Hotline on the statewide toll- free telephone number (1-800-96ABUSE). As required by Chapters 39 and 415, FLORIDA STATUTES, this is binding upon both the PROVIDER and its employees.
- B. In the event of critical incidents such as serious client accident, injury or death, PROVIDER shall advise the Programs Manager immediately by phone and in writing within twenty-four (24) hours. All pertinent information such as Agency Incident Reports, Police Reports, actions taken, etc., shall be furnished by the PROVIDER to the Director of Program Services within twenty-four (24) hours of the incident, or receipt of such information.

XX. NONDISCRIMINATION

Programs receiving funding from the CSC shall not discriminate against an employee, volunteer, or participant of the PROVIDER on the basis of race, color, gender, sexual orientation, religion, national origin, citizenship, disability, or age except that programs may target services for specific participant groups as defined in the application. Additionally, agencies receiving funds shall demonstrate the standards, policies, and practices necessary to render services in a manner that respects the worth of the individual and protects and preserves the dignity of people of diverse cultures, classes, races, religions, sexual orientation, and ethnic backgrounds. The parties shall affirmatively comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in the course of providing any services funded by CSC, including Titles I and II of the ADA (regarding nondiscrimination on the basis of disability), and all applicable regulations, guidelines, and standards. In addition, the parties shall take affirmative steps to ensure nondiscrimination in employment of persons with disabilities.

XXI. INDEMNIFICATION CLAUSE

Any PROVIDER who is a state agency or subdivision, as defined in Chapter 768.28, Florida Statues, agrees to be fully responsible for its acts of negligence, or its agents' acts of negligence when acting within the scope of their employment or agency, and agrees to be liable for any damages resulting from said negligence. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any PROVIDER to which sovereign immunity may be applicable. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency or political subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any manner arising out of any contract or under this Agreement.

XXII. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

The PROVIDER will indemnify and hold harmless, CSC from liability of any nature or kind, including costs and expenses for or on account of any copyrighted, service marked, trademarked, patented or unpatented invention, process, article or work manufactured or used in the performance of the contract, including its use by CSC. If the PROVIDER uses any design, device,

materials or works covered by letters, service mark, trademark, patent, copyright or any other intellectual property right, it is mutually agreed and understood without exception that the proposal prices will include all royalties of costs arising from the use of such design, device, or materials in any way involved in the work.

This article will survive the termination of any contract with CSC.

XXIII. INSURANCE

A. PROVIDER shall maintain in force for the term of this Agreement comprehensive general liability in the minimum amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) per occurrence bodily injury and property damage combined single limit. Such policy will be evidenced by a Certificate of Insurance which reflects CSC as an additional insured and provides thirty (30) days prior written notice of cancellation. The Certificate of Insurance shall also be in compliance with Florida Statute 440 (Workers' Compensation Law).

Further, PROVIDER will maintain professional liability insurance in the minimum amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) for each claim, subject to insurance market availability and affordability. Such policy will be evidenced by a Certificate of Insurance which provides thirty (30) days prior written notice of cancellation.

Each renewal of the respective Certificate of Insurance provided for above shall be submitted to the CSC. Failure to submit a current Certificate of Insurance shall result in suspension of any monies due and owing for any outstanding invoice of the PROVIDER by the CSC. PROVIDER shall submit a copy of their current Certificate of Insurance to the CSC when this Agreement is signed with renewals of same annually thereafter.

B. If PROVIDER'S insurance is provided by a municipality and at any time the municipality is unable or unwilling or otherwise ceases to provide insurance to CSC for injury, damages, or liability which may arise out of the performance of this Agreement, PROVIDER shall be responsible for providing sufficient insurance in amounts and under terms required by CSC. CSC, in its sole discretion, shall determine what constitutes sufficient insurance. Documentation shall be submitted by PROVIDER to the Programs Manager.

XXIV. AMENDMENTS: ASSIGNMENTS

- A. No modification, amendment or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document executed with the same formality and of equal dignity herewith. However, the Programs Manager for the CSC may sign a modification, amendment or alteration to the terms and conditions of this Agreement where there is a change to Exhibit A, Scope of Services, to reduce the Contract Amount, or to change Performance Measures.
- B. This contract or agreement is personal to the parties herein and may not be assigned, in whole or in part, by the proposer without prior written consent of CSC. The

PROVIDER herein shall not assign payments under this contract or agreement without the prior written consent of CSC.

XXV. WAIVER OR BREACH

Waiver or breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other subsequent breach and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement.

XXVI. <u>DEFAULT</u>

In the event that the awarded PROVIDER(S) should breach this contract, CSC reserves the right to seek remedies in law or in equity.

XXVII. <u>REPRESENTATIONS AND ACKNOWLEDGMENTS</u>

- A. PROVIDER represents to CSC that upon the execution of this Agreement and continuing throughout the Agreement Term the following are true and correct. In the event that any of the following representations become at any time not true, the PROVIDER shall immediately provide written notice of same to the Programs Manager.
 - 1. There have been no irregularities involving its management or employees that could have a material effect on PROVIDER'S operations or financial stability.
 - PROVIDER has committed no violations or possible violations of laws or regulations the effects of which should be considered by CSC prior to entering into this Agreement.
 - 3. There are no material transactions that have not been properly recorded in the appropriate document(s) or disclosed.
 - 4. Related party transactions as defined by generally accepted accounting principles and related amounts receivable or payable have been properly recorded or disclosed.
 - 5. It maintains appropriate active license(s), which are all in good standing and have not been revoked or suspended, where PROVIDER is operating a facility or providing a service where any type of licensure is required, including, but not limited to federal, state, county and local law.
 - 6. PROVIDER represents that all persons delivering the services required by this Agreement have the knowledge and skills, either by training, experience, education, or a combination thereof, to adequately and competently perform the duties, obligations, and services set forth in the Scope of Services and to provide and perform such services to CSC'S satisfaction for the agreed compensation.
 - 7. PROVIDER shall perform its duties, obligations, and services under this Agreement in a skillful and respectable manner. The quality of PROVIDER'S

performance and all interim and final product(s) provided to or on behalf of CSC shall be comparable to local state and national best practice standards.

- B. PROVIDER acknowledges that:
 - 1. Verification of liability protection, shall accompany this Agreement upon execution of this Agreement by PROVIDER.
 - Information, guidance and technical assistance offered by Programs Manager, or any other staff, whether written or verbal, in no way constitutes a guarantee of execution of this Agreement by the CSC and should not be relied upon as a basis for doing business, delivering service, expending financial resources or expectation of receipt of payment.

XXVIII. PUBLIC ENTITIES CRIMES ACT

PROVIDER represents that the execution of this Agreement will not violate the Public Entities Crimes Act (Section 287.133, Florida Statutes), which essentially provides that a person or affiliate who is a contractor, consultant or other provider and who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a Public Entity Crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to CSC, may not submit a bid on a contract with CSC for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases of real property to CSC, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with CSC, and may not transact any business with CSC in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statues, for category two purchases for a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list. Violation of this section shall result in cancellation of this Agreement and recovery of all monies paid hereto, and may result in debarment from CSC's competitive procurement activities.

XXIX. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE

This Agreement shall be governed, construed, and controlled according to the laws of the State of Florida without regard to its conflict of laws provisions. Any claim, objection or dispute arising out of the terms of this Agreement shall be litigated in the Seventeenth Judicial Court in and for Broward County, Florida.

XXX. <u>COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS</u>

The parties shall comply with all federal, state, and local government laws, codes, ordinances, rules, and regulations in performing its duties, responsibilities, and obligations related to this Agreement.

XXXI. SEVERABILITY

In the event a portion of this Agreement is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall continue to be effective unless CSC or PROVIDER elects to terminate this Agreement. An election to terminate this Agreement based upon this provision shall be made within seven (7) days after the finding by the court becomes final.

XXXII. CIRCULARS, STATUTES AND COMMON RULES

The source of the CSC'S funding is local dollars; thus the PROVIDER does not need to conduct a separate single audit under this contract. The PROVIDER shall use the following Circulars as a guideline for managing the CSC'S funding:

- A. Administrative Requirements: OMB Circular A-102 "Grants and Cooperative Agreements with State and Local Governments," OMB Circular A-110 "Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Agreements with Institutions of Higher Education, Hospitals and Other Non-Profit Organizations."
- B. Allowable Costs: OMB Circular No. 87, "Cost Principles for State and Local Governments," OMB Circular No. A-21, "Cost Principles for Educational Institutions," OMB Circular No. A-122 "Cost Principles for Nonprofit Organizations" and OMB Circular A-133, "Audits of State, Local Governments and Non-Profit Institutions."
- C. Florida Statutes 215.97, Florida Single Audit Act.

XXXIII. HEALTH INSURANCE PORTABILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT (HIPAA)

Both parties agree to satisfy the standard for personal health information contained in the federal and state statutes and regulations, including, without limitation, any regulations promulgated under HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act), as applicable. It is expressly understood by the parties that where CSC is funding services, CSC personnel and/or its agents shall have access to protected health information (hereinafter known as "PHI") for the purposes of compliance monitoring, quality assurance activities, and auditing. These provisions do not preclude CSC from disclosing protected health information to report unlawful conduct in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.502(j) (as may be amended from time to time).

Where required, PROVIDER shall handle and secure such PHI in compliance with HIPAA and its related regulations and, if required by HIPAA or other laws, include in its "Notice of Privacy Practices" notice of PROVIDER and/or CSC's uses of client's PHI. The requirements to comply with this provision and HIPAA shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement. The parties to this Agreement do not believe that a business associate or trading partner relationship (as defined by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act or "HIPAA") exists between PROVIDER and CSC with regard to this Agreement; however if the Programs Manager subsequently determines that such a relationship exists, the parties agree to enter into an appropriate agreement using the form of such agreement to be provided by Programs Manager in his/her sole and absolute discretion at that time.

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XXXIV. MULTIPLE ORIGINALS

This Agreement may be fully executed in two (2) copies or more by all parties, each of which bearing original signatures, shall have the force and effect of an original document.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

I. Method of Service Delivery

The Provider shall provide neighborhood out-of-school time programming for elementary school age children which will:

Provide a safe, positive environment for youth that enhances academic achievement, supports social and physical development and strengthens youth relationships with adults and peers within the context of their families, schools and communities, thereby strengthening youth protective factors and reducing risk factors.

As a CSC Maximizing Out-of-School Time (MOST) program, the program shall incorporate best practices and offer a safe, positive environment for children, including those with special behavioral, physical, or developmental needs. CSC MOST programs shall incorporate these research-based best practices:

- Qualified, enthusiastic, well-trained, and consistent staff.
- Physical and psychological safety of all students.
- Nutritious snacks and meals.
- Strong family involvement.
- Partnerships with students' schools.
- Acknowledgement and appreciation of diversity.
- Age appropriate opportunities for students to grow and learn including a focus on academic learning and youth development, the learning of new skills, and the exploration of new interests.

CSC MOST programs shall adopt a **1:20 ratio** for general population children in kindergarten through the fifth grade and **1:10 ratio** for general population children in pre-kindergarten. Ratios for special needs students will be based on the individual populations within a program.

Provider shall provide services that accomplish the following:

- 1. Children will remain safe and not experience a serious injury (requiring emergency room attention) nor abuse while in care.
- 2. Children will improve basic reading, math and science skills.
- 3. Children will increase their activity levels and improve their ability to make healthy nutrition choices.
- 4. Children will improve their social skills and interaction with their peers and adults.
- 5. Children with special needs will be placed properly either in an inclusive setting or in a specialized program with policies and procedures in place to ensure appropriate medication administration and use of seclusion and restraint.
- 6. Children will develop interests in different domains including, art, reading for pleasure, leadership development, and participation in community activities.

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A. Program Intent

The program shall provide a safe, positive environment for children that enhances academic achievement, supports social and physical development and strengthens children's relationships with adults and peers within the context of their families, schools and communities. The academic components of the summer camp program shall keep children from regressing academically in the summer months. Teaching high-risk, economically disadvantaged youth the skills to become successful in life is at the core of the Lauderdale Lakes Summer Camp Program. The five major components of the program are academic achievement, physical activity, nutrition, social skills building, crime prevention and substance abuse education, service learning, recycling initiatives and cultural enrichment.

B. Target Population

Target populations for CSC Maximizing Out-Of-School-Time (MOST) programs are children who are enrolled in a School Board sanctioned education program and who are **NOT** participating/ enrolled in other child care arrangements, **AND** who are

- (1) children of low income families in the general population, **and/or**
- (2) children with behavioral health conditions, and/or
- (3) children with special physical or developmental conditions.

Wherever possible, programs will serve children in an inclusionary format that meets the needs of children of varying abilities and exceptionalities. The Provider shall extend the concept of "inclusion" by providing services to children with disabilities during the course of administering CSC MOST programs to the general population; to the extent that services can be provided in a safe environment, and incorporating as many of the critical factors for successful inclusion as possible, as delineated in the Request for Proposal. "Inclusion is defined as the process and practice of educating students with disabilities in the general education classrooms of their neighborhood school, with the supports and accommodations needed by that student."

The Provider shall provide services to the following population:

1. General Population

MOST GP and Inclusionary programs must serve children ages 4 to 12 from low income families. Priority should be given to those children attending a priority Title1 school where 80% or more of the students qualify for Free or reduced lunch (Exhibit C).

C. Service Delivery - Core Services

Provider shall obtain approval from the CSC in writing prior to any site change. Site changes are subject to CSC approval.

E. Dates/Days/Hours of Operation:

The Provider shall operate the summer program from June 12, 2017 through August 11, 2017, Monday through Friday. Daily hours of operation shall be from 8:00 a.m. through 6:00 p.m. The program will be closed on July 4, 2017.

The Provider shall provide services in accordance with the sample program schedule indicated in Exhibit B.

III. General Operating Information

A minimum of (110) unduplicated children shall be served during the summer, with an average daily attendance of <u>94</u>, calculated at <u>85%</u>.

A. Partnership Recognition:

The Provider shall make a concerted effort to promote the CSC and the Provider as partners for these program services in accordance with CSC guidelines on "How to Acknowledge CSC Funding" with prominent Provider and CSC logo displays on all funded program materials, on websites and other electronic venues, in annual reports, newsletters, and at related events, etc. Program staff shall be fully aware of the partnership and able to articulate that their program is supported and funded by CSC.

B. Background Screening/Licensing:

All staff working in the program must comply with Level 2 Background Screening and fingerprinting requirements in accordance with DCF screening requirements and all applicable federal, state, county, city, and other government agency background screening requirements. The program must maintain staff personnel files which reflect that a screening result was received and reviewed to determine employment eligibility prior to employment. Provider shall re-screen each employee, volunteer and/or subcontractor every five years.

An **Attestation or Affidavit of Good Moral Character**, as applicable, must be completed annually for each employee, volunteer, and subcontracted personnel who work in direct contact with children. Provider shall re-screen each employee, volunteer and/or subcontractor every five years.

School based programs must follow all screening requirements as required by the School Board of Broward County.

C. SAMIS Data Integrity:

The Provider shall make every effort to maintain SAMIS data integrity. Maintenance of data integrity shall include information in the Case Data Gatherer (CDG), Fiscal Module, and Performance Measurements (PM) modules.

<u>Performance Measurements (PM) Application:</u> In the PM module, each participant shall be attached to the appropriate PM service component. Test results for each participant shall be entered through the PM service component.

<u>Closing Cases:</u> All cases must be closed in both the CDG and in the PM components of SAMIS upon the conclusion of services, with the appropriate termination reason. If a contract is terminating early, or if a contract is sunsetting, any remaining active cases shall be closed, with the effective date being no later than the last date on which the contract is active.

<u>Reopening Cases:</u> In the event that a child leaves the program and comes back at a later date, the Provider shall reopen the old case, not open a new case.

D. Dual Enrollment

Children who are participating in 21st Century Community Learning Center programs cannot be dually enrolled in any CSC MOST program occurring during the same time period. This includes school year and summer.

E. Student Identification Number

When registering children for the MOST Program providers need to collect and enter each child's Student Identification Number into SAMIS. In the rare case that an eligible child does not have a Student Identification Number (the child is not enrolled in a Broward County Public School or Charter School) the provider must note this on the child's registration form and leave the field empty in SAMIS.

IV. Units of Service

A. The Units of Service are defined as follows:

Non-School Day (School year) / Summer Unit –(Unit # 9221)

One (1) unit of non-school day care is defined as six (6) or more hours per child per day on non-school days during the summer. Attendance of each participant must be timed in and out in writing each day by an adult. Days of Non-School Day, General Population, partial attendance of three (3) or more hours may be billed at a single partial rate of 50%, as needed for students attending a School Board sanctioned summer academic program.

B. The maximum number of units to be provided under this contract is as follows:

Days of Non-School Day, partial attendance of three (3) or more hours may be billed at a single subunit rate of 50%, or **<u>\$6.49</u>**, as needed for students attending a School Board sanctioned summer academic program

Total for all units of service for FY 16/17 may not to exceed \$53,403.00.

*Note that extended decimal places are necessary to account for partial units and ensure accuracy of dollar calculations.

V. Method of Payment

- 1. Unit Costs: Client services provided under this contract will be paid as Units of Service at the rates and maximum amounts as defined above in Section IV. A. The maximum amount to be paid under this Scope of Work for units of service shall not exceed: **\$53,403.00**.
- 2. <u>Value Added (#8020)</u>: Value added expenditures shall be on a cost reimbursement basis. The CSC will pay the PROVIDER for allowable value added expenditures in accordance with CSC Provider Guidelines and the approved value added budget and value added budget narrative, hereby incorporated by reference. Only value added expenditures incurred on or after the contract effective date and on or prior to the termination date of the contract are eligible for payment. The total maximum amount to be paid under this contract for value added expenditures shall not exceed: <u>\$22,050.00</u>.

- 3. All payments shall be requested by the Provider on a monthly basis in the format prescribed by the CSC. Approved payment will be derived from PROVIDER invoices reflecting services delivered in accordance with the contract. Agencies will not be paid for clients who do not attend sessions. Payment is contingent upon submittal of complete and accurate data in accordance with CSC requirements for the reporting of client and service data information. No invoices will be processed for payment if required backup documentation has not been provided in a complete and accurate manner. The Provider is required to pursue third party, Medicaid, and client payments (where applicable). If the contract is with an agency which is subcontracting delivery of services to other Providers, the lead agency will be responsible for compiling all data necessary to submit a consolidated monthly invoice, and required reports. These funds shall not be used to supplant any other sources of funding including, Medicaid, private insurance, and/or, client fees.
- 4. Leverage: The PROVIDER agrees to obtain and utilize leveraged funding from the Broward Sheriff's Office (BSO) Law Enforcement Trust Fund (LETF) in the amount of <u>\$2,300.00</u>; and the Alzheimer's Association Grant in the amount of <u>\$2,700.00</u>. City of Lauderdale Lakes will provide additional match/leverage to employ additional needed staff members in the amount of <u>\$27,697.00</u> for a total leverage of <u>\$32,697.00</u> for the period of **May 1, 2017, through August 31, 2017.** The Provider shall provide proof of leveraged dollars and utilization on behalf of the project as prescribed on the CSC invoice format on or before the due date of the invoice(s). To the extent that the Provider fails to provide such proof, then that amount shall be deducted from any amounts due and owing by the COUNCIL to the Provider under this contract or any other contracts between the parties. The total amount of Leverage to be applied to this Scope of Work shall be through the end of the contract period in accordance with the approved line item budget, hereby incorporated by reference.
- 5. Sliding Fee Scale: In order to further the reach of CSC funding, Provider shall utilize the CSC's approved sliding fee scale as identified in the RFP, herein incorporated by reference. Collected fees shall be deducted from the invoice as third party payments. No child shall be denied services due to inability to pay. Fees may be waived based on documented individual circumstances.

VI. Performance Measures

The PROVIDER will be required to submit client performance measure data, in the SAMIS Performance Measure (PM) Module, within the time frames specified by the CSC. The PROVIDER shall also report any barriers experienced in performance measure achievement, as required. The report should also include any noteworthy activities that have occurred during the term of this Agreement, as requested. PROVIDERS will use the CSC Data Quality Assurance Report to ensure administration points are completed and service components are attached.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends APPROVAL of the proposed vacation (abandonment) of three (3) utility easements located on the "Tricity Plat" and "Somerset Plaza Plat" properties at the southwest corner of West Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 31st Avenue. This approval would also authorize the City Manager to execute a letter of support to Broward County for approval.

BACKGROUND

On December 6, 2016, Application No. 01-EV-16, was filed by the Lauderdale Lakes Community Redevelopment Agency ("CRA"), through Leigh Robinson Kerr & Associates, Inc., requesting to amend the previously approved utility easements on the above noted plats. On January 18, 2017, the Development Review Committee (DRC), consisting of representatives from Fire, Development Services, Police, and City Engineer met, reviewed and offered no objections to vacating the easements on the above-referenced plats as shown on the attached sketch and description.

The +/- 20-acre subject parcel is currently zoned B-2 with an underlying land use of Commercial. The CRA bought the foreclosed property in 2010, marketed the property and selected American Land Ventures, now the contract purchaser, to develop the site. The vacation is being requested to facilitate the development proposed for the site. There is no longer a compelling public need or necessity for the utility/water/sewer platted easements located on the subject property.

ANALYSIS

The Petitioner sent requests for consent to the various utility companies. The attached letters in Exhibit "C" indicate approval of this request. The type/description of easements on the above noted plats are as follows:

Section 509A. – Vacation of rights-of-way or easements – applies to this request as follows:

509A.1. Vacating rights-of-way or easements. The city commission may, of its own motion or upon the petition of any person adopt a resolution vacating, abandoning, discontinuing, and closing any existing public or private street, alleyway, road, highway or easement and disclaiming any right of the city and the public at large to any land contained therein. Prior to the adoption of such resolution, the commission shall hold a public hearing and publish notice thereof. The resolution, as adopted, and the proof of publication of the notice of adoption of the resolution shall be recorded in the public records of the county.

The City's Attorney's Office has reviewed this request and has approved as to form.

CONCLUSION(S)

Staff finds the request in compliance with the authority and purpose of the LDRs. Staff recommends approval of this request.





LOCATION MAP



RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends APPROVAL of the proposed vacation (abandonment) of three (3) utility easements located on the "Tricity Plat" and "Somerset Plaza Plat" properties at the southwest corner of West Oakland Park Boulevard and NW 31st Avenue. This approval would also authorize the City Manager to execute a letter of support to Broward County for approval.

BACKGROUND

On December 6, 2016, Application No. 01-EV-16, was filed by the Lauderdale Lakes Community Redevelopment Agency ("CRA"), through Leigh Robinson Kerr & Associates, Inc., requesting to amend the previously approved utility easements on the above noted plats. On January 18, 2017, the Development Review Committee (DRC), consisting of representatives from Fire, Development Services, Police, and City Engineer met, reviewed and offered no objections to vacating the easements on the above-referenced plats as shown on the attached sketch and description.

The +/- 20-acre subject parcel is currently zoned B-2 with an underlying land use of Commercial. The CRA bought the foreclosed property in 2010, marketed the property and selected American Land Ventures, now the contract purchaser, to develop the site. The vacation is being requested to facilitate the development proposed for the site. There is no longer a compelling public need or necessity for the utility/water/sewer platted easements located on the subject property.

ANALYSIS

The Petitioner sent requests for consent to the various utility companies. The attached letters in Exhibit "C" indicate approval of this request. The type/description of easements on the above noted plats are as follows:

509A.1. Vacating rights-of-way or easements. The city commission may, of its own motion or upon the petition of any person adopt a resolution vacating, abandoning, discontinuing, and closing any existing public or private street, alleyway, road, highway or easement and disclaiming any right of the city and the public at large to any land contained therein. Prior to the adoption of such resolution, the commission shall hold a public hearing and publish notice thereof. The resolution, as adopted, and the proof of publication of the notice of adoption of the resolution shall be recorded in the public records of the county.

The City's Attorney's Office has reviewed this request and has approved as to form.

CONCLUSION(S)

Staff finds the request in compliance with the authority and purpose of the LDRs. Staff recommends approval of this request.




EXHIBIT B Land Use and Zoning Map

It is found that every 98 seconds, another person experiences sexual assault. One in 9 girls and 1 in 53 boys under the age of 18 experience sexual abuse or assault at the hands of an adult. 82% of all victims under 18 are female. Females ages 16-19 are 4 times more likely than the general population to be victims of rape, attempted rape, or sexual assault.

In recognition of the National Child Sexual Abuse Awareness Month, the Female Development World Organization is coordinating a series of events to raise funds and awareness of current sexual abuse problems and provide opportunities for prevention.
